FABRIC NEWS

Over 200 million yards of fabric per year is processed in such a manner as to place it in the coated fabric classification.

A considerable percentage of the coated fabric yardage is used for military personnel, either as clothing or for tents. Through the use of coated fabrics, lighter weight clothing can be supplied to servicemen and still give them the protection needed. Tents in various sizes can be put up easily and air supported.

Coated fabrics are used in hospitals, nursing homes, and other institutions where protective bed linens are needed. Almost any type of fabric or fabric construction can be coated. up significantly, while red tart When buying a coated fabric the basic fabric may be knit or woven; may be cotton, synthetic, or blended; or may be nonwoven or of paper. In general, coated fabrics should be washed rather than dry cleaned. Many of the coating substances are not compatible with the dry cleaning solvent, and basket in the laundry area is an will cause the coated fabric to excellent reminder stiffen and to shrink.

The method to use for washing depends on the item. Examine the entire article thoroughly. If it is a jacket with a deep pile lining and trim or with a wool or acetate lining, it is best to use a washing formula designed for wool and synthetics. If the component parts are cotton, the article should be able to be washed in water temperatures over 160 degrees F. Tumbler drying has been used successfully on some coated fabrics. But unless specific instructions are given, it is best to permit the article to

#### FOOD PRESERVATION TIPS

Dried fruit such as peaches, apricots, and plums will keep a year or so when stored in a dry cool, dark place.

Here are some food preservation tips. Select about 6 pounds of fresh, ripe and firm fruit. Wash and drain and peel them if you wish. Then cut them in halves and remove pits.

To prevent discoloration, soak fruit 15 minutes in a solution of 31/2 tablespoons sodium sulfite to 1 gallon water. A druggist can supply this chemical.

Arrange fruit on trays and place in 150 degrees oven with the bottom tray 3 inches from the oven floor. Don't use the top unit in an electric oven. Prop the oven door open 1/2-inch if your oven is electric or 8 inches if it is gas to let out moisture. Alternate the trays every 1 to 2

The fruit is dry when plicable and leathery. Usually about 6 hours is required. Pieces around the edges of the try will dry first. Remove these as soon as
