

## Jan. 1, 1970 H D Agent's **News Dept.**

By MRS. FAY C. ROE Blackeye Peas

It may be only folklore, but nearly everyone in this part of the country eats blackeyed peas for good luck on New Year's

And blackeyed peas as well as dry beans, dry split peas and lentils are ion the January plentiful food list compiled by the Consumer and Marketing Service.

Production of all these dry vegetables is much larger than a year ago and about 25 to 30 per cent larger than two years

When this good luck folklore originated during the Civil War blackeyed peas were gutown between rows of corn. Even if the corn failed, the peas stood a better chance to survive.

When the peas dried in the pod on the stalk, they were gafor use during the winter when

Now, as then, the mrist popular way to prepare blackeyed peas is with hog jowl. What flavor the pork imparts - if not then use salt pork. A half pound will be enough to flavor two cups of dried peas.

If you want to make sure of your luck, soak the peas overpeas. One pound of dry peas, their original shape through which measures a little over 2 cups, yields about 8 servings.

Until now it was too easy And as a result more than 250,000 children have been poisoned each year.

Almost any child could open a prescription bottle to reach dangerously pretty pills and capsules inside.

New containers now offer protection. Even if a child gets his hands on the dontainer, it will be practically impossible for him to get the pills.

The containers are called Palm-N'-Turn. Caps are notched on the inside to fit over and lock especially designed projections on the container.

To open Palm-N'-Turn you have to put the cap in the palm, press against it and turn. It is easy for adults; frustrating for children.

#### Clothing Shorts

Get a new sweater for Christmas? Don't ruin it by hanging it in the closet. This will stretch it out of shape. Instead, fold loosely and arrange it in a drawer. Put light sweaters on one side and the darker ones on the other for quick identification.

If you stain clothing with a beverage, fruit or nuts, don't try to remove the stain with soap. If heat later is applied to the cloth, the alkali in the soap may combine with the staining material to produce a permanent spot.

Hanging clothes on a shaped hanger and drying them in a cool place will help them retain harsh winter weather. When all moisture is gone, brush clothes thoroughly and press them if

During its stay in the Meditterranean the Sampson will take part in several training exercises with other units of the U.S. Sixth Fleet.


