Handful Vote For One Amendment

A mere handful of Coke County voters turned out for the amendment election which was held last Saturday. The 124 ballots cast represented approximately 12 per cent of the county's qualified voters, and this small number rendered a decision on additions to the constitution of Texas, the state's most basic body of laws.

Coke County approved only one of the proposed amendments, No. 3, which permits the issuance of \$200 million in bonds for revival of the veterans land purchase program.

Local voters did not agree with the state as a whole, as all six of the amendments were passed by Texas voters.

Coke County's vote was as follows:

1. Consolidating county funds: for 41, against 78.
2. Permission for mental health services: for 50, against 71.
3. Veterans land bonds: for 83, against 52.
4. Medical pay for injured police officers: for 53, against 70.
5. Bonds for park improvement: for 43, against 81.
6. Permission for state employees to serve on certain boards: for 45, against 75.

The above figures were issued Saturday night and are unofficial.

Court Hears Talk On Improvements

Coke County commissioners, in a session Monday, heard reports from four committees and their architect on recommendations for proceeding with plans for some permanent improvements in the county.

First and most expensive of the four projects would be a new county jail and home for the county sheriff. Two more projects are construction of a community center in Bronte and additions and remodeling to the existing Robert Lee center. Fourth among the proposed projects is a new livestock building for use in the county's annual livestock show and for other gatherings.

County Judge W. W. Thetford said Tuesday that the architect, Louis Drake of San Angelo, was instructed to make some alterations in plans already tentatively drawn, figure cost of furnishings and required fees, and report back to the court in a few days.

The judge said that rough estimates of the cost of the projects are as follows: \$115,000 for jail and sheriff's resident; \$140,000 for the two park improvement projects (community centers); \$30,000 for the agricultural building. These figures do not include money for furnishings, nor for fees of the architect and fiscal agent.

Present for the meeting, besides the judge and commissioners were Cumbie Ivey, Jr., Sterling Lindsey, Melvin Childress, Ulmer Bird and J. F. McCabe, all of Robert Lee and Royce Lee of Bronte.

After considerable interest was indicated in the permanent improvements for the county several months ago, committees were named to study needs and make recommendations to the commissioners court. Four committees, one each for the agricultural building, Robert Lee Park, Bronte Park, and jail, reported Monday.

Answers To Questions About Robert Lee's New Sewer System

In an effort to answer questions pertaining to our new sewer, beginning operation in the immediate future, we, your City Council, offer this available information.

If the property line of any piece of land within the city limits is within 100 feet of the existing sewer system, you will be required to connect all buildings on the land to the city sewer.

It will be unlawful for outside privies (above or below the ground) to be constructed on any piece of land which extends within 100 feet of the existing sewer system. Any privy or drain now in use on any land extending within 100 feet of the existing sewer system will be required to be abated within 90 days after notice from the designated City Inspector, to do so, and to construct a water closet and connect it and-or the drains to the city sewer.

It will be the duty of the designated City Inspector to determine where grease and-or sand or dirt traps are needed and to see that the same are installed as the sewer connection is made.

Materials to be used in connecting to the sewer will be: Cast Iron Pipe, Clay Pipe with resilient joints or Orangeburg type fiber pipe, or the equivalent.

All installations (without exception) must be inspected before they are covered, as correct installations will mean longer life and trouble-free use of our sewer system.

It is recommended that you contact your City Hall and ask consultation with the inspector before beginning your installation, if done by the individual. Be sure that your contractor has been approved by the City and has discussed requirements of the installation.

There will be no tapping or inspection fees on the original or present installations, but at a later time this will be put in effect.

It is asked that all consultation and inspection requests be submitted between 8 and 5 o'clock Mondays through Fridays.

Needed financial assistance can be arranged by contacting the City Hall. This can be repaid with interest at a monthly rate, in order to prevent financial strain on any citizen. In the event financial assistance is needed, please have your contractor's estimate when making application so the amount for approval will be available.

It is suggested that our citizens begin laying their sewer installations so we will have enough customers ready for quick connection in order that the plant will have ample volume to begin its job.

Full cooperation on this job ahead is pledged to the citizens. Your City Council stands ready to help, where possible, as a group or as individuals.

ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING CONNECTIONS TO BE MADE TO THE CITY SEWER AND REGULATING SAME; AND PROVIDING A PENALTY OF A FINE NOT TO EXCEED ONE HUNDRED (\$100.00) DOLLARS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROBERT LEE, TEXAS;

SECTION 1. That all owners or occupants of buildings, or agents for the said owners, situated in any section of the City where sanitary sewer now exists, or where it may hereafter exist, and where the property line of the land on which any such building is situated approaches or extends to within 100 feet of any sewer, are hereby required to construct or cause to be constructed suitable water closets on their property, and connect the same, with the City Sewer, under the supervision of the inspector designated by the City.

And it shall be the duty of any such property owners or agents of same or occupants of such property to keep and maintain said water closet and connection thereof in perfect condition, and free from obstruction, and it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to build or use any privy vault above or below the ground in the City of Robert Lee or any lot or parcel of land, the property line of which, at any point, extends to within a distance of 100 feet of a City sanitary sewer. All persons now having such privies in such localities are hereby required to abate the same within 90 days after notices, by the designated inspector, to do so, and to construct and put in water closets and connect the same with the City sewer, as required by this Ordinance.

SECTION 2. It shall be unlawful for the owner or occupant of any building situated on a lot, extending within 100 feet of any sewer of the City, any portion of which said house is used for any purpose, during any portion of the day, to fail to have at least one water closet connected with the City sewer within 90 days after notice from the City to do so, and to fail to have said water closets suitably arranged for the use as urinal, unless a separate urinal is provided.

SECTION 3. It shall be unlawful for the owners and occupants of any building, situated within 100 feet of any sanitary sewer, in which said building, food is cooked or clothing is washed, to fail to have a suitable sink or hopper for the reception of waste water, provided, that if the water closet is of the kind suited to such use it may receive the waste water, and the sink or hopper may be dispensed with.

SECTION 4. It shall be unlawful for any person to throw, or allow any person under his or her control, to throw or deposit on the surface of the ground, or in any hole or vault, in or under the surface of the ground, on any lot reaching within 100 feet of any City sanitary sewer, except in the proper and necessary manuring of the soil, any water,

which has been used for domestic purposes, or any liquid or solid filth, feces, or urine.

SECTION 5. It shall be unlawful for any person to throw or deposit, or cause or permit anyone, under his or her control, to throw or deposit in any City sewer, or in any vessel or receptacles connected with any City sewer, any garbage, hair, ashes, fruits, or vegetable peelings or refuse rags, cotton, cinders, or any other matter whatsoever, except feces, urine, the necessary closet paper and liquid slops.

SECTION 6. It shall be unlawful for any person to refuse or fail to connect all wash stands or slop stands in his or her house or yard with the City sewer, or to allow any slops, wash or waste waters of any kind to flow over the pavement or into any open gutter or into the street.

SECTION 7. That every person who omits or refuses to comply with or who resists or willfully violates any of the provisions of this Ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars.

SECTION 8. It shall hereafter be the duty of the inspector designated by the City, whenever any permit for sewer connection shall be by him granted, to file a statement of that fact with the collector of the Water Department.

SECTION 9. Upon making application to connect to the Robert Lee Sanitary Sewer System applicant agrees to use one of the following approved service line materials: Cast Iron, Clay with resilient joints, Orangeburg type fiber pipe or equivalent. All installations shall be inspected by the designated inspector before being covered.

SECTION 10. It shall be the duty of the designated City inspector to determine where grease traps, sand traps, or screens are needed and to see that same are installed and maintained in good working order.

SECTION 11. The fact that there is no ordinance requiring connection to be made to the City Sewer and regulating the same, creates an imperative public necessity that the rules requiring ordinances to be read on more than one day be and is hereby suspended, and that this Ordinance take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication, and it is so ordained.
