County Exhibit Has Large Crowd, Many Items Shown

The Annual Coke County Exhibit held Friday and Saturday in the Recreation Hall in Robert Lee was termed as being "outstanding," the "best one yet" and "very good and interesting."

Visitors from as far away as Ceres and Redondo, Calif.; Tachikawa, Japan; Fort Smith, Ark.; Dallas; St. Jo; Alvarado; Big Spring; Lamesa; Colorado City; Midland; Abilene and San Angelo viewed the many exhibits on display.

A collection of Texas car license plates from 1922 through 1970 were displayed by Mr. and Mrs. Otis Smith of Bronte. They also showed the tags for 1916 and 1917, but lack about three years having a complete collection.

The Coke County Historical Survey Committee had a number of interesting documents on display. There were antiques, including a Masonic apron, badge and glove over 100 years old, a "Sunday dress" of black lawn over 70 years old and two books from the library of Rev. C. R. Blake that were published about 1950. Several other items were also on display.

Other items of interest included many oil painted pictures, quilts and other handmade articles, clothing, horticulture, woodwork, decoupage, hand painted china, Christmas arrangements, a hand built clock by W. D. McAdams and a ceiling drop light made by Rev. Blake, candles, textile paints, decorative stitchery, refinished furniture, handmade ladies bags, handmade flowers from ribbon, plastiform and egg cartons, pillows, afghans and other items too numerous to name.

Over 175 persons visited the exhibit which is an annual event sponsored by the Home Demonstration Clubs, HD Council with the Coke County Historical Survey Committee as co-sponsor.

"We still hope this Exhibit can and will grow into a small County Fair including exhibits by people of all ages from all parts of the county," said Mrs. Fay C. Roe, County Home Demonstration Agent. "We would love to involve local merchants in Bronte and Robert Lee, and various clubs, as well as individuals," she said, "and we can do this with cooperation from a few more people."

Mountain Creek Fish Kill Friday

Fish in Mountain Creek Reservoir will be killed Friday and the public is invited to come and pick them up. Mayor Wilson Bryan said the low level of the lake presents a good opportunity to carry out the fish kill and rid the lake of rough fish.

The work will be done by personnel of the Parks and Wildlife Commission, in cooperation with the city.

No motor boats will be allowed on the lake, due to the low water level. The mayor said those who have small row boats are invited to move on to the lake after the work has been completed. Everyone is requested to pick up all the fish in his area, not just those that are suitable for eating. "A little help from everybody will make the clean-up job much easier," the mayor said. He pointed out that leaving the rough fish in the water will create a pollution problem, since the water is so low.

Three Injured In Car Wrecks

Three cars were involved in two separate accidents about 8:15 p.m. Friday, .3 mile east of Robert Lee near the Add Davis Grocery and Station. Three persons were injured and all three vehicles were heavily damaged.

Patrolman Bobby Hart said vehicles occupied by Wayne Stanley Reed of Robert Lee and Mr. and Mrs. Larry Don Smith of Winters were in collision when one of the cars made an unsafe turn and the other collided with it. A third car driven by Arthur Vellie Jennings of Coleman hit one of the disabled vehicles as he was unable to stop when approaching the scene of the first accident.

The Smiths were taken to West Coke County Hospital and Reed was taken to a San Angelo hospital. They are all reported to be recovering satisfactorily.

Range Tour Is Planned

A field trip is scheduled for Thursday, Oct. 29, on the Wylie Ranch northeast of Bronte. The tour will be made to observe range conservation practices being used on the ranch and to inspect the recently constructed pellet mill, which is being used to turn green chop feed into pellet feed.

The tour will be sponsored by the Coke and Runnels Counties Soil and Water Conservation Dis-

tricts, with the cooperation of C. O. Richards of the ranch.

Among the things to be viewed by those making the tour will be new Klein grass, an introduced variety from Africa; a sprinkler irrigation system; brush control by spraying with Toudon and brush control with root plowing.

Those from Coke County who wish to make the tour will meet in Bronte at 9 a.m., while those

from Runnels County will meet at the same time in Wingate.

Everybody should bring a sack lunch, said W. E. Jacoby, Coke County conservationist, who added that the tour will not be completed by noon.

Jacoby said everybody who is interested in soil and water conservation is invited to make the tour.



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Austin — Tax free financial incentives are recommended by Texas' top officials to lure new industry to the Lone Star State.

Gov. Preston Smith came out for the added attraction at no cost to taxpayers. Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes said he agreed that revenue bonds to help industry finance locations would be the preferred route for legislation.

Both spoke here at the governor's annual conference on industrial expansion.

Smith also advocated a pre-employment industrial training program to fill the need for trained labor. He pledged his efforts to maintain a favorable tax climate for industrial development.

James W. McGrew, Texas Research League director, underscored the importance of the recommendations when he told the conference that Texas will need to provide 600,000 new jobs because of the predicted population increase during the next decade.

Sponsored by the Texas Industrial Commission and hosted by Governor Smith, the conference honored six industries for expansion and economic impact on their communities during 1969.

At a meeting before the conference, the Industrial Commission reviewed plans for a 24-page section on Texas Industry

in Business Week Magazine on March 13. Also discussed was a computerized fingertip data bank on industrial development opportunities in 438 Texas communities over 1,000 population.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court agreed to hear the appeal of a Houston trucking firm on Nov. 25 relative to a \$300,000 judgment favoring an Odessa widow and her children in connection with a 1966 accident in which the woman's husband hit a parked truck.

In other recent actions, the High Court:

* Rejected the City of Floydada's appeal in a lawsuit over land condemned for the city's airport.

* Turned down the claim of a Houston widow to a share of her deceased husband's inheritance because she waited too long to file suit.

Court of Criminal Appeals dismissed the petition of a Houston doctor sentenced to life in prison in the sniper slaying of a partner.

Three Houston theater operators seek a federal court injunction to prohibit police raids on nude film showings.

TAX RAISE, CUT — Employers got both good news and bad on the tax front last week.

Rate experts recommended a 1.1 per cent average increase in

workmen's compensation insurance rates.

At the same time, Governor Smith said employers covered under the Texas Unemployment Compensation Act will be eligible for a one per cent reduction in their payroll taxes about Jan. 20.

Workmen's comp rate will vary among industries. Under recommendations, average manufacturing rates statewide would increase 4.4 per cent, while those for contractors would drop 2.3 per cent. Oil industry rates would dip 1.1 per cent and "all others" would increase two per cent.

Unemployment tax cut is possible because the trust fund reserve for paying jobless benefits reached \$347 million on Oct. 1. When the fund is more than \$300 million on the computation date, a tax cut is mandatory.

450 NEXT DRAFT CALL — November draft call for Texas is 450, says acting State Selective Service Director Lt. Col. Charles Duncan.

First to be called by the local draft boards will be men with random sequence numbers 1 through 145. Those with higher numbers will be subject to call if needed, Duncan said.

Texas' quota is part of the national call for 8,000 men, all for the Army.

A total of 1,310 will have to take pre-induction physical and mental examinations for the November quota.

Local board quotas for induction and pre-induction examinations in November were mailed to 159 boards on Oct. 9.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES — Military personnel can qualify to serve as prospective jurors on satisfying election code requirements and if they intend to establish a residence in Texas, says Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin in a new opinion. In other recent rulings, Martin concluded that:

* No state agency now has authority to execute an FHA form certifying the need for a nursing home.

* College of Osteopathic Medicine in Fort Worth is entitled to representation on the Anatomical Board of Texas.

PRIVATE COLLEGES ASK AID — Private colleges and universities will be seeking \$28 million in state aid to stay in business during the next two years.

Independent Colleges and Universities of Texas Inc. has reviewed it needs in a meeting with Central Texas legislators.

Spokesmen for the schools previously have outlined their plight to the Coordinating Board of the Texas College and University System.

Legislation backed by the group will seek tuition equalization grants for private college students and authorization for contracts by the Coordinating Board with private schools for services and degree production.

Although the state is investing heavily in new tax supported institutions, there are some 16,000 openings in private classrooms.

WASTE ORDERS REQUIRED — Texas Water Quality Board Chairman Gordon Fulcher warns that waste control orders must be obtained from that agency before any type of sewage facility is built.

This applies to individuals as well as municipalities and other government entities.

"This is for their own protection," Fulcher said. "While the

type of facility might meet with full approval of the Board, there also is the possibility that it would not, and that money spent on the facility might thus be wasted... Standards vary in different areas of the state."

Major purchasers have indicated that they want to buy 3,322,177 barrels of Texas crude oil daily next month—a drop of 57,790 under October.

Texas Rangers and highway patrolmen are advised to learn Spanish when on South Texas assignment, but no requirement has been adopted.

Old Fort Leaton near Presidio has been partially restored by the Parks and Wildlife Department with the second phase of work to begin soon.

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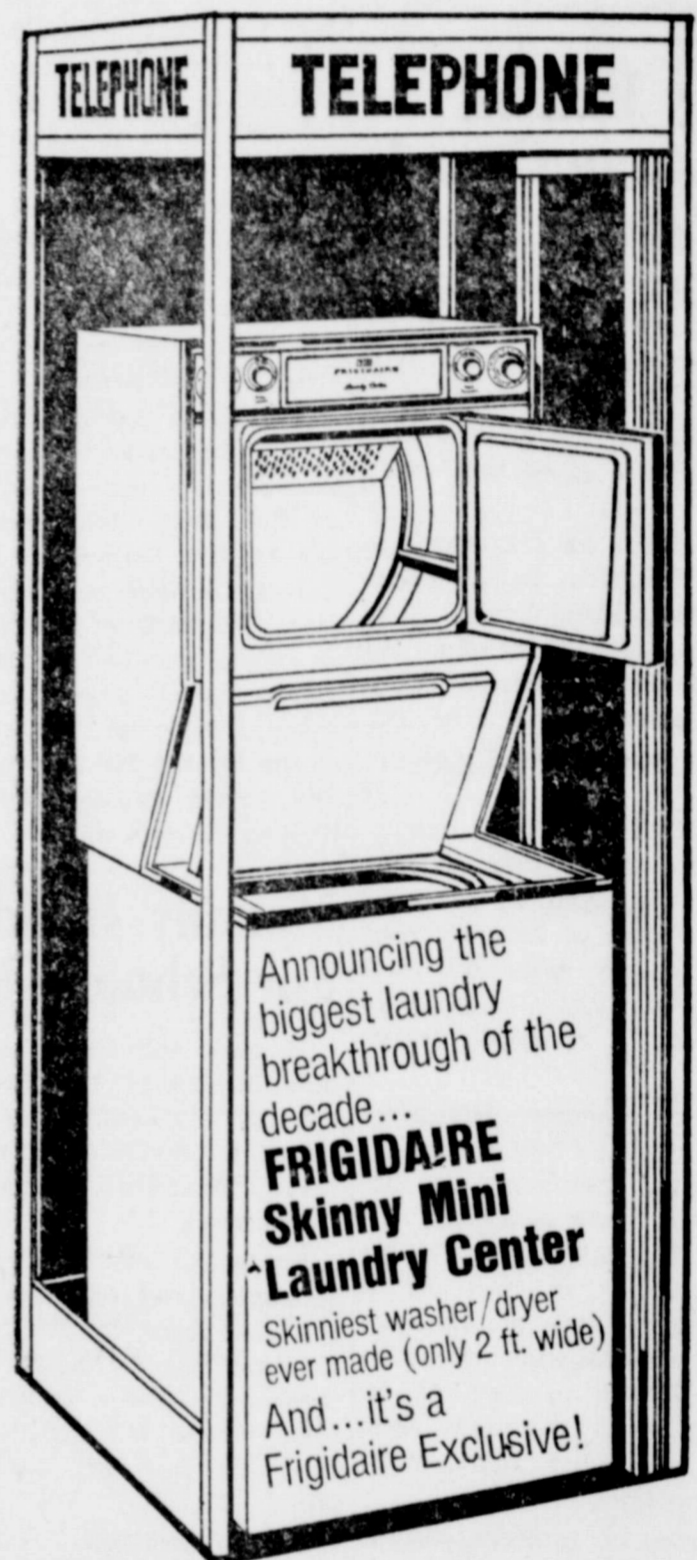

Robert Lee BCD Items of Interest

Vice President W. D. McAdams presided at Tuesday's meeting of the BCD. He gave a resume of the County Exhibit which was held last weekend in the Robert Lee Recreation Center.

McAdams said the exhibit is an annual affair and is becoming larger every year. He noted that there probably would be more items shown if space were available.

The logical sequence of reasoning after McAdams' statement about need space for a larger exhibit brought to mind that a larger Rec Hall is needed in Robert Lee. The next thought was how to finance it.

Commissioner Fern Havins stated the only way to finance an addition to the Rec Hall was to have a bond election to provide the needed amount.

While he was speaking, Commissioner Havins told BCD members that the bond issue also is needed to finance seal coating on the paved streets of Robert Lee. He said the streets which were paved in 1959 are in serious need of seal coating, and the cost will be approximately \$150 per block. Havins added that there is no money for such a project at the present time. The remainder of the 1959 road bond issue was used last year to pave some 40 blocks in the north part of town.

The commissioner said a small bond issue to do this work and enlarge the Rec Hall could be done on a precinct level, with precincts 1 and 3 participating in the balloting.

Gerald C. Allen, president of Robert Lee State Bank, told BCD members that the tight money problem has reached just about everyone now. He said the squeeze hit the big cities of the East some 18 months ago and it usually takes six to 12 months for the effect to be felt in this area. Money for industry, building, etc., is hard to get, the banker said. He said the local bank still has money to loan but many of the larger banks in Texas do not have it and are operating through smaller banks.

Ten members were present at the meeting.

Absentee Voting Now in Progress

Any qualified Texas voter eligible to cast an absentee ballot may now make application to his county clerk for an absentee ballot for the Nov. 3 general election.

In order to vote absentee by mail in this election, a voter must: (1) be unable to appear Nov. 3 at the polling place because of sickness or physical disability; or (2) expect to be absent from his county of residence on Nov. 3 and during the county clerk's office hours throughout the period Oct. 14-Oct. 30, inclusive.

All applications for absentee ballots must be received in the county clerk's office not later than Oct. 30.

Details as to absentee voting procedure may be obtained from a voter's county clerk. Generally, these provisions apply:

A voter applying for an absentee ballot by reason of sickness or physical disability must mail his application to the county clerk. It should be accompanied by the voter's registration certificate, and by a certificate of a duly licensed physician, chiropractor or accredited Christian Science practitioner certifying to the voter's illness or physical disability.

A voter desiring to vote absentee by reason of absence from the county may deliver or mail his application to the county clerk. In the application, the voter must state that he expects to be absent from the county on election day and during the clerk's regular office hours for the entire period of personal appearance absentee voting (Oct. 14-Oct. 30). The absentee ballot then must be mailed to the voter at an address outside his county of residence. Also, the envelope in which the voter returns the ballot must be post-marked from a point outside his county of residence.

Persons who will be out of the county on election day and wish to vote absentee may appear at the county clerk's office any time during regular office hours through Oct. 30.

Voter registration in Texas this year is at an all-time high with 4,150,645. On Nov. 3, voters will express their preference in state, district and local races, as well as on seven proposed constitutional amendments.

Thomas D. Humphrey Oil Properties Ltd. of Dallas completed No. 1 E. H. Schuch as a discovery and re-opener of Cad-do oil production in the Eliva Baker, North Field, six miles southwest of Tennyson.

Location is 2,310 feet from the north and 330 feet from the east lines of J. M. Whitaker Survey 5 1/2.

Daily potential was 76 barrels of 52.2 gravity oil through an 8/64 inch choke and perforations at 6,395-6,446 feet. The hole was treated with 1,500 gallons of acid.

Operator set 4 1/2 inch casing at 6,641-92 feet. Total depth was 6,716 feet and plugged back to 6,546 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 3001-1.

The well was originally drilled as Miami Oil Co. No. 1-C E. H. Schuch and was plugged and abandoned at 6,716 feet in December 1956.

United States Smelting and J. Frank Stringer of San Angelo No. 1 Foster S. Price has been completed 14 miles west of Robert Lee. The completion gives the Millican, West (Pennsylvanian) Field its fourth producer and a location north extension.

Daily pumping potential was 173 barrels of 39.4 gravity oil, plus 19 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio too small to measure.

Production was through perforations at 6,998-7,005 feet. The hole was washed with 500 gallons of mud acid.

Location is 560 feet from the south and 1,980 feet from the east lines of Section 160, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

Beauty of Apples

The beauty of an apple goes a long way past the skin—right into the pulp of this tasty fruit.

Appearance is a good guide to quality, but that doesn't help when you want "eating" apples and have mistakenly purchased cooking apples. That's where the variety is important. If the store has not labeled the apples, ask for the variety name.

It's often not easy to tell the variety just by looking, but usually you can identify the Delicious by the five knobs on the blossom end. But the Delicious apples grown in certain areas have knobs less pronounced.

The popular Delicious apples—both red and yellow—are excellent for eating raw. Use them for dessert and for salads and fruit cups. The variety has been around since 1894.

For a good cooking apple, try Rome Beauty. The Romes have an especially good reputation as "bakers." They're also fine for stewing and frying—and for applesauce, apple pie and other cookery. Too many enjoy their special tart taste for fresh eating.

Jonathan and Winesap are excellent for both cooking and eating. You'll find these and many other apple varieties in especially plentiful supply. October is the peak month for apple harvesting, and a large volume will be moving to market.

You can place a generous two-week supply in the refrigerator. It's best to put them in the vegetable drawer or a plastic bag. The apples will remain crisp for eating out of hand and be at their peak quality for cooking.

The Apple Casserole recipe makes about four servings. It's a delicious meal-in-one dish.

1 lb. thick sausage cut into half inch pieces

OR 1 lb. bulk sausage

4 medium size apples, peeled and sliced

2 medium size sweet potatoes, peeled and sliced

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon flour

1 tablespoon sugar

1 cup milk

1 tablespoon margarine, melted

Preparation: Cook sausage until done. If using bulk sausage, drain into small hole before cooking or cook "crumble" style. Combine with flour, sugar and milk. Add water, margarine, apples and sweet potatoes. Apples are peeled and sliced in half, pressed flat, leaving some of the skin on. Sprinkle top with sugar, flour, salt and milk.

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Put raisins into centers of apples. Place apples in a baking dish and pour the orange juice and water around them. Combine the flour, salt, sugar, cinnamon, orange rind, butter or margarine and peanut butter, mixing until crumbly. Stir in the peanuts. Spoon peanut mixture over the raisins, piling some in a mound on top. Bake at 375° about one hour, basting with the liquid every 15 minutes. Makes four servings.

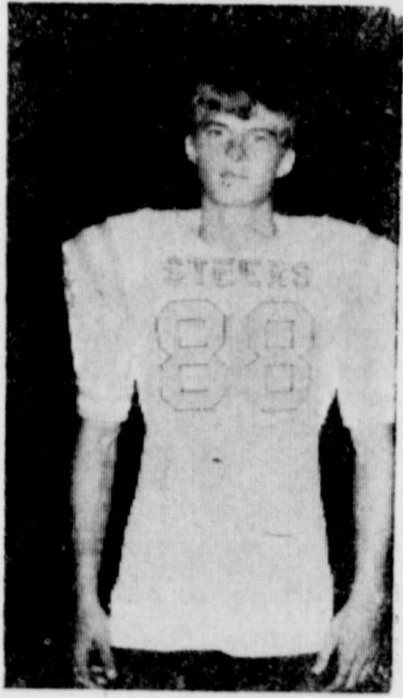

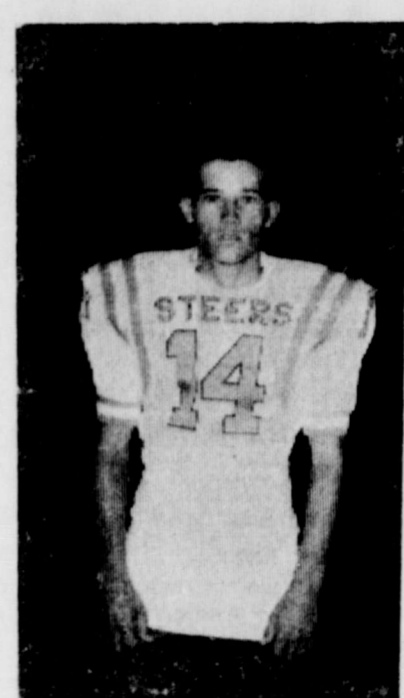

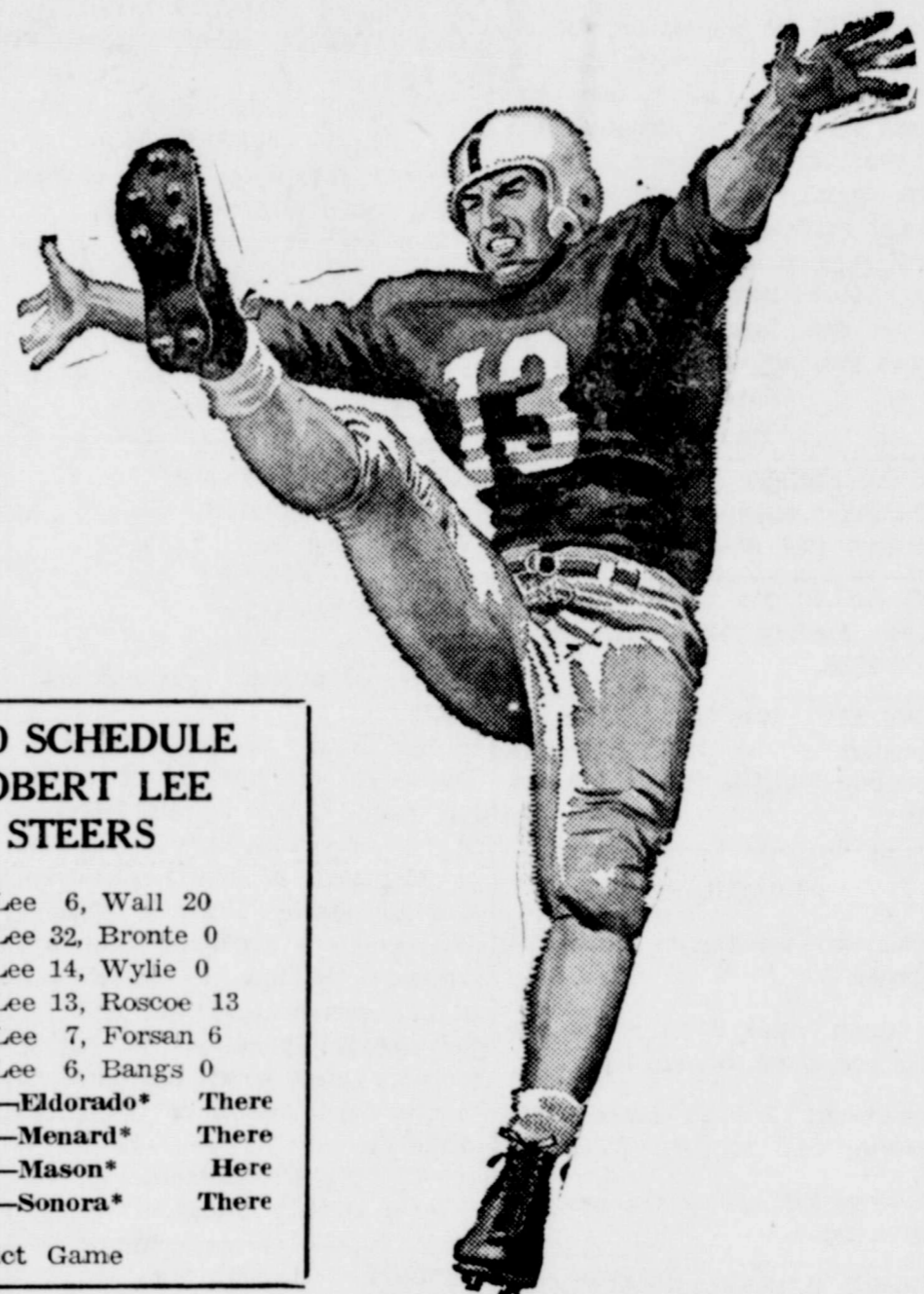
