The big District 7 of Texas Farm Bureau will hold its annual Queen and Talent Find Contests in Robert Lee School auditorium Friday night of next week, Aug. 25. The district covers an area which extends all the way to El Paso.

Water Problems Solved for Now

Robert Lee has no immediate water shortage problems, according to Water Supt. Sherman Williams, since the big rains of the past 10 days.

But, Williams said, the City of Robert Lee should continue its quest for federal funds to tie the city mains onto Lake Spence. He indicated that the Mountain Creek Reservoir is not dependable enough for a source of water for the city.

But things are looking fine right now. Williams said as of Monday the city has impounded in Mountain Creek Reservoir about 460 acre feet or 150,280,000 gallons, which is sufficient supply for about a year.

Williams said the present level of the lake is the best it has been since April and May of 1968.

Incidentally, Williams pointed out that the recent addition of water to the lake should enhance it as a small lake with good fishing. The lake was "killed" in October 1970 and restocked. Nice sized bass and crappie are being caught from the reservoir now, Williams said.

The City of Robert Lee has applied for a federal grant to assist in financing tying on to Lake Spence. No word has been received, but city officials are hopeful they will receive a favorable reply in the near future.

Lake Spence Rising

Lake E. V. Spence was expected to rise several feet by the end of this week. Millions of gallons of water started flowing into it Tuesday night from the floods which devastated Snyder last weekend.

Residents of Silver received 5.1 inches of rain, while Edith had 8.45 inches.

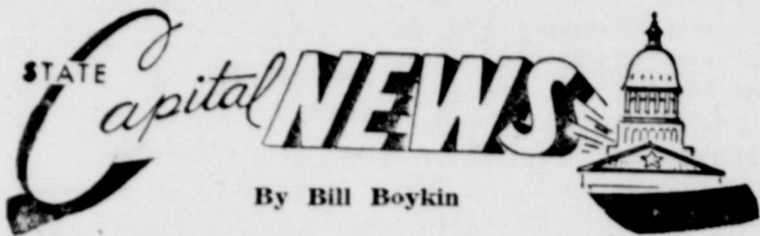

Austin — Rep. Price Daniel Jr. of Liberty apparently will take over the House of Representatives speakership without opposition next January.

Withdrawal of Rep. Frank Calhoun of Abilene from the speaker's race last week, after concluding that Daniel was too far out front to catch, left the 31 year old attorney from Liberty free of a major challenger.

Rep. James E. Nugent of Kerrville, who had planned to enter the contest earlier, endorsed Daniel.

Before Calhoun's withdrawal, Daniel claimed more than 100 commitments from House members or nominees.

"So many of the old and new members had committed to my opponent before I got into the race, that my continuance in the campaign would place a burden on my supporters that I do not feel justified in causing," said Calhoun.

Daniel, son of former Gov.

Price Daniel, came from a long way back to emerge as the shoe-in candidate for speaker.

When Rep. Rayford Price of Palestine won the post in special session last spring after resignation of former Speaker Gus Mutschler, he was considered a cinch to keep the job during the 63rd Legislature.

But Price was defeated for reelection to his House seat in the June 3 Democratic runoff primary by Rep. Fred Head of Troup.

Daniel, meanwhile, had been busy rounding up commitments from incumbent lawmakers and new nominees. He tries to dodge being labeled a liberal and prefers the term "progressive." He has emphasized need for legislative reform and is pledged to hold the speakership only one term.

SAFETY COURSE OFFERED — Texans who complete a new defensive driving course after Sept. 1 can become eligible for a 10 per cent reduction in their

annual auto insurance policies. Texas Safety Association has accepted responsibility for coordinating the National Safety Council course.

The course will cost about \$10 or less per person, and the resulting credit is good for three years. Individual savings over the three year period are estimated at about \$45 — or \$43 million statewide. Duplications are not allowed for the new course in addition to the driver training course.

In families with two or more cars, the principal drivers of each car will have to take the course to qualify for credit on all vehicles.

PARTIES CERTIFIED — Two new political parties, La Raza Unida and the Social Workers Party, have been certified for places on the Nov. 7 general election ballot in Texas.

Secretary of State Bob Bullock said it was his duty to certify the parties since they filed more than the required number of 22,365 signatures necessary for ballot position.

The American Party and the New Party, which did not file enough signatures, seek to get on the ballot anyway by federal court action.

La Raza Unida is waging an aggressive campaign for governor, with Ramsey Muniz of San Antonio as its candidate. Both parties also have candidates for U. S. senator, lieutenant governor and most other major statewide offices.

SPECIAL SESSION COOLING? — Gov. Preston Smith may be cooling a little on the idea of a September special session on insurance reform, but he insists the idea is still alive.

"I'm pretty flexible," said Smith. "If anybody can bring me in some facts that would show me there would be no purpose served in calling a session, I would not even pretend to be in a mood to waste \$33,000 a day (estimated session cost) of the taxpayers' money."

On the other hand, Smith said, if he could be shown that legislation to reduce insurance rates could be passed, he would not hesitate to summon lawmakers back to work.

Main business of the session, he indicated, would be a proposal for competitive insurance rates, which he said are in effect in 49 states. He seemed to be backing off his proposal to abolish the present insurance regulatory board.

DDT BANNED — DDT registration in Texas will be cancelled Aug. 31 with few exceptions, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White announced.

White had banned DDT registration for household use earlier under Pesticide Advisory Committee recommendations. The Committee said the action would have little impact on Texas agriculture.

Exceptions will permit registration for DDT to use on stored sweet potatoes, disease control programs by public health officials, in prescription drugs; and by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the military in health quarantine programs.

Short Snorts — The Governor has requested the federal pay board to approve a pay raise for state employees Sept. 1.

A state regulation requiring catfish to be at least 11 inches long has been scrapped in the northeast regulatory district.

Texas Rehabilitation Commission reported 2,998 Texans with mental health problems and 2,668 who are mentally retarded received rehabilitation services during the last year.

House and Senate members spent \$1.9 million in expense funds allocated to them during the last fiscal year, according to a new state auditor's report.

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 1)
 General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Sec. 2. That Article IV, Section 22, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office.

He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Article IV, Section 23, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified. The four-year term applies to these officers who are elected at the general election in 1974 or thereafter. Each shall receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Sec. 4. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and certain statutory State officers."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**

NUMBER 12 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 29)
 General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40."

Sec. 2. That Article XVI, Section 40, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and the officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States, or retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and officers of the

State soil and water conservation districts, from holding at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any election, general, special or primary in this State when otherwise qualified. State employees or other individuals who receive all or part of their compensation either directly or indirectly from funds of the State of Texas and who are not State officers, shall not be barred from serving as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts; provided, however, that such State employees or other individuals shall receive no salary for serving as members of such governing bodies. It is further provided that a nonselective State officer may hold other nonselective offices under the State or the United States, if the other office is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by the State or Federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States, except as a notary public if qualified by law."

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment permitting State employees, who are not State officers, to serve as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment of State funds for compensation to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument."

Farm Prices Show Increase . . .

Calf prices are above 100 per cent of parity, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes. Average price for calves received by Texas farmers as of July 15 was \$45.30 per hundred-weight. Effective parity is \$44.20 per hundredweight.

Overall, the all farm products index shows prices received by Texas farmers and ranchers were at 356 per cent of the 1910-14 base. This is an increase of 20 per cent above a year ago.

Calf prices are the only commodity above effective parity price. Cotton, for example, was at 28.5 cents per pound while the effective parity is 55.16 cents per pound.

Hogs were at \$27.20 in Texas on the average; effective parity is \$30.60.

Beef cattle prices averaged \$35.60; effective parity is \$36.80. Grain sorghum averaged \$2.01, while effective parity is \$3.33.

Parity — that measuring stick to compare farm income with non-farm income — is now at 75 per cent.

So even though farm prices have been increasing, total farm income is still about one-fourth below the rest of the economy.

Farm income now is estimated at \$18 billion this year. But at full parity, farm income would be about \$22 billion.

SHEEP on feed in Texas shows a six per cent increase in the number on feed a month earlier. This, however, is four per cent below a year ago.

Dry lot sheep feeders with a lot capacity of 2,000 head or more had 143,000 head of sheep and lambs on feed for slaughter as of Aug. 1.

Current intentions to market the 143,000 head are: August, 53,000; September, 56,000; and October, 34,000. September and October intentions are incomplete at this time because additional lambs could still be placed on feed and marketed during the period.

CANCELLATION OF DDT registration will take effect Aug. 31, except for a few limited uses. The Pesticide Advisory Committee of Texas, which makes recommendations to the Texas Department of Agriculture relating to the use of pesticides, said cancellation should have little impact on agriculture production in the state.

SCREWWORM regulations relating to dipping or spraying of livestock have been changed. Livestock are no longer required to be dipped or sprayed before shipment from one screwworm infested state to another. However, all livestock shipped from or through areas where screwworms are a recurring problem must still be inspected, any wounds treated, and shipment certified free of screwworms.

PINK BOLLWORM stalk destruction deadline is Aug. 31 for Cameron and Willacy and certain portions of Starr and Hidalgo counties.

Early stalk destruction throughout the state is urged. Extensive insect damage has been reported this year in many parts of the state. Early stalk destruction can reduce insect infestation for the 1973 cotton crop.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 7 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 16)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Texas Constitution be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 3a, to read as follows:

"Section 3a. Equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin. This amendment is self-operative."

Sec. 2. The foregoing

amendment to the constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin."

The rains during the past 10 days were the best we could have hoped for. To be so dry, with prospects fading daily, then receive such a blessing, certainly gives one a boost.

The screwworm picture stayed about the same last week, but no doubt we will see a rise in numbers from now on through the fall. The weather conditions will be more favorable if wounds are present to be infested.

We again encourage every operator to continue mailing in samples for identification. The sterile fly drops are limited now but those that are made will be made in areas where the officials receive the greatest number of reports from. Also, this is the only way the program administrators can stay abreast of what is happening over the state.

There has been some publicity regarding a producers fund drive. This may occur in order that funds will be available for mass sterile fly production by next spring. But to date we have nothing official regarding a fund drive.

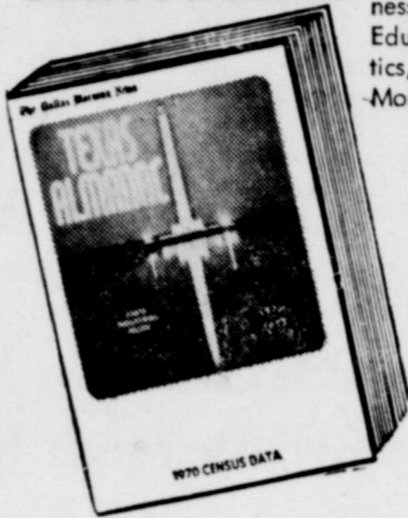

Washington — Now that Hop Sing (of the Ponderosa) has recovered from the shotgun wound received in the recent West Coast plane hijacking, he says he will not make another trip by air unless he is assured of security from hijackers. The trouble is there is thus far no such thing. Real efforts are being made by both government and the airlines, but there is nothing yet to give guaranteed certainty against airplane holdups.

Consider some of the basic facts involved. In the United States alone there are approximately 14,000 scheduled flights a day, carrying an average of 500,000 daily passengers and countless millions of pieces of luggage and

baggage. More than 500 airports receive regularly scheduled air flights. Though 25 airports account for 70 per cent of all passengers, many of the smaller ports are served by modern jets and become targets for hijackers and extortionists. Air travel and air freight are constantly expanding and the predictions are that during the 70's travel will increase by at least 10 per cent a year.

Efforts are underway to provide carrier protection against this type of robbery. A real test is shaping up within the next few months. There seems to be new determination on the part of government and airlines to halt these air crimes.

It is a frustrating business and an expensive one. Detection systems cost money and there is already an argument between the government and the airlines as to who will foot the bill. The biggest problem, however, is how to exercise the greatest possible precaution and at the same time avoid delay and inconvenience. Human frailties being what they are, airlines will receive all sorts of complaints by their passengers if they are greatly inconvenienced. Competing airlines want to give the best possible service and delays such as the search of individuals and their baggage would certainly slow schedules. The fact that airlines are both promoters and cops has been an obstacle to hijacking efforts. It is understandable that both federal marshals and airline security agents will not want to needlessly harass travelers if they can avoid it. It is understandable that carelessness will result, since the chances of a passenger being hijacked is one to 3½ to 4 million.

In the next few months tighter controls will be put into effect. The airlines are buying hundreds of magnetometers with plans to use them at all gates of major airports. By presidential order hand baggage is now being inspected in three of the nation's most heavily traveled air routes. These are Los Angeles to San Francisco, New York to Boston and New York to Washington. On other routes a screening system is being used but the effectiveness has not been proved.

The Federal Aviation Administration is pressuring the airlines to do more. One approach is to give passengers the choice of either surrendering all baggage or requiring a search of anything carried on a plane.

The problem is by no means a simple one and defies complete and total solutions. The problem exists throughout the world, which has brought international consultations. An amendment to the foreign aid bill passed last week provides that any aid to a foreign country will be cut off if they do not either prosecute or extradite to this country any sky-jacker who has sought asylum, as in the last case of those who went to Algeria. This will not reach many countries such as Cuba but it does point up a part of the dilemma and an effort to eliminate safe harbors for the criminals.

Passengers, airlines and government may eventually be left with the worst of two choices: stricter and more time consuming inspections of passengers and baggage or face the constant threat of sky crime.

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "To set a six percent (6%) weighted average annual interest rate for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority presently having a specified interest ceiling."

 Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
 NUMBER 6 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 7)
 General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
 Section 1. That Article VIII, Section 1-b, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:
 "Section 1-b. (a) Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes.
 (b) From and after January 1, 1973, the governing body of any county, city, town, school district, or other political subdivision of the State may exempt by its own action not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from all ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. As an alternative, upon receipt of a petition signed by twenty per cent (20%) of the voters who voted in the last preceding election held by the political subdivision, the governing body of the subdivision shall call an election to determine by majority vote whether an amount not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) as provided in the petition, of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or over shall be exempt from ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. Where any ad valorem tax has theretofore been pledged for the payment of any debt, the taxing officers of the political subdivision shall have authority to continue to levy and collect the tax against the homestead property at the same rate as the tax so pledged until the debt is discharged, if the cessation of the levy would impair the obligation of the contract by which the debt was created."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the various political subdivisions of the State may exempt not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the value of residence homesteads of all persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from ad valorem taxes under certain conditions."

 General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

 "Section 61. All district officers in the State of Texas and all county officers in counties having a population of twenty thousand (20,000) or more, according to the then last preceding Federal Census, shall be compensated on a salary basis.
