1967 An Eventful Year In RL

Summary: Not intended to include all events of 1967, this summary was made by scanning the 1967 file of the Bronte Enterprise, reflecting a few of the things that happened in "our town" during the past year.

JANUARY E

A business exchange began with the New Year when Vaughan Davis and Wesley Kinsey sold Butane Sales Co. to Douglas Ditmore of Bronte. The BCD began the annual membership drive and Dun and Bradstreet listings in Coke County were up. Bitter cold weather was on tap for the annual Coke County Livestock Show but more than 100 youngsters participated. Texas State Health Department approved plans for the new sewer system. Robert Lee junior high basketball teams made a clean sweep of the Bronte tournament,

winning both championships. Deposits at Robert Lee State Bank reached a new high with \$2,498,315.12 on deposit at the start of the year. Bill Allen was elected new president of the Golf Association. A hilarious, womanless wedding was sponsored by the high school senior class.

FEBRUARY

1967 license plates went on sale. Final approval was given on the city's low rent housing project. 996 persons registered to vote in 1967 in Coke County in the first Texas voter registration period. Coke County gave \$848 to the March of Dimes. It was announced that construction work at the Robert Lee Dam was running 30 days ahead of schedule. Marsha Dodson was named to receive the DAR Good Citizenship award. Gene Baker retired from Baker's Grocery & Market after

nearly 39 years in the grocery business. Daphne Elayne Roe and James Everette Brown were wed in First Methodist Church and would live in the Philippines where he is stationed in the Air Force. Mrs. R. L. Flanagan opened a new beauty shop in town. Funeral services for Frank Coalson, West Texas educator and long time resident, were held. Pvt. Ronnie Walker was stationed in Fort Riley, Kans. Water flooding for secondary recovery operations was begun in the IAB oil field. Joe David Key received the Eagle Scout award. W. E. Abbott of Lubbock and San Antonio Construction Co. were low bidders on the water plant and sewer system construction jobs.

MARCH

Forty sustaining memberships were announced by the BCD. Darrell Pitcock and Sharon Walker were named king and queen of the sweetheart banquet at the Baptist Church. 700 persons attended the Lions Club-4-H pancake supper and talent show held at Robert Lee School. The heart fund collected \$552 in Coke County. Shelton Anderson was killed in a one-car accident. High school students were busy with track meets. Neil Calder won \$50 at the Bronte rattlesnake show for turning in 121 pounds of live rattlers. Spotted rains, badly needed, fell over the area. Mrs. Leola McCabe and Mrs. Vera Sparks returned from a three weeks trip to western states and Hawaii. Robert Lee girls volley

ball team won second place in the district. Twenty-six members of the senior class and their sponsors made the senior trip to the Gulf coast. Robert Lee Appliance Store had a grand opening March 30.

APRIL

An estimated 600 persons toured the big Robert Lee Dam construction project as invited guests of the contractor. Will Millican celebrated his 90th birthday. Union Texas announced plans to close its Silver camp. Douglas Gartman, Truman Hines and Billy J. Blair were elected school trustees; Clifford Wilson and Curtis Walker were elected hospital district directors. Robert Lee school students took an easy win of the district 44-B literary meet and qualified 11 students for

the regional meet. Sterling Allen and Sheri Pitcock were winners in the 4-H Favorite Foods Show. Billy Varnadore received a rattlesnake bite while working at the dam. Mrs. Fred McCabe Jr. was named Homemaker of the Year. Workers arrived in town to begin the new sewer system. Robert Lee Steers won first in the district track meet and qualified seven tracksters and five golfers for regional competition. From the regional competition, ten Robert Lee students, Marsha Dodson, Rhea Jean McCutchen, Melinda Percifull, Lois Heuvel, Randy Hall and the golf team, Gary Sam Williams, Quinn Conley, Bobby White, Ronnie Devoll and Gary Parker, won firsts and a berth in the state meet. A western musical netted \$165 for West Coke Hospital for landscaping the grounds.

MAY

Rhea Jean McCutchen and Della Katherine Dean were named honor students of the 1967 senior class. Kay Cole, Jo Adkins and James Hood were honor graduates of the 8th grade. The Little League season began. Rites for H. H. Jameson were held at Silver. Furst M. Moore was elected president of Robert Lee-Silver Lions Club. Melinda Percifull was 2nd and the golfers 3rd in the state meet in Austin. A devastating hail storm struck Robert Lee with thousands of dollars in damage. The swimming pool opened May 27 for the summer. Thirty seniors graduated from Robert Lee High School. J. O. Rudd was named a director of West Texas Boys Ranch. Lois Heuvel placed sixth and the mile relay team, composed of Heuvel, Jackie Counts, Patty Hughes and Elaine Fikes, won sixth in the state girls' track meet.

JUNE

The 13th annual Sanco homecoming was highlighted by the dedication of a historical marker commemorating the establishment of a post office on the frontier. Rainfall ranging up to 1.5 inches fell over the area. Rev. Bobby C. Palmos was named new pastor of First Methodist Church. A 3-inch rain fell at Silver, with lesser amounts in other parts of the county. Another new business, Anderson Automotive Service & Enco Station, opened in Robert Lee. Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Allen celebrated their 55th wedding anniversary. Heavy rains on the Colorado River watershed threatened the under-construction of the morning glory spillway at the dam, but workers managed to ward off damage. The Court of Civil Appeals upheld the consolidation election that had been in court since the election in Feb. 1966. A group of Robert Lee Explorer Scouts, accompanied by Garland Davis and Gene Hinnard, left for a trip to Minnesota and Canada. Suzann Burns was married to Drexel Skipworth.

JULY

The Robert Lee Observer had its 77th birthday. Swimming lessons were begun at the local pool. Considerable oil activity was taking place in the north part of the county. Carlton Boone was home after being stationed three years in Germany with the combat engineers. Lt. Col. Frank

Rising Costs Of Operation Send Prices For Hospital Care Spiralling Upward

A local hospital spokesman said this week that there is no deep dark secret why hospital prices go up. A review of hospital expenses, item by item, can be most revealing.

West Coke Hospital District Hospital Administrator Mrs. Nell Hines, said that the cost of preparing three meals a day, for approximately 703 patients at the West Coke Hospital for September and October has been rising rapidly.

In January of 1966 the average cost of preparing one meal was 84 cents. Now, not quite two years later, the cost is \$1.07 per tray. (The figures quoted are for the median hospital in Texas in the 50-99 bed size.)

Coke Stock Show Set For Jan. 8

Coke County's annual livestock show will be held Monday, Jan. 8, at the Show Barn in Robert Lee.

Events will get underway at 8:30 a.m. with the judging of breeding hogs. An auction sale which will start at 2 p.m. will conclude the show.

Frank Brownfield, vocational agriculture at Blackwell, will be the judge for the show, and Louis Bridges, vocational agriculture teacher at Eden, will be in charge of classifying and sifting the animals.

Prizes and ribbons will be awarded the top winners in the various classes, and awards will also be made to top Coke County breeders of animals entered.

During this period the raw food cost climbed from 49 cents to 51 cents or about 4%.

The largest part of the increase was in labor. Mrs. Nell Hines said that five work in the dietary department at West Coke Hospital.

Hospitals came under the Minimum wage law in February. The lowest allowable wage is \$1.00 per hour and will climb to \$1.15 per hour next February.

"We just see no relief in sight," Mrs. Hines said, "for our rising costs in dietary or any other department."

"It appears the hospital patient can expect no immediate reverse in this pattern," she said.

The administrator continued, "We're sure no one expects hospital employees to work for sub-standard wages."

"Federal legislation has decreed that by 1971 our wages will be on a level with all other employers. This will cause a continuance in the price spiral which no individual hospital can stop," she said.

"Modern, efficient hospital care which restores the sick and injured to health in the shortest possible time is still a bargain in spite of the upward cost trend," she concluded "And your governing boards and administration are determined to do everything within their power to assure each patient receives care and treatment commensurate with the cost."

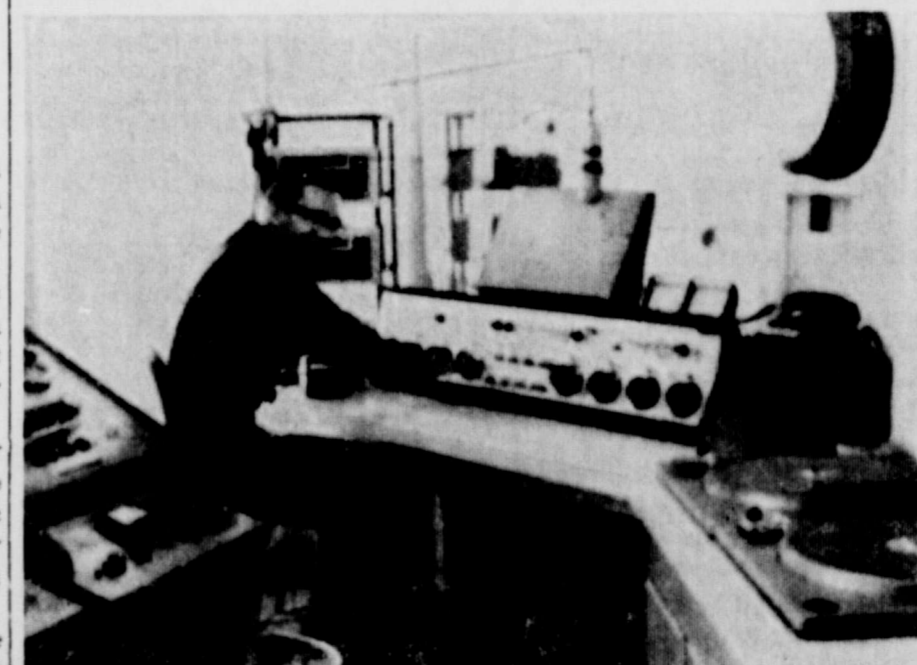
BEEF CATTLE COURSE WELL ATTENDED

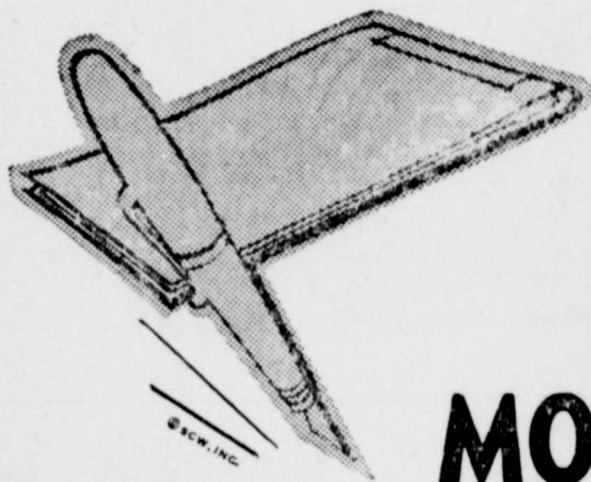

Kay Roberts was named Farm Bureau queen and Della Katherine Dean was winner of the talent find contest held in the Robert Lee school auditorium.

AUGUST

Jeanmarie Sirus and Bobby Alan Hammer announced their engagement. It was announced that work on the new highway will get underway soon. Three inches of rain fell during the last month. New uniforms were distributed to members of the Robert Lee High School Band. 100 were present for the Edith homecoming. Football season was nearing and the Steers were in practice. Robert Lee School budget was set at \$394,962. The dam construction claimed its first fatality, Henry Bass, who was drowned when a bank he was standing on caved in. Mr. and Mrs. Bill Powell leased Zettler's restaurant. Dawn Grace Boykin and Billy Bob Highsmith exchanged wedding vows in the Methodist church.

Robert Lee got the direct dialing system Sept. 10. Earth-soaking rains offered relief from a dry summer. The Steers opened their season against the Menard Yellowjackets. Coke County voting boxes were consolidated into five precincts. Joe Jones, 27, was killed in an auto accident in California. Last rites were held for R. B. Allen, 84, former long time Silver resident. The BCD began to talk about Christmas decorations. Ivey Motor Co. showed the new 1968 Fords and Mercurys and Vaughan Chevrolet Co. showed the 1968 Chevrolets. Robert Lee Methodists had a consecration service for the new Methodist parsonage. Almost four more inches of moisture were received. W. H. Robertson was named new fire chief and Calvin Wallace retired from the fire department after 20 years of service.

OCTOBER

A Pioneer Day celebration took place Oct. 12 and a historical marker, commemorating the Fencing War, was dedicated. Finis Harmon was elected president of the Coke County Game Management Association. Girl Scouts were organized in town. J. Frank Norfleet, colorful ex-Coke countian, died at 102 at Hale Center. The BCD voted to sponsor the annual Christmas Party and visit of Santa Claus. A new bride was Mrs. Kenneth Dwaine Clanton. Daylight saving time came to an end and Coke Countians caught up on the hours sleep they had missed six months before. Wayne Arrott was named new president of Coke County Farm Bureau. The DAR Good Citizenship award went to Kay Roberts.

NOVEMBER

Basketballs were unsacked and the winter schedules begun. A

large crowd turned out for the PTA carnival. Lois Heuvel and Tooter Fields were named Mr. and Miss RLHS. Funeral services were held for H. L. Scott, 68; also E. W. Olson, 71. Mrs. Mattie Tinkler was honored on her 78th birthday. Joe David Key was named 4-H Gold Star Boy of Coke County. Kathy Percifull and Donnie Devoll were homecoming king and queen. A mere handful of voters turned out for the amendment election, voting on six amendments to the Texas constitution. Six weeks tests were underway at Robert Lee School. Contract was let for construction of three new classrooms at Robert Lee School. Two Girl Scout troops were organized. Some new opponents for Robert Lee Steers were announced in the 1968 schedule, including Bangs, Wall and Wylie. Doyle Haley spent some time at home before being stationed aboard the USS Ulysses S. Grant, a new submarine, at Pearl Harbor. Seaman Lynsey White was undergoing training at San Diego. Deer season opened and many hunters bagged deer early in the season. Preliminary work was begun on rebuilding Highway 158 west of Robert Lee. An inch of rain fell in the county.

DECEMBER

Jimmy Bickley, Jim Herford and Jerry Sirus received awards for their work in Boy Scouting. Voter registration for 1968 was in process. A beef production short course for adult farmers was held at the school. Rhonda Sue Gartman and William Ray Hood were married in the Baptist Church. Kay Roberts was announced as FFA Sweetheart. Local basketball teams lost out in the Slaton tournament and entered tourneys at Eola and Lake View. The Texas Supreme Court refused to reverse the actions of lower courts and upheld the consolidation elec-

tion in the last move by the plaintiffs in state courts. Randy Hall was selected a member of the Class A all area team. Danny Smith was elected FHA beau. School was dismissed for the

Christmas holidays and an air of festivity took over in parties, shopping and other events. A giant ice storm presented the look of Christmas to area residents.
