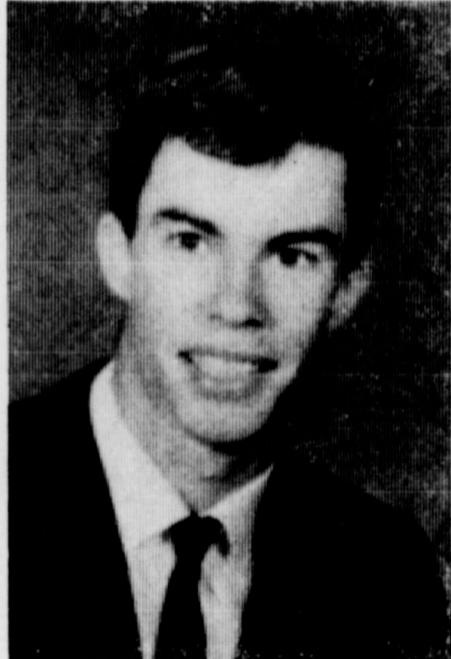

Hospital Board Plans Meeting To Discuss Nursing Home

The board of directors of West Coke County Hospital District plan to meet Thursday night (tonight) to discuss the recent grant which was approved for an addition to the district's nursing home. J. E. Quisenberry, secretary, said this week that he expects the board will set a date for a public meeting when all interested citizens will have an opportunity to hear the proposition explained and to ask questions.

Quisenberry explained the situation to the Observer as follows:

The \$55,000 grant has been approved under the Hill-Burton program for hospital construction work. In order to use this \$55,000, the hospital district would have to provide a matching \$55,000, making a total of \$110,000 needed to build facilities to take care of eight additional residents in the home, or a total of 16 persons.

The hospital applied for a grant of \$97,500 which, when matched with local funds, would have been sufficient to build 22 additional rooms for a total of 30.

Baker Thanks Coke Voters

Fort Stockton—In expressing his thanks to voters of the 66th district for a 2 to 1 majority in the race for state representative, George Baker of Fort Stockton has asked that local residents of the towns and counties give him the benefit of their views on legislative problems and matters of both local and general concern.

"A legislator can represent the people intelligently only if fully informed of local problems and local thinking. It is my desire to represent all of the people, all of the towns and all of the counties of our district with fairness, and with the benefit of fullest possible information.

"It is my aim to make the office of representative in our district mean exactly that — your agent and your spokesman in Austin," Baker said.

Final, but unofficial, returns from the 13 counties gave Baker a total of 12,397 votes, to 5,996 for Jim Kent, his opponent from Monahans.



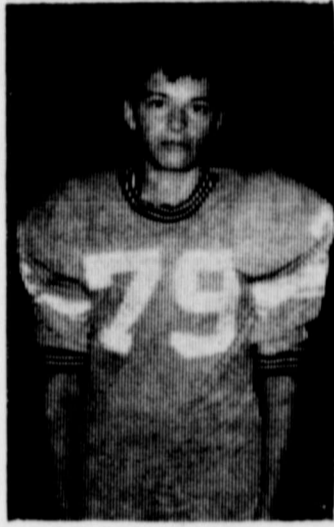

Roscoe Scores Late Touchdown To Down Robert Lee Steers, 7-0

The Steers lost a tough one played in a snowy, sloppy mess. The Roscoe Plowboys outfumbled the Steers, but the fumble that counted hurt the Steers in the last two minutes of play. Outweighed again on a field that should favor the heavier men, the Steers played an outstanding game of defense and it was a defensive battle all the way, and it was the defense that actually scored for Roscoe.

First Quarter

The Plowboys received the opening kickoff with Lane Beaty kicking to the 25 yard line on a flat kick. With a return to the 36, they had it 1st and 10. The Steers hit quick and in three tries the Plowboys gained only 1 yard and were forced to punt. The kick was a good one and carried to the Steer 10 yard line. The Steers made a hard 1st at their 21, then Roscoe held and Mumford quick kicked to the Plowboy 40. Then in rapid succession, Roscoe moved to the Steer 10 yard line on a mismeasured 1st down. (The field was so muddy and sloppy the yard markers were hard to see.) But then on a good run the Roscoe fullback hit the middle and at the 1 yard line, Randy Smith stole the ball and saved a possible TD. It was the Steers ball. The Steers made a 1st at their 15, but then Roscoe held and Mumford quick kicked again to the 50 yard line. The Plowboys tried to field the punt and fumbled. Joe Key recovered at the Plowboys 45. The Steers made another 1st at the Roscoe 34 and the quarter ended at that point.

Second Quarter

Roscoe held at that point and Blair quick kicked to the Plowboys 27 yard line. The Steers held and the Plowboys punter fumbled and Ballard pounced on the ball at the Plowboy 30 yard line. The Steers went to the air for a try and a deflected pass was intercepted by the Plowboys. It was to no avail, however, as a hard tackle by a Steer shook the ball loose and Bob Thmoason recovered for the Steers. The Steers went for a first at the Roscoe 29 with Blair and Key gaining 11 and 6 yards respectively. But the Steers stalled and on a 4th down field goal attempt, the sloppy ball fell short and it was the Plowboy's ball at the 20. But again the Steers hit hard and the Plowboys fumbled with Mumford falling on it at the Roscoe 38 yard line. The Steers gained little and Blair quick kicked to the Plowboy 20 yard line. But the Plowboys couldn't make the yards needed and had to punt with the kick carrying to the Steer 49. The Steers made a 1st at the Plowboy 36 and on the next play the first half ended.

Third Quarter

The Steers kicked again with Beaty kicking to the Plowboy 40 on an onside kick. R. Smith pounced on it at the 40. But on the first offensive play, the Steers fumbled at the Plowboy 39. But that was all they got out of it as the Steers held and Roscoe punted to the Steer 35 yard line. The Steers couldn't gain either and Mumford punted to the Plowboy 37. Roscoe then went to the air and Joe Key promptly picked one off and returned it to the Roscoe 37 yard line. Again Roscoe held the Steers and Mumford punted to the Roscoe 11 yard line.

Roscoe plowed for a 1st on the 23 where the Steers held. Roscoe punted to the Steer 33. The Steers with Randy Smith making the quick bursts, made a 1st at the Steer 44, but again Roscoe held them there and Mumford kicked to the Plowboy 46 yard line. The

Steers wouldn't give ground. The Plowboy punter had trouble again as the ball was fumbled and the Steers bounced on him at the Plowboy 46 on 4th down. The Steers ran one play to the 41 as the third quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

The Steers made their first at the Roscoe 35 and then, after four more tries, the Plowboys took over at their own 30 yard line. The Steers were still tough and held them for little gain and Roscoe punted to the Steer 35. Roscoe also held tough and Mumford quick kicked to the Plowboy 36. The Plowboys drove for a 1st at the 47, and another at the Steer 40. Then they gained another on a pass interference call at the Steer 22. The Steers held at the

14 on four tries and three plays later Mumford quick kicked again to the Steer 44 yard line. Then a long pass started the trouble. The receiver caught the ball and as he turned around he was hit hard and fumbled the ball with Teddy Millican recovering it on the 2 yard line. The Steers ran one play and then on second down, fumbled with Roscoe recovering on the one yard line. The 1st play Roscoe plunged over for the only TD of the game with a minute and 20 seconds left in the ball game. The kick for the extra point was good and the score was 7-0. Roscoe kicked off to the 28 and it was returned short to the 33. The game ended shortly after with the Steers trying desperately to score.

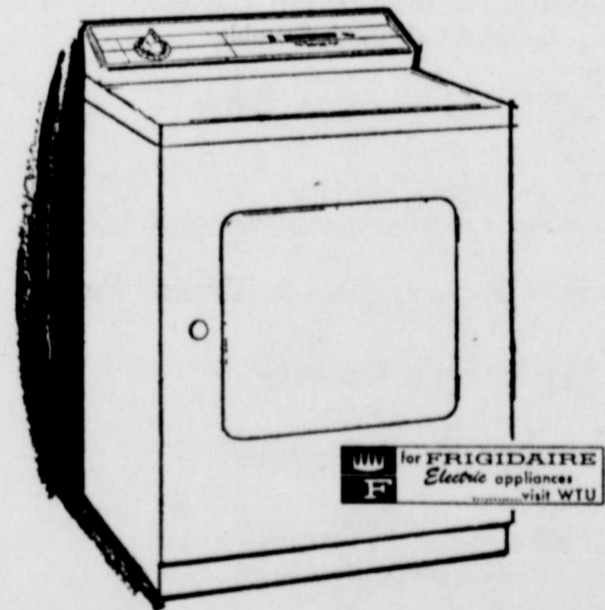

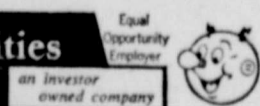

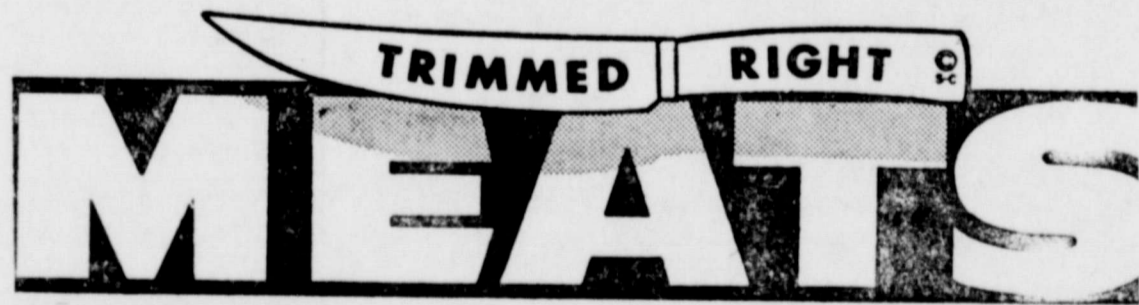
