

Milk

Use nonfat dry milk in cooking or as a beverage - unless fortified fluid milk is a principle source of Vitamin D. For a beverage mix equal amounts of reconfresh whole milk.

Buy nonfat dry milk in as large use without waste.

The United States Department of Agriculture has established grades for nonfat dry milk. The \$3.59 U.S.D.A. grade shield signifies that the product has been packed in a clean, sanitary plant and it meets exacting quality requirements. The highest quality of instant nonfat dry milk is designated U. S. Extra Grade. Look for this on the label.

> Fresh dairy products are highly perishable. Keep them clean, cold and tightly covered. Refrigerate fresh milk and milk products as soon as possible after purchase or delivery. Letting milk stand in the sunlight causes loss of riboflavin and may affect flavor. Don't mix new milk with old except for immediate use.

Make Old Refrigerator Safe

Old discarded refrigerators tempt too many children to use them as a hiding place.

Just because an old refrigerator has a magnetic latch it isn't accident proof. A small child might not be able to push the

Even if the box is on its side or back, older children could open the door but not, perhaps, if he was inside. Fright and weight of the door could prove to be too

If you have an old refrigerator around your house, remove the door entirely, face the refrigerator toward a wall, lock the door with a lock and chain and fasten blocks to the door to keep it from closing.

A few minutes of time may save a child's life. In some areas, repairmen will remove a refrigerator door as a public service.

Velour is Back

Velour, the French term meaning "velvet", is back in force with improved yarns and fabrics that improve drycleanability.

Velour fabrics are made of wool, mohair, cotton or rayon or with blends of synthetic fibers such as polyester. New bright shades make velour more appealing than ever.

Fabric performance depends on construction, colorfast dyes and proper finishing in the textile mill, that is too thin or too short is susceptible to abrasion in wear and drycleaning.







Coke Historians Attend Workshop On Preservation of Historic Sites

Mr. and Mrs. Elton Mims of Water Valley, Mrs. C. E. Arrott of Bronte and Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough of Robert Lee attended the Winedale Workshop, a conference on the principles of architectural preservation and restoration, at the Winedale Inn Complex in Fayette County, Sept. 12 and 13.

A capacity crowd of 200 from all parts of Texas were in attendance. The Coke group represented the Coke County Historical Survey Committee at the meeting.

Winedale Inn and the other buildings in the complex, in the valley of Jack's Creek and about even distances from Giddings, Brenham and La Grange, have produced a striking symbol of much that is important in the history of Texas. The complex is on a homesite established in the Mexican colonial period in the heart of an area which drew settlers even before Stephen F. Austin brought his famous "Old Three Hundred" and made it a part of his first colony.

Center of interest in the Winedale Complex is the Winedale Stagecoach Inn, built by William S. Townsend about 1834 of cedar timbers. It was purchased in 1949 by Samuel K. Lewis and by the Coke group included Bethwas known as "Sam Lewis' Stopping Place" for many years.

On April 8, 1967, the buildings, the 130-acre site on which they stand, and an endowment fund for their maintenance, were dedicated to the University of Texas by Miss Hogg. At that time she expressed her dream that Winedale would become a center for study of the history and the contributions of ethnic groups who settled in Central Texas. In accepting the gift, Chancellor Ran-

som said, "It is just such focal points in the state that make visible the traditions of Texas and make vital the spirit which informs those traditions."

Persons who visit the complex will realize the truth and importance of statements made by one of the principal speakers at the dedication, who said, "The buildings left to us by earlier generations, which we once took so easily for granted, now command our affection and respect...We know that the real value of these structures doesn't come just from their age, their size, or their elegance, but rather from what these buildings mean; their significance in terms of human experience.

Wayne Bell, now consulting restoration architect with the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, conducted a tour of the Winedale Complex which included an on-site inspection of a structure in the process of being restored. This and a candle-light dinner at the Inn Friday night were highlights.

Another highlight for the Coke County group was Dr. W. C. Holden's report on the plans for and the progress being made at the Ranch Headquarters Complex being developed at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.
