Conely resides in Robert Lee, so he can be near his son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. John Conley and family, since his wife, Mary Lee, died.

Conley is a retired employee of Big Lake Oil Co., but he is remembered by many more Texans as former major league baseball player, then as player-manager of the Dallas team in the Texas League during the 1920s, and later as player manager of the Midland team in the old West Texas League.

After he started to work for the oil company and moved to Texas, he guided the famous Texon Oilers, a semi - pro team.

Notaries Have Till Hospital News May 15 To File

Secretary of State John L. Hill announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1967 and ends June 1, 1969, must pay the required fee and file a new application, oath and bond with the county clerk of his residence not later missed. than May 15, 1967.

Hill emphasized that Notaries Public should not send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary ted. of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerks approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the application to the Secretary of State.

Each person applying for a commission as a Notary Public must at least 21 years of age, a citizen of the United States and of Texas and a resident of the county for which he is appointed. The required application forms may be obtained from the county clerk.

Secretary of State Hill further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term should apply to his county clerk before May 20, chocolate pudding.




