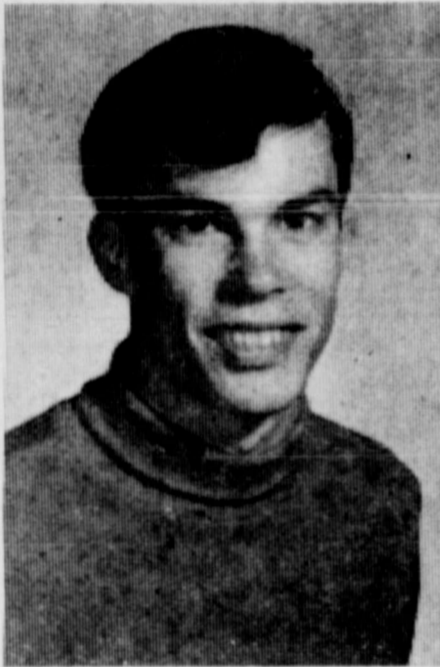

Rains Add 15 Feet To Lake Spence

Rains during the past week have poured 15 feet of water into the new E. V. Spence Reservoir at Robert Lee. The measurement was taken Wednesday morning and engineers reported the lake was still rising.

Turbulent weather over the weekend and shower activity on through early Wednesday morning dumped up to nearly five inches of rain in the area.

Highest measurement reported was in the Hayrick area where 4.7 inches was recorded. Robert Lee had 2.67 inches. South of town on the J. O. Rudd ranch the measurement was 3 inches. Silver also reported 3 inches; Edith received 2.2 inches and Sanco had 2.5 inches.

Fowler Home Hit By Gas Explosion

An explosion in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Fowler in north Robert Lee on West 15th Street about 3:15 p.m. last Wednesday sent Mr. Fowler to West Coke Hospital with burns about his face, neck, hands and arms.

A fire which occurred along with the explosion was soon brought under control by Robert Lee Volunteer Fire Department.

Fowler, who is a custodian at Robert Lee School, had complained earlier about not feeling well and had gone home to rest.

Firemen theorized that the explosion must have been caused by gas escaping from a faulty stove. It was presumed the gas was ignited by a pilot light after it had accumulated.

Supt. Jimmy Bickley announced this week that Fowler has submitted his resignation to the school board and it was accepted, effective May 31.

Fowler began working as a school custodian in 1951, and will have completed 18 years on the job when he retires. Poor health was given as his reason for retiring.

Bickley Explains Senate Bill 116

Supt. Jimmy Bickley spoke at Tuesday's BCD meeting on the adoption of Senate Bill 116, which would allow Robert Lee Schools to raise the school tax rate.

Adoption of Senate Bill 116 would give the school district the authority to raise the tax rate to the maximum of \$1.50 per \$100 valuation for the purpose of maintenance and operation, and allow up to the maximum of 50 cents per \$100 valuation for the purpose of retiring bonds.

A petition to the school board is necessary before the election can be called.

The superintendent said adoption of the bill by Robert Lee School District is necessary, or the alternative is to raise property valuations. Additional money is needed to take care of rising costs of operation, annual bond retirement and a decline in oil values.

June 27 has been set as the date for the election. **Continued on Back Page**

Graveside rites for Earl Everett Roberts, 61, were held at 2 p.m. Sunday in Robert Lee Cemetery. Williams Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Roberts was dead on arrival at West Coke County Hospital about 9:30 a.m. last Friday, apparently of a heart attack.

He was born Aug. 21, 1907 in Robert Lee and was a lifelong resident of Robert Lee. His parents were the late Mr. and Mrs. Green Roberts. He was married to Ruby Pritchard here Feb. 3, 1929. He had owned and operated a grocery business in Robert Lee at two different times, retiring because of ill health. He developed a fruit orchard near the West Coke County Hospital and was moderately active with it for the last few years.

Survivors include his wife; a brother, Artell Roberts; two sisters, Mrs. Calvin (Leona) Wallace and Mrs. Odie (Alice) Benton, all of Robert Lee and several nieces, nephews and cousins in the Robert Lee area.

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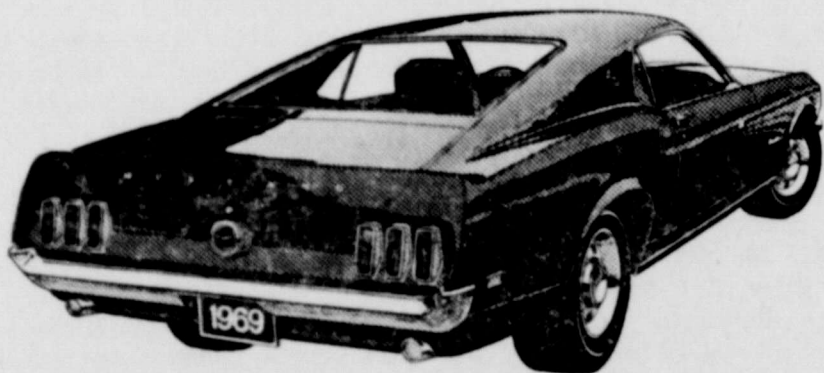

Lone Star Asks Hike in Gate Rate

AUSTIN, May 2 — Lone Star Gas Company today filed with the Texas Railroad Commission an application for an increase in the intracompany gate charge for residential, commercial and distribution unaccounted-for gas.

The company asked an increase from the present gate charge of 35.4 cents per thousand cubic feet of gas to 44.8 cents per thousand cubic feet.

When the Railroad Commission establishes the new intracompany gate charge, specific computations will be made for each Texas town. In those towns where earnings are deemed inadequate, individual rate action will be pursued with each town's ruling body.

CITY LAKE CATCHES GOOD SUPPLY OF WATER

Mountain Creek Reservoir, the city lake from which Robert Lee obtains its water supply, has added 2½ feet of water to its supply during the recent rains in this area.

Mayor Wilson Bryan said this week that the lake level has not reached to the top of the spillway, but it has received plenty of water to insure the city a plentiful supply during the coming summer.

GIRL SCOUTS WILL HAVE SUMMER DAY CAMP

Scout leaders in Robert Lee announced that they will have Day Camp again this year. This program is designed for girls, ages 8 through 15, and will be held May 26-30.

Vegetable Casserole

- 1 stick butter
 - 2 cups cracker crumbs
 - ½ lb. cheese, grated
 - 1 can asparagus
 - ½ can asparagus juice
 - 1 can English peas
 - 1 can French green beans
 - 1 can mushroom soup
- Melt butter, pour over crumbs and cheese. Put half into 2-quart casserole dish. Heat drained vegetables, add ½ can asparagus juice and soup. Add enough water to make one can liquid. Put into casserole dish and add remaining crumb mixture on top. Bake in 350 degree F. oven for 25 to 30 minutes. Serves 14, generously.

Christie Writes Trapping Experiences

Sampon Christie was in Robert Lee last Friday visiting and plugging his new book, "Longfang." The book is on sale here at Farris Drug.

For those who don't know about Christie, he is one of the best known trappers in West Texas. He lived many years in Glasscock County and now resides with his wife near Barksdale in the Nueces Canyon country.

"Longfang" is a rather short and sketchy story of his years of trying to rid this part of the country of predatory coyotes.

Christie was born at Indian Gap in Brown County in 1898 and moved with his parents to Glasscock County about 50 years ago. He grew up a lover of nature and was taught names of wild flowers, birds and animals by his mother. Consequently, it didn't take much encouragement for him to "hit the trail" when he was in his teens.

"All my life I had yearned to trap an outlaw wolf," Christie wrote in his book. "Here was a logical way to satisfy my adventurous spirit and serve my ranching countrymen."

Christie came up with a secret bait which the wild coyotes evidently could not resist, because he caught thousands of the wily predators, using it to lure the animals into the steel jaws of his

traps. Both young and old will enjoy the book Christie has written about matching his wits against the clever coyote. Price is \$1.25.

AUSTIN, Tex. — Strong determination to hold out for a two-year spending bill with new taxes now was voiced by Gov. Preston Smith after a week of conferences on the subject.

Smith took the line that he and legislators have a commitment for teacher pay raises, and that it cannot be done without a tax bill to raise about \$100 million a year.

But Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and Speaker Gus Mtuscher, as leaders of the two houses of the legislature, will make the decision on whether a one-year or a two-year spending bill will be passed.

"We are considering all factors, and the governor's opposition to a one-year bill is, of course, one factor," Barnes said.

Smith declared, "the House-Senate conference committee is working on a two-year bill. That would indicate to me that it has been pretty well determined."

Conferees did go to work on a biennial bill. House Revenues and Tax Committee has yet to come up with a tax package, although Mtuscher privately has sketched out a \$275 million revenue bill which includes a \$90 million corporate gains tax and increased cigarette levies.

Although rumors increased concerning possible summer special session of the Legislature after Smith took his stand against delayed taxation, Governor insists that will be unnecessary. He thinks lawmakers "if they apply themselves" can get through with all mandatory duties by the June 2 regular session deadline.

BILLS PASSED — With less than a month of the regular session to go, the House began to out-distance the filibuster-slowed Senate in churning out major bills.

House finally approved measures boosting drinking curfew to 2 a.m. and increasing maximum interest rates on \$300 to \$1,000 loans from \$8 to \$12 per \$100.

Another House proposal passed and sent to the Senate is a constitutional amendment to permit local governments to contract with each other for services like police and fire protection, streets, waste disposal etc.

Both Houses completed action on a bill to strengthen the law requiring open meetings and advance notice of government agencies. Legislative investigating committee sessions and consultations with attorneys will no longer be exempt. Both Houses also approved a bill adding four more "Monday holidays" — Columbus, Veterans' and Memorial Days and Washington's Birthday — for state employees effective in 1971.

Legislators also voted themselves a substantial boost in retirement benefits.

House gave final approval to a bill that allows children to transfer from one district to another without permission of the home district, taking State money with them.

House sent to the Senate bills to permit persons 18 or older to teach driver education, provide for occupational drivers licenses for persons aged 15 to 18, toughen the 1967 Consumer Credit Code restrictions on misleading advertising, and bring the state law closer to conformance with the Federal Truth in Lending law. (It gives the State Consumer Credit Commissioner broader powers in enforcing the code.)

House voted to create a six-member committee to promote mass transportation and to make eight changes in the 1943 bank-

ing code.

Senators, braving an all-night filibuster, passed a resolution to knock the annual voter registration requirement out of the constitution.

Senate approved a \$1.25 per hour state minimum wage bill and sent it on to the House.

A bill to halt the flow of unsolicited merchandise that comes by mail passed the Senate. Bill says unsolicited merchandise may be deemed a gift and the receiver does not have to return or pay for it.

Senate passed a bill to change the requirements for independent school districts wishing to form junior colleges. Contiguous districts with a combined taxable wealth of \$30 million — instead of \$9.5 million — and a scholastic population of 3,000 — instead of 7,000 — could establish a junior college.

Among other Senate-passed bills were stiff new controls for forging or altering prescriptions, curbs on obscene movies, a bill to establish a council to study the problems of children with learning defects and a measure which would permit Galveston's Moody family heirs to share in insurance company stock dividends distributed to the \$165 million Moody Foundation.

Carpet which has a thin sheet of vinyl behind the pile offers the comfort, luxury, ease of maintenance and sound reducing qualities of soft coverings plus the durability and resistance to wear of hard surface floor coverings.

This type carpet usually con-

sists of several layers — a dense pile, a polypropylene backing, a layer of pure vinyl and a cushion backing.

Since the carpet has a cushion backing, it can be cemented permanently to any type floor. This helps prevent moisture from getting under the carpet and damaging it.

Strength and endurance characteristics of this type carpet makes it an ideal floor covering for heavy traffic areas as in hospitals, supermarkets, offices and

schools. One company guarantees their carpet against excessive surface wear for five years from the date of installation when properly located and maintained.

If the carpet happens to be damaged as a burn or tear, it can be repaired by cutting out and removing the damaged area and installing a new piece.

Children's Eating Habits

Mothers often worry about their children's eating habits. Feeding seems to be one of the most common behavior problems, often causing unnecessary misunderstanding between mother and child.

Mothers may coax, nag or bargain their children into eating particular foods.

Mothers should introduce new foods to children one at a time, preferably when the child is very hungry.

The child may spit out the food at first, but urge him to try it again. Rejection is a normal reaction to a new texture.

Large pieces of food help the pre-school child learn to eat a variety of foods. Foods such as carrot sticks, apple wedges, lettuce leaves and cubes of meat are handled easily and comfortably if the food can be eaten with the fingers.

Mothers should let a child's appetite be the guide. He does not always want or need the same amount of food. Do not overwhelm him. Start with a small serving and then let him have more if he wants it. He will accept foods better if servings are not too large.

May plentiful foods list includes turkeys, onions, canned beets, canned and frozen sweet corn, canned and frozen green beans, canned tomatoes and tomatoes and tomato products and Maine sardines.

Be a smart shopper and include these foods in your meal plan often during May.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR31)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. The Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall each receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the annual salary of the Governor. Each other member of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed the annual salary paid to a district judge from state funds. Members of the Legislature shall also receive a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legis-

lature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall receive a salary fixed by the Legislature, not to exceed one-half the salary of the Governor; providing that the Legislature shall fix the salary of the other members, not to exceed that received by a district judge from state funds; and removing the 120-day limitation on per diem for regular sessions."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR4)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-d, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51-d. The Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for the payment of assistance by the State of Texas to the surviving spouse and minor children of officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units with authority to make an arrest, of the state or of any city, county, district, or other political subdivision who, because of the hazardous nature of their duties, suffer death in the course of the performance of those official duties. Should the Legislature

enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for payment of assistance to surviving spouses and minor children of governmental officers, employees, and agents, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and certain organized police reserve units, who have hazardous duties and are killed in the performance of those duties."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR8)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws as they now read or as they may hereafter be amended, providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance grants to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and other services to or on behalf of:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or non-citizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years;

"(2) Needy individuals who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;

"(3) Needy blind persons;

"(4) Needy dependent children and the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may prescribe such other eligibility requirements for participation in these programs as it deems appropriate.

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the federal laws

making matching funds available to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any needy person shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments only out of state funds on behalf of such individuals shall not exceed the amount of Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) during any fiscal year.

"Supplementing legislative appropriations for assistance payments authorized by this Section, the following sums are allocated out of the Omnibus Tax Clearance Fund and are appropriated to the State Department of Public Welfare for the period beginning September 1, 1969 and ending August 31, 1971: Three Million, Six Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$3,600,000) for Old Age Assistance, Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) for Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, and Twenty-Three Million, Nine Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$23,900,000) for Aid to Families with Dependent Children. Such allocations and appropriations shall be made available on the basis of equal monthly installments and otherwise shall be subject to the provisions of currently existing laws making allocations and appropriations for these purposes.

"Provided further, that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate federal statutes, as they now are or as they may be amended to the extent that federal matching money is not available to

the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enacts such laws as may be necessary in order that such federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy persons.

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday in August, 1969. At the election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting "FOR" or "AGAINST" the proposition:

"The Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of the needy aged, the needy blind, the needy disabled, and the needy dependent children and their caretakers; establishing Eighty Million Dollars (\$80,000,000) as the maximum amount that may be paid per year from state funds for assistance only; allocating and appropriating additional sums supplementing current legislative appropriations for assistance grants; and authorizing the Legislature to enact such laws as may be necessary in order that federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR50)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 50b-1 to read as follows:

"Section 50b-1. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in addition to those heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to Section 50b of the Constitution. The bonds authorized herein shall be executed in such form, upon such terms and be in such denomination as may be prescribed by law and shall bear interest, and be issued in such installments as shall be prescribed by the Board provided that the maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by such bonds may be fixed by law.

"(b) The moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited to the credit of the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund created by Section 50b of the Constitution and shall otherwise be handled as provided in Section 50b of the

Constitution and the laws enacted pursuant thereto.

"(c) The said bonds shall be general obligations of the state and shall be payable in the same manner and from the same sources as bonds heretofore authorized pursuant to Section 50b.

"(d) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution.

"(e) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The Constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for additional loans to students at institutions of higher education under the Texas Opportunity Plan."

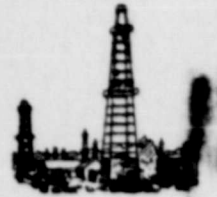
All necessary booklets are furnished and training will be ar-

date for a meeting of the school equalization board with oil companies. A separate board of equalization will be announced for local property owners.

President Garland Davis presided at the Tuesday meeting and gave a report on the meeting of citizens of Robert Lee, Colorado City, Snyder and Post Monday with the Texas Highway Commission. Thirty-one persons from the four cities attended the session in Austin and presented their case for routing an extension of Interstate 27 through their towns. Charles C. Thompson, president of City National Bank in Colorado City, made the presentation. He was assisted by Joe Bell, publisher of the Colorado City Record.

Davis said those going to Austin were well pleased with the reception they received there and that results of the trip will have to be awaited until the decision of the commission and the appropriation of funds for building the new highway.
