The Federal Reserve lends to the United States government and the interest on this and all other sources of borrowed money now amounts to more than $\$ 17$ billion annually
A bill has been introduced in to the Congress to vest in the govarmment of the United States the absolute, complete and unconditional control over our money through government ownership of the Federal Reserve Banks. The report of the United Staters Treasurer of January 1970 showed the total coinage in circulation to be about $\$ 6$ billion. The total currency was around $\$ 47$ billion. If the reasoning holds that Federal Reserve Notes are nothing more or less than faith and credit, established by the Federal Reserve System, then only $\$ 6$ billion in cunrency backed by coins, really belongs to the poople. The $\$ 47$ billion is put into circuation on loans on which
everyone pays interest.
Needless to say, high interest rates and inflation are becoming an unbearable burden on everyone. Some are led to believe that the only answer lies in higher wages and higher prices. Som
