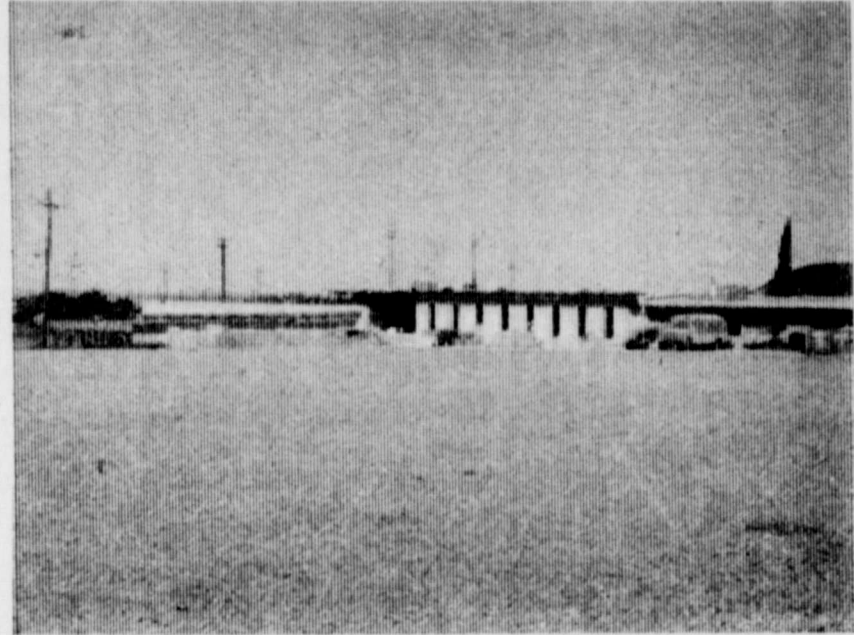
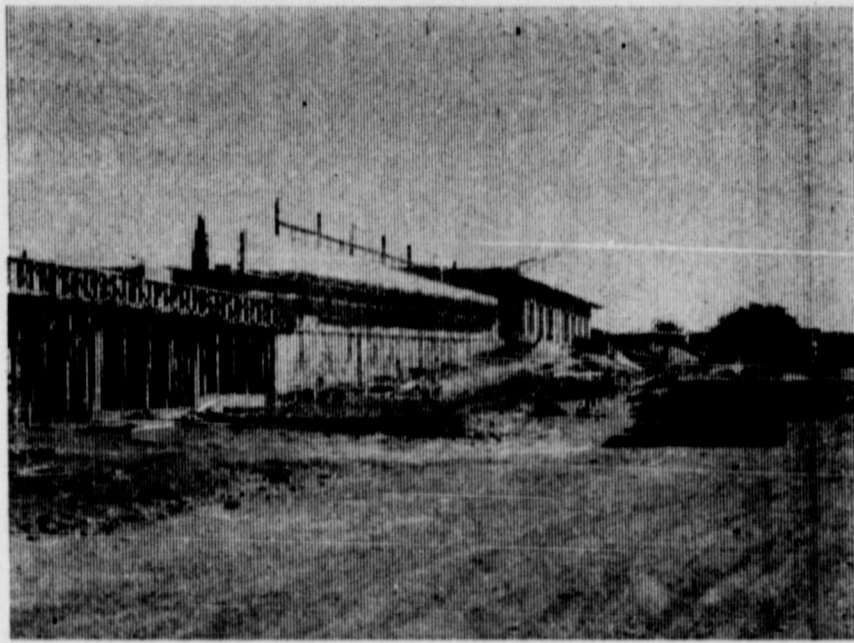

Construction on New Robert Lee School Goes Forward

## Part Of New School Ready In September

Supt. Jimmy Bickley gave a report on the progress of the school construction job at Tuesday's BCD meeting. Most of the new construction will not be ready for the opening of the 1969-70 school term, the superintendent said, but the vocational agriculture classroom and shop, the cafeteria and shower rooms of the gymnasium will be completed by the first day of school.

School officials are busy this week selecting new equipment for part of the new buildings, including dining room and library furniture and equipment. Tables for the junior high science lab have been ordered. More decisions on needed equipment will be made at a board meeting Thursday night, Bickley said.

## Coke County Wells Make 16,000 Barrels Daily

Texas, the nation's leading oil producer, has yielded more than 21 billion barrels of oil during the past 79 years of recorded production, according to the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

This has meant a statewide distribution of income which currently averages about \$3.4 billion a year. With 207 of the state's 254 counties producing crude oil,

each section of the state is marked by several prolific fields. Texas' daily oil production is more than 1.1 million barrels.

"More investment is needed to find new oil fields to replace those now being depleted," says Corbin J. Robertson, Association president. "By the end of this century the demand for oil and gas will have doubled. Between now and 1980, some \$200 billion will have to be spent to find enough energy to continue our present standard of living and guarantee national security. Clearly, the country today needs policies which will stimulate the drilling of more wells. Our reserves are shrinking."

Coke County, which has recorded production since 1942, has had a total crude oil output of 148,773,949 barrels up to the beginning of 1969. Coke County

production in 1968 was 5,852,904 barrels at the rate of 15,992 barrels a day.

Texas has 36 counties scattered over the state which produced at the rate of 25,000 barrels or more per day. The three largest are: Andrews, 203,520 barrels per day; Ector, 172,654 barrels per day; and Crane, 128,839 barrels per day.

Gregg County is the only county that has produced more than two billion barrels of oil. Andrews, Ector and Rusk counties have produced more than one billion barrels of oil.

## HINNARD GOING TO SCOUT JAMBOREE IN IDAHO

Scoutmaster Gene Hinnard plans to return to Robert Lee Sunday after he gets his Boy Scouts settled in camp at Camp Sol Mayer. He will leave Monday for Farragut Park in Idaho, site for the national Boy Scout Jamboree.

Other adult leaders from the Concho Valley Council who will attend the jamboree are Stuart Hawkins of San Angelo, who will serve as scoutmaster for the council delegation, and Willie Masters of Eagle Pass, who will be assistant scoutmaster. Hinnard will serve as assistant scoutmaster, also.

The group will leave San Angelo Monday, fly to Spokane, Wash., then travel by bus to the campsite. The jamboree will last from July 16 through 22. Some 35,000 to 40,000 Boy Scouts are expected to attend.

## New Phone System Ready Next Week

At 1:01 a.m. July 16 Robert Lee telephone customers will start receiving service through the new central office equipment, according to Jack Goss, division manager for General Telephone Company.

Goss said customers should start using their new telephone number and directories on that date. New numbers and directories have been mailed to all customers and anyone who has not received either their new number or directory by July 11 should notify the business office in San Angelo.

Party line customers are reminded that in order to reach another party on their line, they must dial the code "19" and then the complete seven digit number of the person being called, hang up and wait for the called party to answer.

Features of the new equipment will permit customers to move from one section of town to another, or to change from party to private lines without changing numbers. Full selective ringing on party lines will be provided — party line customers presently receive other parties' rings in addition to their own.

"This new system, combined with EDDD, Expanded Direct Distance Dialing, installed less than two years, is another step in our company's effort to provide the most complete and most modern communications service available," Goss said.

Mrs. Lula Wolfe, 87, died at her home in Lampasas Wednesday of last week, July 2.

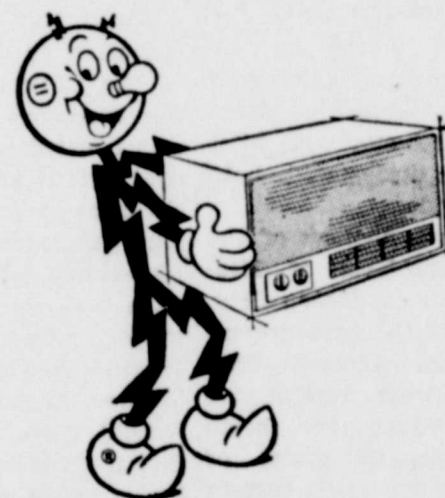
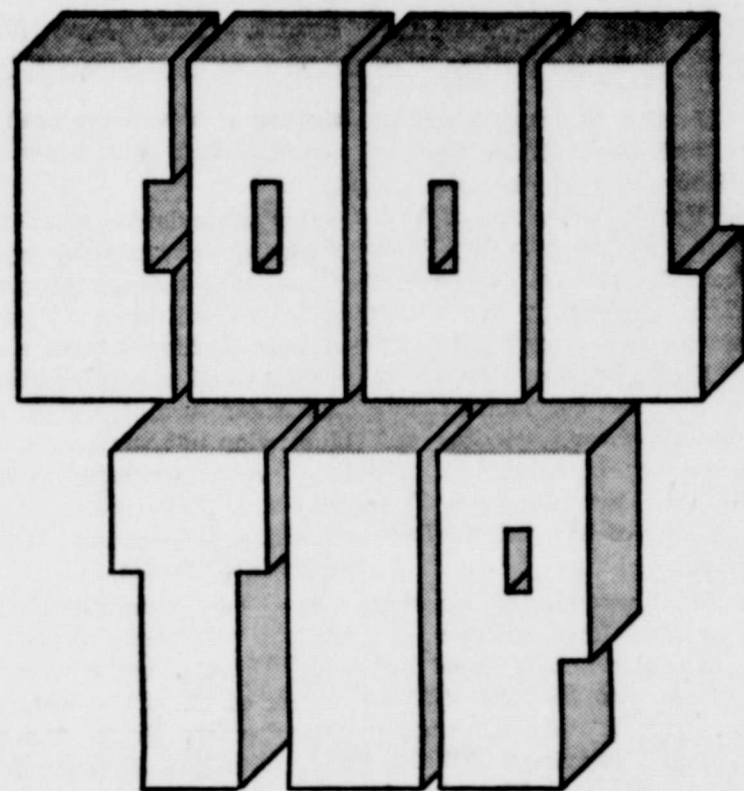
She was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. K. Landers and a sister of Mrs. Henry Varnadore.

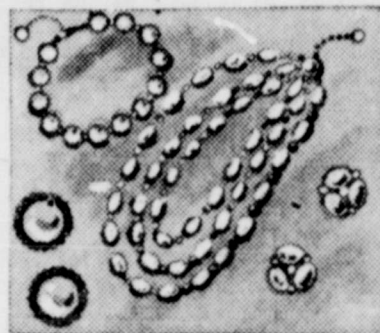

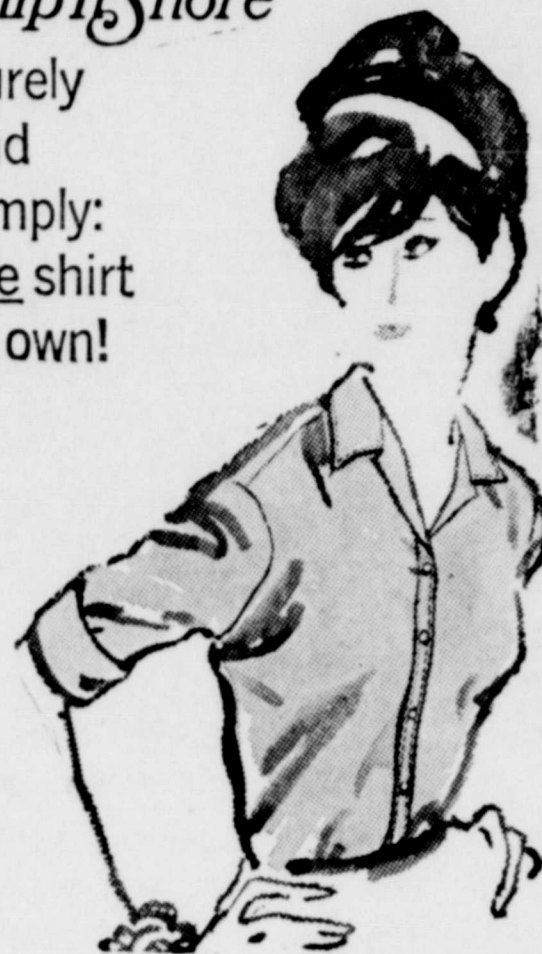
