



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

Mix two parts good garden loam, two parts of peat moss and one part sand. Well rotten manure or shredded leaf mold may substitute for peat moss.

To kill disease organisms, in-

sects and weed seeds, pasteurize the soil mixture by placing it in a shallow pan for 30 minutes in an oven preheated to 200 degrees. The soil should be moistened before placing in the oven.

Always use clean tools and new pots or soil may be reinfected with harmful organisms. Used clay pots should be given the same pasteurization treatment as the soil. Plastic pots should be washed thoroughly in hot soapy water.

A simpler and much easier way to handle pot plants in the home is to purchase the prepared mixes available in your nursery or garden supply center.

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
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
