# Homecoming Planned Friday

## Lindsey Gets Award For Career Day Work

County Agent Sterling Lindsey was honored recently when he was presented one of 10 awards presented in the United States to county agents for their work in the National Career Guidance Awards program. The award was presented by Raymond Fuquay, sales representative of the New Holland Division of Sperry Rand Corporation, sponsors of

the career program. Lindsey was to have received his award at the national convention of the National Association of County Agricultural Agents, held recently in Atlantic City, N. J., but he was unable to attend the gathering.

The Coke county agent's entry in the competition was selected from 34 state winners. The program is designed to honor county agents who have done an outstanding job in devising and carrying out career guidance programs for rural youths. It is especially designed to acquaint rural youths with career advantages awaiting them in agribusiness, including farming itself.

In addition to the plaque which he received, Lindsey received a color TV set.

Lindsey said he felt "kinda bad" about receiving the award since Mrs. Fay C. Roe, county home demonstration agent, "has done just as much for the career day programs as I have." He and Mrs. Roe have worked together and with the officials of Robert Lee and Bronte Schools in setting up and carrying out the program since its beginning in 1962.

Lindsey said, "Any success of the programs in Coke County has been due to the cooperation of the Extension Department and the two schools of the county. Career day programs have been held in Coke County in 1962, 1964, 1966 and 1969, and the next one is planned for 1971. The programs consist of talks to the entire student bodies of the high schools and then students divide into smaller groups for consultation with experts in fields in which they have special interests.

A big crowd is expected in Robert Lee Friday for annual homecoming. Exes of Robert Lee School will be honored early in the afternoon with a tea and the

highlight of the evening will be the last home football game of the season when the Steers tangle with the Roscoe Plowboys at the local field, at 7:30 p.m.

An especially large crowd is expected for the game, since Friday will be the date for the annual Homecoming. Special halftime activities are planned which will honor the Homecoming King and Queen and Mr. and Miss RLHS.

More moisture fell in the area over the weekend with the heaviest measurement reported to the Observer being on the J. O. Rudd Ranch south of town where .75 of an inch fell.

Other measurements reported included .63 in Robert Lee; .6 inch in the Edith area, and .5 inch at Silver, Sanco and east of town on the M. A. Cox place.

The area had its first freezing weather and heavy frost of the season Monday of this week. It was reported that the cold was severe enough to kill tender plants, while some of the more hardy ones were able to withstand the low temperatures.

## Deer Season Opens Saturday

Deer season opens Saturday, Nov. 8 and hunters will have through Jan. 1 to get their bucks. Also running for the same period of time will be open season on wild turkey.

R. L. Flanagan, game warden for this area said this week that the bag limit on deer will be two bucks. He said all animals killed must have hardened antlers protruding through the skin. It is not necessary, however, that they have a rack.

Bag limit on turkey is two of either sex. Two hens or two gobblers, or one of each will be allowed, with a total of two, Flanagan said.

Quail season also opens Nov. 8 and will continue through Feb. 15. Bag limit on quail is 12 per day, with 36 in possession.

Flanagan said any land owners who are leasing land for hunting should buy a shooting preserve license at the county clerk's office.

Wildlife population is reported to be good in most sections of West Texas and hunters should be able to get their limits.

**Freezing Chicken**

Chicken is a favorite main course in most households.

So it's a smart move for the economy-minded homemaker to stock the freezer with chicken when it's an especially good buy.

You can freeze either whole or cut-up chickens. Wrap the chicken in an air-tight wrap, so each package contains the amount to be cooked and served at one time.

Be sure to write the date and amount of chicken on the package wrapper for future reference. Keep chicken frozen until ready to use, with sufficient time allowed for thawing before cooking. Under the most favorable conditions, frozen uncooked chicken can be stored up to 12 months. Thaw chicken in the refrigerator—allowing 12 to 24 hours, depending on the amount.

Broiler supplies are plentiful, according to USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service. You may find it the right time to stock up on chicken.

Treat the family to Hawaiian-Style Chicken.

One 2½ lb. disjointed broiler  
 2 tablespoons cornstarch  
 ½ cup tomato juice  
 ¼ cup lemon juice  
 ½ cup honey  
 1 can (1 lb., 4 oz.) pineapple chunks with syrup  
 2 green peppers

To prepare, moisten cornstarch with small amount of tomato juice. Add balance of juices and honey. Blend well. Add green peppers cut in bite-size pieces and pineapple.

Pour sauce over single layer of disjointed chicken pieces. Cover and bake at 300 degrees F. for one hour. Remove cover and continue baking until chicken pieces are tender and glazed.

Hawaiian-style chicken is a real crowd-pleaser. Try serving it at your next party.

A special sale on broilers indicates a good time to buy several chickens, steam to tenderness, remove meat from bones and freeze cooked chicken in portions which can be used in special recipes. The broth also can be frozen. It's best to use cooked chicken within about a month after freezing.

Utilize this chicken in Chicken Pot Pie.

**Chicken Pot Pie**

2½ to 3 cups cooked chicken  
 1 cup cooked diced potatoes  
 1 cup cooked diced carrots  
 1 cup cooked diced celery  
 ½ cup raw or sauted chopped onion  
 3 cups chicken broth  
 ½ cup uncooked peas  
 ½ cup flour  
 Salt and pepper  
 1 recipe pie crust or biscuit dough

Combine flour with small amount of cool broth, mixing until smooth. Stir in remaining broth. Cook mixture until thickened. Add all remaining ingredients and simmer until heated through.

Pour mixture into baking dish. Cover with pie crust or biscuit dough. Bake in 400 degree F. oven 15 to 20 minutes, or until topping is golden brown and thoroughly baked. Makes six to eight servings.

Chopped Chicken Livers make a big hit at a party.

**Chopped Chicken Livers**

½ pound chicken livers  
 ¼ cup chicken fat or butter  
 1 medium onion, diced  
 1 hard-cooked egg  
 ½ teaspoon salt  
 ¼ teaspoon pepper  
 ¼ teaspoon thyme

Cut chicken livers into coarse pieces. Heat butter or chicken

fat in fry pan, add livers and onions. Saute gently until livers are cooked and onions tender, about six minutes. Place into the blender container the contents of the fry pan, including drippings and other ingredients.

Cover the container and blend together for about five seconds, or until mixture is coarsely chopped. Stop blender as necessary to stir ingredients. Chill pate and serve as an appetizer with a garnish of chopped hard-cooked egg or finely chopped parsley. Makes about two cups of liver pate.

Turkey may be substituted for chicken in the above recipes.

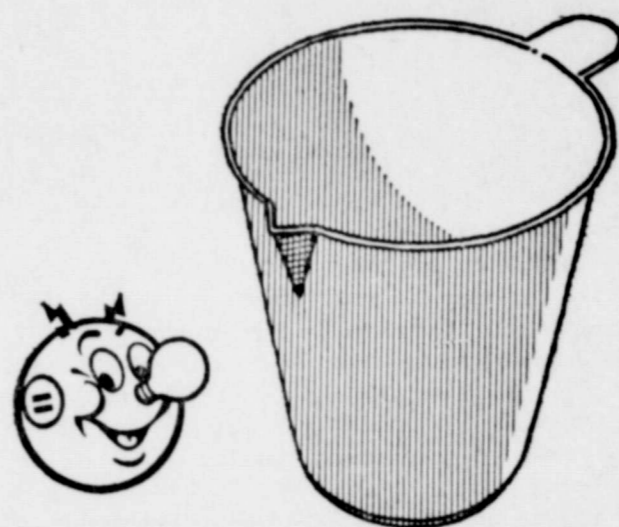

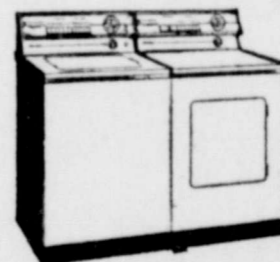
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# Aspermont Tops RL Steers, 23-12

Aspermont 23 — Robert Lee 12

The Steers took a plain old country licking from, evidently, an under-rated ball club. The Steers just could not penetrate the huge Hornet line, and without the ground attack, the passing attack just couldn't get going. There was no question that if the Steers were going to move the ball, they would have to go to the air. But that's the story, it didn't work until the fourth quarter and then it was too late.

### First Quarter

The Hornets received the opening kickoff and started a drive from their 30, making 3 first downs in the process, moving to the Steer 1 yard line. Then the Bee defense held and the Hornets had to give up the ball. The Steers made a 1st down at the 13 yard line, but Aspermont held at the 15. Fields punted to the Hornet 40 with no return. The Hornets made a 1st at the Steer 35 and the Steers then held them at the 40. Aspermont kicked out of bounds at the Steer 10. The Steers made yardage to the 20, where they fumbled and Aspermont recovered. The Hornets had a 1st down on the 8 yard line as the first quarter ended.

### Second Quarter

Aspermont made 4 yards and on the next play, they scored a touchdown. The try for extras failed and they led 6 to 0.

The Steers received the kickoff at the 20 and returned it to their own 38. But they couldn't move the ball and Fields punted to the Aspermont 26. They made a 1st at the Hornet 38. On the next play they fumbled with Randy Smith recovering at the Aspermont 33 yard line. Again the Steers couldn't go and Fields kicked out of bounds at the Aspermont 12 yard line. Aspermont fumbled again, this time it was Joe Key who recovered it at the Hornet 25.

Again Robert Lee couldn't move and the Hornets held on downs at the 18 yard line. Aspermont started a continuous drive, making four consecutive first downs to the Steer 25. Then on 1st down they broke through for a 25 yard run and another TD. The try for extras were good this time and it was 14-0.

The Hornets executed an on-side kick which worked and they had possession of the ball at the Steer 48. But it didn't continue to work as Mike Mumford intercepted a pass at the 30 yard line. But they turned around and intercepted it right back on 2nd down. They moved to the Steer 15 yard line with time running out. They tried a field goal which was good and made the score 17-0. After the kickoff and three plays later the half ended.

### Third Quarter

The Steers received the 3rd quarter kickoff and returned to the Steer 14 yard line. But disaster struck as the Hornets intercepted a 2nd down pass at the 25 and returned it all the way for the score. Try for extras failed and the score was 23-0.

The Steers got the next on-side kick with Jackie Preslar falling on it on the Aspermont 47. But the Hornets held at the 45 and Fields kicked to their 34 yard line. Then the Steers held the Hornets for little gain and they punted to the Steer 36. It was the same thing for the Steers as they punted to the Aspermont 35 with a return to the Steer 41. The Steers held at the 34 on downs

and took over. The Steers made a 1st at the Hornet 45 and that's where they stopped. Fields punted into the end zone, which brought the ball to the 20. At the Aspermont 26, the Steers held and the Hornets kicked to the Steer 49. The Steers started moving now and went for a 1st at the Aspermont 26, then to the 16 as the third quarter ended.

### Fourth Quarter

On the 1st play of the 4th quarter, a screen pass to Joe Key from Mumford and behind good blocking at the line of scrimmage, Key went in for the score. The extras failed and the lead was cut to 23-6.

Lane Beaty kicked off to the Aspermont 12 with a return to the Aspermont 35. The Steers held there and the Hornets kicked to the Steer 39. The Steers moved in rapid progress to the Aspermont 13, but the machine stalled at the 10, and the Hornets took over. The Steers held at the 15 and Aspermont kicked to the Steer 47. The Hornets held on downs at the 47, and then fumbled with Fields recovering it. The Steers took advantage of the situation and went for a 1st at the Aspermont 33. A quick pass went to Randy Smith, who fought and dodged his way to score again for the Steers. Try for extras failed and the score was 23-12.

The Steers kicked off to the Hornets and they exchanged a couple of pass interceptions before the ball game ended with the Steers in possession at their own 20.

Members of the BCD, meeting at noon Tuesday, decided to sponsor the annual Christmas party and visit from Santa Claus again this year. Dec. 13 was set as the date for the big party this year.

President Garland Davis presided at the meeting, but used little time before turning the meeting over to W. T. Roach, who is chairman of the Christmas program committee. Roach asked for a motion approving Dec. 13 as the date for the party and then outlined plans.

A free movie for all children of the community will begin at 1 p.m.

At 2 p.m., the Robert Lee High School Band will parade from Highway 208 to the downtown area, and at 3 p.m. Santa Claus will make his appearance. The next 15 minutes will be spent allowing Santa to distribute his candy gifts to the youngsters of the community.

At 3:15 p.m. the drawing for gifts from merchants of Robert Lee to lucky winners will begin.

Santa's stop and the drawing will be held in front of the Observer office.

The following persons were named to take care of the parts of the program indicated: Vic Wojtek will be in charge of the movie; Sheriff Melvin Childress will direct the parade route of the band and be in charge of traffic; Sam Williams will furnish the public address system and perform duties necessary to the drawing; Fern Havins will have the drawing cage ready for operation in front of the Observer office; Mrs. Mary Prine will be in charge of publicity and supply drawing registration slips.

E. H. Ivey, fire chief, will be in charge of furnishing the fire truck for Santa's transportation, and the Lions club will help Santa get his candy and see that it is sacked.

BCD members approved the plans as set forth by Roach and President Davis appointed W. D. McAdams, Weldon Fikes, Cumble Ivey Jr., Fern Havins and George Newby to assist the chairman in soliciting donations to defray expenses and prizes to be given away at the drawing.

Mr. Campbell died at 5:10 a.m. Sunday in Hendrick Hospital after an illness of one week.

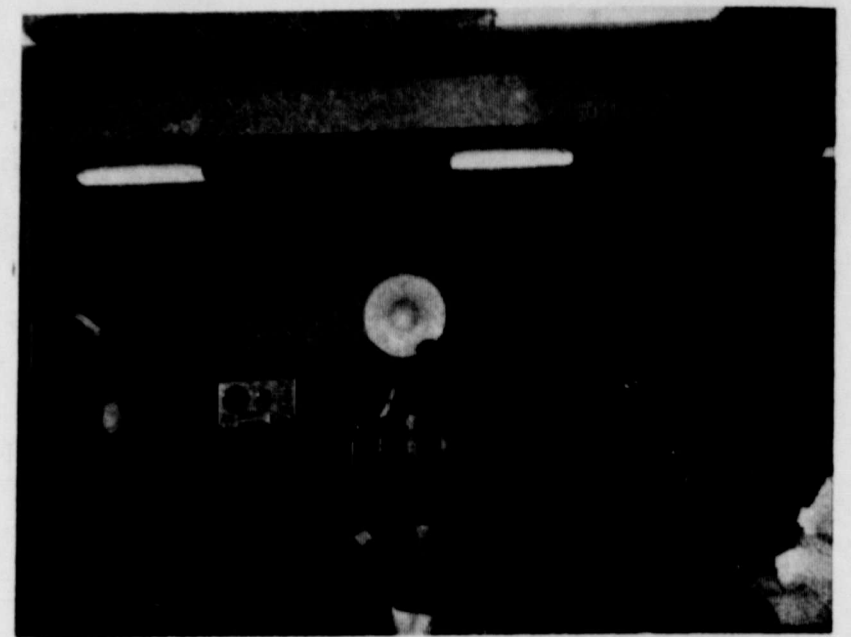

AUSTIN, Tex. — State Bar of Texas directors have agreed on guidelines for release of news in criminal proceedings, as drawn by judges, lawyers and newsmen after a nine-month study. Texas Press Association, Texas Daily Newspaper Association, Texas Association of Broadcasters and the Bar sponsored the study.

News organizations will review the guidelines early next year.

Highlights of the proposal include:

"The press has the right and the responsibility to report the truth. A free and responsible press enhances the administration of justice. Parties to litigation have the right to have their cause tried fairly by an impartial tribunal. No trial should be influenced by pressures from the press or from public clamor, and the Bar and the press share the responsibility to prevent the creation of such pressures. All members of the press should strive for objectivity, accuracy and fair play. The public has a right to be informed. The accused has a right to be judged in an atmosphere free from prejudice."

**SMALL BUSINESS** — Texas Industrial Commission, whose main job is to try to attract new businesses into the state, may be branching into other areas.

Rep. David Finney of Fort Worth asked the TIC to set up a new division to help smaller industries with their development and managerial problems. Under the plan, TIC would work with local chambers of commerce and trade associations to assist businesses with difficulties — either by providing counseling services or by directing them to professional business counselors.

TIC has taken the proposal under consideration.

**LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL** — Texas Legislative Council, which meets between sessions to study proposals to better organize state government, has agreed to make a series of studies including one

on the "Cavness Plan" which raised so much controversy during the last session.

This plan, ruled unconstitutional by the attorney general, would allow the Legislature to tap some of the permanent school fund. It is estimated by the author that it would have cut the need for taxes by \$71 million if it had been approved.

Rep. Don Cavness of Austin, originator of the plan, tried to get a constitutional amendment through that would have legalized the process but was unsuccessful in the Senate. He asked for the study.

Other proposed studies that were adopted include: Study of assistance programs for the handicapped, safeguards for buildings where a large number of persons congregate, a study of the chain store tax, study of service for the deaf, feasibility of giving schools three day weekends for holidays like the state has, and a study of effectively anticipating population changes on population bracket laws.

**AG RULES** — New law effective January 1 will permit 16 year old boys and 14 year old girls to enter into common law marriages by filing an "intent to marry" form with county clerks, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held.

However, Martin said, as waves of protest broke over the opinion, he is personally against the law and thinks provisions for common law marriages ought to be eliminated entirely.

**DRAFT QUOTA CUT** — Texas draft call quota for next month has been trimmed to 456. This compares with the November call of 491, according to Col. Morris Schwartz, state Selective Service director.

October quota was originally set at 1,491 but later was reduced to 504 following presidential directives.
