School to Host Teachers Meeting

Robert Lee Schools will host the Region 15 Small Schools In-Service Program Aug. 15-17, with approximately 225 teachers coming to bone up on special grade or subject level interests.

Supt. Jimmy Bickley said the local school was happy to host the meeting and extended a welcome to all the teachers and others who will be here.

Dr. Rex Kyker, professor and head of the department of communication, Abilene Christian College, will be keynoting the 9:30 a.m. general session in the Robert Lee School auditorium.

Small group sessions keyed to the needs of teachers and administrators will begin at 10:45 a.m. and continue throughout the workshop. Topics will range from methods of teaching Shakespeare to new certification standards from consumer education to girls track and field.

Small group sessions will focus on grade and subject areas with sessions on kindergarten to second grade, third and fourth grade, fifth through eighth grade, business education, English, homemaking, mathematics, physical education, science, Spanish, vocational agriculture, and an administrators' section.

Area schools participating in the inservice include, Bronte, Eola, Grape Creek, Mozell, No-vice, Paint Rock, Robert Lee, Santa Anna, Sterling City, Talpa, Veribest and Water Valley.

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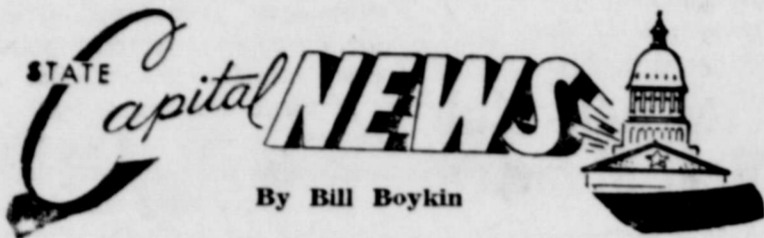

Austin — A recent statewide survey shows 22 per cent of Texans, or 2.5 million, are poor compared to a nationwide rate of 13 per cent.

Further, Texas accounts for nearly 10 per cent of the nation's poor.

Texas Office of Economic Opportunity submitted the 300 page report to Gov. Preston Smith, terming it the most comprehensive study ever undertaken among the Texas poor.

The Rio Grande Valley area was shown as having the highest incidence of poverty in the state — 42.2 per cent of the population. East Texas was next with 29 per cent poverty rate.

The East Texas and Lower Rio Grande Valley areas also have the smallest proportion of persons completing high school.

About 55 per cent of the heads of poor households are employed, and 70 per cent of those have fulltime permanent jobs, according to the study.

However, low income levels make it difficult for these persons to bring their families out of poverty.

Guidelines for the report set poverty level for a family of four at an annual income of \$3,800.

More than one third of the Texas poor are children under 15, and four out of five are black or Mexican-American.

George P. Taylor, TOEO director, said the report will be the basis of programs to alleviate poverty in the state. Recommendations include bringing in new industry to decrease unemployment, housing expansion and better health care and food programs.

A proposed four year anti-pov-

erty plan for Texas would seek \$6.3 million in aid from national and regional OEO.

REFORM SESSION STUDIED — Governor Smith disclosed he is putting together a "full package" of insurance reform proposals in case he decides to call a special session this year.

Reports indicated the governor was serious when he said he may call such a session on insurance matters. Smith himself continued to lash out at the insurance regulatory board. When members ordered a rate cut for auto insurance averaging 11 per cent statewide, Smith said a 21 per cent reduction was in order.

Smith said he must work closely with legislative leadership to achieve anything in a special session, but Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and House Speaker Rayford Price said he hasn't said a word to them about his plans.

If Smith calls the session, apparently he will propose wholesale reorganization of the board and a controlled competitive rate system for property and auto insurance.

ELECTION BILLS PAID—The state ran out of money before it paid 1972 primary election expenses and fell about \$325,000 short of meeting all its bills.

The last \$117,000 available was sent to county officials last week. A lot of election workers, printers and suppliers have not been paid for their work.

The money was disbursed on a pro rata basis, amounting to 26.66 per cent of bills still outstanding in the counties. Remaining expenses will have to go uncompensated until the 1973 Legislature can make appropriations. An appropriation of \$2.1 million

was set aside by the Legislature last spring for the 1973 primaries. "I can find no other source of funds available at this time," said Secretary of State Bob Bullock. "When we have paid all the county chairmen, we will not have one cent remaining of the \$2.1 million appropriated."

AG OPINIONS — Death penalties may be commuted to life sentences at any stage between jury verdict and granting of a new trial, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded:

* One convicted of a felony may have rights of citizenship restored and become eligible to hold public office.

* A county clerk may record marks or brands given the same name if the marks or brands are themselves different.

* Parks and Wildlife Department officers have duty to preserve the peace and disperse riots.

COURT MERGER URGED — Merger of the Texas Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals, elimination of municipal and justice of the peace courts and non-partisan election of judges were proposed by the Chief Justices Task Force for Court Improvement.

A series of seminars are being scheduled over the state to hear comments on the proposed revisions.

Under the recommendations, courts of civil appeals would become courts of appeals handling both criminal and civil cases.

The Legislature would be directed to create a system of county courts at law to perform the judicial functions now performed by all courts below the district level.

UNEMPLOYMENT JUMPS — A jump in the unemployment rate last month was spurred largely by new graduates and summer job seekers, according to Texas Employment Commission.

The jobless rate reached 4.6 per cent statewide, but this was less than the 5.3 per cent rate of June 1971.

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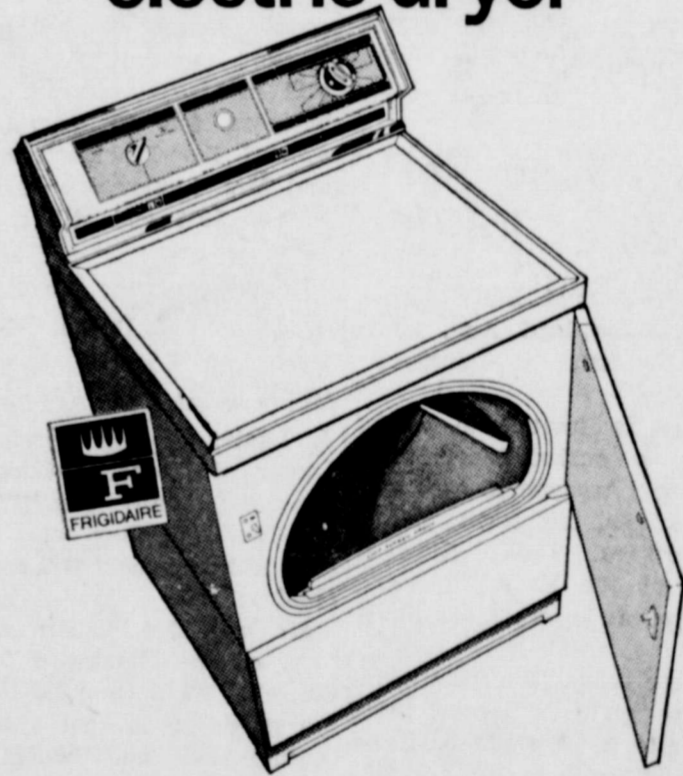

Washington — There's an old saying (if it isn't an old saying, we'll start one) that "give me the power to select a Congress and you can have the Presidency."

Actually, this has been repeated many times over the years by those with political wisdom and knowledge of the governing processes. Even a few members of Congress — enough to provide a needed majority — can, at any given time, change the trend of things.

After all, it is the Congress which passes the laws and holds

the purse strings. The President and his appointees administer the laws and spend the money. True enough he has the power of veto over actions of the Congress but the veto can also be overridden.

It is, of course, a matter of the electorate's judgment as to the makeup of the Congress and we differ in our opinions as to what constitutes proper qualifications for the office. Primarily it is assumed that the Congressman's stand on issues is determining. Quite naturally, we differ on basic philosophies of government,

which direct the course of our nation. We can all agree that any member of Congress should be able to read and write but beyond that, differences of opinion set in as to other qualifying attributes. Descriptive words such as "intelligence, dedication and integrity" and so forth, have meaning but are sometimes difficult to define. Like the zeal of Saul, it depends on the direction these attributes may take. A dedication of purpose can be anywhere around the 360 degrees of the compass. The fact remains that there are obvious truths which, at this time and place in our history, need to be critically observed. It seems that number one should be the re-establishment of complete integrity of our dollar's value. Many other issues are related to this rather simple proposition — inflation, the erosion of people's savings, investments, pensions or whatever. It relates to the crime rate, which

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absorbs the issue of law and order. It relates to our national defense and our standing with other nations of the world.

Given a Congress which is deeply conscious and thoroughly dedicated to preserving a government which can serve the need of its people and at the same time preserve its integrity, then the Presidency is not the most vital office. It is, of course, the highest office and has tremendous authority in making appointments to the Cabinet and the various posts under it. The President has the veto power and the authority to withhold funds appropriated by Congress. But it remains the duty and responsibility of the Congress to enact laws and appropriate money for their administration and execution.

The President of the United States cannot veto what is known

as "line items" as the governor of our state is permitted to do. He either vetoes all of an appropriation measure or none. He cannot lift out certain items to which he objects. On the other hand, he can order the impoundment of funds appropriated for a specific purpose. This is an old controversy and one unresolved. In truth it will never be resolved but only complained about as has been the case throughout the years. The real answer is for the Congress not to appropriate money to the President for things not needed or in excess of that which is absolutely necessary. This is the real rub and accounts for the conclusion in the minds of many that of the two it is more important to elect a highly responsible Congress than to elect a President of the United States.

Dunlop gave a brief lecture on the work and accomplishments of the association and the way it is promoting tourism for the trail and towns located on it. The trail is 680 miles long and association workers will cover the entire route during this summer, said Dunlop. Brochures and literature

about the trail are available upon request.

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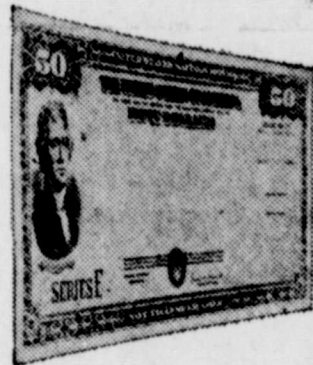

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Proposed
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 6 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 7)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Section 1-b, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1-b. (a) Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes.

(b) From and after January 1, 1973, the governing body of any county, city, town, school district, or other political subdivision of the State may exempt by its own action not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from all ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. As an alternative, upon receipt of a petition signed by twenty percent (20%) of the voters who voted in the last preceding election held by the political subdivision, the governing body of the subdivision shall call an election to determine by majority vote whether an amount not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) as provided in the petition, of the assessed value of residence

homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or over shall be exempt from ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. Where any ad valorem tax has theretofore been pledged for the payment of any debt, the taxing officers of the political subdivision shall have authority to continue to levy and collect the tax against the homestead property at the same rate as the tax so pledged until the debt is discharged, if the cessation of the levy would impair the obligation of the contract by which the debt was created."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the various political subdivisions of the State may exempt not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the value of residence homesteads of all persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from ad valorem taxes under certain conditions."

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF ROBERT LEE, COKE COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF ROBERT LEE, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered from and after thirty (30) days from the date of final passage of this ordinance, the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Robert Lee by Lone Star Gas Company, a Texas corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 1,000 cu. ft. or fraction thereof \$2.444 Gross; \$2.20 Net
 Next 3,000 cu. ft. @ \$1.222 per Mcf Gross; \$1.10 per Mcf Net
 Next 6,000 cu. ft. @ 1.100 per Mcf Gross; .99 per Mcf Net
 Next 15,000 cu. ft. @ 1.011 per Mcf Gross; .91 per Mcf Net
 Next 75,000 cu. ft. @ .956 per Mcf Gross; .86 per Mcf Net
 All over 100,000 cu. ft. @ .922 per Mcf Gross; .83 per Mcf Net

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period.

ADJUSTMENTS

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above-stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustments: Plus or minus the amount of any increase or decrease, respectively, above or below the 42.5 cents per Mcf level in the intracompany city gate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of the State of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers where such changes are caused by increases or decreases in the cost of gas purchased by the Company; plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax, or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to April 1, 1972, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract.

Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company, at its option, may forego the application of any adjustment if such adjustment would result in an increase in the monthly bill; however, failure of Company to apply any adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time, or at any time, to make an adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date; gross rate shall be applicable thereafter.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial customer per meter per month or for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. It is hereby found and determined that the meeting at which this ordinance is passed is open to the public, as required by Texas law, and that advance public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given, and that this rate ordinance is in compliance with the applicable general criteria issued by the Price Commission under the Economic Stabilization Act of 1970, as amended.

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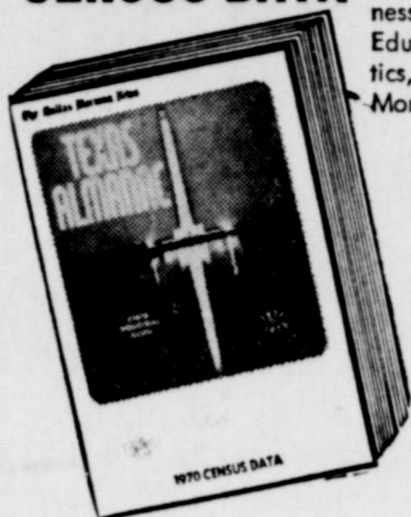

NUMBER 7 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 16)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Texas Constitution be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 3a, to read as follows:

"Section 3a. Equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin. This amendment is self-operative."

Sec. 2. The foregoing

amendment to the constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 13 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 82)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 65 to read as follows:

"Section 65. Wherever the Constitution authorizes an agency, instrumentality, or subdivision of the State to issue bonds and specifies the maximum rate of interest which may be paid on such bonds issued pursuant to such constitutional authority, such bonds may bear interest at rates not to exceed a weighted average annual interest rate of 6%. All Constitutional provi-

NUMBER 12 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 29)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40."

Sec. 2. That Article XVI, Section 40, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and the officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States, or retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and officers of the

State soil and water conservation districts, from holding at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any election, general, special or primary in this State when otherwise qualified. State employees or other individuals who receive all or part of their compensation either directly or indirectly from funds of the State of Texas and who are not State officers, shall not be barred from serving as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts; provided, however, that such State employees or other individuals shall receive no salary for serving as members of such governing bodies. It is further provided that a non-elective State officer may hold other non-elective offices under the State or the United States, if the other office is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by the State or Federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States, except as a notary public if qualified by law."

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment permitting State employees, who are not State officers, to serve as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment of State funds for compensation to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument."

NUMBER 3 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 41)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 61, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis. In all counties in this State, the Commissioners Courts shall be authorized to determine whether precinct officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts, to compensate all justices of the peace, constables, deputy constables and precinct law enforcement officers on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1973; and in counties having a population of less than twenty thousand (20,000), according to the then last preceding Federal Census, the Commissioners Courts shall also have the authority to determine whether county officers shall be compensated on a fee basis or on a salary basis, with the exception that it shall be mandatory upon the Commissioners Courts to compensate all sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, county law enforcement officers in-

cluding sheriffs who also perform the duties of assessor and collector of taxes, and their deputies, on a salary basis beginning January 1, 1949.

"All fees earned by district, county and precinct officers shall be paid into the county treasury where earned for the account of the proper fund, provided that fees incurred by the State, county and any municipality, or in case where a pauper's oath is filed, shall be paid into the county treasury when collected and provided that where any officer is compensated wholly on a fee basis such fees may be retained by such officer or paid into the treasury of the county as the Commissioners Court may direct. All Notaries Public, county surveyors and public weighers shall continue to be compensated on a fee basis."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to require the commissioners court in all counties of the state to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis."

Livestock Inspection Reinstated... Stocks of Grain Show Increase... Wool Production Declines... Early Stalk Destruction Urged... Pecan Producers to Vote.

LIVESTOCK moving from Texas, Oklahoma, Puerto Rico and parts of Arizona, California and New Mexico must be inspected and certified free of screwworms before being moved interstate.

The regulations will be in effect through Nov. 30 of this year, and from April 15 through Nov. 30 in future years until the present screwworm infestation is overcome.

State and federal veterinarians, state and federal livestock inspectors and accredited veterinarians are authorized to make the necessary inspections, supervise pesticide applications and issue shipping certificates.

TEXAS stocks of grain in all positions as of July 1 are estimated at 190 million bushels. This compares with 141 million bushels a year ago. The largest increase is in sorghum stocks followed by wheat, corn and rye. Stocks of oats, barley and soybeans are down from a year ago.

Sorghum stocks are estimated at 129 million bushels compared with 86.9 million bushels in 1971.

Nationwide, large increases were noted in corn, sorghum grain, wheat and rye. Stocks of corn, oats, barley and sorghum totaled 81.7 million tons, 35 per cent more than 1971.

Feed grain disappearance during April-June totaled 44 million tons, 17 per cent more than for the same quarter in 1971.

WOOL production in Texas for 1972 is estimated at 29,765,000 pounds, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting

Service. This is down two per cent from last year's production of 30,397,000 pounds.

Spring shorn wool is expected to account for 83 per cent of the total wool production.

Nationwide, wool production is expected to be down four per cent from the 1971 production of 159,084,000 pounds.

The Texas lamb crop is now estimated at 2,302,000 head, up one per cent from last year. Nationwide, the lamb crop is estimated to be down four per cent from 1971.

EARLY destruction of cotton stalks in the Lower Rio Grande Valley as well as throughout all of the state is urged. Mandatory deadline is Aug. 31 in the Lower Rio Grande Valley counties of Cameron, Willacy and certain portions of Hidalgo and Starr counties under the pink bollworm act.

Early destruction of stalks will help prevent build-ups of pink bollworms and other cotton insects for the 1973 crop.

HOG CHOLERA outbreaks in Texas and throughout the nation continue to hamper efforts in the final stage of hog cholera eradication.

Fifty cases have been reported in Texas since late last year. Federal quarantines are now in effect in all of seven Texas counties—Dawson, Harris, Jim Wells, Moore, Nueces, Terry and Webb—and parts of Bexar, Mitchell and Nolan counties.

PECAN producers in Texas will vote this fall on a proposed referendum being conducted by the Texas Pecan Growers Association. Proposed assessment will not exceed 50c per 100 pounds of pecans. Money will be used to finance a program of production, marketing and use of pecans.

NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 1)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Sec. 2. That Article IV, Section 22, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Article IV, Section 23, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified. The four-year term applies to these officers who are elected at the general election in 1974 or thereafter. Each shall receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Sec. 4. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and certain statutory State officers."

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER 4 ON THE BALLOT (HJR 61)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 2 to read as follows:

"Section 2. (a) When the legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission.

"(b) The commission shall study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973.

"(c) The members of the 63rd Legislature shall be convened as a constitutional convention at noon on the second Tuesday in January, 1974. The lieutenant governor shall preside until a chairman of the convention is elected. The convention shall elect other officers it deems necessary, adopt temporary and permanent rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. A person elected to fill a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature before dissolution of the convention becomes a member of the convention on taking office as a member of the legislature.

"(d) Members of the convention shall receive compensation, mileage, per diem as determined by a five member committee, to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVI, Section 33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its members and for the employment of a staff for the convention, and for these purposes may by resolution appropriate money from the general revenue fund of the state treasury. Warrants shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him in writing to sign them.

"(e) The convention, by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections, or may submit revisions of the existing constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections. Each resolution shall specify the date of the election, the form of the ballots, and the method of publicizing the proposals to be voted on. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. The conduct of the election, the canvassing of the votes, and the reporting of the returns shall be as provided for elections under Section 1 of this article.

"(f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members; but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p.m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended for a period not to exceed 60 days by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members.

"(g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution."
