Robert Lee will be the site of a meeting of the Edwards Plateau Historical Association Saturday. Members of the organization will gather in Robert Lee School auditorium, with registration beginning at 9:30 a.m.

The meeting will get underway at 10 a.m. with the invocation given by the Rev. Bill Beaty, pastor of Robert Lee Baptist Church. Mayor Wilson Bryan will welcome the guests, and E. W. LeFevre of Eden, president

of the Edwards Association, will respond to the welcome. Introductions will be the next item on the program.

Beginning at 10:30 a.m., a program will consist of historical papers given by members of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee. Included will be talks on Geography and Economy of Coke County by Ulmer Bird; Political History of Coke County by Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough; and Vignettes of Coke County History by Elton Mims.

The program will be concluded at noon when lunch will be served in Robert Lee School cafeteria.

The group will re-assemble at 1:30 p.m. in the auditorium for a talk by Jerry Rogers of Texas Tech University at Lubbock. He will speak on the work being done at Texas Tech on the restoration of a typical West Texas ranch operation.

Following Rogers' talk, the association will conduct a business meeting.

Last item on the program will be a tour of Robert Lee Dam, conducted by Douglas Robertson, lake patrolman. Other sites of historical interest may be toured if time permits.

Mrs. Yarbrough, who is chairman of the Coke County committee, said that everyone is invited to the meeting, and added it should be of much interest to anyone who wants to know more about Coke County history.

## Coke HD Club Women Complete 25 Years

First Home Demonstration agent of Coke County arrived in Robert Lee on Monday morning, Oct. 9, 1944. The agent, Mrs. Fay C. Roe, nee Fay Daphne Croslin, set up the office in the courthouse and organized clubs — two before the end of October.

The Fort Chadbourne Club was organized on October 29, Robert Lee on October 30 and Friendship the next day. Presidents of the first clubs were Meses. Charles Boecking, Lowell Roane and A. D. Fields. Thirteen other clubs were organized before the end of the year.

The first major event of the clubs was the officers training school held on March 24, 1945. Seventy-five members and eight visitors attended the event held in the Robert Lee Methodist Church. The first county camp was held on August 15 in the Bronte Legion Park. A large

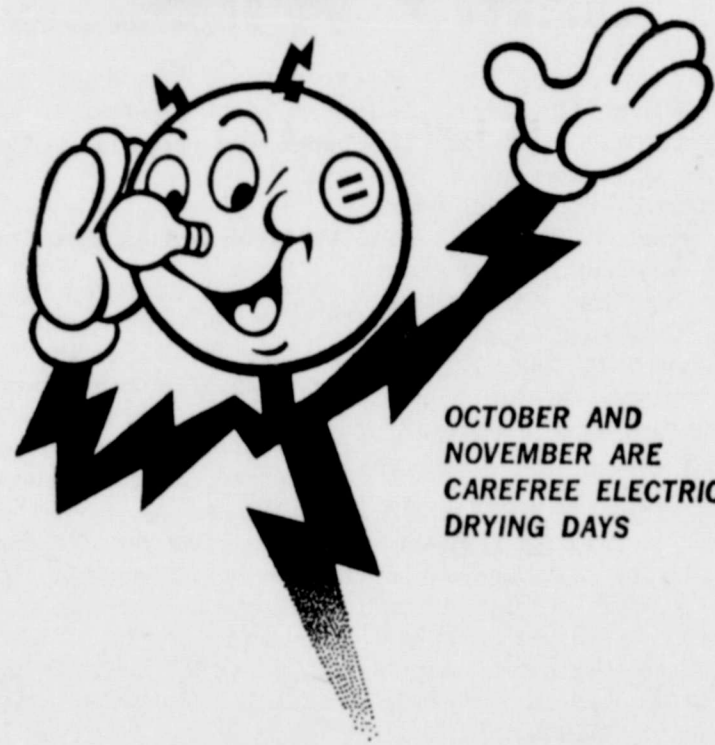

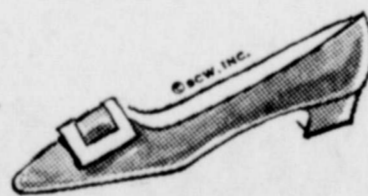

## BCD's Welcome Sign Project Nears Completion; Some More Money Needed

The long worked-for project of erecting four welcome signs on the highways coming into Robert Lee apparently is about to reach a successful completion — if only \$250 to \$260 more in donations can be secured. The project has been sponsored by the BCD and all phases of the work involved is about completed. H. S. Lewis Jr., chairman of the committee to raise money for financing the project, reported at the Tuesday meeting of the BCD that about 80 more letters have been mailed requesting financial help for the project. He said he is hopeful they will produce the necessary revenue to complete the project.

Mayor Wilson Bryan announced that he and other members of the committee he heads have selected sites on which the signs will be erected. He said permission of land owners has been secured and spots for holes to be dug have been marked. W. D. McAdams reported he had asked Fisk Line Co., which is working in this area, to dig the holes and they have agreed to do so. The holes in which the mounting poles will be set will be five feet deep.

Cumbie Ivey Jr., who has headed up a committee from the beginning to develop the sign project, announced that the signs have been finished and are ready to have letters attached as soon as they arrive. Some finish work will be needed after the signs are erected, such as welding on braces and legs.

### Industry Being Studied

Mayor Bryan reported to BCD members that about three weeks ago the city had communication with the Texas Industrial Committee, and three men were appointed to meet with the group last week. Members of this local committee were Bill Allen, First Moore and Cumbie Ivey Jr. Allen made a report at the Tuesday meeting and said they were asked to attend meetings which are scheduled for December and January to learn some of the procedure for lining up "smokestack" industry for Oke County. Allen said the committee was really interested in the possibilities of industrial growth for Robert Lee due to the lake here. Allen stated there would be a lot of work and travel involved in pursuing this matter but he felt it would be very worthwhile. He brought out the fact that there are some small towns now in existence which will not be here in 20 years and stated that "smoke stack" industry is the permanent kind which brings lasting growth for the communities and adds to churches, schools and permanent residents.

Mayor Bryan told the BCD that seven or eight members are needed for this project and more will be added later.

Supt. Jimmy Bickley reported that construction of new school facilities is moving along slowly.

He said everything is now under a roof and weather should not prevent work from progressing. A great deal of finish work remains to be done, he said.

Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough, chairman of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee, announced a meeting Saturday of the Edwards Plateau Historical Association. More information on this gathering can be found in another story in this week's Observer.

Twelve BCD members were present at the Tuesday meeting.

## Lake Not Open For Water Sports

Lake E. V. Spence is not yet open for fishing or water sports, it was emphasized this week by Lake Patrolman Douglas Robertson. The patrolman said this week that contrary to the belief of many persons, the lake still is not open for anything other than sightseeing, which is encouraged.

Robertson said the level of water which the lake now has makes it dangerous to engage in water sports and fishing; consequently the date for opening has not been set, and will depend on the level of water in the lake. Tree stumps, bridge pillars and other obstructions make use of the lake extremely dangerous at this time.

He added that Colorado River Municipal Water District is as anxious as anybody for the lake to reach a high enough level to allow for water sports, but until this level is reached, violators of the present restrictions will be prosecuted.

Robertson said, "We feel we have been very lax on everyone who violated the ordinances regarding use of the lake, but the time has come when we have to change all that." He urged area residents to take notice of the restrictions and not allow themselves become party to a prosecution.

It was brought out that a story in last Sunday's San Angelo Standard-Times might have left the impression that the lake was open to fishermen. However, the fact is that the trophy fish shown in the daily paper was caught at Mountain Creek Reservoir, rather than at Lake Spence.

Robertson asked cooperation in carrying out the rules which have been set up for the safety of everyone.

### MRS. COALSON HEARS TALK ON MEXICAN AMERICANS

Delta Kappa Gamma members of the San Angelo area attended a luncheon Saturday in Ballinger. Bob Henderson, Ballinger grade school principal, was the main speaker at a joint meeting of teachers belonging to Theta Pi and Theta Omicron chapters. Mrs. Pauline Coalson, member of Theta Pi, attended from Robert Lee, where she teaches high school Spanish.

Henderson, who attended a seminar this past summer at Texas Tech in Lubbock, and participated in a study of "The Mexican American," discussed this type of student in public schools. He stated that Mexican surnames are increasing yearly in class record books, and a tremendous responsibility is mounting for the conscientious teacher in dealing with these students.

He presented the cultural and racial backgrounds of these people to show that ignorance of such information causes teachers to develop within the Mexican American a poor image of himself. The speaker stressed that schools are failing to provide adequate training and schooling for his economic security. Eight out of every 10 students who enter schools, he stated, never graduate from high school and therefore, enter society unable to make a decent living. Because of the large number of children found in the Mexican American families, their status in schools demands the attention of every school administrator and classroom teacher, Henderson concluded.

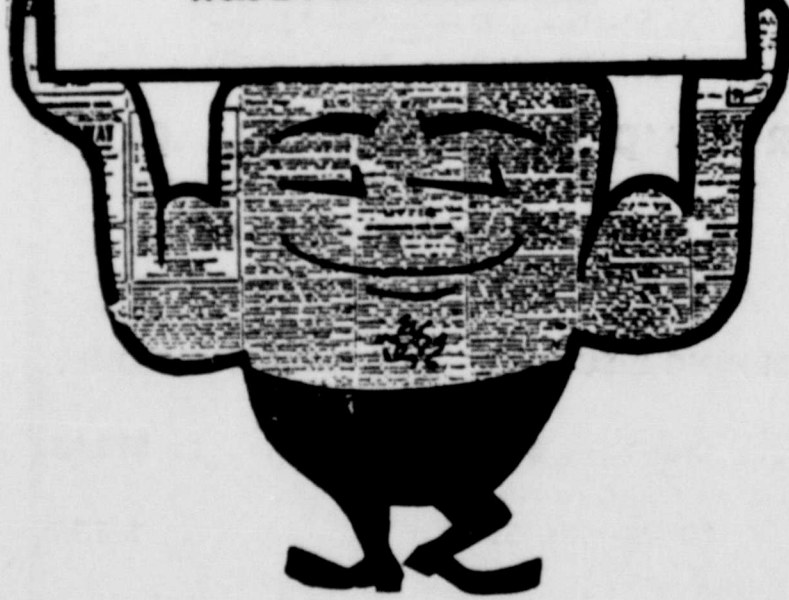

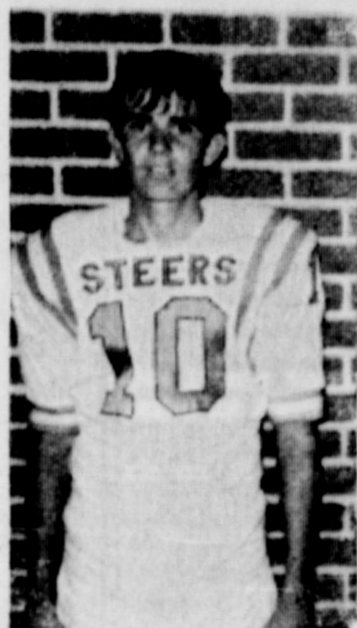




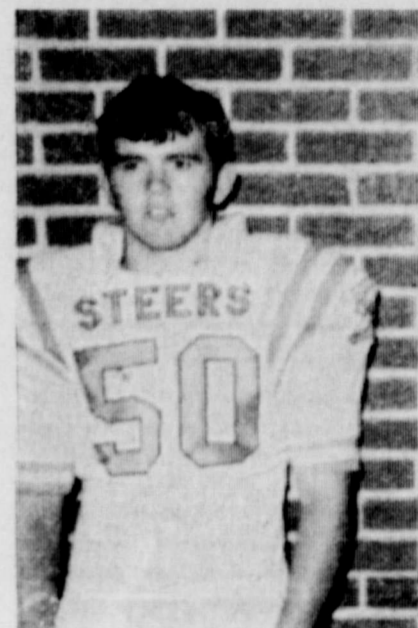
