## 60 Golf Teams Coming For Annual Tournament

Sixty partnership golf teams will be in Robert Lee Saturday and Sunday for the annual Partnership Low Ball Tournament sponsored by the Mountain Creek Golf Club.

The 120 golfers will come from Robert Lee, Bronte, Midland, Odessa, San Angelo, Lubbock, Rankin, Dallas, Sonora, Snyder, Big Spring, Brady, Abilene and Midkiff. A waiting list is being made up in case of absence of any of the first 60 teams who signed up.

Sonny Perez and Blackie Howard of San Angelo will be here again this year to defend their 1968 win of the annual tournament. Of particular interest will be a match between Perez and Howard and Charlie Ramirez and

John Cantu. The latter team won the Riverside Golf Tournament in San Angelo last week.

Durwood Mumford, tournament director, said this week that the Mountain Creek Golf Course is in good condition due to lots of rain the past few weeks and verti-cutting of greens. Three fairway bunkers and four sand traps have been added to the course for the tournament, to increase interest for the participants. Mumford stated that electric golf carts will be available for those who want to use them.

### \$2,000 in Prizes

A total of \$2,000 in prizes is waiting for winners of the tournament. In addition to team prizes, a medalist prize will also be offered.

An 18 hole qualifying round will be shot Saturday, and on Sunday, another 18 holes will be shot by all flights. A total of five flights will be made up of 12 teams each. Prizes will be given to four winners in each flight.

## Equalization Board in Session

A board of equalization for Robert Lee Independent School District was scheduled for two sessions this week to meet with taxpayers who wished to present evidence concerning the valuation of property located in the school district.

Notices were mailed out last Friday stating the board's intention of raising all property valuations 30 per cent. The raise in valuations is necessary, school officials say, due to the fact that voters turned down a proposed tax rate increase June 7.

The vote was 57-46 against the proposal to raise the tax rate for maintenance and operation purposes to \$1.50 per \$100. More money is necessary, officials say, to maintain present standards of instruction, in the face of higher costs, decrease in oil valuations and building of new school facilities.

A meeting Wednesday was scheduled for local taxpayers. Another is scheduled for Friday when representatives of oil and industrial taxpayers will be heard.

A large crowd was present and the weather was perfect for the dedication last Saturday of Robert Lee Dam and E. V. Spence Reservoir. A threat of rain kept everybody wondering, but the cloud cover only made the affair pleasant.

Rep. Omar Burleson, congressman for the 17th District of Texas, was the main speaker for the event. He praised the Colorado River Municipal Water District for its initiative in building the huge lake and was interrupted by applause when he said, "You did it yourselves, without asking anything from Washington."

CRMWD President Charles W. Perry of Odessa opened the program following the barbecue lunch which was served by the Odessa Chuck Wagon Gang.

Perry welcomed visitors and introduced members of the board of directors of CRMWD. John L. Taylor of Big Spring, member of the board, served as master of ceremonies for the remainder of the program.

Taylor introduced O. C. Fisher of San Angelo, congressman for the 21st District, who made a short talk paying tribute to those who worked to get a dam on the Colorado River in Coke County.

Next, Taylor named the three

men he called primarily responsible for making the dam possible: J. B. Thomas, president of Texas Electric Service Co., S. W. Freese of the engineering firm Freese, Nichols and Erdress, and the late Col. E. V. Spence, former manager of CRMWD for whom the lake was named.

Thomas and Freese both spoke on early days of the organization and told of getting it "off the ground." They had high praise for the leadership of Colonel Spence during the early life of CRMWD.

Taylor also praised Colonel Spence for "taking the dream (of a dam on the Colorado) and making it a reality." Taylor also stated that when the colonel died, there was a pause in the operation of the water district, but there was no stop. He explained Spence had groomed present manager O. H. Ivey for the job and the operation continued almost uninterrupted.

Last part of the program was the introduction of Mrs. Spence who unveiled a plaque which shows the name of the dam and lake, along with a list of CRMWD officials.

A large number of dignitaries were recognized including Gerald C. Allen, L. T. Youngblood and

## Hail, Wind, Rain Damage Area Church of Christ To Have Meeting

A storm full of wild weather was almost disastrous for parts of the Robert Lee country last Thursday afternoon. Hail and high winds, along with deluges of rain did a great deal of damage to the Silver and Sanco communities before it moved eastward to continue its havoc.

Hail was not heavy enough to do a lot of damage to cars and roofs, but it was sufficiently strong to strip fruit trees and gardens and to batter grass into the dirt.

Heaviest rain reported was up to 5 inches on the Arledge Ranch north of Sanco. Parts of the ranch had only 3½ inches, however. Nolan Pentecost, who ranches further north near the Panther Gap area, reported that grass was destroyed on his place and damage to the roof on his

house was heavy.

Windows in the church at Sanco as well as residences of the community were broken out. Complete loss of oat crops were reported by Teddy Pitcock, Harvey Reid and Henry Carwile in the Sanco area.

Further north in the Graham Valley community, the J. W. Service place had damage to fruit trees caused by high winds and some hail. They reported 1.9 inches of rain.

Silver reported 2 inches of rain with enough hail to damage fruit trees.

East of Robert Lee, T. B. Childress had 1.9 inches of rain and winds were high enough to blow over a butane tank. M. A. Cox, northeast of town, had 2.5 inches of rain.

The heavy rain, hail and high wind missed Robert Lee where only .95 inch of rain fell. South of town the measurement showed 1 inch.

The storm moved eastward and did heavy damage to the area north of Bronte. At Oak Creek a number of trailer houses were turned over or blown off their moorings. Apparently the storm increased in intensity as it moved eastward, as hail damage at Winters was estimated at over \$1 million. A longtime Winters resident told The Observer, "I have always heard about baseball size hail, but this was the first time I ever really saw it. It was even bigger than baseballs, more like grapefruit." The hailstorm in the Runnels County town lasted 25 minutes.

A weekend meeting is being planned by members of the Northside Church of Christ in Robert Lee. The three days of special services are set for June 27, 28 and 29. Gaylon Wright of Houston will do the preaching.

Friday and Saturday services will begin at 7:30 p.m. while Sunday services will start at 10 a.m. and 6 p.m.

She was married to Diamond McSpadden Dec. 26, 1931 in Alpine. She was a member of the Church of Christ.

## Rules for Revolution Still Working

On a dark night in May 1919, two lorries rumbled across a bridge and on into the town of Dusseldorf. Among the dozen rowdy, singing "Tommys" apparently headed for a gay evening were two representatives of the Allied military intelligence. These men had traced a wave of indiscipline, mutiny and murder among the troops to the local headquarters of a revolutionary organization established in the town.

Pretending to be drunk, they brushed by the sentries and arrested the ringleaders—a group of 13 men and women seated at a long table.

In the course of the raid the Allied officers emptied the contents of the safe. One of the documents found in it contained a specific outline of "Rules for Bringing About a Revolution." It

is reprinted here to show the strategy of materialistic revolution, and how personal attitudes and habits of living affect the affairs of nations:

"A. Corrupt the young. Get them away from religion. Get them interested in sex. Make them superficial, destroy their ruggedness.

"B. Get control of all means of publicity and thereby:

"1. Get people's minds off their government by focusing their attention on athletics, sexy books and plays and other trivialities.

"2. Divide the people into hostile groups by constantly harping on controversial matters of no importance.

"3. Destroy the people's faith in their natural leaders by holding these latter up to ridicule, obloquy and contempt.

"4. Always preach true democracy, but seize power as fast and as ruthlessly as possible.

"5. By encouraging government extravagance, destroy its credit, produce fear of inflation with rising prices and general discontent.

"6. Foment unnecessary strikes in vital industries, encourage civil disorders and foster a lenient and soft attitude on the part of government toward such disorders.

"7. By specious arguments cause the breakdown of the old moral virtues: honesty, sobriety, continence, faith in the pledged word, ruggedness.

"C. Cause the registration of all firearms on some pretext, with a view to confiscating them and leaving the population helpless." — From NEW WORLD NEWS, February 1945.

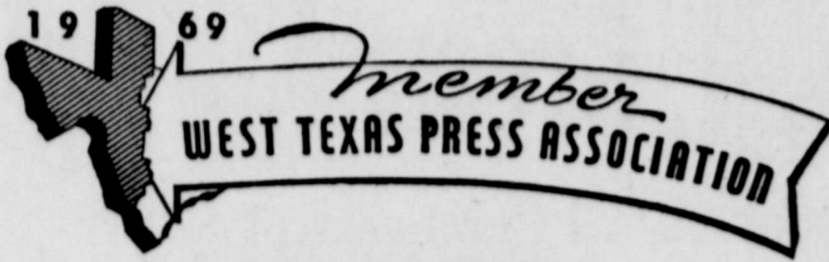

**Baker Baby Making Medical History**

(Editor's note: The following article was taken from the Mission Times and concerns the little son of Mrs. Cynthia Davis Baker and the late Arthur Ray Baker, who was killed in an accident while working on Robert Lee Dam.)

Little Arthur Burton Baker, age two months, is presently quite unaware that he, and his birth on March 22 in McAllen General Hospital, were helping to establish a new era and mortality rate for babies such as himself. Heretofore, so-called "blue babies" have had to struggle for survival with alarmingly low success.

Arthur Burton, whose mother is the former Miss Cynthia Davis, lost his father, Arthur Ray (Audie) Baker on Jan. 28 just a couple of months before his birth, due to a construction accident. He and his mother have been with Mrs. Baker's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Tyrus A. Davis, 1009 Country Club Drive, since that time, minus such times for his various hospitalizations.

The long arm of coincidence reached out at the very time of his birth in the form of an article in April McCall's Magazine, under the general title of "What's New in Medicine." The item mentioned and emphasized a new fluoroscopic system, recently being recognized and used. A first installation was made at children's hospital in Boston, whereby these babies can only be helped by this operation which enlarges the opening between the chamber of their oxygen-starved hearts. These babies must be operated upon, inside the oxygen chamber immediately.

Therefore, Arthur Burton was rushed to the Driscoll Hospital in Corpus Christi where the delicate operation, inside the oxygen chamber, was performed under the capable hands of Dr. J. W. Simpson of the cardiac division of the hospital.

**NEW SON FOR ROBERTSONS**

### Auto-Truck Wreck Injures Wilson Girl

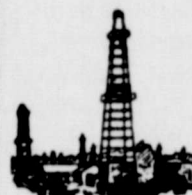
A 12 year old girl was injured in a car-truck collision about 5:30 Wednesday morning. The wreck occurred about one mile north of Robert Lee on Highway 208.
