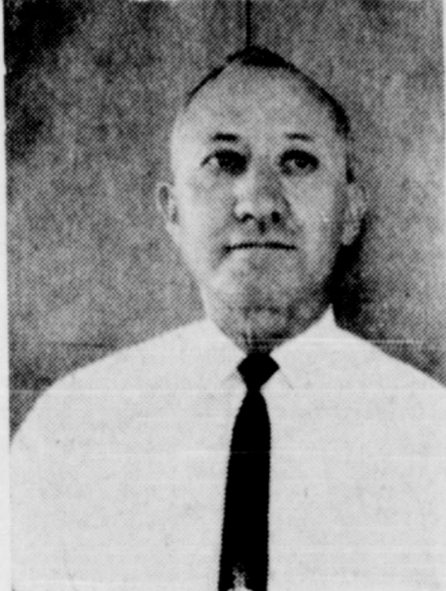

Ivey, Allen Honored At BCD Meeting

G. C. Allen and Cumbie Ivey Sr. were honored at Tuesday's BCD meeting when they were awarded certificates of appreciation for their years of services as directors of the Upper Colorado River Authority. Ivey was unable to attend the meeting and Allen accepted both his and his fellow member's certificate.

Royce Lee, mayor of Bronte, and a director of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, made the presentations on behalf of that organization.

Some 300 West Texans were honored several weeks ago at a meeting in Pampa for serving on various boards, agencies and commissions of the State of Texas. Ivey and Allen were among the honorees, but could not attend the meeting. Hence, the local presentation of the certificates was planned.

L. T. Youngblood of Bronte, also a long time director and chairman

of the UCRA, was a guest at the meeting. His certificate was presented at the earlier meeting in Pampa.

Lee told members and guests that all they had to do in order to "appreciate the work of these two local citizens was look at a clear glass of water, and realize that it was provided by their unselfish work." He was referring to the UCRA's financing of Mountain Creek Reservoir from which Robert Lee obtains its city water supply.

Allen responded to the presentation by stating that "in 1934 when the idea of impounding water in our country and district first started, it couldn't be known then how much time, work, long driving hours and sleepless nights would be put in to realize the dream of having a big lake in Coke County." Allen told BCD members that he and Youngblood are the only two men still on the UCRA board of directors who were members of the original board appointed by the governor in 1937.

President Vaughan Davis told how much the city appreciates the help which has been given by the UCRA. He also said if it had not been for UCRA help, work would not be starting this week by the Colorado River Municipal Water District on the big dam above Robert Lee.

Youngblood spoke briefly, thanking the BCD for inviting him to the meeting and stating that the new dam in Coke County is a life-long dream come true and he hoped to see the lake full of water.

Other guests included Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough, Mrs. G. A. Beeman and Mrs. O. T. Colvin.

Work Underway On Dam Project

Next Monday, Oct. 31, excavation of the spillway area of the new Colorado River Municipal Water District dam at Robert Lee is scheduled to start.

Clement Bros. of Hickory, N. C., contractors on the \$8,969,000 job, is moving in machinery and starting pre-irrigation of the ground to be excavated.

Work has already begun on cleaning off the actual site of the dam. Stakes with orange flags have been erected along a line which will be the center of the dam.

At the outset, the contractor will operate a 10-hour shift for five days a week and an 11-hour shift one day. Later this may be stepped up to a pair of 10-hour shifts.

Machinery on the site so far includes 13 earth movers with a 40-cubic-yard capacity level and 55-

yard capacity heaped. Eventually, the contractor will have 21 of these behemoths in order to move 35,000 to 40,000 cubic yards of earth a day.

Around 5,000,000 cubic yards will have to be moved in the core trench and in the emergency spillway area, and this is about half of the total volume of earth for the dam.

Work will start initially south of the river and toward the emergency spillway area. One hill, which now crests at elevation 1983 will be reduced to elevation 1808 as work progresses.

Offices have been established in the O. E. Kresta residence, which is about 1,000 yards downstream from the dam site. A conference was held there last week between the district and contractor, and

Steers Take Win From Loraine

The Steers, still with their strong defense, stopped the Loraine Bulldogs cold Friday night with the offense starting to jell and score some points. The offensive blocking was important in the factor that the ball was being moved instead of stalling in important situations. With Blair back in the lineup for heavier pass protection and the line hitting harder than in the past games, it looks like the zest for victory is back again.

First Quarter

Loraine won the toss and elected to receive at the north end. Skipworth kicked a long one into the end zone. At the 10, Carl Bloodworth made the tackle. It was first and 10 at that point. In 3 plays,

the Bulldogs make only 5 and have to punt. The punt is short and the Steers got the ball at the Loraine 35. The Steers move in two quick plays to the 22, but disaster strikes and the Steers fumble and lose at the 26.

Loraine nets only 6 yards on 3 plays and have to punt again with the ball being called dead at the Steer 35 yard line. The Steers move to the Loraine 40 and lose on downs at that point. The Steers hold again but on 4th and the kicking situation, the Steers get a roughing penalty and Loraine has the ball at the Steer 40.

Loraine fumbles on their second play and Skipworth recovers with little time remaining in the 1st quarter. But the Steers don't want the ball and fumble it back to the

Bulldogs as the quarter ends.

Second Quarter

Loraine then generates a drive to the Steer 36, then to the 20 where the Steers get tough and hold. The Steers then get a first at their 40. The Bulldogs then turn the tide and intercept a pass at their 30 yard line. A completed pass and penalty move the ball to the 50 yard line.

The Steers start popping a nd knock the ball loose, with Gary Parker coming up with it. The Steers then start their best drive with a 17 yard pass to Randy Hall and runs by Blair, Roe and Devoll move the ball to the 13 yard line. Williams then hits Pitcock with a quick one and he scoots into the end zone for the first 6 points. Try

Diverted Acreage May Be Grazed

Farmers who diverted acreage under the 1966 feed grain, wheat, and cotton programs will soon be able to graze this acreage without losing program benefits, C. E. Arrott, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee for Coke County, has announced.

Starting date for such grazing will be Nov. 1, marking the end of the 6-month period during which the no-grazing provision was in effect under the diversion programs.

Arrott stressed, however, that this program relaxation regarding use of the acreage applies only to grazing the acres diverted from commodity production. Hay on such acreages still may not be harvested.

Land diverted under the Conservation Reserve Program may not be grazed or harvested through the whole year.

Coke County farms participating in the 1966 commodity diversion programs number about 350.

Skipworth kicks off to the Loraine 30 with the ball being stopped at the Loraine 35 yard line. A penalty and 10 yard run moves to the Steer 39 with a first down coming up. Location is 645 feet from north and 3,242 feet from west lines of W. R. Walker survey 18.
