Members of the Upper Colorado River Authority and representatives of the City of Robert Lee met Tuesday afternoon to discuss construction of new water system improvements for the

The improvements which are needed because of population growth and low water pressure, would include a new 100,000 gallon elevated tank on a high location, over 13,000 feet of pipeline, new fire hydrants, new fittings, site work and some other projects.

Mayor Wilson Bryan, city councilmen Jack Denman and Robert. Large, and city secretary Mrs. Edna Havins told the board the city had applied for a federal grant which would cover approximately half the estimated cost of \$93,000 to \$100,000. The city asked UCRA to build the facilities on a long term basis at a low rate of interest.

The board officially went on record as being willing to participate up to \$60,000 if needed, provided the federal grant was going to be forthcoming.


