Straw Vote Gives Wallace Good Edge

Former Alabama Gov. George Wallace was the winner in a straw vote taken Monday by a senior government class of Robert

Lee High School. Wallace received almost 40 per cent of the votes polled by 142 persons in Robert Lee.

The 142 persons were asked the question: "How would you vote if the election were today?" Wallace received 56 votes. Vice President Hubert Humphrey received 49 and former Vice President Richard M. Nixon's count was 22. Eleven persons were undecided and four votes were cast for other persons.

The 35 government students, who are taught by Kenneth Mitchell, covered the downtown area of Robert Lee, going from Froggy's Cafe to the courthouse.

Boy Scout Fund Drive Underway In Robert Lee

The annual Robert Lee finance campaign for the Boy Scouts of America as kicked off Monday night at the community center, according to Freddie White, campaign chairman. Captains for the drive are Jimmy Bickley, Garland Davis, J. D. Mumford, Bobby Palmos and W. W. Thetford.

White said advance notice had not been given, but the campaign is in progress and will end Oct. 16.

The annual drive is one means of financing the Scouting program for boys 8 to 17 years of age in the area served by the Concho Valley Council. Funds raised are used to pay for equipment, salaries, office supplies, scouting awards, training volunteers in the scouting program, such as scoutmasters, cubmasters, explorer advisors, den mothers and committeemen.

Concho Valley Council serves 23½ counties of West Texas and its membership of Scouts is approximately 6,000.

White noted that the boy, his family, the institution that sponsors a unit and the community have to pay for the scouting program as no federal or other kinds of aid are received to pay for the program designed to "deliver young men of character, trained as concerned and participating American citizens in a society characterized by freedom and responsibility."

White concluded by stating: "America needs, and Scouting has proved that it can deliver the old fashioned patriotism which built our heritage and which is now so maligned by so many."

Improvements Reported for Housing Project, City, School at BCD Meeting

Work is already underway on cleaning up vacant lots in the city and concrete plans are to be made to clean up Robert Lee Cemetery, it was announced Tuesday at the regular luncheon meeting of the BCD.

The city already is busy at work bulldozing and cleaning vacant lots, Mayor Wilson Bryan said, and BCD President Hugh Lewis announced that Robert Lee Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star has agreed to appoint two members to serve on the cemetery committee with other members from the Masonic Lodge, BCD, Lions Club and city council.

Lewis also reported on the housing project in Robert Lee. He said several of the houses have been re-roofed as a result of damage caused by hail last spring. He also stated that Robert Lee Housing Authority has the money to install a sprinkler system on the grounds, and work would get started soon.

A new agreement with the general contractor on landscaping around the new homes has been worked out, Lewis said, and it is expected that the grass burr problem will be taken care of and a grass cover will be set over the area.

Mayor Bryan said the city has secured the loan of a small bulldozer from the county and a lar-

ger one from Stafford Bros., paving contractor who is working on the new highway through the city. He said city officials plan to continue to push trees and brush and clean up vacant lots as time permits employees to work on this project.

The mayor said the city has received excellent cooperation from property owners. He noted that some lots with buildings on them will require some work by owners to clean, but said he is hopeful owners will do their part, so the entire city can be cleared of brush and trash.

Bryan said after the cleanup is completed the city plans to use a shredder and mower regularly to keep the city clean and trimmed. The mayor added that he felt keeping the city free of brush and trash would improve health conditions, as it would aid in mosquito control.

Supt. Jimmy Bickley announced that Stafford Bros. has also promised use of equipment to pave the school parking lot, with the only cost to the school going for materials used. Both Bickley and Mayor Bryan had high praise for Clement Brothers and the paving contractor for their generous help in making city improvements.

Steers Bounce Bulldogs, 32 - 0, To Even Record

The Steers coasted to an easy victory over an Eden team that is down on experience. The Steer second team played the 2nd half and showed real promise. The experience will help them tremendously.

First Quarter

The Steers received the opening kickoff and with a return to their own 35, they went to work. Punching it out through the middle, they moved for five 1st downs to the Eden 10 yard line where on 1st down Mumford faked the middle and threw in the end zone to Joe Key for six points. The try for extras failed and, with much of the 1st quarter consumed, it was 6-0.

Cole kicked off to the Eden 20 and it was returned to the Eden 38. The Bee defense held for a gain of only 4 and Eden kicked to the Steer 30.

The Steers made a quick 1st but then a penalty stalled the drive and Mumford boomed it to the Eden 14 yard line. Again

the defense, lead by Ted Millican and James Fields with a new nose guard, Jim Ballard plugging the line, forced the Bulldogs to punt again. The kick went to the Steer 42 and one play later the 1st quarter ended on the Steer 46.

2nd Quarter

The Steers moved quickly again and made a 1st at the Eden 38 and another at the 21. Mumford hit Lane Beaty with a pass and Beaty moved the ball to the 7 yard line and another 1st. Then, with good interference, Roy Blair went the remaining 7 over right tackle and another touchdown. The extras failed again and the score stood at 12-0.

Cole kicked again to the Eden 12 with a return to the 35. Eden went to the air and Randy Smith picked it off and went all the way, but a penalty nullified it and the Steers had to take the ball at the Eden 26. Mumford swept the end for a first at the 15 and then with Blair and Preslar working the middle they

made another 1st at the 1 yard line. Mumford sneaked it in and the Steers had another 6 points. The extras failed again and the score was 18 to 0.

The Steer kickoff went to Eden's 27 with no return. Eden lost ground to their own 16 and were forced to punt again. A short kick gave the Steers the ball on the Eden 59. The Steers made short work of the next TD as they moved the ball to the 4 yard line in three 1st downs and Blair again punched it over. Andy Cole kicked the extra point and the score jumped to 25 to 0 just before the first half ended.

3rd Quarter

Lane Beaty kicked off to start the 2nd half and Eden returned to their 31 yard line. Their efforts at moving the ball were to no avail and Eden attempted to kick. Ted Millican went crashing through and blocked the kick and Randy Smith scooped it up at the 28 and this time he did score. The scoreboard showed 6 more points for the Steers. Cole's kick was good and the score

was 32-0.

Coach Mitchell pulled the starters and the second team took over after the kickoff. Eden made their first 1st down at the Steer 38, but on the next play, Larry Sockwell, playing safety for the 2nd string, intercepted at the Steer 20. Mumford came in and on 1st down quick kicked to the Eden 25 yard line. The Bulldogs made another 1st, but then Waldon Millican intercepted at the Steer 40 and Robert Lee had possession again. However, they quickly gave it back as the eager 2nd team fumbled at the Steer 41. The defense got tough and held the Bulldogs at the Eden 31 and they punted to the Steer 35. Mumford again kicked on 1st down to the Eden 26. The young Steers held the Bulldogs at the Steer 44 on downs as the 3rd quarter ended.

4th Quarter

The young Steers made a 1st at the 46, then another at the 35. The Bulldogs then held them at the 26 and took over on downs. Going to the air, the Bulldogs let

Danny Perciful pick off a pass and return it to the Eden 35 yard line. The Bulldogs held at that point and took over. Again, the Steers intercepted as Doug Burns picked it off at the Robert Lee 45 and returned to the Eden 37. Quarterback Burns hit end Mike Denman with a quick pass and Denman moved to the Eden 8 yard line. The Steers drove on to the Eden 1, but that was all, as the Eden defense held. The Steers also held and Eden punted to their 47.

The Steers got too anxious and were penalized to their own 31. Again Burns hit Denman with a pass and a 1st at the Eden 36. Denman made a beautiful diving catch on the 1st down play, but it went to no avail as Eden held again. The Steers were a little tough as they then held the Bulldogs and Eden lost ground back to their 30 yard line. Andy Cole attempted a field goal from 40 yards out but it fell short against the wind. Eden took over at their own 20. Two plays later the ball game ended in a slow drizzle.

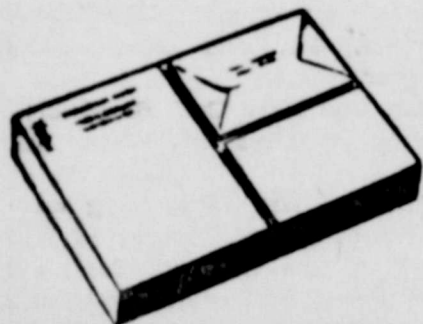
Installation service will be Nov. 7 at Winters by Mrs. Louis J. Cole of Ballinger.

Effective with the first gas bills rendered on or after the 1st day of October, 1968, the general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Robert Lee by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

- First 600 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$1.667 gross; \$1.50 net.
- Next 1,400 cu. ft. at \$1.482 per MCF gross; \$1.334 per MCF net.
- Next 3,000 cu. ft. at .927 per MCF gross; .834 per MCF net.
- Next 20,000 cu. ft. at .649 per MCF gross; .584 per MCF net.
- Over 25,000 cu. ft. at .593 per MCF gross; .534 per MCF net.

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

ADJUSTMENT

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustment: Plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to January 1, 1966, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of this adjustment; however, failure of Company to apply such adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make such adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. The fact that there is an imperative public need for an ordinance fixing and determining the rate for gas and gas service furnished to residential and commercial consumers creates an emergency, and the reading and passage of this ordinance at three separate meetings is hereby suspended and this ordi-

nance shall take effect and be in full force from and after the date of its passage at a single meeting and the approval thereof by the Mayor.
