Girl Scout leaders said all the girls involved so far feel their enrollment will grow, and they invited girls who are interested to contact them.


Band Gets Div. II Rating At Odessa

H D Agent's News Dept.

Here is a recipe that might be used as a means of using up leftover chicken or turkey from Thanksgiving dinner.

Try this:

Chicken or Turkey Taco Pie

3 to 4 cups diced chicken or turkey

- 1 can enchilada sauce
- 1 can mushroom soup
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic salt
- Dash pepper
- 11-ounce package corn chips
- 1 cup grated cheese
- 1 cup chicken broth

Combine chicken, enchilada sauce, mushroom soup, onion, garlic salt and pepper. Grease a 2-quart baking dish and line with corn chips. Add chicken mixture

sprinkle with grated cheese and cover with corn chips. Pour 1 cup chicken broth over mixture. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 30 minutes. Serves 6. This dish freezes well. If frozen, bake at 350 degrees F. for 1 1/2 hours.

Other recipes ranging from Creole A La Louisiana to Hot Poultry Salad and Texas Fried Chicken are available at cost at any county Extension office in a newly published "All-Time Favorites - Chicken and Turkey."

Also included in the booklet is information on selecting and storing poultry, as well as carving, cooking and serving it. Poultry is fun for the cook and eater as well as easy on the budget.



PUBLIC NOTICE

OF THE REQUIREMENT FOR RECORDATION AND LIMITATION OF CERTAIN CLAIMS OF WATER RIGHTS.

Notice is here given as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than claims under permits and certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.

On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.

Instruction and forms for recording claims may be obtained without cost from the Texas Water Rights Commission, P. O. Box 12396, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.



NATHAN HALE DID NOT SAY: "Me spy on the British? Are you trying to be funny? Do you know what they do to spies they catch? I will give you a news flash, chum. They hang them."

PAUL REVERE DID NOT SAY: "What do you mean, me ride through Middlesex village and town, and in the middle of the night too? Why pick on me? Am I the only man in Boston with a horse?"

PATRICK HENRY DID NOT SAY: "Sure, I'm for liberty. First, last and always, I'm for liberty. But we have got to be realistic. We are a pretty small outfit. If we start pushing the British around, someone is likely to get hurt."

GEORGE WASHINGTON DID NOT SAY: "Gentlemen, I am honored and appreciate your confidence, but I just have too much to do. I am just starting to get things in shape out at Mount Vernon."

SINCE THESE HEROES DID NOT SAY THESE THINGS, they would be considered "squares" nowadays.

THIS WORD "SQUARE," according to Mr. Charles H. Brower, originated with convicts. To them, a square was an inmate who would not conform to the convict code. From this, the sophisticated have applied it to the man who never learned to get away with wrongdoing. To them, he is a Joe who volunteers when he does not have to. He is a guy who gets his kicks from trying

to do something better than anyone else can. He is a boob who gets so lost in his work that he has to be reminded to go home. He is a slob who still gets choked up when the band plays "America The Beautiful."

THE SQUARE DOES NOT FIT TOO WELL into many current groups of angle players, corner cutters, sharp shooters and goof-offs. He does not even like to open packages before Christmas. He does not want to fly now and pay later. He is burdened down with old fashioned ideas of honesty, loyalty, courage and thrift. In fact, he may be on his way to complete extinction.

IN MARK TWAIN'S DAY, the word "Square" was pretty wholesome and one of the finest. At that time you gave a man a square deal if you were honest. You gave him a square meal if he was hungry. You stood four-square for the right as you saw it, and square against everything else. When you got out of debt you were square with the world. And that was when you could look your fellow man square in the eye.

OF COURSE, WE KNOW THAT TIMES CHANGE. With changes come different expressions, just as we hear new tunes and have new dances.

SOMETIMES SOME OF THESE THINGS sound somewhat foreign. It causes one to wonder if we are importing ideas, rather than exporting them.

IT HAS BEEN POINTED OUT THAT the famous quotes from Nathan Hale, Patrick Henry and others have been practically dropped from all textbooks. In

nine of the new texts, the reply of John Paul Jones to the British demand for surrender, "I have not yet begun to fight," does not even appear.

TODAY WE HAVE A NEW SET OF HEROES. Their names are Glenn and Grissom, Shepard, Carpenter, Shirra and Cooper. These heroes are from nice, small towns with names like Sparta, Boulder, East Derry, Mitchell and Shawnee. Maybe these men are squares and maybe the reason is they have lived too far from the sophisticated influences to keep from becoming squares. For who but a square would volunteer his life for his country's good? This would be the opinion of some of those who want to make fun of a square, but not these squares. We can be thankful there are still some and hope there will be a great deal more.

NEXT WEEK WE WILL TALK ABOUT BOBBY DYLAN'S new song, "Something Is Happening in the Land, and You Don't Know What It Is, Do You, Mr. Jones?" Mr. Jones is the "Square" and most of us, young and old, are Mr. Joneses.
