### State Officials Urge Safety First During Holiday

Austin, Tex. — The Texas Safety Association today issued its annual "Accidental Death Alert" for the Labor Day holiday weekend and called on Texas drivers to personally identify themselves with traffic safety problems.

"Traffic safety is not a 'one-way street', S. Ross Carr, TSA President said. "Each driver is equally responsible for operating his automobile safely on our streets and highways."

The Association President said too many drivers fail to take positive action in matters of traffic safety due to a lack of personal identification with the problem.

"And, some even operate under the false idea they have some sort of built-in personal immunity to accidents," Carr added. "They think 'it' can't happen to them."

"This just isn't true. — Each driver in our state has less than a 50-50 chance to go through his driving career without being involved in a traffic mishap, or without incurring injury to himself or one of his family."

Carr advised drivers to use extreme caution and display courtesy in traffic during the holiday weekend.

"Put all your driving skills to work: be prepared for the unexpected actions of other drivers; and adopt a proper driver-attitude to stay out of trouble," he said.

The TSA "Accidental Death Alert" goes into effect at 12:01 a.m. Saturday, Sept. 3 and ends at 11:59 p.m. Monday, Sept. 5. The period coincides with the Department of Public Safety's traffic alert, "Operation Motorcade." The TSA alert also includes other accidental deaths.

The Association is cooperating with the DPS, other state agencies and local organizations in promoting safety for the holiday period.

### Mayor Issues Statement

Mayor Robert Vaughan issued the following statement after the successful outcome of the election:

"The city council of Robert Lee and the special sewer committee wish to thank the people of Robert Lee for the confidence shown in the water and sewer program that was voted on last Saturday, the 27th.

"We will proceed as fast as we can to put this program into effect. The engineers tell us that it will be about 60 days before final plans are ready for bidding.

"Every effort will be made by your council and the sewer committee to see that the sewer lines are available to all houses, if at all possible."

It will be mandatory for everyone who is within 100 feet of a sewer line to tie on, city officials said. Cost for residential service will be \$3.00 per month. Financing for taking care of the tying on cost will be provided by the city, allowing residents one to three years to pay back the cost.

### BCD Hears Plans For New Projects To Be Sponsored

An air of optimism was in the air at Tuesday's BCD meeting as a result of the big majority given in the sewer bond election held last Saturday. President Vaughan Davis expressed appreciation on behalf of the city council for the large turnout and the vote in favor of building the sewer system for the City of Robert Lee.

Hugh Lewis Jr., president of the Robert Lee Housing Authority, announced that arrangements for land for the low rent housing project have been completed and that progress on this project should be made in the near future. A story on the housing may be found elsewhere in this week's Observer.

President Davis noted that projects which have been sponsored by the BCD are nearing completion and asked for suggestions and ideas for new worthwhile projects which the organization can back.

Bill Beaty suggested that the BCD get behind a movement to get all the houses in town numbered. He said now that street signs are up in the city, it would be a big help to travelers and new residents to have numbers on all houses. It was brought out that anyone who doesn't know what his house number is can find out by calling the city hall.

A complaint was registered that Robert Lee doesn't have city mail delivery service. Postmaster Lewis recited the rule regarding this matter, by stating that he would be able to provide this service when the town reaches 3,000 population.

Another suggested project was the erection of signs pointing out the location of the city lake, the golf course, the new dam site, the county park, etc.

The Quarterback Club barbecue, scheduled for Sept. 9, was announced and the BCD voted to get behind it and help any way possible to make it a success.



## HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS FROM THE STATE CAPITAL

**NEW MANSION SOUGHT** — At its initial meeting, the Texas Fine Arts Commission, created by the Legislature in 1965, recommended a new governor's mansion and said the present residence, completed in 1855, should be operated as an historic house.

Governor Connally has not yet expressed his view on a new mansion. However, last year when the State Building Commission, of which he is chairman, recommended a new \$1,000,000 Mansion, he differed and recommended that the money be used elsewhere.

Commission outlined a far-reaching program to encourage development of, and participation in, the arts, including traveling exhibits, festivals, awards, nighttime family entertainment in communities and revived band concerts on the square.

Former Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepard of Odessa was named chairman of the new committee.

**"RED MEANS WRONG"** — You will be seeing lots of red if you drive the wrong way on a Texas freeway.

In a move to curb wrong-way freeway pileups, State Highway Department is installing red reflector buttons and pavement markers at entrances to interstate and other controlled access highways.

If you see a red arrow pointing at you from the pavement as you enter a freeway ramp, you are entering the wrong way. A straight red line pointing against you on lane lines means you are going in the wrong direction.

Highway Department has spent or obligated \$76,600,000 in an overall four-year safety program.

**LOANS** — Tight money has made it hard for Texas Colleges to sell their building bonds. Some still are looking for buyers.

On a third try, buyers were found for the 4 per cent bonds of Angelo State at San Angelo (\$1,200,000); Stephen F. Austin at Nacogdoches (\$2,600,000); and Sam Houston State at Huntsville (\$2,500,000). But Southwest Texas State at San Marcos and East Texas State at Commerce still need buyers for their respective \$2,400,000 and \$2,300,000 bonds. Constitutional ceiling of 4 per cent makes the bonds less attractive to investors than other issues bringing higher returns.

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seem certain to force a tax increase by the Legislature which meets in January.

Budget requests for the 22 state colleges are almost double those of the current two years, in large part because of a need for "catching up." Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, says that the previous practice of providing money based on past enrollments just won't work. Cash should be provided for the 22 state colleges and the 34 junior colleges on the basis of what their enrollments will be, instead of what they were.

Junior colleges, fast growing as they are, will be some \$16,000,000 short of operating money during the current two years. It will take \$100,000,000 to put senior college appropriations on a current basis.

Prospects for a surplus in the state treasury of \$75-\$80,000,000 have led to talk of increasing college tuition and fees, so students would pay more of the cost.

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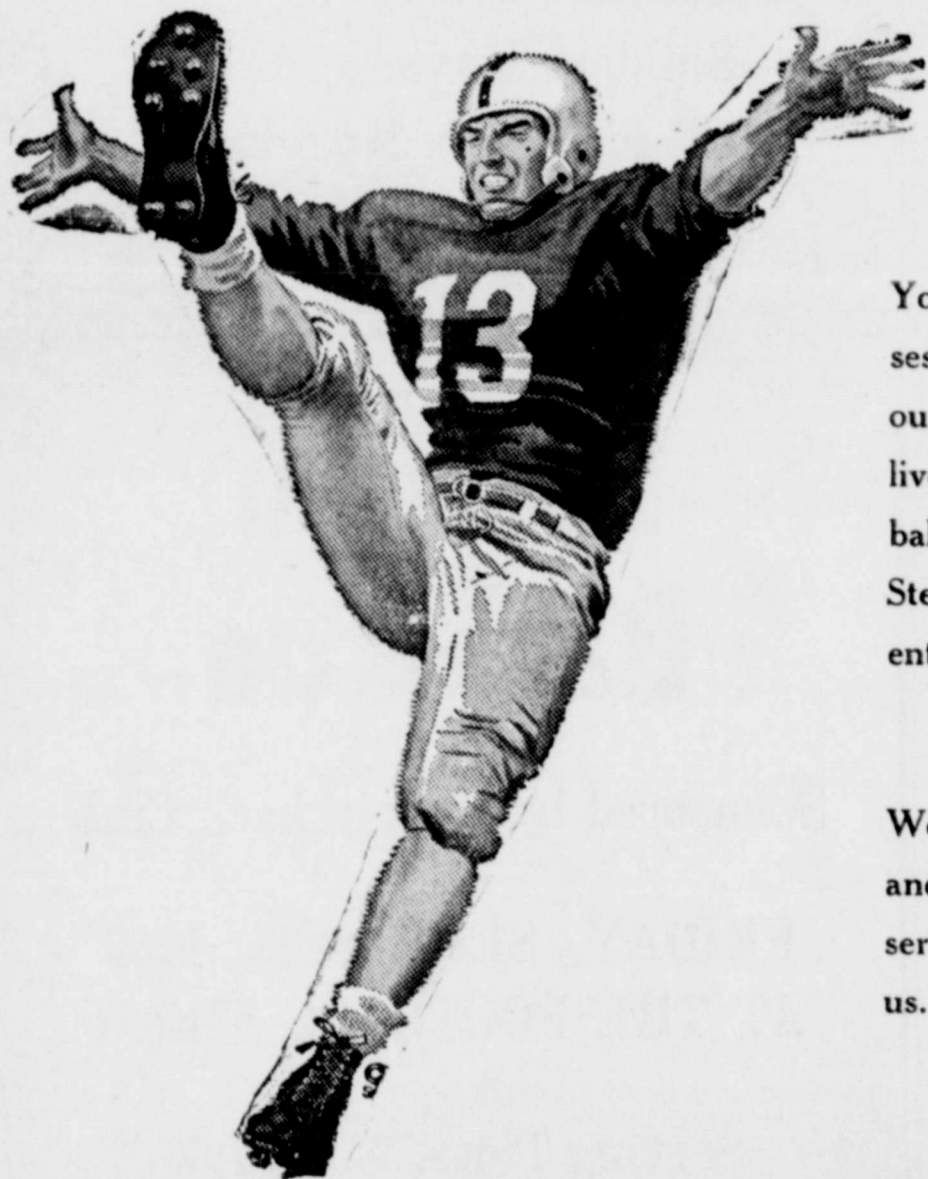

**Steaks in Spotlight**

Steaks for outdoor grilling will be featured at some supermarkets as the Labor Day weekend rolls around.

Beef cuts expected to be on special include steaks, chuck roasts and liver.

Since steak is one of the most popular meats for outdoor grilling, many consumers have questions about the best way to cook a steak on a grill. Here are some of the most frequently asked questions from backyard chefs.

**Question:** How can you keep a steak from curling during cooking?

**Answer:** Slash the fat edges of the steak before cooking.

**Q:** How often should a steak be turned during cooking?

**A:** Once is all that necessary. Broil until brown on first side, turn it and continue cooking the other side. Use tongs to turn the steak without piercing it. Jabbing a steak with a fork causes an undue loss in juices.

**Q:** When should a steak be salted—before or after grilling?

**A:** Salt each side after grilling. This is important because the seasoning may draw the flavorful juices to the surface and slow the browning process.

**Q:** How can you tell when a steak is done?

**A:** Cut a slit in the steak with a sharp knife. Cut near the bone, if there is one. Look at the color inside. If it's red, it's rare; pink is medium, and brown is well done.

**Q:** Why is it recommended that meat be sliced across the grain?

**A:** Meat should be carved against the grain to give uniform slices for attractive serving. Also, slicing across the grain, or fibers, makes the meat easier to eat.

**Tips on How to Mend and Spruce Up School Clothes**

Get a head start on having your children's school clothes ready to wear.

Garments that have been stored may need freshening before they are ready for use.

Check all garments for tears, holes, snags and loose buttons as you remove them from storage. Mend and repair the damaged areas in preparation for the busy season ahead.

You may be able to remodel and spruce up a garment by adding a smart new trim. With intelligent use of fabrics and notions, you may be able to turn many garments into smart clothing for you and your family with little cash outlay.

**"Better Breakfast Month"**

Skipping breakfast is not a smart way to lose weight.

Following a plan of three well balanced meals a day to obtain the important nutrients needed in each person's daily diet.

September is designated as "Better Breakfast Month" and is a good time to check on the family's breakfast habits.

Breakfast skippers are likely to become more pronounced with the beginning of school and the competition for "prime" time each morning for students and other busy people.

A recent breakfast study in Iowa demonstrated that when a low-fat, low-cholesterol morning meal is indicated, a cereal and milk breakfast is superior to some because it is low in fat and cholesterol, it contains an adequate amount of complex carbohydrates and a small quantity of simple sugar, and it also furnishes adequate protein, important vitamins and essential minerals.

A basic cereal and milk breakfast of 400 calories for weight reduction is just as nutritionally efficient as others, according to the study. It includes one-half cup orange juice, 1 ounce of whole wheat flakes or other ready-to-eat cereal, 1 cup of nonfat milk for the cer-
