RL Firemen Need Accurate Info

More accurate information is needed in reporting location of fires, Fire Marshall Buzz Sawyer said this week. Location is important in reporting any fire, he said, but it is especially important in reporting rural fires since much time can be lost in driving, when the place of the fire is not known.

The need for accurate locating was evident last Friday when the local Volunteer Fire Department was called to help San Angelo, Tom Green and Wall Fire Departments fight a fire on the Wilson Ranch 20 miles east of Water Valley. The request for help stated the fire was burning 20 miles west of Water Valley. Inaccurate information caused 40 miles of extra driving and a large amount of time lost.

The firemen were called out Friday at 3:30 p.m. to fight a grass fire on the Wendland Ranch eight miles southeast of town. The blaze was set by lightning and was quickly brought under control. Gorman Walker, ranch foreman, said they were thankful for a change in wind direction which blew the fire back into the area which was already burned off.

Only five or six acres was burned off due to help of firemen and others, and the good fortune of the wind change. He said they had another fire in an oat field on the ranch which was set off when a plow hit a rock, creating a spark. About 10 acres was burned off in this fire.

As soon as the firemen got back Friday afternoon from the Wendland Ranch they were called to the Wilson Ranch fire east of Water Valley.

Later in the day they battled a grass fire on the south side of Lake Spence. They used two trucks and got the situation in hand about 8 p.m.

Sawyer said he thinks all the Friday grass fires were set by lightning which accompanied thunderstorms in the area.

all in use for the first time at the beginning of a school year. He said the school operation will be much more effective and efficient with the new buildings in use.

All the old makeshift classrooms and other outdated facilities have been replaced with one of the most modern school plants in the state. The superintendent feels that the new plant will add immeasurably to the effectiveness of instruction and accomplishment of the students.

Something new has been added to this year's school. For the first time Robert Lee has a kindergarten. The five-year-olds were included in the school's program after the Texas legislature passed a law which states that all schools in the state must carry on this instruction.

Another change which will take place this year is the requirement, also put into effect by legislative action, that schools must offer 180 days of instruction. Heretofore, 175 days of classes was sufficient. Also, beginning this year, teachers must be on hand for duty 10 months of the year instead of the nine months formerly required. In addition to being on the job for the extra week of instruction, they must be around for duty prior to opening and after the end of the school term.

Qualified voters of Robert Lee will go to the polls Saturday and decide whether or not the city will adopt a 1% retail sales and use tax. The tax, if approved, would be levied on all mer-

Now that dollars are scarce and most items are higher is an ideal time to learn in your own home how to manage the food money better, Mrs. Roe said.

chandize and services which now have a state sales tax collected on them. The additional 1% would be collected along with the state tax and sent into the state. It would be returned to the city at the end of each quarter.

Mayor Wilson Bryan said the election was called after it became apparent to the city council that more revenue is needed to continue services of the city at their present level. He cited rise in costs of everything the city buys as the reason for the need for more money.

The council is running an ad in this week's Observer in favor of the tax and calling on all citizens to support the measure as a means of helping alleviate the financial bind.

The mayor said he could not guarantee that passage of the sales tax would provide all the additional money need, but "it will help," he added.

The council called attention to the fact that anybody, regardless of where he lives, will have to pay the tax on purchases made in Robert Lee. This feature will help take some of the tax burden off of those who live in the city, the council pointed out.

The election will be held at the city hall, with Mrs. Willie Clark as presiding judge and Mrs. Hazel Lindsey as alternate judge. Any qualified voter who has lived in the city as long as six months may vote in the election.

District Court Session Short

A session of 51st District Court was held Monday, but it was a short one and only one of the cases on the docket was disposed of after a hearing.

A petit jury panel which had been ordered to report at 10 a.m. was notified not to report after most of the cases were passed over for action at later sessions of the court.

Judge Joe L. Mays heard the case styled J. C. Tate vs. Carl Hurley, a suit for damages and personal injury. The plaintiff was awarded \$3,500 on an agreed judgment.

The other cases on the docket, as published in last week's Observer, will be heard at a latter term of the court unless disposed of in some other manner.

Austin — More than 2.7 million Texas students have started or soon will be heading back to public schools again.

There will be a lot of changes in store for them, although most probably will fast adjust or barely recognize the differences.

* Teachers will begin work a little earlier, and classes in some areas will start earlier.

* School will stretch out from 175 classroom days to 180.

* Teachers will be on duty 10 more days of non-teaching work for in-service training and to help with school opening and closing.

* For 224,500 little ones, the school experience will be brand new. They are the first graders and (30,000) five-year-olds in a new state-supported kindergarten program.

* A drug education program also will be initiated, seeking an effective two-way communication between youth and adults. Utilized in the effort will be modern techniques and teaching methods which encourage students to express themselves rather than relying on lectures, preaching or moralizing. Training of local teaching teams in 1,206 school districts is slated to start in September and October.

* Twenty-two school districts in major population and geographic areas will be pilot testing three key facets of the state's emerging plan for special education. These districts will serve as a proving ground for efforts in comprehensive special education, early childhood programs for exceptional children and teaching tailored for children with language and/or learning disabilities.

Even broader changes may be

in store for pupils of 16 school districts sued in federal courts at Austin and Tyler for racial segregation. Districts held conferences at Texas Education Agency last week to prepare plans for conversion to non-discriminatory systems. Plans are to go to courts by Friday (Aug. 21). Hearings may begin Monday.

EAGLE MAY BE OUT — A Railroad Commission examiner has prepared a report recommending Missouri Pacific Railway Company be permitted to discontinue its St. Louis Eagle passenger train.

Findings came after extensive hearings in several cities. Opponents of shutting down the train have 30 days to reply and restate their case.

Eagle was one of the last three passenger trains on a regular run across the state from Texarkana to Laredo and back once a day.

MP claimed a revenue loss and asked permission to cut it off its routes.

DRAFT CALL UP — September draft call for Texas is 704 — a considerable increase from 560 in August. But no man will be ordered for induction with a random sequence number higher than 195.

Col. Charles M. Duncan, deputy state Selective Service director, said it appears unlikely the ceiling will go higher than 195 for the rest of the year. Duncan said new manpower, mainly from formerly deferred students, helped hold the level on sequence numbers.

September quota for pre-induction physical and mental examinations is 7,171, an increase from 1,490 in August. Texas' induction quota of 704 is the state's share of a national call of 12-

600 men, all for the Army.

PARKS ADVANCED — Outstanding new Lyndon B. Johnson State Park near Stonewall, and across Ranch Road 1 from the famed LBJ Ranch, will be officially dedicated on Aug. 29 at 2 p.m.

Former president will attend the festivities which include a reception and luncheon in Stonewall.

Parks and Wildlife Department also announced approval of a \$355,050 federal grant for a development project in Abilene State Park.

Funds will be matched by the state on a 50-50 basis in the \$710,000 project which includes building of a headquarters, visitors' center, campsites, a group shelter, wading pool, playground equipment, roads and parking.

INSPECTION TIME AGAIN — Another auto inspection deadline is approaching for vehicles with red stickers and the large numeral "9."

These cars, warned Col. Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, must be reinspected before midnight Sept. 30.

Texas now has a 12-month inspection system. Sticker in the lower left-hand corner of each automobile windshield contains a large numeral showing the month of inspection and expiration.

Speir said cars with red stickers and a number "10" must be reinspected before midnight on the last day of October, those with an "11" by the end of November and those with a "12" by Dec. 31. Fee remains at \$2 with adjustments or repairs extra if required.

LAND RECOVERY SOUGHT — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has called on Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin to take whatever legal steps are necessary to recover lands of Calhoun County Navigation District not being used for navigation purposes.

Sadler noted that 47,000 acres were purchased by the district from the state in 1956 for \$1 an acre. In 1961, Sadler said, he refused to approve the district's application to buy additional lands, after officials admitted 20,000 acres of the original purchase were considered surplus acreage not needed for navigation purposes. Some of this land was old, and has gone into private real estate development.

Commissioner said he urged the attorney general's office as far back as Dec. 28, 1961, to take steps to recover the 20,000 acres for the permanent school fund but got no action. School Land Board, he related, has now requested that the land be recovered.

GRANTS APPROVED — Gov. Preston Smith has approved a federal grant for \$114,389 for operation of a family planning program for migrant farm workers in 26 Texas counties and six other states where they migrate.

Smith also announced approval of a demonstration grant of \$72,344 to Las Colonias Del Valle Inc. in San Juan, Hidalgo County, for youth development program.

A state regional planning assistance grant of \$14,939 went to the South Plains Association of Governments (SPAG) serving 33 cities, eight special purpose governments and 11 counties.

AG OPINIONS — An off-duty policeman may not conduct a private enterprise, employing other off-duty policemen or officers, to perform guard duty or patrol without securing a license, says Attorney General Martin.

In other opinions, Martin ruled that:

* An alarm agency, approved by the State Board of Insurance, may perform certain activities—

send their representatives to answer the alarm, furnish a key police officers for entrance to the premises, assist the police as they may request in their check of the premises, and reset the alarm after the police have finished their work — without its personnel having obtained a license.

Short Snorts

Judge Joe Frazier Brown of San Antonio, executive director of the Texas Criminal Justice Council, has been named to the national executive committee and chairman of the committee on discretionary grants for heads of state criminal justice planning agencies.

Drug abuse among children committed to Texas Youth Council has increased from five to 70 per cent during the last three years, according to new report of State Program on Drug Abuse.

South Texas group (United

Farm Workers, PASO, MAYO and Colonias del Valle) have filed suit against the governor and the Department of Public Safety, claiming they are being spied on by state police.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 22)** General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under

such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county."

Salad Sorcery

Appetites will zoom when you prepare salad at the table in sight of all. Place salad bowl, mixing tools, salad and dressing ingredients on an attractive tray and bring to the table. Mix dressing in the salad bowl first. Then add prepared ingredients. Toss gently and serve. Here's your chance to delegate the mixing to Dad or someone else while you sit back and relax.

Salad ingredients should be chilled before mixing. Chilled salad plates make a big hit, too.

Be kind to your wooden salad bowl. Never soak in water. After each use, wash thoroughly and rinse in clear lukewarm water; wipe dry and store in dry place.

Next time you use your favorite dressing recipe, try substituting lemon juice for part

or all of the vinegar. Fresh lemon adds a lively touch.

Marinate canned salad vegetables in lemon juice for several hours or overnight to give them zip and dash.

To keep fresh fruits and vegetables from darkening or oxidizing, dip them in freshly squeezed lemon, orange or grapefruit juice.

Add your own personal touch to prepared or packaged salad dressings or mayonnaises by adding freshly squeezed citrus juice and grated peel.

Substitute freshly squeezed juice for part of the water in gelatin salad for added flavor and Vitamin C.

Fresh citrus is nature's most practical source of Vitamin C a nutrient so necessary to keep every body cell in a healthy condition. It also supplies vitamins and minerals, there are fibrous substances that are not absorbed by the body, but influence the way food moves through the mouth and digestive tract.

The calorie count for citrus is low. A medium orange has 60 calories; a grapefruit half has 55 calories; one whole lemon has only 20 calories; a large tangerine has 40 calories.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR28) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company.

(b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such dis-

trict or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts, may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof, as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes to wit:

(1) The improvement of rivers, creeks, and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation thereof, or in aid of such purposes.

(2) The construction and maintenance of pools, lakes, reservoirs, dams, canals and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof.

(3) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved

roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of Subsection (b) of this Section, bonds may be issued by any county in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county, for the construction, maintenance, and operation of macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of the county, and without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation. The county may levy and collect taxes to pay the interest on the bonds as it becomes due and to provide a sinking fund for redemption of the bonds."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified property taxing electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR10) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 20, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"(a) The Legislature shall have the power to enact a Mixed Beverage Law regulating the sale of mixed alcoholic beverages on a local option election basis. The Legislature shall also have the power to regulate the manufacture, sale, possession and transportation of intoxicating liquors, including the power to establish a State Monopoly on the sale of distilled liquors.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 3, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition:

"Repeal of the prohibition against open saloons found in Section 20, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR32) General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51. The homestead, not in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two hundred acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a city, town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand Dollars, at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of any improvements thereon; provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a

home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of a family; provided also, that any temporary renting of the homestead shall not change the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale."
