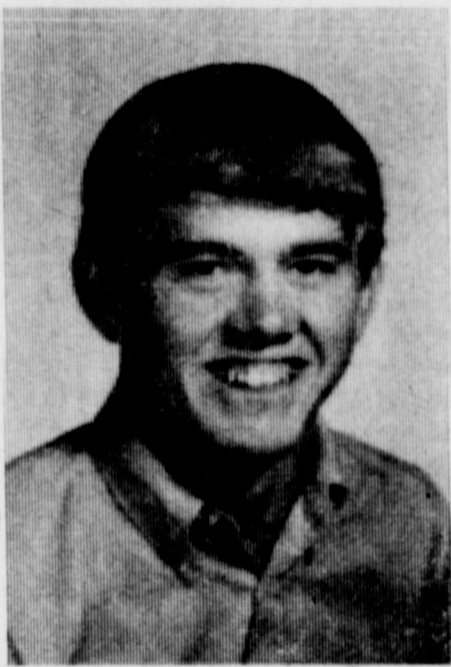

Worker Killed In Fall At Dam

Arthur Roy Baker was killed instantly at 11:20 a.m. Tuesday when he fell from the morning glory spillway at the Robert Lee Reservoir damsite. He was an employee of Terry Construction.

According to Howard Cox, the victim's foreman, Baker stumbled and fell through a hole for 45 feet, hit a concrete wall and fell 100 feet further to the floor of the spillway.

Baker had been employed by the company for the past 17 months. He was a regular iron worker, but was helping pour ce-

ment when the accident occurred.

Baker was the second accident victim of the construction job on the huge dam. Henry Bass was drowned in August, 1967, when he fell into the river following a cave-in. He was employed by Clement Bros., the prime contractor on the dam.

Funeral services for Mr. Baker will be held at 2 p.m. Thursday (today) in First United Methodist Church of Robert Lee. The pastor, the Rev. Bobby Palmos will officiate. Burial will be in Robert Lee Cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Baker was born Nov. 26, 1945, at Boerne. He graduated from McAllen High School in 1965 and was married to Cynthia Ann Davis June 17, 1967, at Mission. He was a member of the McAllen Methodist Church. He came to Coke County in 1967 to work on the dam.

Survivors include his wife; his mother, Mrs. Yvonne Baker of McAllen; his grandfather, Gilbert J. Baker of Weslaco; his grandmother, Mrs. A. B. Sheppard of Robert Lee.

1140 Coke Citizens Register To Vote

Coke County voters have through Friday, Jan. 31, to register in order to be able to vote in elections which may be called during the next year. Any person, regardless of his age, will not be allowed to vote unless he has registered.

County Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs reported Wednesday morning that 1140 persons had

registered up to that time. He said he was expecting a rush during the last two days.

Jacobs said he would like particularly to make clear that persons over 60 years old must register just like everyone else. "Back before the poll tax was declared unconstitutional," he said "anyone over 60 didn't have

to pay the tax or register in order to be eligible to vote. However, since the new voting law was passed, everyone must register."

Citizens may register by going to the tax office in person, or they may fill out, sign and mail in an application, so long as it is postmarked not later than Jan. 31, Jacobs said.

There are some instances when an agent may register for a prospective voter. The voter registration law of Texas provides that a husband, wife, father, mother, son or daughter may register for the prospective voter.

Tax Deadline, Too

Friday is also the deadline for paying all property taxes, Jacobs pointed out. State and county taxes should be paid in his office not later than Jan. 31, in order not to be declared delinquent.

City and school taxes are also payable not later than Jan. 31, and will become delinquent if not paid by that deadline.

City taxes should be paid to Mrs. Edna Havins at the city hall and school taxes should be paid to Mrs. Juanita Trimble at the school tax office.

School Census Deadline Nears

Friday, Jan. 31, is the deadline for counting school age children in Robert Lee School's annual census.

All children who will be six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1969, and not over 18 before Sept. 1, should be counted, regardless of whether the child is in school.

Every school age child who resides in the district as of Feb. 1 needs to be counted, said Supt. Jimmy Bickley. Anyone who knows of a child who fulfills the age requirements, and might not have been counted, is requested to call school officials not later than Friday.

Ordinance Lists Rules for RL Lake

An ordinance passed by the board of directors of the Colorado River Municipal Water District is being published in this week's Observer. The lengthy public notice spells out in detail the rules and regulations which will govern the use of facilities of the Robert Lee Reservoir. The ordinance covers regulations for persons who will use the lake for recreation purposes, as well as those who will live at the site or establish businesses in the area.

Anyone who plans to make use of the facilities is invited to study the regulations, and cut them out of this newspaper and save for future reference.

New Car Tags Going On Sale

Motor vehicle license plates will go on sale Feb. 1 in the office of County Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs. Sale of the new license plates will continue through April 1.

The new plates will be of new reflectorized metal background with black lettering and will be inscribed only with the word "Texas" plus 1969 and the number.

Jacobs said vehicle owners are required to bring four items with

them when they come to his office to buy license plates: 1. certificate of title; 2. 1968 license receipt; 3. current residence address; 4. zip code.

State law requires that each owner register his vehicles in the county in which he resides and to present his certificate of title as evidence of ownership.

Jacobs said he has received over 3,000 new plates to take care of the 11 vehicle categories

which require licenses. Most of them are for passenger cars, with lesser numbers for trucks, farm trucks, truck tractor, farm truck tractors, trailers of various classifications and weights, federally owned vehicles and machinery vehicles.

Jacobs urged Coke County residents to be sure their vehicles are registered correctly and legally so as to avoid penalty under the laws of the state.

County Agents News Column

Thirteen 4-H Club members exhibited nine lambs and 14 barrows in the Abilene Stock Show last week. As usual, the competition was stiff. The percentage that place is small. The number that qualify for the premium sale is even less.

Terry Wayne and Harvey Wojtek were the most fortunate exhibitors. Their three crossbred barrows, showing in a class of 58 light weight barrows, placed 4th, 5th, and 7th. Rhonda Askins did well, also exhibiting the first place group of three Duroc barrows and the reserve champion pen of three barrows of the show.

Audrey Walker placed 6th in a class of 36 heavy weight Duroc barrows. Rebecca Walker and Darrel Pitcock both came close in the class of 92 light weight Duroc barrows. They were among the top 15, but did not make the top 10 that received ribbons. Also showing in the pig show were Sharon Walker, Sheri Pitcock and Wibby Millican.

The lamb show was equally tough. Konny Service placed 19th with one of her crossbred lambs. Walter Tinkler was in the lineup of the top 30 light weight finewool lambs, but did not place. Jeania and Clark Tinkler showed finewool lambs, also.

Seven club members will exhibit animals in the Houston show late in February. Most of the animals will be held for the San Angelo show in March.

The 1969 price support level for mohair is 77.4 cents per pound grease basis. The 1969 price support level for shorn wool

is 69 cents per pound, grease basis.

The new yield for lamb carcasses and slaughter lambs will become effective March 1 of this year. A dual grading system, a combination of the present USDA grades and the yield grade system will be employed.

What this will do to our present marketing system is difficult to predict. Any change is slow and takes time for the packers, the producers and the consumers to come into full accord.

I would become acquainted with the new system if you have not already done so. Texas, the Southwestern states and the man who sells range produced lambs stand to gain more once, and if, the new system is fully accepted. Many of our range produced lambs would yield number one and two under present yield standards.

Again, the big question is if and how soon the buyers will pay the top price for the lamb with less finish. Until they make the change, lambs with more finish and more pounds of weight will set the price standard.

Much testing and speculation is going on regarding the ideal cow size or put another way which size cow will produce the greatest net yield. Many operators still prefer a purebred animal. Others are using a different breed of bull and producing crossbred calves. Still others are using a purebred bull on crossbred cows.

Every operator's situation is different. The pasture available is different, the present breeding herd is different from that of his neighbor. There is no one answer that will be best for every producer. But, there are some con-

siderations that should be given some thought as we plan for the future and as we think more about production efficiency.

I recently saw a picture of a cow under production test whose type deserves consideration. She was an angus — Jersey cross, three years of age and weighing 649 pounds. She produced a calf by a Charolais bull that weighed 279 pounds at 210 days of age, and 681 pounds at ten months of age. She was a very efficient producer.

Many factors need to be weighed in reaching the conclusion of what would be best in a given production situation. Many operators will not want to change unless big differences in production can be assured. Despite this, the beef cattle industry as a whole is changing and production efficiency is a term we hear more frequently each year.

A few cases of rabies have been reported found in Coke County in recent weeks. T. B. Childress was exposed to a rabid goat recently. A rabid fox was killed one day recently near the Oak Creek Village south of Blackwell. And one or more cases apparently have been spotted in the west end of the county.

As a precaution and preventive measure all pets should be immunized against rabies. Contact with any suspicious looking varmints should be avoided if possible. And finally, should you be exposed to a rabid animal and send the head in for a test, be sure to tell the authorities that someone was exposed to the rabies germ.

The Robert Lee Independent School District is requesting bids for an Asphalt Surface Running Track. The work to be done will be as shown on the accompanying drawing, and hereinafter specified, by Welch and Hampton, Architects, Sweetwater, Texas.

The Owner wishes to take bids in two parts. The first part being the layout and construction of the concrete curb. The Owner will then haul and dump the caliche base in place. The second part will be the grading and compacting of the caliche and the furnishing and laying down of the asphalt material and striping.

Sealed proposals addressed to Mr. Douglas Gartman, President of the Board of Trustees, Robert Lee Independent School District, Robert Lee, Texas. Bids will be received up to and not later than 7:00 P.M. on February 13, 1969. At this time, all proposals will be publicly opened and read aloud in the Board Room of the Robert Lee School District.

Each bidder must submit a Cashier's Check, Certified Check or Bid Bond payable without recourse to the order of the Own-

er in the amount of five per cent of the largest total amount of his proposal. This is considered a guarantee that the bidder will enter into a contract and execute contract survey within ten days after notice of award.

The Owner reserves the right to hold the bids for a period of thirty (30) days after the time set for the submission of the bids. If the successful bidder executes and delivers agreement, bonds, and insurance certificates, the Cashier's or Certified Check will be returned.

The Owner reserves the right to accept or reject any or all proposals.

Each contract is required to state in his proposal the time required for completion of the work. The only stipulation that the Owner would require in the construction work is that the work would not interfere with the use of the Stadium for practice or scheduled games, also that the track be completed by March 14, 1969.

Each contract will contain liquidated damage clause whereby the Contractor agrees to allow the Owner to withhold \$25.00 for each day consumed in completing the work in addition to the contract time. Allowance will be made for inclement weather and for other causes not the fault of the contractor.

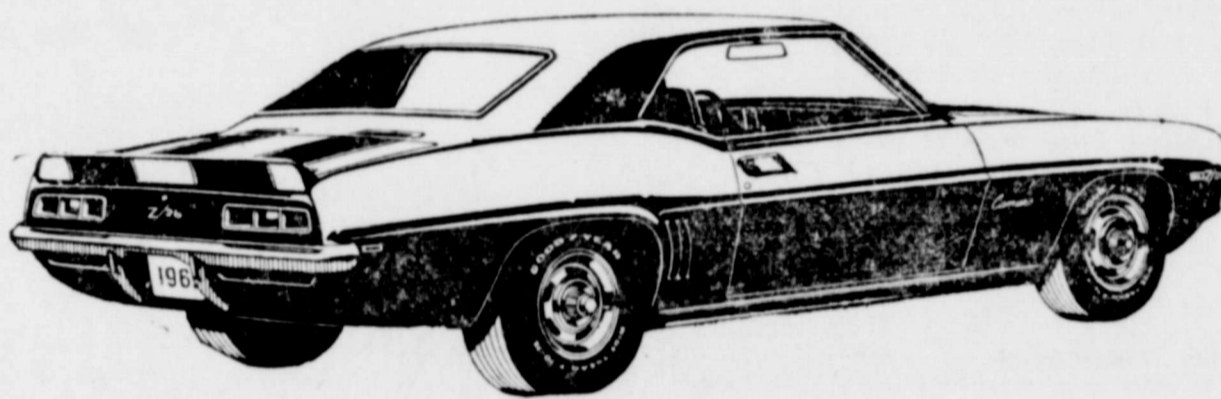

Organize Kitchen Storage

BCD Makes Plans To Erect Four Welcome Signs

A report on four proposed advertising signs to be erected on the highways entering Robert Lee was given at Tuesday's BCD meeting by Cumbie Ivey Jr. He is chairman of a committee which also includes Bill Allen and Fern Havins.

Ivey said his committee had contacted Ernest Clendennen, Silver welder, for cost of building the signs. It was decided the signs should be 8x16 feet and constructed of four-inch pipe and sheet steel. They would be mounted on four-inch pipe, 10 feet high.

The committees estimate on getting the signs built and erected amounted to a total of \$1250.

BCD members talked about wording for the signs and most of those present agreed they would like for them to carry the slogan, "Playground of West Texas." It was brought out that the wording would have to be limited in order to make letters large enough to be easily seen by motorists. The top of the sign and the most prominent lettering will say "Welcome to Robert Lee."

President Garland Davis, who presided at the meeting, asked members to be thinking of ways to finance the signs.

Davis reported that replies are coming in from letters recently sent out for sustaining members of the BCD. He said eight checks already have been received.

Supt. Jimmy Bickley mentioned the fact that Coke County will soon have three lakes of sufficient size to attract tourists, and he thought this would be a good thing to emphasize in advertising the county. Already the county had Mountain Creek Lake at Robert Lee and Oak Creek north of Bronte, and soon Robert Lee Reservoir will be completed. Bickley also mentioned that a guest house is under construction on the Murphy and Rochester Lakeside Estates adjacent to the new lake.

Twelve members were present, along with Davis Martin of Lubbock who was a guest of Gerald and Bill Allen.

be a nuisance, and it shall be the duty of the Lake Patrolmen to remove and destroy same whenever found.

Section XII

PIERS, DOCKS, BOATHOUSES AND OTHER CONSTRUCTION ON LANDS OWNED BY DISTRICT OR UPON LANDS UPON WHICH THE DISTRICT OWNS A FLOWAGE EASEMENT

No person, corporation or association shall erect or construct or proceed with the erection or construction of any building or structure, nor add to, move, alter, extend or demolish any building or structure upon lands owned by the District or waters impounded in the reservoir owned by the District without first applying for and obtaining a building permit therefor from the District. Whenever any such construction work is being done contrary to the provisions of this Ordinance, the District may order the work stopped and also revoke the building permit theretofore issued by notice in writing served upon the person to whom such permit was issued or any person engaged in the doing or causing of such work to be done, and such work shall be stopped forthwith until authorized by the District to proceed with such work or upon issuance of a building permit in those instances in which a building permit was not first obtained or which has been revoked.

After construction is completed, upon notice from the owner or permittee, the District will cause such structure to be inspected and, if constructed in accordance with such application and building permit, the District will issue a use permit which shall authorize the use of such structure until December 31 of the year in which such permit is issued. Such use permit shall be renewed annually, after inspection by the District, if such structure is found to meet the minimum standards hereinafter set forth. Should such annual inspection show repairs necessary to bring such structures within the minimum standards stated, such defects shall be pointed out in writing and delivered to the owners of such use permit who shall cause such defects to be corrected.

Failure to obtain such annual use permit by March 1 of each year, or failure to correct such defects so pointed out within ninety (90) days after receipt of notice of same shall constitute a forfeiture of the right to continue to use such land and structure, and the same shall be removed therefrom upon receipt of notice to remove. Any such structure not removed promptly after such notice may be removed by the District, and if not reclaimed and the cost of removal, if any, paid within ninety (90) days after such removal, the District may sell, destroy or otherwise dispose of the same.

A fee of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) must be paid by applicant for such annual inspection and use permit.

Such building and use permits will be issued provided the structure for which the same is requested meet the following minimum standards:

1. No pier, dock, boathouse or float or combination of pier, dock and boathouse may extend from the shoreline into the Robert Lee Reservoir more than 100 feet measured from elevation 1898 feet above mean sea level, except that in channels and inlets measuring 300 feet or less in the width, the overall length of such pier, dock and boathouse or combination of piers, docks and boathouses may not be more

than one-third (1/3rd) of the width of said channel or inlet.

2. No pier, dock, boathouse or float may be constructed except within the lot lines projected into the reservoir of a tract of land leased or owned by the owner of such pier, dock, boathouse or float.

3. The deck of all fixed piers and docks must be above elevation 1900 feet above mean sea level.

4. All structures extending into the reservoir must have 3-inch red reflectors affixed at 20-foot intervals around all sides open to the reservoir.

5. All piers, docks, boathouses and floats must be constructed to withstand 70 m.p.h. winds and wave action caused by such winds.

Section XIII

REMOVING WATER FROM RESERVOIR

No water may be withdrawn from the Robert Lee Reservoir except by permit granted upon application submitted upon forms prepared and furnished by the District, only upon the terms and conditions stated in such application. All waters withdrawn under permits granted upon such applications shall be raw, untreated, surface runoff water, and the District shall not be responsible either for quality or quantity of such available waters. No water may be withdrawn from such reservoir for purposes of irrigation, provided, however, irrigation shall not be construed to include normal household, yard and individual gardening uses.

Section XIV

ALTERATION OF LAKE SHORE WATER LINE

No alteration, change or realignment of the lake shore water line of the Robert Lee Reservoir shall be made or done by any person, corporation or association without first obtaining from the District a permit therefor. Applications for any such alteration, change or realignment shall be made in writing and shall be accompanied by a plan showing the alterations, changes or realignments proposed.

Any such change, alteration, or realignment will be presumed to interfere with the safety, efficiency and capability of such reservoir, and such permits will be granted only upon showing by applicant that such interference will not be material. Such permits shall be granted or withheld solely in the discretion of the District.

No such permit granted may be transferred or assigned by the Grantee. No such permit will be granted to permit a cut or channel across and beyond ground elevation 1912 feet above mean sea level.

Section XV

COMMERCIAL USE OF SHORELINE

(a) Commercial development and public use of any nature is prohibited along the shoreline and land below the 1900-foot contour elevation without first having a permit and franchise for such use, issued by the District.

(b) No person, firm or corporation, or their representatives, shall engage in or solicit any business within the District-owned area, except normal business activity franchised concessionaires on District property, without permission in writing from the District or in accordance with terms of a permit or a concession contract with the District.

(c) All commercial operations on the lake or land owned by the District shall be in accordance with a negotiated contract and lease with the District.

Section XVI

SKIING, SURFBOARDING AND SPEEDING IN PROHIBITED AREAS

Water skiing, surfboarding and high-speed boat operation in excess of posted speed limits is prohibited in marked areas.

Section XVII

ABANDONMENT OF PROPERTY

Abandonment of personal property on land or water owned by the District is prohibited.

Personal property shall not be left unattended except in accordance with permits issued therefor.

Property abandoned or left unattended in excess of 48 hours will be impounded by the District, and, if not reclaimed and impoundment charge, if any, paid within ninety (90) days, it will be sold, destroyed, converted to District use, or otherwise disposed of by the District.

Section XVIII

SPEED LIMITS, ETC., IN PARK AREAS

(a) The speed of any vehicle shall be such that life and property will not be endangered and shall be kept within posted limits on District-owned lands.

(b) Persons using public park areas will be responsible for that portion of the park used in regard to sanitation and burning of litter.

(c) Children under twelve (12) years of age must be accompanied by an adult.

Section XIX

SKIING - SURFBOARDING

Skiers and surfboarders must wear a life preserver when being towed by any craft.

Section XX

PROHIBITING USE OF SIREN

No person, persons, firm or corporation shall have, use, own, operate or maintain upon the waters of Robert Lee Reservoir any boat or craft equipped with a siren, except duly authorized peace officers of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, or other governmental unit or agency.

Section XXI

ANCHORING RAFT OR FLOAT

It shall be unlawful to anchor any raft or float upon the waters of Robert Lee Reservoir at any place other than at the water's edge and between a projection of lot lines of a lot or lots owned or leased by the owner of such raft or float; except that any raft or float may be anchored at any place not otherwise prohibited, upon the waters of Robert Lee Reservoir so long as such raft or float is occupied or attended by any person or persons of the age of fourteen (14) years or older.

Section XXII

BUOYS, FLOATS OR MARKERS

It shall be unlawful for any person to anchor, moor or otherwise affix to any buoy, float or marker belonging to the Colorado River Municipal Water District, any boat, trot line or other fishing apparatus or device whatsoever.

Section XXIII

THROWING TRASH & DEBRIS INTO LAKE

It shall be unlawful for any person to throw, discard or discharge into the waters of Robert Lee Reservoir any can, bottle, rubbish or waste matter of any kind.

**Section XXIV
OVERNIGHT CAMPING
IN PUBLIC AREAS**

It shall be unlawful to camp in any public area for more than seven (7) consecutive days.

**Section XXV
PEACE OFFICERS**

Realizing that the peace officers of Coke County, due to the pressure of their other duties, shall not be depended upon for the enforcement of the provisions of this Ordinance, it is hereby provided that the General Manager of this District, without other and further order of the Board of Directors, shall be directed, authorized and empowered to employ and establish one or more peace officers of this District. The compensation of any such officer and the duration of service shall be fixed by the General Manager of said District. Any such peace officer shall be required to give a good and solvent surety company bond, the premium thereon to be payable by the District, in the penal sum of \$1000, payable to this District, which shall be conditioned insofar as is appropriate, in the same manner as is, or may be provided by the laws of Texas with respect to the sheriffs of counties, but such bond may contain such other and further conditions as may be deemed by this District to be appropriate. Upon approval of any such bond by the Board of Directors of this District or its duly authorized agent, any such peace officer, insofar as may be appropriate, shall be required to take the oath of office prescribed, or to be subscribed, by the laws of Texas for sheriffs of counties of this State. The duties of any such peace officer shall be only those authorized by provision of the act of the Texas Legislature creating this District, and this District shall have no liability for any act of any such peace officer, whether within or exceeding the scope of his lawful authority save in cases where such officer may be acting under express recorded authorization by this Board of Directors. Every peace officer employed under this Ordinance shall be furnished with a commission and a badge to give evidence of his authority to act for the District.

Each such peace officer shall have the authority and duty to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance and all reasonable rules and regulations adopted hereunder, in like manner as would be the duty of a sheriff enforcing the laws of the State of Texas; provided, however, that such officers may make arrests only when necessary to prevent or abate the commission of any offense against the provisions of this Ordinance, or any amendment thereof, or any offense against the laws of the State of Texas, when any such offense, or threatened offense, occurs upon any land, water easement or other property owned or controlled by this District. Any such peace officer, in any event, shall have the power and duty to file specific complaints concerning offenses committed in violation of this Ordinance, or in violation of any laws of the State of Texas, or in violation of any laws of the United States of America.

**Section XXVI
PENALTIES**

The doing of any act forbidden to be done by this Ordinance, or the failure to do any act required by the provisions of this Ordinance, shall be deemed to be a misdemeanor, which in case of a lawful conviction thereof, shall be punishable by the infliction of a fine of not less than Ten Dollars (10.00) nor more than

Two Hundred Dollars (200.00), together with the costs of court, provided the fine and costs of court may not exceed Two Hundred Dollars (200.00). The fines collected hereunder, insofar as may not be required for payment of the cost of court, shall be payable to this District and shall be credited to its recreational fund. In case of the assessment of a fine hereunder and the refusal or inability of the guilty persons to discharge any such fine, together with the court costs incurred by reason of the prosecution of the offense, upon order of the Board of Directors of this District, any such person shall be committed to the county jail to serve out any such penalty at the same rate of credit as would be done to him in case of conviction of a misdemeanor under the laws of the State of Texas. It is, however, provided that no such imprisonment shall be ordered by the court of jurisdiction unless this District makes provision to reimburse the county for the confinement and maintenance of any such person at the same rate per day as would prevail in the case of confinement of a county prisoner, or upon any other basis of a compensation which may be agreed upon between the County Commissioners' Court and the Directors of this District. The penalty hereby authorized shall be in addition to any other penalty provided by the laws of the State of Texas, or by the laws of the United States of America, and may be enforced or imposed under complaints filed by the District, its peace officers, or any other interested person, in an appropriate court of jurisdiction.

Any person, persons, firm, or corporation found guilty of violation of any section or sections of this Ordinance shall upon request of the District surrender his permit or lease for suspension or cancellation by the District. Any fees which may have been paid by the Permittee for such permit shall automatically be forfeited, and the District shall not, in any event, be liable for the return or refund of any part thereof.

**Section XXVII
REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES**

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this Ordinance or any part thereof are hereby repealed, but only to the extent of such conflict.

**Section XXVIII
PARTIAL INVALIDITY**

If any section, sub-section, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions hereof.

**Section XXIX
PUBLICATION**

The provisions of this Ordinance shall be in full force and effect five (5) days after the second publication of the notice of this Ordinance as required by law.
