

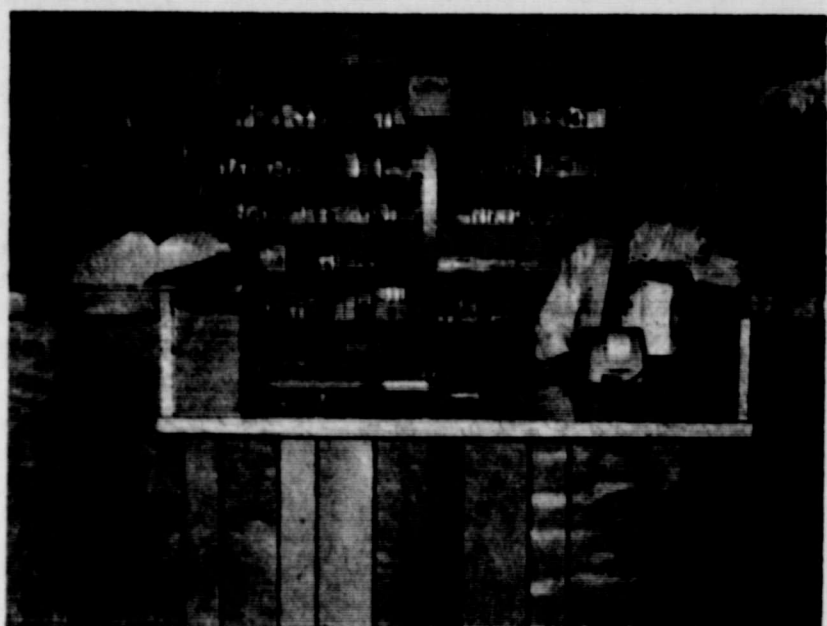

New Pharmacy To Have Grand Opening Friday

DeWitt Snead opened his new pharmacy for business in Robert Lee Monday, but the big grand opening of the business is scheduled for Friday. A large amount of free gift merchandise will be on hand for visitors during the Friday opening, and the new owner of the store has issued an invitation to everyone in the area to be on hand some time during the day.

The new business is housed in a 24x34 concrete tile building and is located on Highway 208 next door to West Way Grocery. Mashburn and Reed, Robert Lee contractors, built the building. Snead is now in the process of having the area around the store paved with asphalt paving. Paving will allow customers to drive to the drive-in window as well as to come to the front door without getting off the surfaced area.

The new building has a tiled floor and fluorescent lighting is used throughout. New fixtures have been installed to provide the most modern equipment in the store.

In addition to stocking a complete line of prescription drugs, Snead also has a complete line of shelf merchandise usually found in a drug store. He will also handle King's candy and has a large selection of magazines and comic books. He said this week that in a short time he will handle a line of greeting cards and will add a stock of livestock medicines and supplies.

Mr. and Mrs. Snead will live on West 12th Street next door to Mrs. Lamont Scott. He said he will be available to fill prescriptions both day and night, and anyone who needs service after hours should come by the couple's home.

Clift Accepts Job At Univ. of Denver

Wallace Bruce Clift, a former attorney and Episcopal priest, has been named assistant professor of religion at the University of Denver.

Clift was a corporation attorney in Houston from 1953-57 and a parish priest in the Episcopal Diocese of Texas from 1960-64. A graduate of the University of Texas (1948) and Harvard Law School (1952), he received a bachelor of divinity degree from the Church Divinity School of the Pacific in Berkeley, Calif. in 1960.

He earned a master's degree from the University of Chicago Divinity School in the field of religion and personality in 1968, and is working toward a doctor of philosophy degree in that field from Chicago U.

Clift has received five yearly grants from the Farish Foundation for study in analytical psychology and theology. He spent two years at the C. G. Jung Institute for Analytical Psychology in Zurich. He also served with the U. S. Naval Reserve from 1944 to 1946, and with the Korean National Department of Education in Seoul, 1946-48.

He is the son of Mrs. Bruce Clift, and the late Mr. Clift, of Robert Lee.

Enrollment Hits 398 First Week

Robert Lee School's enrollment for the current term has dropped considerably from last year, but the decrease was expected since a large number of students who were here with dam construction workers have moved on.

Latest enrollment figures released by school officials show a total of 398 students in school. The big drop is in elementary school (grades 1-7), while high school enrollment has shown a decrease of only three. Last year's enrollment at this point in the school term showed 468 in the school, which is a loss of 70 students.

Considerably more than half the 398 students are in the high school (grades 8-12) with a count of 227. Elementary school enrollment is 171.

More rains have fallen during the past week, making the agricultural outlook for the area appear better than it has since last spring.

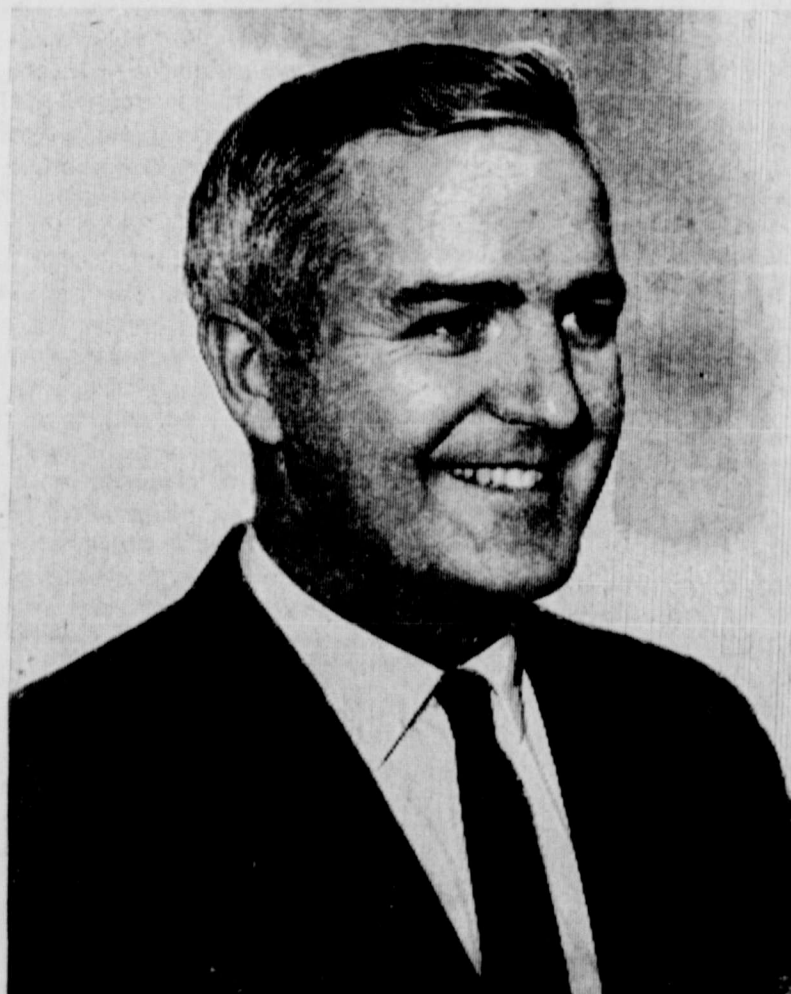

Elections are scheduled by mail on September 17 for Community A, B and C.

A chairman, vice-chairman, regular member and first and second alternates are to be elected in each community. First duty of the newly-elected chairman, vice-chairman and member will be to serve as delegates to the county convention at which time vacancies on the Coke County ASC Committee will be filled, according to the county committee chairman, Daniel F. Percifull. The county convention will be held on Sept. 24 at 10 a.m. in the courthouse. The convention will be open to the public.

ASC community committees assist in carrying out farm program responsibilities assigned by the ASC county committee and in informing farmers of purposes and provisions of programs administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

"The ASC community committeeman is a vital link between the farmer and the men in Washington who administer the farm programs passed by Congress," Percifull said. "I urge farmers to vote in their community elections for persons they believe will best represent them faithfully and responsibly and who are well informed about our local and national agriculture."

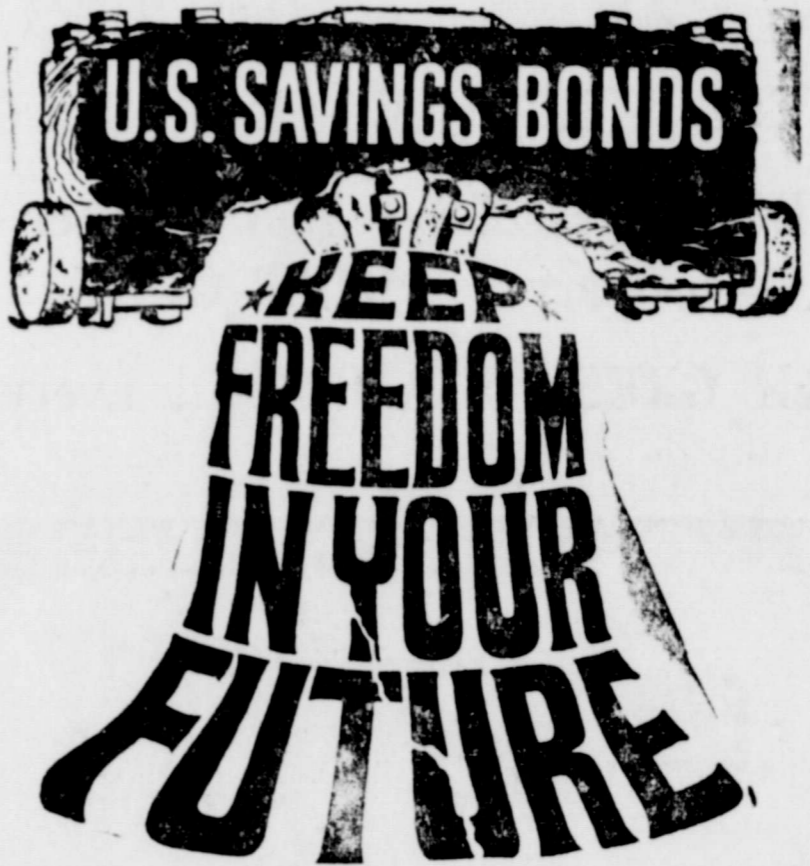

New Fact Sheet

Research points out that most elderly people make "peace" with themselves and face death realistically.

This and other aspects of death are the subject of a fact sheet, "Planning and Financing a Funeral", just released by the Agricultural Extension Service.

The fact sheet is designed to help families understand the psychology of death and become aware of the financial aspects of a funeral.

They explain how death affects members of the family from the aged person to children.

Any death creates an emergency and the fact sheet considers steps in planning a funeral, including military funerals and insurance collection.

In Texas, funeral costs for an adult averages \$942. A lawyer or funeral director can help determine if benefits are available and how to make claims from retirement plans, Veterans' Administration, insurance and others.

The four-page fact sheet is available from my office.

Cutting Up A Chicken

Disjointing a chicken for economy and eating and serving pleasure requires a bit of skill.

Both whole and cut-up chicken are priced attractively these days, but whole chicken saves a few extra cents a pound.

To get the most for the money, pound for pound, buy chickens that have been inspected for wholesomeness and graded for quality. Federal inspection is required for all poultry processed in plants that sell across state lines. Grading, though, is voluntary.

This is one way to disjoint a chicken:

Cut skin between thighs and body of the bird.

Grasp skin between thighs and body of the bird.

Grasp a leg of the bird in each hand and lift the bird from the table, bending its legs back as you lift. Bend legs until hip joints are free.

Remove leg from the body by cutting from back to front as close as possible to the back bone.

Locate knee joint by squeezing thigh and drumstick together. Cut through the knee joint to separate thigh and drumstick.

Remove wing from body. Start cutting on inside of wing just over the joint. Cut down and around the joint. To make the wing lie flat, either cut off the wingtip or make a cut on the inside of the wing at the large wing joint. Cut just deep enough to expose the bones. Repeat the process on the other side of the bird.

Divide the body by placing bird on neck end and cutting from the tail along each side of the back bone through rib joints to neck junction. Cut the skin that attaches the neck-and-back strip to the breast. Place neck-and-back strip, skin side up, on cutting board. Cut strip in two just above the spoonshaped bones in the back.

Alternate method: Separate back from breast by cutting between the breast and back ribs from the shoulder to the tail end. Bend the back and breast to separate the shoulder joints.

Place the breast piece firmly in both hands. Bend each side of the breast back and push up with the fingers to snap out the breastbone. Cut the breast in half lengthwise.

New Coffee Filter Rings

For people tired of struggling with soggy coffee grounds, one coffee company has developed

coffee filter rings.

The rings are premeasured, then compressed and sealed in filter paper. Each ring will make four to six cups of coffee.

To use, fill a percolator with cold water; place a filter ring in the basket and perk the coffee. When brewed, toss the used ring away.

The rings come packed 10 to 20 in a can.

Home Economics Tips

A recent USDA survey pointed out that many American homemakers roast meats at too high a temperature. Half of those interviewed roast between 350 and 375 degrees. Authorities recommend a temperature of between 300 and 325 degrees. Only one of seven homemakers surveyed reported using a meat thermometer as a means of measuring doneness even though the meat thermometer is almost fool proof.

September is better breakfast month. Here is an idea to make any breakfast better. Orange nut biscuits are made quickly with ready-to-bake biscuits, frozen orange juice concentrate and brown sugar. Place biscuits from 8-ounce package in ungreased 8 or 9-inch round pan and bake according to package directions. Combine 1/4 cup undiluted orange juice concentrate with 3 tablespoons brown sugar. Spoon over biscuits. Bake 4 to 5 minutes longer.

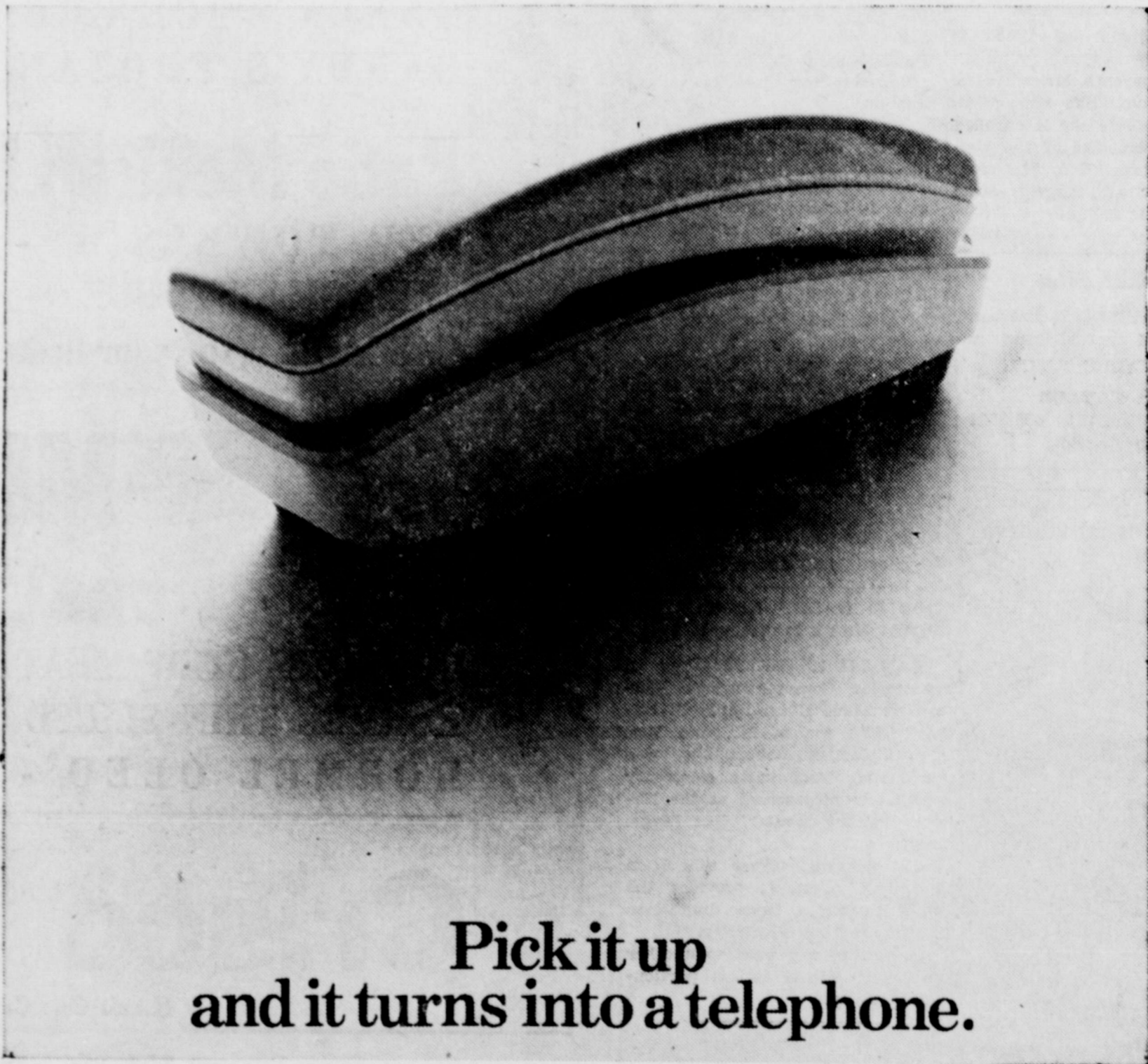
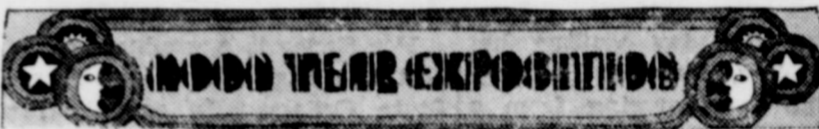
