School To Open Next Monday

Quarterbacks To Eat, See Steers Scrimmage

Robert Lee Quarterback Club's annual football barbecue will be held Friday at 6:30 p.m. Everyone who is interested in the fortunes of the 1967 Robert Lee Steers is invited to attend. Admission price is \$1.25 for adults and 75c for students for a meal and to view a scrimmage between the Steers and the Ozona Lions. The scrimmage will begin at 6

p.m. and serving will start at 6:30, thus allowing spectators an opportunity to eat while they are watching the ball game.

The barbecue supper will consist of barbecue beef, potato salad, beans, pickles, onions, bread, tea and coffee. Those present will have their plates served and will go into the stands to eat and watch the Steers battle the Lions.

Hershell Hall is president of the Quarterback Club. Members of the club are in charge of preparing and serving the food. Proceeds will be used to defray expenses of the club in lending a hand to the Steers in filming games and other extras connected with the season.

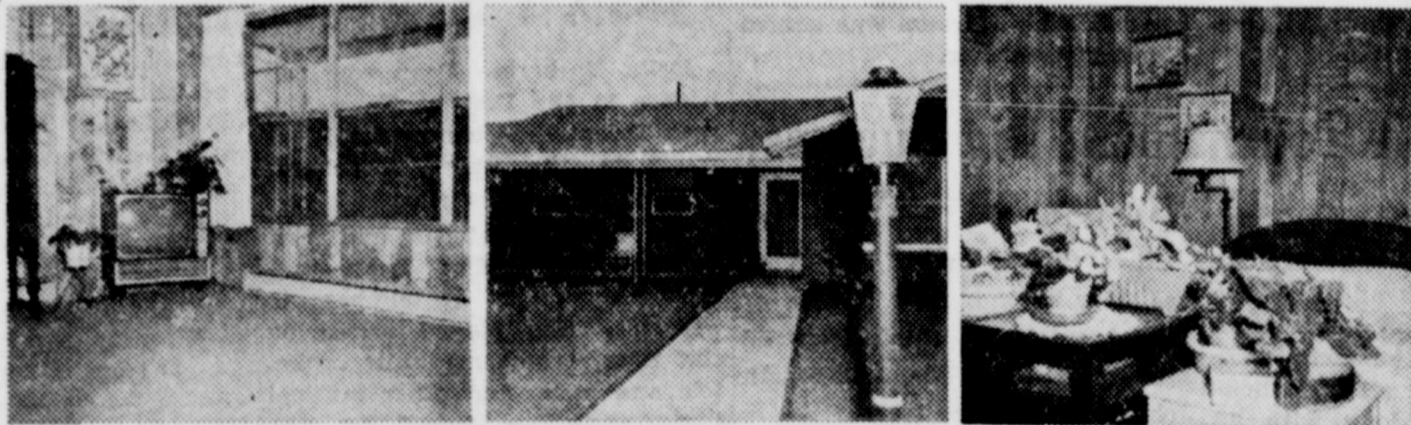

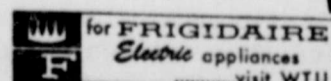

Cooking With Instant Flour

Beware of instant flour. There is more in the cup than meets the eye.

When baking with instant flour, take 2 level tablespoons out of each cup of flour called for by the recipe.

A full measure of instant flour in a cake or cookie recipe, designed for regular flour, may alter the shape, texture and flavor of the final product.

Instant flour is processed with steam or hot water after regular milling to make tiny granules stick together as larger particles. This takes up less space in a measuring cup. Therefore, instant flour mixes more readily with water without forming lumps and is a handy product for making gravy.

In baking, instant flour weighs more pre cup and takes up liquid faster than regular flour, leaving too much flour for the dough in relation to the liquid.

For example, in popovers, the batter doesn't contain enough for the product to "pop" properly.

The Agriculture Research Service suggests improving the taste and appearance of pastry by adding more fat to the dough. Some companies making instant flour suggests that extra fat be added to the product to help overcome the tendency of instant flour to soak up water.

Although a little extra fat helps, researchers warn that adding extra water to the dough is no solution. This destroys the proper balance between ingredients and tends to ruin the baked product.

Surplus Calories Not From Potatoes Alone

No, potatoes aren't fattening. No food is fattening until your body's need for calories has been met. Surplus food from any source is changed to fat and stored in the body.

One medium - sized potato, 5 ounces, supplies 90 calories. This is about the same as a medium - sized apple, pear, grapefruit or orange, none of which is considered a high - calorie food.

Added fat and gravy, often served with potatoes, do increase the calorie count considerably. For example, fried potatoes may be two to three times as high in calories as the same weight of

boiled or baked potatoes. And the sour cream or butter or margarine added to the baked potato for tastiness also add up in the calorie category.

But, it's not the potatoes that add pounds, it's the surplus calories from other sources.

Home Economic Tips Cleaners With Cleaning In Mind

Different cleaners do different jobs. The upright is best for large areas of rugs or wall to wall carpets. Choose the canister for general housecleaning, corners, stairs, bare floors and "about the floor" cleaning chores. Lightweight vacuum cleaners, such as the stick and hand vac, come in handy for cleaning hard - to - reach places, such as car interiors and draperies.

Bamboo Boom

Bamboo, a material which has intrigued decorators for centuries, is invading the furniture scene with success. Home furnishings are featuring the tropic material in complete room settings, as well as accent pieces. As a rule, real bamboo is not used, since the plant is basically a hollow stem. But woods, brass, chrome and even painted plastic are giving the bamboo look, creating a distinctive atmosphere.

New Driving Laws Told For Vehicle Operator in Texas

A new set of ground rules for the state 5½ million licensed drivers will go into effect August 28 when a major portion of the new traffic safety laws become effective. After that date, conviction of driving while a drivers license is suspended or revoked will carry with it a jail sentence of 72 hours to 6 months plus a fine of \$25 to \$500.

Motorists who do not bother to get a driver's license will be faced with fines up to \$500 plus the possibility of jail sentences ranging from 72 hours to 6 months for habitual violators.

New License Age

New minimum driver licensing ages will become effective August 28. After Monday, 18 years will be the minimum age for a regular drivers license unless an approved course of driver education has been passed by the applicant. With driver education, operators licenses can be issued at 16.

There are two exceptions to this provision. A license may be issued at 16 if an approved course of driver education is not taught at the school regularly attended by the applicant. This exception was put into the law to give the schools an opportunity to offer driver education to all Texas teens and will remain in effect until June 1, 1969. A license may be issued at 15 when certain, severe hardships conditions exist.

An instruction permit may be issued by the Department of Public Safety to persons 15 years of age who have satisfactorily completed the classroom phase of an approved driver education course and have passed all but the "behind the wheel" part of the driver license examination. This provision is in the law to permit the beginning driver to legally get "behind the wheel" driver training. When a driver with an instruction permit is driving, a licensed operator who is at least 21 years old must accompany and sit beside him.

The new law makes changes in other types of driver licenses. Minimum age for a commercial or chauffeur's license will be 18 unless the applicant has completed an approved driver education course and in that case it will be 17.

Provisional drivers licenses will be issued to all persons under 21 years of age. These licenses will be clearly designated as provisional permits to drive.

The new law permits the Department of Public Safety to have re-examined any person believed to be incapable of safely operating a motor vehicle. A drivers license may be denied to a person with a physical or mental disability, or disease, that prevents him from exercising reasonable or ordinary control over a motor vehicle. A license may not be issued to a person unable to understand highway wording or direction signs in the English language.

School Budget Set At \$394,962

Robert Lee School is growing into a bigger business all the time, as evidenced by the budget which was adopted Aug. 17 by the board of trustees.

This year's budget amounts to \$394,962, some \$86,000 more than last year's.

The \$86,000 increase will be used to take care of teacher pay raises which were voted by the last legislature, general cost increases of operating, and three permanent classrooms.

The school tax rate was set at \$1.48 per \$100 valuation, set at 33½ per cent of market value.

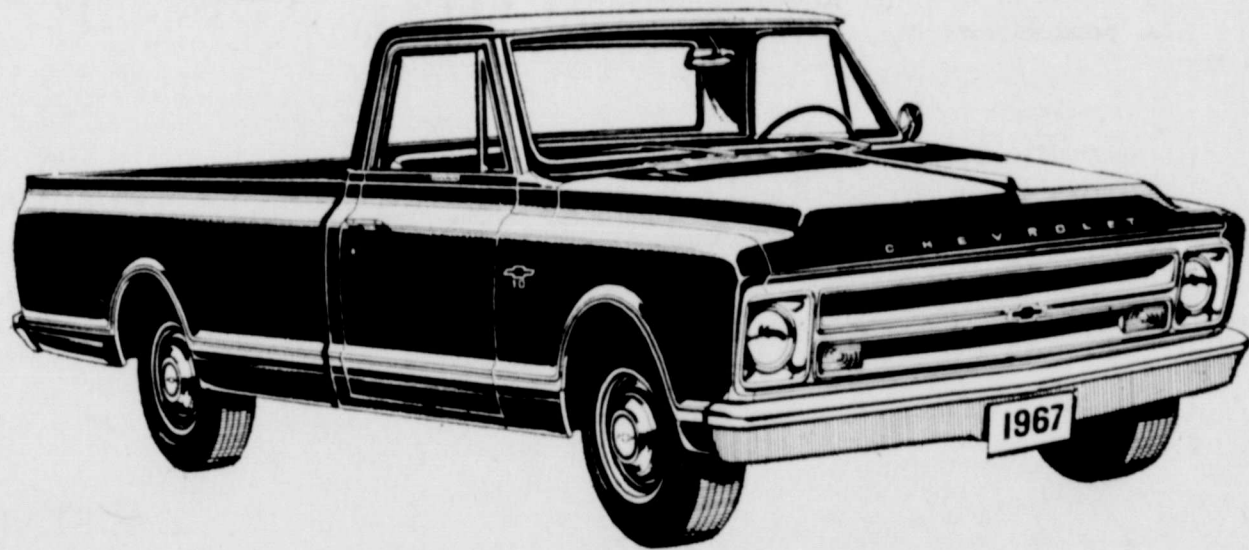
Scholastic growth of the district allowed the addition of two new teachers this year. As a stop gap measure, seven temporary classrooms will be used to take care of the students.

Supt. Jim Bickley said the school board recognizes the dire need for a building program, but are unable to pursue the project until the outcome of the consolidation election with Silver is finally determined in the courts. If the consolidation election is sustained, Robert Lee School will be eligible to receive \$300,000 incentive aid from the state for use in its building program.

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AUSTIN, Tex. —Major changes in state drivers' license law go into effect on August 28.

At the same time, inspection of additional auto equipment will be required and minimum fee for vehicle inspections will be raised to \$1.75. Inspections for the 1968 sticker will continue until April 15, the usual deadline.

Under the new law, front seat belts will be required on all cars which have belt anchorages as part of original equipment. Steering mechanism, wheels and rims also will be added to inspection items.

Other changes effective next week include:

— Licensing law raises minimum age to 16 for those who have completed a driver's education course and to 18 for those who have not had approved training.

— Minimum age for operating a motor scooter has been raised to 15, and a special examination will be required after January 1 to operate a motorcycle.

— All licenses issued to persons

under 21 will be stamped "provisional" and may be suspended if the operator is convicted of two traffic law violations in a 12 month period. (This provision effective January 1.)

— Motorists convicted of driving without license will be subject to a fine of up to \$200 for first offense and stiffer penalties thereafter.

— Those convicted of driving while intoxicated (or similar offense) are subject to first suspension of 12 months (18 months for later offenses) and may be required to attend a program of rehabilitation for problem drivers.

— Thumb prints will be required on all original applications.

— Driving while license is suspended or revoked is punishable by fine of \$25 to \$500 or a jail sentence of three days to six months.

— Stiff penalties are provided for counterfeiting or forging a license.

— Department of Public Safety will in the future receive from Department of Public Welfare a

list of all Texans receiving aid due to visual defects.

POLITICAL SIGNS EMERGING — First major political indicators of what is expected to be a stormy year ahead began to come into focus here last week.

House Speaker Ben Barnes and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith acknowledged that they sat down together to talk over their plans at length.

Barnes said Smith told him he plans to run for governor and encouraged him to seek the lieutenant governor's office.

Both declined to make any formal announcement of their plans until after Gov. John Connally's return from Africa about September 4.

"I am hoping things work out so there will be no big political turmoil, but I have stated repeatedly my plans are not dependent on what anyone else does," commented the lieutenant governor.

"I may announce in the next few weeks, but I have to think about all this," said Barnes. "This is a political decision I am not ready to make yet."

Most observers rate Governor Connally as almost certain to seek a fourth term.

ATTORNEY GENERAL SPEAKS — Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin said it is up to each individual school district to decide if it wants to adopt the new "ten-

ure" or "continuing contract" law for its teachers. However, once adopted, the tenure plan (protecting teachers against firing without cause) becomes mandatory.

In other recent opinions, Martin has held that:

— Insurance issued to an individual under a group policy does not become incontestable under the insurance code until two years from the date the person becomes insured under a master policy.

— District judges and district attorneys can claim full reimbursement for official travels out of county of their residence, effective September 1.

— Railroad Commission employees assigned to a transportation conference are entitled to travel expenses as are state employees representing their agencies at a Texas Historical Survey Committee - sponsored dedication ceremony.

— A public weigher may not conduct weighing operations outside the area in which he was elected or appointed; deputy weighers need not be actual residents of the area they serve.

— Cities under 185,000 population cannot pay any portion of firemen's personal obligation as contribution to relief and retirement fund.

— Texas Employment Commission may contribute state funds to the premiums of its employ-

ees' group insurance coverage; but under these conditions, Commission must secure the contract of insurance, be the policy - holder and pay the contributions to the company.

— Writ of possession on property sold at a tax sale may be issued to the purchaser after expiration of 20 days from end of redemption period.

— State agencies must make purchases of goods manufactured by the prison system through the Board of Control; political subdivisions may purchase directly from prisons but Board must set manufacturing specifications.

OIL OUTPUT REMAINS HIGH — Texas Railroad Commission maintained August's high oil production allowable for September — 54 per cent of potential. September figure allows for maximum production of 4,075,231 barrels daily, unchanged from August.

Allowable has zoomed following Middle East oil crisis. It was 33.8 per cent in May, 35.9 per cent in June, 42.9 per cent in July and 54 per cent in August.

Nominations to purchase oil from major buyers came to 3,406,451 barrels a day for September, an increase of 383,941 over August. Bureau of Mines predicted the demand for Texas crude in the coming month would be 3,525,000 barrels a day.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 17 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office and two (2) citizens of the State of Texas, one (1) of whom shall be well versed in veterans' affairs and one (1) of whom shall be well versed in finances. One (1) such citizen shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, be appointed biennially by the Governor to serve for a term of four (4) years; but the members serving on said Board on the date of adoption hereof shall complete the terms to which they were appointed. In the event of the resignation or death of any such citizen member, the Governor shall appoint a replacement to serve for the unexpired portion of the term to which the deceased or resigning member had been appointed. The compensation for said citizen members shall be as is now or may hereafter be fixed by the Legislature; and each shall make bond in such amount as is now or may hereafter be prescribed by the Legislature.

"The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of said Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as are now or may hereafter be provided by law. In the absence or illness of said Commissioner, the Chief Clerk of the General Land Office shall be the Acting Chairman of said Board with the same duties and powers that said Commissioner would have if present.

"The Veterans' Land Board may provide for, issue and sell not to exceed Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund, Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) of which have heretofore been issued and sold. Such bonds or obligations shall be sold for not less than

par value and accrued interest; shall be issued in such forms, denominations, and upon such terms as are now or may hereafter be provided by law; shall be issued and sold at such times, at such places, and in such installments as may be determined by said Board; and shall bear a rate or rates of interest as may be fixed by said Board but the weighted average annual interest rate, as that phrase is commonly and ordinarily used and understood in the municipal bond market, of all the bonds issued and sold in any installment of any bonds may not exceed four and one-half per cent (4½%). All bonds or obligations issued and sold hereunder shall, after execution by the Board, approval by the Attorney General of Texas, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchaser or purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas; and all bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board are hereby in all respects validated and declared to be general obligations of the State of Texas. In order to prevent default in the payment of principal or interest on any such bonds, the Legislature shall appropriate a sufficient amount to pay the same.

"In the sale of any such bonds or obligations, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price therefor, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting full payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any lands comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and

interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.

"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund hereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.

"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and the interest thereon, together with the expenses herein authorized, of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violative of any contract to which said Board is a party.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.

"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, and who, upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, or who has resided in Texas at least five (5) years prior to the date of filing his or her application. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board may be used by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.

"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board (a series of bonds being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, to be sold as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds hereafter issued and sold shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the re-

tirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.

"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

"AGAINST the amendment to extend the Veterans' Land Program by authorizing the sale of bonds to increase the Veterans' Land Fund for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the present armed conflict in Viet Nam, which amendment would amend Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, and provide for an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds, such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
