Clement Bros. Get Contract

Trent Eases By Steers In First District Game

First Quarter

Trent received, to start the ball game, and returned to the 23 yard line. Making only 7 yards in three plays, they punted to the Steer 41. The Steers were held for no gain and Williams punted to the Gorilla 39 where they fumbled the ball and Skipworth came up with it. Roe went for 2, Devoll for 6 and then the Steers fumbled it back to them on 3rd down. scored standing up. A screen pass from Williams to Devoll for the extra points, was good and Robert Lee led 8-0.

The Steers kicked off with Skipworth kicking to the 5 yard line. It was returned to Trent's 22. Robert Lee held and Trent punted to the 45 of Robert Lee. After moving only 5 yards, the Steers punted to the Trent 15, where on a sustained drive of 85 yards, Trent scored from the one. Try for extra points failed and the score stood Robert Lee 8, Trent 6.

Trent kicked to the 15 and it was returned to the 35 yard line. With time running out, an attempted pass was intercepted as the whistle sounded the end of the half.

Third Quarter

Trent kicked off to Robert Lee to the 10 yard line and Devoll returned to the Steer 25. Robert Lee moved out to their 31 where they were forced to punt. Trent took the ball at their 40, and on an end run, covered 55 yards in one play, but it was nullified by an offside penalty. Trent then drove to the Steer 19, only to lose on downs. The Steers could make only short yardage and punted to the Trent 45. Then another quick play covering 48 yards by Trent put the ball

at the Steer 10 yard line. Moving to the 4 yard line, the Steers got tough and held. The Steers moved out to the 9, where they were forced to punt again. They kicked it to their 43 yard line as the 3rd quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

Trent drove down to the Steer 15 where they fumbled the ball and Roach recovered for the Steers. Robert Lee moved well until they reached the 42 yard line where they fumbled and lost the ball. Then with new life Trent and Payne started punching 4 and 5 yards at a lick and with 2nd and 5 they punched through for the score. Try for extra points failed and the Gorillas now led 12 to 8.

With little time left the Steers tried to move the ball but had little success. Time ran out with Trent in possession at their 40 yard line.

In our football ad this week, we have already discovered that there is a mistake in identifying one of the football players. Larry Sockwell's picture was run with Joe David Key's name under it. The problem arose because the two boys had their picture made in a jersey with number 11 on it.

The Colorado River Municipal Water District cleared the last major hurdle Thursday between it and the construction of a dam to impound a 488,000-acre foot lake on the Colorado River near Robert Lee.

For a time as bids from 10 contractors were read at the Settles Hotel before some 250 contractors, suppliers, and sub-contractors, it appeared that the project would be too far above the estimates.

Then W. L. Eeds, representing Freese, Nichols and Endress, project engineers, read: "Clement Brothers, Hickory, N. C., total bid, \$8,686,440." A ripple and then a roar ran through the crowd.

Later the board awarded the con-

tract to Clement Bros. subject to a check by the engineers. The low bidder was \$1,264,560 under the second low bid by H. B. Zachary Co. of San Antonio in the amount of \$9,951,000. Third bid was R. N. Adams, Kaufman, for \$10,271,140. The ten bids ran to a top of \$13,549,660 by Heldenfeld Bros. of Corpus Christi. This was \$4,863,220 or 56 per cent over the low bid.

Richard Goodwin, vice president of Clement Brothers, told officials of the district later that "we're satisfied. Of course we would like to have had a little more money, but we decided to make a bare-bones bid. Looks like we did."

Engineer estimates on the project had been pegged roughly at \$8,432,000.

"We'll begin moving equipment in about two weeks from now," said Goodwin. "We'll be started on or before Nov. 1 and in full swing by the end of the year."

Completion of the dam and spillway is set for March 1, 1969.

CRMWD Acquires Additional Land By Condemnation

Hearings on two parcels of land owned by Marvin A. Simpson and William M. Simpson ended late last Friday after being in progress since Tuesday. The hearing resulted in awarding Simpson Brothers and others with mineral and royalty interests, almost half a million dollars for the two parcels totaling approximately 2704 acres. The condemnation suit was brought by the CRMWD to secure the land for the Robert Lee Lake.

Commissioners hearing the case were J. O. Rudd, Bert Blaylock and Will Percifull. Their award was \$433,540 on 2,410.51 acres to Marvin Simpson and others, and \$64,997.30 on 294.25 acres to William M. Simpson and others.

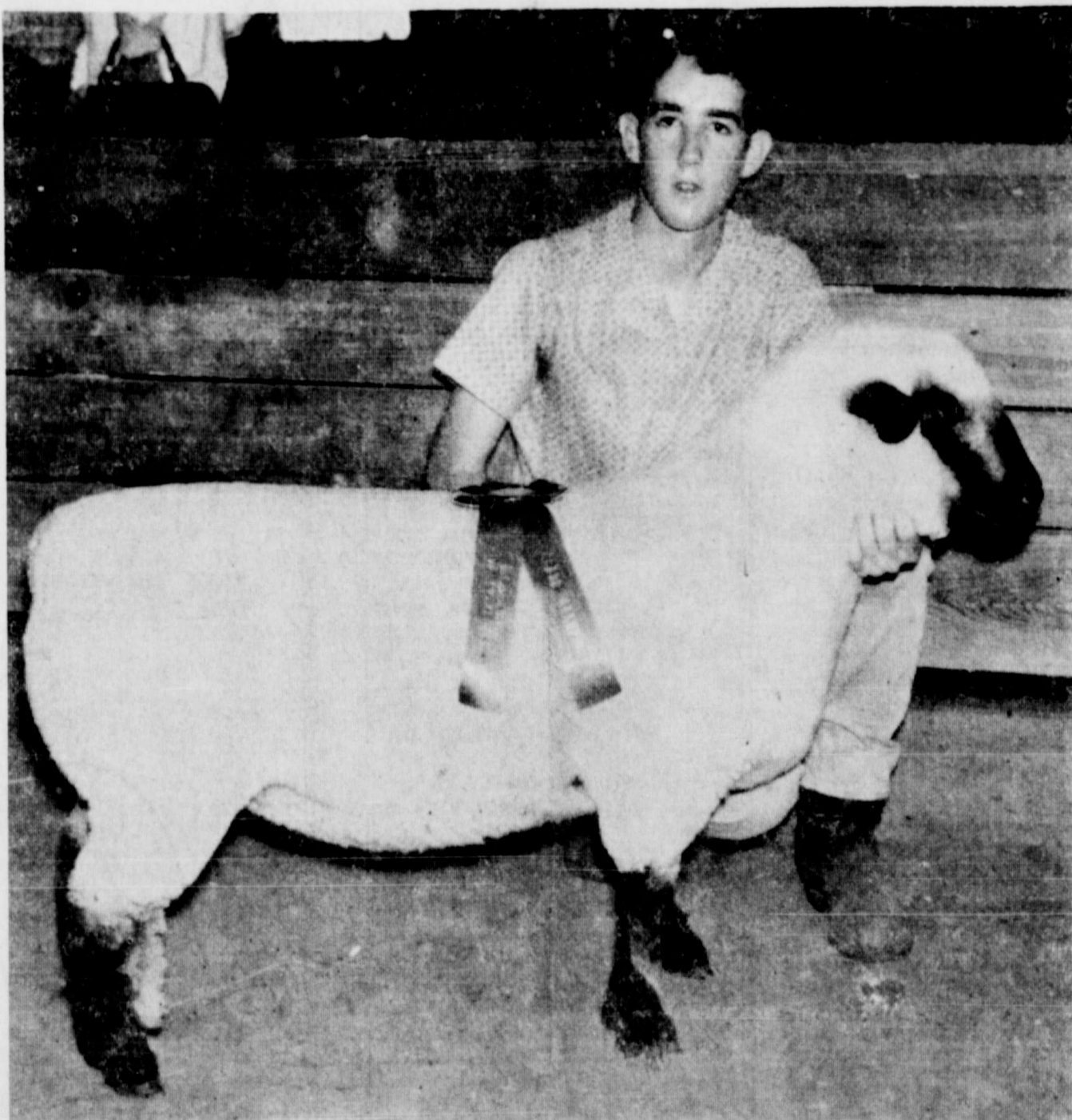
The price agreed upon by the commissioners was some \$37,463 less than the \$628,000 the Simpsons reportedly were asking, and some \$185,537 more than the \$313,000 offered by CRMWD. No report has been received by the Observer of intention to appeal the board's decision.

A breakdown of the total amounts gave Marvin Simpson \$397,540 and owners of half royalty on the land, \$36,000. For the William Simpson land, Simpson was awarded \$63,875; D. W. Smith and others, owners of half royalty on the 294.25 acres of land, \$1,100; and to Saul heirs, owners of 1-16 royalty on the land, \$22.30.

A hearing on condemnation of land held Monday of last week awarded \$80,500 for 389.4 acres owned by Weldon Gordon and others.

Only other suit now on file, CRMWD directors announced early this week, is for gravel interests of Cecil Montgomery, who operates a pit near the river bridge two miles northwest of Robert Lee.

With the 3,000 acres added to the damsite area last week by the condemnation suits, only about 6,000 acres remains to be acquired. O. H. Ivie, general manager of CRMWD, said that about 1000 acres of the remaining land is owned by ten persons, and the remainder by two large landowners. Ivie said he was hopeful these parcels can be acquired soon.

Lions Sponsor Essay Contest On Peace

The youth of Robert Lee have been given a challenge to develop a plan for world peace by their local Lions Club—a challenge that could earn one of them a \$25,000 educational grant.

Robert Lee Lions Club, together with Lions Clubs throughout the world, is sponsoring a world-wide essay contest for the world's youth on the most important world subject today—Peace.

The contest offers \$50,000 in total awards, including the \$25,000 first prize, eight semi-final world regional awards of \$1,000 each and travel expenses for the eight winners to Chicago, Ill., in July 1967. Also, more than 20,000 local, district and multiple district awards will be made.

The contest is open to young people who will be 14 but less than 22 years of age as of January 15, 1967.

"The purpose of the contest is to develop a formula for world peace

because we feel peace is attainable," said Garland Davis, Robert Lee High School principal, who is contest chairman. "We want to alert our youth to the need for world peace and focus attention on that important goal," Davis said.

The closing date for the club's contest is Dec. 10, 1966. Young people wishing to enter should contact Davis to get full details of the contest. He is a member of the Robert Lee-Silver Lions Club.

The winner of the local contest will be entered in the district contest by the Lions Club.

H D Agent's News Dept.

No home pesticide spraying or dusting is safely completed until you are sure the pesticide container is disposed of.

No pesticide container is ever completely empty, so handle with the same care you used when they were full.

When pesticide containers are "empty," the container has done its important job of holding the product until you used it. After this job is over, the pesticide container will sit where you put it and create problems for you until you safely dispose of it. Such "empties" should be kept in locked storage if you cannot conveniently take care of them as they become useless. The containers should NEVER be used again for any reason.

Pesticide materials, such as dusts or liquids, are often left over after the application is past and you wish to dispose of these leftovers. The best way to do so is to dig a pit, at least 18 inches deep, in an isolated area—away from children, pets, and garden areas—and carefully pour in the unwanted pesticides. Be careful to avoid splashing. Wear rubber gloves and any other protective clothing called for on the label. Fill the hole in with 12 to 18 inches of soil, then dispose of the container.

I will feature correct disposal methods in future articles. I particularly want to point out today that aerosol "bug-bombs" require special handling. Pressurized containers should never be burned or punctured, because they will explode, causing droplets of pesticide and bits of sharp metal to travel great distances. Aerosol cans should be wrapped in several layers of newspaper and placed into the garbage can. If you do not have garbage service, they should be wrapped and buried in an isolated area, or taken to a nearby supervised sanitary land-fill dump.

Plan Traffic Pattern in Kitchen

When shopping for a new house, the housewife should take a good look at the overall kitchen planning. The flow of traffic and convenience of the appliances is very important. Be sure to check for awkward situations that could grow more irritating with time:

(1) Be sure a built-in oven or dishwasher does not obstruct traffic when it's open. This can be hazardous.

(2) Doors which, when they open into the kitchen, should not cut off use of an appliance or a portion of counter space. Sometimes you can solve the problem by having them rehung to open out or in the opposite direction.

(3) Lack of counter space is frustrating. Be sure there's a "landing strip" beside the refrigerator—preferably on the side where it opens, by a built-in oven (let's hope it's heatproof) and ample ones on both sides of the sink.

(4) In smallish kitchens, avoid having major traffic run right through the main work area. Children rarely stop, look or listen, which could make such a traffic arrangement exasperating and dangerous.

(5) If you walk quite a distance from sink to range, you're in for spills and a lot of trotting back and forth when you need water for cooking, to drain vegetables, etc. About three to six feet is a manageable distance.

(6) Snack bars often give too little knee room, face a blank wall, are too high for small children, subtract rather than add storage, obstruct necessary traffic. Just as bad in their way are big breakfast areas at the expense of needed work and cabinet space. These may save the builder money, but they make little sense in homes with other adequate dining areas.

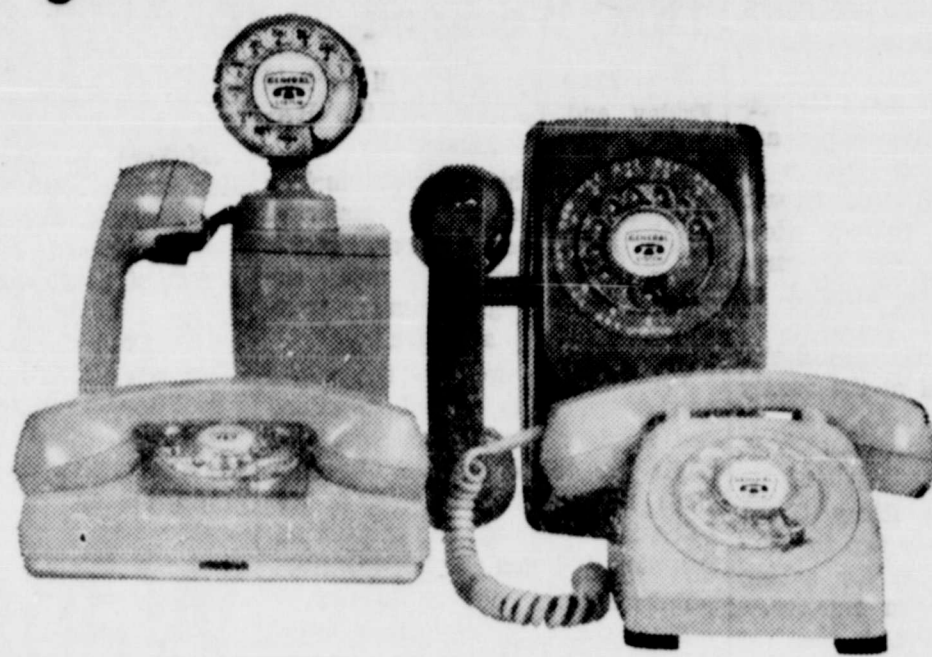

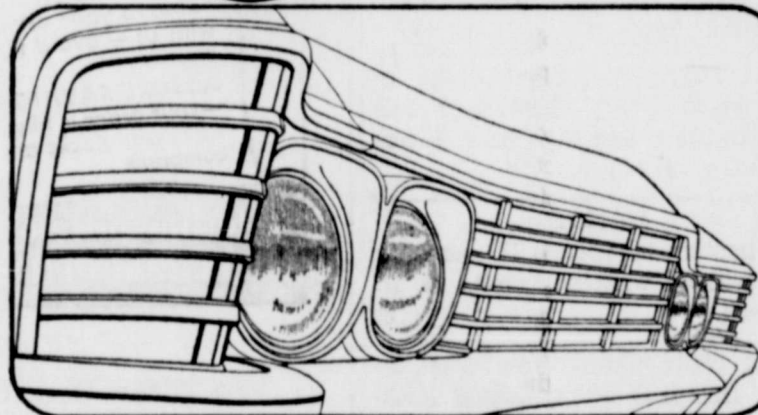
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Game Assn. Has Annual Meeting

Houses, Trailer Space Should Be Listed

Persons who have housing of any kind or places to park trailers are requested to notify the city office in Robert Lee. BCD Members Hear Reports About Contractor's Housing and Other Needs

The big item of discussion at Tuesday's BCD meeting was the dam and the opportunities and problems it will bring to Robert Lee.

President Vaughan Davis asked Cumbie Ivey Jr., chairman of the local committee to assist the contractor, to report on his findings at the bid letting last Thursday in Big Spring.

Ivey stated that he talked with Clement Bros.' general supervisor, Rufus Turner and was informed that he and one of the brothers would be in town next week to investigate such matters as housing, school and other things in which his personnel will be interested.

Ivey said he understood that about 100 workers will be needed during the first six months of con-

struction, and later the number would peak with an additional 200 men. Turner told Ivey that approximately 25 per cent of his firm's employees, supervisors and general personnel would have trailer houses, and the others would have to obtain housing wherever they could find it.

Ivey at this point told the group that he would like to have Robert Lee area residents list all available housing with city secretary, Mrs. Edna Havins. Details on this can be found in another story in this week's Observer.

Mayor Robert Vaughan told the group of talking with the mayor of Somerville in East Texas, where Clement Bros. have just completed a large dam. He said the mayor of the city spoke very highly of the firm and its personnel. "They are fine people and we enjoyed their stay here," he told Vaughan.

Mayor Vaughan said he was told that the firm has two large shops in which they service and repair their own equipment, and that much of their work is sub-contracted out. Vaughan said, after talking with Mayor Stout of Somerville, that there will not be as many mobile homes involved in the job as was originally thought. Vaughan said he was told that the firm hires about 80 per cent of their workers from the local labor force.

Vaughan said another thing he learned was that there will be a need for motel space, as many visitors will be coming in all during the construction period.

The mayor said anyone who wants to build trailer space can count on the city to bring water lines as far as the city limits.

Supt. Jim Bickley reported the latest development in the suit to keep Robert Lee and Silver schools from consolidating. He said Attorney Dell Barber, lawyer for the plaintiffs in the case, was allowed to file briefs on this case Oct. 5, with the court of civil appeals. Bickley said he thought it would possibly be as long as January before they hear anything on the outcome of the appeal.

Bickley said the school can handle about 100 additional students if there is that much growth in pupil enrollment. All grades except the third can handle additional students, he said, and it is completely filled with one class. Any appreciable increase in third grade enrollment would force hiring of another teacher.

The district's three member cities, Odessa, Big Spring and Snyder, will be supplied from the new lake, as will Midland, which has contracted to buy surface water from the CRMWD starting in 1970.

Of the total bid, Clement included \$2,375,000 for construction of the high concrete spillway which will carry excess water through the center of the dam. The remainder was for excavating 1,587,000 cubic yards from a core trench 30 feet deep, installing 11,488,000 cubic yards of wetted and rolled embankment for the dam proper, plus 83,000 yards of 10-in. gravel blanket and 209,000 yards of rock rip-rap two feet thick to protect the dam. The dam will be 22,000 feet long, will rise 143 feet from the river channel of 123 from the second river bank, will be 850 feet wide at the base and 20 feet wide at the top.

The big spillway will be morning glory type with adjustable gates on top. It will resemble the bell of a sousaphone 66.3 feet wide from lip to lip, feeding water into a main conduit 28 feet wide, with walls 6½ feet thick, down and under the dam to a stilling basin — a big concrete box with walls two feet thick and rising 58 feet from a floor which is eight feet thick.

One 60-inch pipe will run into the lake well beyond the spillway and will feed into a wet well, which resembles a silo, from whence water can be discharged either into the main outlet or through a 24-inch pipe to serve downstream customers.

In other matters considered by the board, a contract for \$5,269 was awarded M. C. Sissom, Bronte, for construction of fences at the dam site two miles northwest of Robert Lee. A budget of \$2,781,000 was approved for 1967, subject to bondholder approval. The board provided a total of \$10,000 for salary adjustments, which will be distributed as soon as a personnel policy is completed.

Trainees Needed For Game Warden Hospital News

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is accepting applications for prospective State Game Warden Trainees leading up to competitive examinations at eight key cities in November.

Successful candidates receive \$397 a month while studying and \$453 per month after six months on-the-job training. They are requested to contact the nearest Parks and Wildlife Field Office or write to the Personnel Office, Parks and Wildlife Department, John H. Reagan Building, Austin, Texas. Completed applications must be received by the Department's Personnel Office, no later than Nov. 4.

Applications meeting the initial requirements, such as high school graduate, within the 21 to 40 age bracket plus physical requirements, will be assigned to take written examinations at eight places over the state including San Angelo on November 21.

Applicants qualifying under a rigid selection process involving personal interviews, background and character checks, will be given an extensive training course, including one semester at Texas A & M University.

The Department, seeking to interest qualified young men in a rapidly expanding enforcement operation, stressed many new opportunities as a field man in this work.

Lately, for example, the usual

routine of assisting Biologists with game management techniques and other duties, has been increased to include water safety on the larger lakes.

The last mentioned is one reason the warden staff is being increased.

Previously, only one training unit was authorized each year. Now two classes of wardens are commissioned each year and assigned to actual patrol responsibilities.

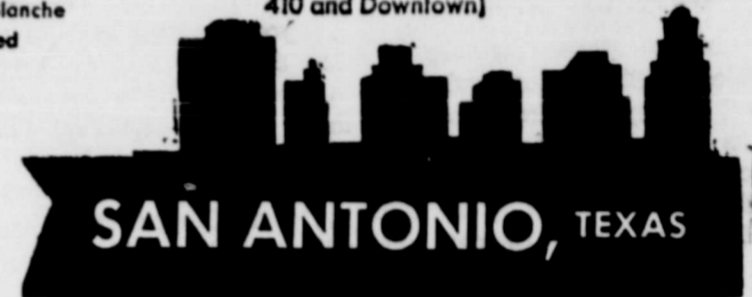
