BCD Members **Busy Working on Christmas Party**

Plans for Robert Lee's annual Christmas party were making progress as the day approaches for the visit from Santa Claus and the distribution of many free gifts to residents of the city and surrounding area. Date for the party is Dec. 13.

W. T. Roach, chairman of the annual party, said this week that workers have been busy all week and a large number of gift items have been donated for the drawing.

The Christmas party will start at 1 p.m. on Saturday, Dec. 13, with a free movie at the Alamo Theater for all children of the area. Following the movie, at 2:45 p.m., the Robert Lee School Band will parade from Highway 208 to downtown Robert Lee. Immediately after the parade Santa will arrive and the distribution of candy will start in front of the Observer office.

After Santa gives away all his candy, there will be singing or playing of Christmas carols and the drawing for the gifts donated by Robert Lee merchants will begin.

Following the drawing, all those who are present for the party are invited to visit Robert Lee stores where they will find a complete display of Christmas gifts for everyone on their shopping lists. Local merchants are displaying their Christmas wares and gift items are in abundant supply at all Robert Lee stores.

The City of Robert Lee reached a long sought-after goal this week when word was received from the Texas State Department of Health that all requirements of the department had been met and the city is authorized to erect "Public Water Supply Approved" signs on highways entering the city.

The city has been working toward securing the approval for some time, and Mayor Wilson Bryan said this week officials are extremely proud to have this recognition for Robert Lee.

In addition to the water supply itself having to meet rigid standards, all personnel who work with the city water system have to meet strict requirements or qualifications.

A letter to Mayor Bryan from Dr. J. E. Peavy, Commissioner of Health, tells about the approval:

Texas State Department of Health Austin, Texas November 19, 1969 Honorable Wilson Bryan, Mayor City of Robert Lee P. O. Box 26 Robert Lee, Texas 76945 Dear Mayor Bryan:

The Division of Sanitary Engineering recently received a sanitary survey of the public water system operated by the City of Robert Lee, Texas, which revealed that all the requirements for Texas State Department of Health approval have been met. As you are probably aware, the attainment of this recognition authorizes the local officials to erect "Public Water Supply Approved" signs on highways entering your City. We are enclosing two copies of an Agreement Form covering the display of these signs to be executed by the persons indicated and returned to this office. My signature will then be affixed to this document and one copy returned to you for your files. Prior to erecting the signs along the highway rights-of-way, the District Engineer of the State Highway Department should be contacted and his approval obtained as to the proposed erection sites. A sheet containing information regarding the preparation of these signs and also a list of companies where they may be purchased are attached. In conclusion, we wish to express our appreciation for your interest and cooperation in our Water Supply Sanitation Program, and if this department can ever be of assistance concerning problems of public health signi-Continued on Page 4

Drawing Rules

Registration for the drawing will begin Dec. 1. Slips for signing will be furnished by The Observer and each merchant will be responsible for supplying a container for holding the slips after they are signed.

Each merchant will let his customers register as many times as he wishes, this being optional with the individual merchant.

Homemaker Test

High school senior girls here will join more than 600,000 others in over 15,000 schools throughout the country Tuesday, Dec. 2, in an only-one-of-its-kind examination. At stake in the written homemaking knowledge and attitude test of the 16th annual Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow are \$110,000 in college scholarships.

The girl scoring highest here will receive a specially designed silver charm from General Mills, sponsor of the homemaking education program, and her paper will be entered in compethis, a state winner, who will be awarded a \$1,500 scholarship, will be selected, as will a state runner-up, who will receive a \$500 educational grant. Next spring, first-place winners from the 50 states and the District of Columbia, each ac-

companied by a school advisor, will gather in Washington, D. C. for an expense-paid tour of that city and Colonial Williamsburg, Va. Climaxing the tour will be announcement of the 1970 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow and three runners-up. Chosen from the 51 state winners on the basis of original test score and personal observation and interviews during the tour, they will have their scholarships increased to \$5,000, \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

In the girls contest Jackie Conley was high pointer for the game and her team with 21 points.



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
