## Steers Moving Up To 'A' Schedule

Robert Lee Steers will move up to Class A when they enter the 1967 football season next September. They will compete in District 6-A. The change in classification was brought about by increases in enrollment which no longer makes them eligible to compete in Class B.

The first three games of the season will be non-district tilts and will include old adversaries, Menard, Bronte and Eldorado. The remaining seven games will be with other members of District 6-A.

## Waggoner Carr Man For U.S. Senate Job

(An Editorial)

Texans will have an opportunity Nov. 8 to repudiate the accidental election six years ago of Republican John Tower.

Waggoner Carr, a West Texan, is the Democratic nominee for U. S. Senator from Texas. He didn't get the nomination accidentally; it was earned and won by long years of honest efficient public service; first to Lubbock district as state representative; then to the Texas Legislature and the entire state as speaker of the House for two terms, then as attorney general of Texas for two terms.

Senator Tower was elected to this office purely because Democrats didn't bother to vote six years ago. The main reason for this lack of interest was that he was opposed by a Democratic nominee who was also ultra conservative, giving voters little choice in their selection.

Waggoner Carr, too, is a conservative, but not just for the sake of opposing everything which comes before the U. S. Senate. In all the years of his public service, he has demonstrated his ability to recognize and carry out the will of the people of Texas.

Carr has received the endorsement of all living ex-governors of the state, as well as that of present Governor John Connally and President Lyndon B. Johnson. That's pretty good recommendation from the men who have worked by his side.

Texas has been virtually without a vote in the U. S. Senate for the last six years. Sen. Tower has almost unflinchingly cancelled out Sen. Yarborough's vote on important legislation. Perhaps Sen. Yarborough's vote needed to be cancelled on occasion, and if such is the case in the future, Waggoner Carr would be the man to do it unflinchingly. He would not, however, vote against every piece of Democratic legislation which comes up.

The office of U. S. Senator is an important position. The man we elect to this position will be voting on things that vitally affect our lives every day. We need to make a wise choice.

Texas needs a man in this spot who can be seen and heard. Carr is that kind of man. He would receive a friendly hearing from both the legislative and executive branches of our government, since both are firmly in the hands of the party of which he is a member. Certainly not a yes-man to the administration, Carr nevertheless is a Democrat.

Also, Texas needs to put a man in the U. S. Senate who measures up to the giants of the past who have represented us in this august body: men like Joe Bailey, Morris Shepherd, Tom Connally and Lyndon B. Johnson. And certainly voters of Coke County and the surrounding area could be doubly

proud of Waggoner Carr as their senator, for he is a West Texan. Granted, the Democratic nominee has outgrown sectionalism, but it would be comforting to know that we have a man representing us who has a headful of good old West Texas horse sense.

As we see it, Waggoner Carr, in order to win, needs only the assurance that Democrats of the state will go to the polls Nov. 8 and cast their ballots. This is too important an event, too big a fight, to stay home or go fishing.

## RL Students Invited to Try For Scholarships

Robert Lee High School students who expect to complete their secondary school requirements and to enter college in 1968 can register now to participate in the 1967-68 National Merit Scholarship Program, Principal Garland Davis announced today.

The first step for all students who wish to enter the nationwide competition is to take the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (NMQST), which will be given in the school at 9:00 a. m., Tuesday, Feb. 28, 1967.

Participating students pay a \$1 fee, which is remitted by the school to Scientific Research (SRA), the testing agency.

In addition to competing for the Merit Scholarships to be awarded in 1968, students can take the test to obtain information useful in planning their future education and careers. With his NMQST scores, each participating student will receive a handbook to help him evaluate his scores, compare his performance with that of other high school students across the country, and give him information on choosing a college and financing his education. The handbook and other interpretive materials are furnished as a part of reporting the test results.

The highest scoring students in each state will be named semifinalists and will be eligible for Merit Scholarship consideration. In addition to the National Merit Scholarships financed by NMSC, more than 350 business corporations, foundations, colleges, professional

associations, unions, trusts, other organizations, and individuals offer scholarships through the Merit Program.

About 13,440 students have won Merit Scholarships in the eleven Merit Programs to date. Some 2,330 Merit Scholarships were awarded in 1966 with stipends ranging from \$100 to \$1,500 per year for four college years. The amount of a winner's award is determined

by assessing the financial assistance he will need to attend the college of his choice.

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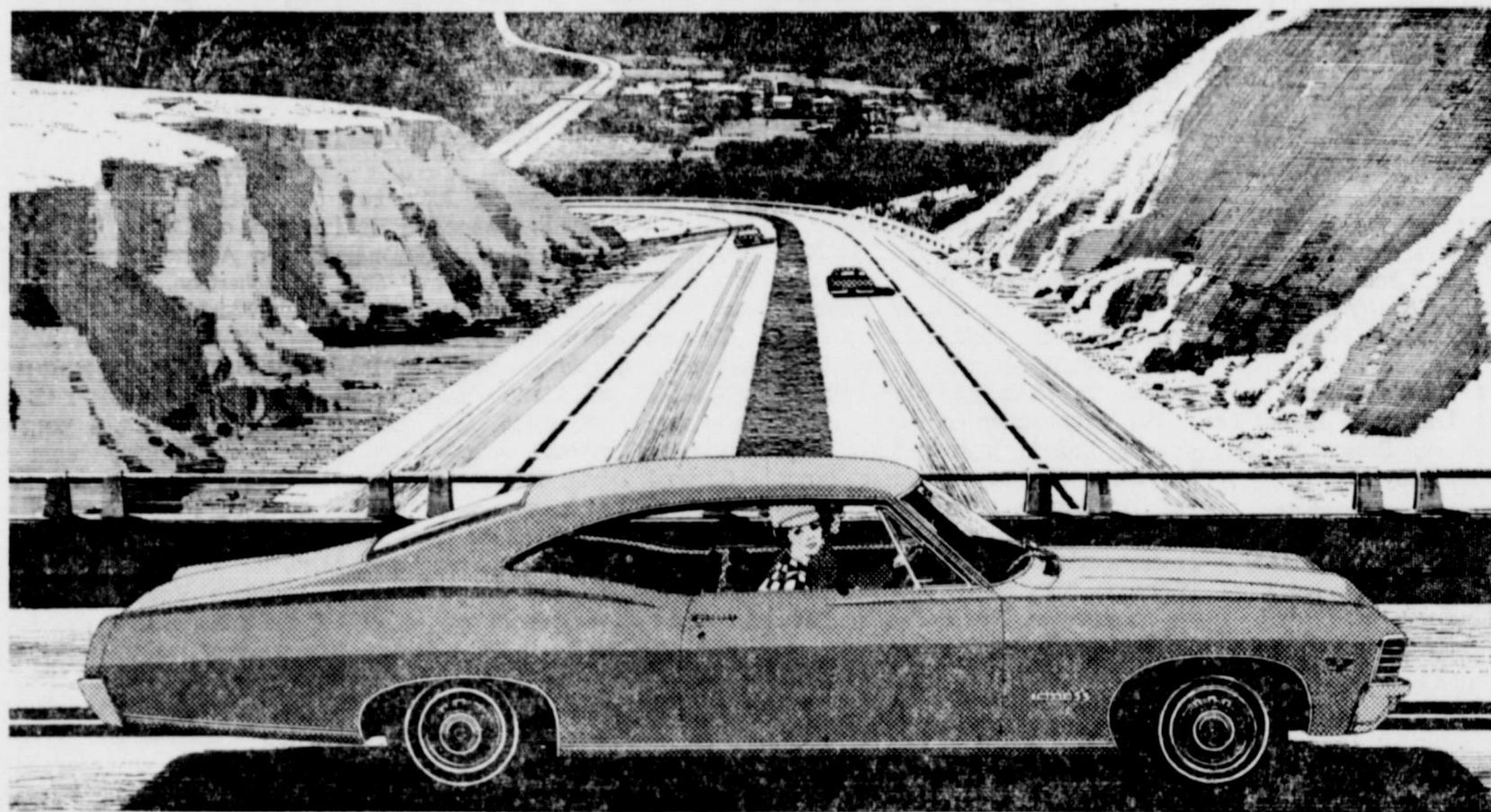

### Attending Robert Lee School Fulfills Long-time Hope of Maria Luisa Garcia

As the school doors opened this fall, a seemingly quaint, exotic atmosphere was noticeable up and down the halls of Robert Lee's school, as a smiling little girl from Mexico greeted us with a cheerful "Buenos dias." She is Maria Luisa Garcia, who is living with the Frank Coalsons. A dream has literally come true for this young Mexico native in her coming to Robert Lee to go to school.

The Coalsons have known her and her family approximately ten years and all during that time, she had secretly prayed and hoped that one day she could live in their home, attend school and learn to speak the English language.

Mrs. Coalson, who is a long-time Spanish teacher, upon the request

of Maria Luisa, began a series of correspondence with immigration officials in Monterrey seeking a passport for her. The date, Aug. 15, was given for her to appear and after two days of standing in lines awaiting turns for vaccinations, X-rays and other examinations, she stood before the American consul, presenting many affidavits from the Coalsons, as to proof of her support and one from Supt. Jimmy Bickley granting permission to attend school here. A sigh of relief was evident as she finally raised her right hand and repeated after him, "I solemnly swear I never wish to return to Mexico." Of course this permanent visa will allow her to visit her home country at any time she wishes.

Since she spoke no English at all, Mrs. Coalson secured first grade books, and after having read 12 or 15 of them, she was placed in the second grade at the beginning of school. In addition, she has been given music in the sixth grade, freshman homemaking and Spanish II. She is well adjusted to this varied program and has made rapid advancement in speaking English.

She enters into the spirit of the school, and has become a rooter for the Steers and takes pride in wearing the orange and black as a member of the pep squad. One of her big thrills was to have her picture made for the school annual, a brand new adventure for her.

Maria Luisa was delighted to find here that public school students can receive 12 years of free schooling, compared to only six in Mexico. She related with sadness that, as valedictorian, she was unable to use her beca (scholarship), which she had been granted upon finishing the sixth grade, to attend a girls' school in Guanajuato, Mexico. Her mother had felt the school was too far away. She has noticed, too, that we have a compulsory school law and that our children have to go to school whether they want to or not.

Another difference she has noticed is that all our stores are closed on Sundays and that she cannot go shopping. Then, too, she has asked friends, "Porque no hay bailes los domingos? (Why are there no dances on Sundays?) She has been very complimentary of the American way of dating among young people. She states that there is much confidence placed between mothers and daughters, and she thinks it is a happy situation when girls do not have to slip around to see their boy friends, but on the other hand, can invite them into their living rooms.

Mary Luise, as she prefers to be called, displays a fine sense of humor. After a difficult assignment

in Spanish grammar one day in class she was heard to say, "This 'Gringo' does not want to do all this work!" ("Gringo" is the Mexican term for sorry American.) Also one day when a girl friend remarked, "You look very pretty today," she replied, "Cuanto dinero desea usted?" (How much money do you want?)

Her ultimate desire is to learn the English language well and then

to take a business course so that she can find employment in some nice office.

The Coalsons say that Mary Luise has not yet displayed any nostalgic signs concerning her home land; however, she is eagerly awaiting "La Navidad" (Christmas) when she will return and break her own pinata in the traditional way.

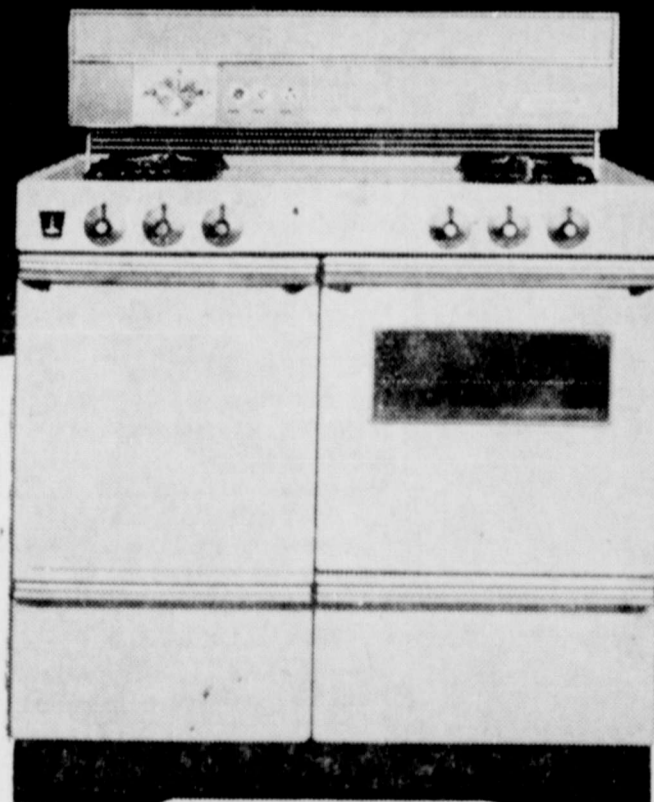
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### Poster Contest Winners Named

now led 16-0.

Skipworth again kicked deep to the 5 yard line, with Hermleigh returning it to the 27. Hermleigh made their second 1st down of the game as they moved to their 45 only to be forced to punt again. The punt carried to the Steer 25 with no return by the Steers. The Steers hit their first snag and were held for short yardage. Williams punted to the Hermleigh 35 yard line. Hermleigh also hit a snag and fumbled with Gary Parker coming up with the ball. The Steers moved to the Hermleigh 31 before the half ended.

**Third Quarter**

The Steers got their choice and received the ball at the 10 yard line. The ball was brought out to the 25 yard line by D. Devoll with a 1st and 10 from that point. The Steers then showed their blocking as 4½ minutes later with 5 and 6 yards at a time, Roy Blair went over from the 2 for another touchdown. Try for extras failed and the Steers were ahead 22 to 0.

Skipworth kicked to the Hermleigh 10 yard line with the ball being return to the 30 yard line. But Hermleigh couldn't move again and they punted short to the Steer 49 yard line. Then the airways got some business as Williams passed 30 yard to Hall, a pitch back again

went to Devoll and he passed 16 yards to Hall and the Steers were at the 7 yard line quickly. Four yards by Blair and the TD was run over by D. Devoll to add another 6 and Williams hit Pitcock again for the extras and the Steers led 30-0.

Robert Lee kicked off to Hermleigh deep again to the 5. It was returned to the 25 yard line. Hermleigh ran two plays before the quarter ended.

**Fourth Quarter**

Hermleigh then started their best movement of the night as they made two first downs to their 47 yard line, but Jesse James Hall put a stop to it and stole another pass at the Steer 39 yard line and returned to the 49. The Steers gave Glenn Roach a little exercise and said kick a field goal from 40 yards out, but Glenn said it's too far, and the ball went short with Hermleigh returning it to the 19 yard line. Hermleigh tried the air again and Bob Lomas swiped one at the 23 and returned to the 17.
