

If cheese buying puzzles you, it's understandable. More than 800 kinds of cheese are marketed around the world. They include natural cheese and blends combinations of natural cheese, process cheese, cheese food and cheese spread.

Each natural cheese can be grouped by moisture content or hardness and by degree of ripening or aging. Natural cheese varieties are:

Very hard, ripened: Parmesan Romano.

Hard, ripened: Cheddar (often called American), Colby, Edam, Gouda, Gruyere, Swiss, Provo-
