## Auto Inspection Deadline Nears

Speir, director of the Texas De-
partment of Public Safety today
reminded motorists that only one
month remains before the 1999
motor vehicle inspection deadline.
To date an estimated 28 mil-
lion vehicles have received the
inspection required by state law.
The Department of public Safe-
ty said some 3.2 million addition-
al vehicles remain to be inspected
prior to midnight, April 15.
Speir said 42.2 per cent of the
vehicles inspected so far requir-
ed mechanical adjustments prior
to issuance of an inspection
sticker. The defect found most
often has been misalignment of
headlights.
The Department of Public
Safety urged motorists to get the
inspection soon to avoid long
lines which will develop at in-
spection stations as the April 15
deadline approaches.
Texas has 5,466 licensed in-
spection stations. The required
inspection fee is $\$ 1.75$.

The tiny chewing pests live on skin scales, scurf and other skin tense irritation as they feed in the woll. The itching and irritation results in the sheep biting bing vigorously against posts, trees and other objects. The fleece becomes ragged and torn
and is greatly reduced in wate Biting lice usually spend their entire life on the sheep, leaving only to transfer to another animal upon contact. Peak numbers occur during the winter and may persist to spring shearing, after Small populations of lice sustain themselves on the animals during the summer and may begin to increase quickly with colder wea-
ther during the fall and winter when considerable damage occurs, according to the entomolo
gists. Louse control is difficult when animals are in heavy fleece. In-
secticidal sprays furnish partial secticical sprays furnish partia. much slower than desired. Dipping when animals are in full
fleece is impractical and is not fleece is impractical and is not obtained from insecticidal treat following shearing

AUSTIN - Texas lawmakers are nearing the halfway mark of
the 61st legislative session the pace is beginning to quicken visibly.
More than 1,200 House bills and some 700 Senate bills (plus nearly 100 proposed costitutional were filed by Friday, the deadline for free introduction of bills. A four-fifths majority now is required. Although floor sessions are brief, a lot of legislation is get-
ting passed 63 bills last ting passed 63 bills last week sion's major bussiness.
And the lights burn bright at the state capitol after midnight for some committees which
chedule hearings on as many as chedule hearings on as many as a dozen bills at a time. Other committee meetings begin as early as 9 am . and last until floor action

So far, the Senate has reversed its usual form. It is cranking out general bills faster than the House, where the representathodical look-'em-over-carefull thodical,

## MAJOR BILLS MOVING

The Iegislature has completed and handed the governor, a tough new measure providing fines up to $\$ 200$ and jail terms up to six months for disruptive activity on college campuses. Bill won't take effect until the start of the new school year.
