

Jimmy Killam Seriously Hurt In Pickup Wreck

Jimmy Killam, 35, of Robert Lee was seriously injured Sunday when his pickup went out of control on a rain-slick highway and turned over several times.

He was taken to West Coke County Hospital where he is receiving treatment for a broken pelvis, a hip injury and multiple bruises and lacerations. He is reported to be recovering satisfactorily. Killam is employed by Ivey Motor Co.

The accident occurred about 6 p.m. just south of the county line on Highway 208 in Tom Green County. Killam was returning to Robert Lee from San Angelo. His pickup was completely demolished. It is believed that he was thrown from the vehicle while it was rolling.

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over the proposed constitutional side of a barbed wire fence is 288. amendment to set the maximum assessed at \$1,000 an acre, and limits on tax assessments of farm, ranch and timber land.

An amendment (No. 3) on the Nov. 3 ballot would authorize the Legislature to provide a uniform method of assessment for lands, based on their capability farm and forest crop production.

A 15-member special committee headed by State Sen. Wayne Connally of Floresville has completed the last of 11 hearings over the state on this measure. Its tentative report summarizing testimony favoring the amendment will be presented before Nov. 3. Committee's recommendations to the Legislature will be delayed until next year.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES - Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held that a profit or non-profit corporation may perform solid waste disposal services -garbage collection - for local governments.

Martin also held that the House and Senate may pay the State Building Commission, under contract, for building repair and remodeling services at the state capitol, where a multi-million dollar project is underway.

MOPAC KILLS EAGLE -Railroad Commission approved an application of the Missouri Pacific Lines to cancel the Texas Eagle, one of three remaining trans-Texas passenger trains.

Eagle connected Laredo, on the border, with St. Louis-via San Antonio, Austin, Palestine and Texarkana. Trains were promptly ordered discontinued, although opponents of the cancelled service can appeal to courts. Commission said it had no choice but to allow cut-off of a train found unprofitable. MoPac said it was losing more than \$500,000 a year on the service.

National Association of Railroad Passengers charged MoPac deliberately shrank passenger revenue "by neglect and disdain." MaPac operated once - daily trains northbound and south-

TEACHERS MAP PROGRAM -Texas State Teachers Association, which won a long-term pay raise from the legislature last year, has a seven-point legislative program for 1971 which will require no major new state spending.

At the same time, teachers are looking over a proposed new code of ethics and standard practices which includes a flat pledge not to engage in strikes or organized work stoppages.


The bride wore a street length dress of white satin. Attendants were her sister, Cindy Nixon, and Tom McBroom.
