Services Thursday For Mrs. Nichols

Mrs. H. A. (Ethel) Nichols, 74, died in West Coke Hospital at 1 p.m. Tuesday, March 7, after a long illness following a stroke. Funeral services will be held at 2:30 p.m. Thursday in Robert Lee First Methodist Church with the Rev. C. R. Lemon, pastor of Roscoe Methodist Church and longtime friend of the family, and the Rev. Bill McKinley, local pastor, officiating.

Burial will be in Robert Lee Cemetery by Williams Funeral Home.

Mrs. Nichols was born Mollie Ethel Snead on Feb. 16, 1893, in Peoria, Hill County, Texas. She was the daughter of the late J. C. and Hattie (Bragg) Snead. She moved with her parents to Robert Lee from Hico in Erath County, in 1905. She attended school here and was graduated from Robert Lee High School. She was a Methodist and was a member of the Order of the Eastern Star.

She was married to the Rev. H. A. Nichols at Robert Lee on May 10, 1917, and went to Iredell, where he was serving as pastor of the Methodist Church. While still a ministerial student, the Rev. Nichols had previously served an interim pastorate at Robert Lee, finishing out the year for the Rev. J. C. Mayhew. Other Methodist Churches served by the couple during their 40 years in the active ministry included churches at Roby, Tahoka, Chillicothe, Spearman, Stratford, Amarillo and Anson. A gifted singer, Mrs. Nichols assisted with the music and served as Sunday school teacher for many years.

After retiring from the ministry, they established their home in Abilene. The Rev. Nichols died March 19, 1965. After Mrs. Nichols became ill, she was brought to the hospital in Robert Lee to be near her family.

Survivors include her stepmother, Mrs. J. C. Snead of Robert Lee; four brothers: J. C. Snead Jr., Robert Lee; Joe Long Snead, Roscoe; Douglas Snead, Bronte; De Witt Snead, Fort Stockton; one sister, Miss Iva Snead of Robert Lee; several nephews and nieces.

Nephews will serve as pall bearers.

Salmon is March Plentiful Food

If you're looking for a bargain package of powerful nutrition, an extra plentiful supply of canned salmon is available this season. It is one of the March plentiful foods.

Commercial grades of canned salmon are established by five species. Canned, these species will differ in color, texture of flesh, and flavor, but show little variation in food value.

Canned salmon also varies in price depending on kind. Chum and Keta are the least expensive salmon and are lighter in color. They are especially suitable for casseroles and other cooked dishes.

The low-priced salmon is not inferior or less carefully prepared. It's just a different variety than the more expensive pink salmon.

If you're a calory counter, you'll be glad to know that salmon only has 37 calories per serving.

Home Economics Briefs

If you're going to be out of the kitchen while using a double boiler, here's an ingenious alarm system that tells you when the water is boiling. Borrow two or three of your youngster's marbles and place them in the bottom of the double boiler before turning on the flame. If the water should boil away to a dangerously low level, the marbles will begin a clatter that will get you back in time to add water and save the pot from burning.

Potatoes may be an overlooked choice for the reducing diet. A medium-sized potato, boiled or baked, contains about 100 calories. This is about the same number of calories as in a large apple, orange, or half a grapefruit.

PEACE CORPS TO TEST ON MARCH 18

Coke County area residents interested in putting their skills to use in developing nations around the world are invited to take the Peace Corps Placement test at 1:30 p. m. on Saturday, March 18, at Room 324, Federal Bldg. San Angelo.

The Peace Corps uses the Placement Test to determine how an applicant can best be utilized overseas. The test measures general aptitude and the ability to learn a language, not education or achievement. (If test scores indicate a limited language-learning ability, for example, the Peace Corps tries to place the applicant in an English-speaking country.) The Placement test requires no preparation and is non-competitive — an applicant can neither pass nor fail.

The application form, not the Placement Test, is the most important factor in the selection of Volunteers. Persons interested in serving in the Peace Corps must fill out an application, if they have not already done so, and present it to the tester before taking the test. Applications may be obtained from local post offices or from the Peace Corps, Washington, D. C., 20525.

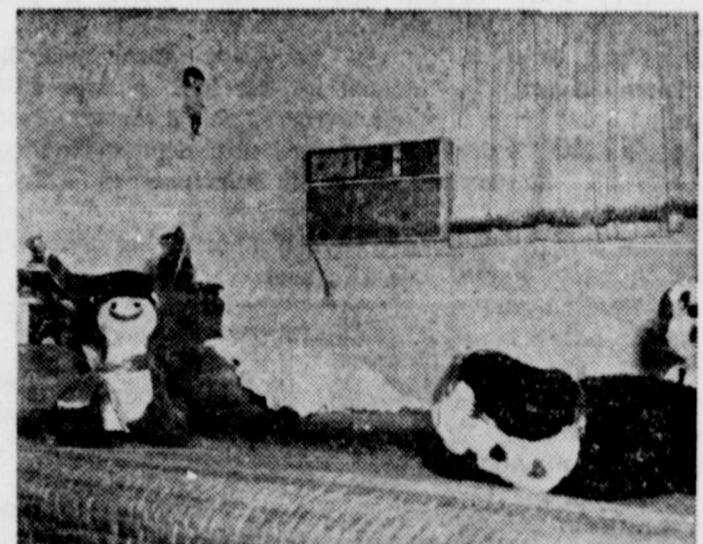

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Deadline Nears For Auto Inspections

The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reminded motorists that only six weeks remain before enforcement begins on the 1967 vehicle inspection stickers.

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., DPS Director, said that the law allows for no extension of the April 15 deadline and urged drivers to have their vehicles inspected before the last minute lines begin forming.

Garrison pointed out that some two and one-quarter million vehicles in Texas remain to be inspected in order to comply with state law. This amounts to approximately 14 vehicles per working day for each of the 5,500 official inspection stations.

"Undoubtedly," Garrison stated, "many motorists will wait until the last day, and it may be very difficult to find an inspection station that is not swamped

with late-comers.

"In order to secure an orderly flow of the remaining uninspected vehicles through the inspection stations we would urge each motorist to have the inspection attended to as soon as possible. This can easily be taken care of during a routine visit to an authorized inspection station."

Sanco To Silver Waterline Built

Clyde Construction Co. of Odessa has completed laying water main from about 1/4 mile west of Sanco to the treatment plant of Sun Oil Company at Silver, connecting with the cross country line from Lake J. B. Thomas.

Clyde has also a crew putting in the substructure for the pump station at the east end of the new line and is laying lines to the injection wells in the Northeast IAB Field that surrounds Sanco.

Under a joint agreement between Sun Oil Company, Colorado River Municipal Water District, and Standard Oil Company of Texas, who operate the unitized NE-IAB Field, treated water from Silver will start the secondary recovery pressurization of the field, to flood out oil in the sands at depths of slightly more than 5,000 feet.

The overland water main is a six inch cement asbestos line. Extra storage has been installed at the pump site.

Recovery period has been estimated unofficially at from ten to twenty years.

Location of the injection pump station is on the Frank C. Dickey Jr. land, formerly known as the Henry Briscoe place.

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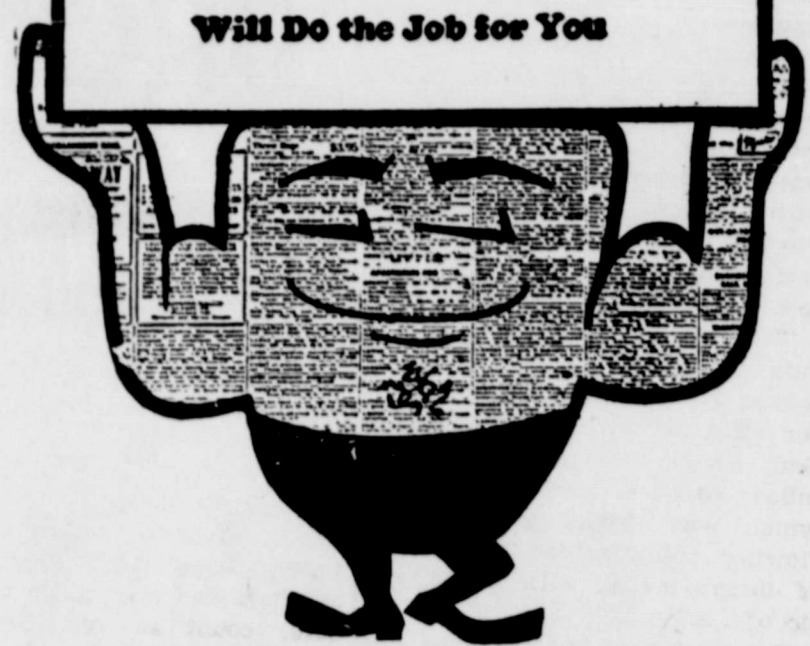

A confirmation was assured this week in the Bloodworth Northeast (5,750 Canyon) Field of northwest Coke County, and announcement was made of re-entry into a wildcat failure in the eastern part of the county.

Tucker Drilling Co., Inc., of San Angelo, and Peter Henderson, New York City, No. 1-A Foster S. Price, in 257-1A-H&TC, ¼ mile east of the recently completed opener and lone producer in the Bloodworth, Northeast (5,750 Canyon) field of Coke County, 3½ miles east-northeast of Silver, flowed 241 barrels of oil in 19 hours from the Canyon.

Flow was through a 32-64-inch choke and perforations between 5,736-46 feet, which had been washed with 500 gallons of mud acid. Casing pressure was 325 pounds, tubing pressure, 25 pounds.

Testing continued.

The field opener, the same operators' No. 1 Foster S. Price, was finished Feb. 24 for 204 barrels of 46 gravity oil per day with gas-oil ratio of 1,579-1, through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations between 5,746-71 feet.

The Railroad Commission has granted field designation of Bloodworth, Northeast (5,750 Canyon) for Tucker Drilling Co., Inc. San Angelo, No. 1 Foster 3½ miles east-southeast of Silver, which was finished for a daily flowing potential of 294 barrels of 46 gravity oil with gas-oil ratio of 1,579-1.

Potential was based on an actual 12-hour flow of 102 barrels of oil through a 20-64-inch choke and perforations between 5,746-752 feet, which had been acidized with 500 gallons. Casing (4½-inch), was seated at 5,840 feet, on total depth of 5,850 feet.

The 12-hour gauge earlier was erroneously reported as being the daily potential.

Location is 1,980 feet from the north and 660 feet from the east lines of 306-1A-H&TC.

Daily allowable is 102 barrels.

A. G. Hill, Abilene, No. 7-E Ralph E. Harris Estate, in W. Scott No. 13, one location west and northwest of oil production in the Bloodworth (5,700 oil and gas) field, 5½ miles southeast of Silver, recovered shows on two drillstem tests.

The one-hour test taken between 5,768-90 feet recovered 1,000 feet of gas and 95 feet of gas-cut mud with slight oil shows; and the 1½ hour test taken between 5,884-944 feet, surfaced gas in 23 minutes, no gauges. Recovery was 180 feet of gas-cut mud, 210 feet of heavily mud-cut oil, 180 feet of salty mud-cut oil and 90 feet of muddy salt water.

Operator has set 4½-inch casing at 5,943 feet, on total depth of 5,944 feet.

Tuesday Sun 12 Walker was preparing to acidize through perforations between 5,627-65 feet, in 4½ inch casing seated at 5,980 feet, total depth.

Sun 2 Millican was drilling below 2,985 feet. Operator ran 8-5-8 inch casing to 119 feet. Hondo Drilling Co., Abilene, is contractor.

Tucker and Henderson 1 Walker, flowed 164.99 barrels of load in 22 hours through an unreported choke and Canyon sand perforations between 5,721-28 feet.

Lipan 1 Stone, 6,040 feet in shale and lime.

Kuper Oil Co. will re-enter and clean out 4,500 feet for completion attempt in the Palo Pinto at a Coke County 5,615-foot wildcat failure, four miles northeast of the two-well Bronte, Southeast (Palo Pinto) field. It is the No. 1 Allar Co.

Originally drilled by Condor Oil Co. as the No. 1 Norton Properties, it was abandoned Dec. 12, 1953.

Location is 1,302 feet from the south lines and 1,980 feet from the west lines of L. N. Taylor No. 4. Elevation is 1,916 feet.

Original application was filed 1,980 feet from the north and west lines of the survey.

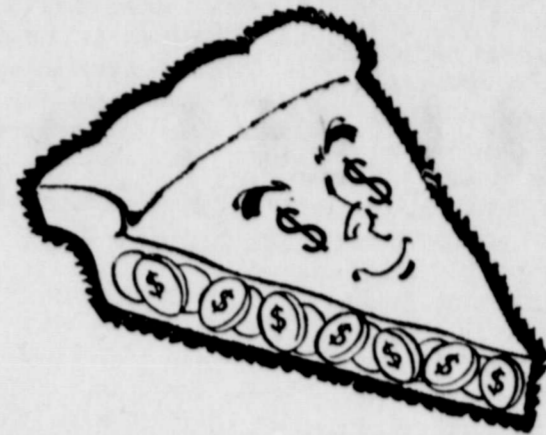

RL Baptist Minister Cites Arguments Against Liquor By The Drink Bill

(Editor's note: The following article was written by the Rev. Bill Beaty, pastor of Robert Lee Baptist Church. Any other readers who have opinions to express on this subject, or others, are invited to write them in the form of letters to the editor. They will be published insofar as space will allow.)

"If the saloon bill is passed and liquor by the drink is allowed by law, more than 600 Texans will die needlessly in automobile accidents the first year," the Rev. Bill Beaty, pastor of the Robert Lee Baptist Church, said today.

Rev. Beaty said the 600 figure is based on a 20 per cent increase in fatal automobile accident that occurred in other states after liquor by the drink was legalized. "Some of our neighbors, friends and children will be victims of drinking driver-deaths that are needless," he said.

In addition to the 600 additional deaths in automobile accidents, the number of alcoholics would increase by 50 per cent, according to records of other states with saloon laws. "These are well-documented facts. For every \$1 in alcohol taxes Texas collects, it spends \$37 in alcohol-caused costs, such as crime, welfare, lost jobs, extra policing, courts, etc., according to the American Business Men's Research Foundation. Liquor by the drink will cause more people to start drinking. It will enable more minors to drink. It will increase crime. It will increase traffic accidents, cause alcoholism, and poverty. It is our Christian duty to oppose the saloon bill," Rev. Beaty said.

Open saloons would not increase available tax money because so much alcohol-caused costs would arise, according to statistics from Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education, Inc. Open

saloons would not cut down the amount of drinking, but it would increase it.

In "bottle only" states, per capita consumption of alcohol is slightly under one gallon per person per year. In open saloon states it is nearly two gallons. "Write your legislators today opposing the saloon bill, thus creating a better moral climate for our fair state, urges Rev. Beaty.

TSGRA Grateful For Help On Wage, Hour Problem

Texas Sheep and Goat Raiser's Assn. members and directors meeting in Ozona unanimously voted for an expression of gratitude to officers and individual members who carried on an extensive campaign on behalf of the ranch industry in respect to the new Wage and Hour Law. Included in the expression were officers of the National Wool Growers Association, who worked closely with the Texas group.

"At a time when all the odds seemed to be against us, and when many organizations saw no hope and offered little help, these men carried on the battle", declared Gaylord Hankins of Rocksprings, chairman of the TS and GRA ranch labor committee.

He said exclusion of range livestock employees from the new law, and exemption of ranchmen from responsibility for most contract labor, was due to the determined efforts of these men in the wool - and - mohair - grower organizations.

Ranchmen will find themselves having to keep more records than ever and comply with regulations they have never known in the past, he continued, but even so the TS&GRA and NWGA won important concessions the industry would not otherwise have had.

The official commendation lauded officers and members who worked with Texas Senators Yarborough and Tower, with individual members of Congress, with labor committee members of both Houses and with the U. S. Department of Labor. It recognized the effect TS&GRA and NWGA had upon the final writing of various safeguards in the law.

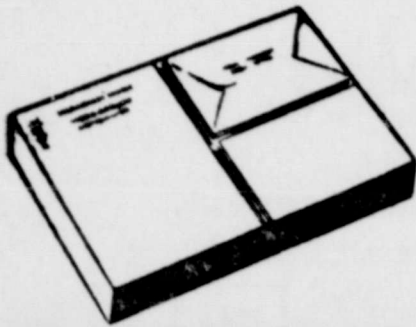
