At that time he became combinationman in Wellington. He moved to Crowell as combinationman in June 1964, where he has served until his move to Bronte.

#### Recreation Areas Closed

Jack Mathews reported he had heard complaints from out of town fishermen that some camp areas around Lake Spence were closed. Sheriff Melvin Childress said he had talked with R. A. Schooling, lakekeeper, about this, and was told that some areas had to be closed because they were accessible only through private property. Land owners complained mostly about litter and lack of sanitation caused by the visitors. However, it is planned that more development will eliminate the need to cross private property to get to these camp areas.

Postmaster Hugh Lewis Jr. reminded everyone of the Dec. 10 deadline for mailing overseas Christmas packages. He urged everyone to put an address inside packages, since wrapping is often lost and the post office then has no way to find the addressee.

Cumbie Ivey Jr. said that Coke County is not well represented as a good hunting place for deer, quail, dove and turkey. He felt the county was missing a good bet by not publicizing its abundance of game. The county was not mentioned in the Hunting Edition of the Standard-Times which came out Sunday. BCD members agreed this matter should be studied and pushed each year. It was suggested that land owners who have hunting leases need to be contacted for assistance. The Extension Office keeps a list of leases available. It was also mentioned that Robert Lee and Bronte should cooperate in advertising hunting possibilities.

### Burglars Hit Coke Businesses

A series of burglaries was committed in Coke County last Friday night. Similar burglaries were committed the same night in Ballinger, Paint Rock and Eden, and on Monday night in Mertzon and Garden City.

Breakins in Robert Lee were at Rowoldt's Fina Station and the Ross Conoco Station. At the Fina Station the culprits broke into the cigarette machine and took a few cigarettes and the coin box. At Ross Conoco, they broke into the cigarette machine and took the coin box. Cold drink boxes in neither station were bothered. Admittance to both stations was gained by breaking the front door glass.

Moving on to Bronte, the burglars tried unsuccessfully to get into the change machine at Dittmore's Laundry. They did break into the drink machine and dryers. Also robbed was the cold drink machine at Corkey's Eneco Station.

Sheriff Melvin Childress said this week that he felt all the burglaries were committed by the same persons. No leads had turned up by Wednesday.

### Conley Nominated For Hall of Fame

Snipe Conley of Robert Lee is one of 12 persons who have been nominated for the Texas Sports Hall of Fame. The Texas Sports Writers Association announced the nominations Saturday. Three of the nominees will be inducted into the Hall of Fame.

Conley received the high honor because of his exploits in baseball from 1919 to 1927. He won 19 consecutive victories as a pitcher for the Dallas baseball team in 1919. He played for Dallas from 1916 until 1924 and then managed the team through 1927.

## Phone Co. Asks Rate Hike

An application for increased local telephone rates has been filed officially by General Telephone Company of the Southwest with the Robert Lee City Council, it was announced today by Jack Goss, San Angelo division manager.

Information concerning the application has been presented to city officials, according to Goss.

The last rate increase in Robert Lee was June 21, 1962. The rate of return on invested capital on present telephone rates is 4.42 per cent, while the proposed rates would raise the earnings to 7.09 per cent.

"Steadily increasing operating expenses and taxes along with increased investment in new facilities have made the rate increase necessary," Goss said. "We have been able to absorb most of the inflationary cost of

doing business for the last 10 years by technological improvements and greater operating efficiencies. However, in order to attract new investors, a fair and adequate return on the capital already invested must be secured."

"Without adequate telephone rates, expansion and improvement of telephone service is impossible," the division manager stated. "Good earnings and good service are inseparable. No business can succeed in meeting the expanding needs of its customers without good earnings to finance its ability to meet those expanded needs."

The proposed telephone rates for Robert Lee are:

Also included in the application are increases in rates for PBX and key system services.

"It is our sincere desire to continue to provide Robert Lee with the most modern and dependable telephone service available," Goss said, "and with adequate return, the goal is attainable."

Goss said the criteria an increase must meet include: that it is cost justified and does not reflect future inflationary expectations; it is the minimum required to assure continued, adequate and safe service; and it will achieve the minimum rate of return needed to attract capital at reasonable costs and not impair the credit of the utility.

**The Cranberry Crisis**

Thanksgiving is almost here, and you know that means good food, good times, and good-bye good garments if cranberry stains aren't treated right.

Treat the stain as soon as possible.

Many stains can be removed easily when fresh, but they're difficult—or next to impossible—to remove later. Always remove stains before subjecting them to tumble drying or pressing, as heat tends to set or fix stains.

To treat cranberry stain on a washable fabric, soak the fresh stain in cool water, then wash in warm suds and rinse.

If the stain remains, make a solution of two tablespoons of hydrogen peroxide to each gallon of water. Test the solution on hidden section of the garment. Then soak stains one-half hour or longer, if necessary. Rinse twice.

On dry cleanable fabrics, first sponge stain with cool water. Immediately work a liquid laundry detergent into stain. Let stand several hours.

Then test a drop or two of white vinegar on a hidden section of the garment to be sure it won't affect the color.

If no color change occurs, apply a few drops of vinegar and let remain a minute or two. Sponge with cool water.

Cranberry stains are some of the hardest to remove. But if the garment is worth saving, it's worth a little extra time and effort to follow stain removal procedures.

**Turkey Left-Overs**

After the fabulous Thanksgiving feast is over, there is almost sure to be a lot of leftovers.

Turkey leftovers can be turned into countless dishes—from appetizers to main course, from sandwiches to glamorous dishes.

But first, what's left of the roast turkey must be stored properly.

As soon as the meal is finished, scoop the stuffing out of the neck and body cavities of the turkey. Cool the stuffing quickly by immediate refrigeration. Later, cover the cooled stuffing.

The turkey should be treated much the same way—cool and then wrap loosely to prevent drying.

If desired, the meat can be cut from the bones and stored. Some

prefer to wrap the white and dark meat separately.

Plan to use frozen leftover turkey within four to six weeks.

One way of preparing these leftovers is making them into a turkey club sandwich supreme. It's tops for a luncheon, supper or late evening snack.

To make a turkey club sandwich supreme, first cover pumpkin-ernickle rye bread slices with crisp lettuce leaves. Then add layers of sliced swiss cheese, tomato slices and sliced roast turkey—both white and dark meat. Top with crisp bacon and serve with Thousand Island dressing. White bread and American cheese can be used.

For a gourmet style appetizer, try a turkey cube and a piece of dill pickle or preserved watermelon rind on a toothpick. Serve these with a bowl of Russian dressing.

A rich, well seasoned cream sauce containing bite size chunks of turkey is glamorous served over

er biscuit, split and toasted cornbread, or crisp fried noodles. To make the dish elegant, add pineapple tidbits to the sauce.

## Coke FB Adopts Protection Plan

Coke County Farm Bureau has adopted the new Property Protection Plan offered by the Texas Farm Bureau.

Effective Nov. 1, 1972, all members who have the official "No Trespassing" signs on their property will be protected against trespass and other offenses. This reward program is provided by the Texas Farm Bureau and affiliated insurance companies.

Action was taken by the Coke County Farm Bureau at its recent convention to adopt the program.

The new service to member program provides for posting of property according to the new anti-trespass law passed during the last session of the Legislature.

A reward of \$200 is offered by the Texas Farm Bureau and Insurance Companies for information leading to the arrest and final conviction of those committing trespass, felony theft, arson, or malicious mischief as defined by Article 1350 on property of a current Farm Bureau member.

Also available are name plates and decals to be attached to vehicles.

Proper completion and correct amount of income submitted may prevent a decrease in V. A. pension check or stop payment on January 1, 1973.

For correct completion of the questionnaire card, the veteran, widow or dependent parent must know the exact amount of their Social Security before the increase on Sept. 1. Other sources of income, such as Railroad Retirement, Civil Service, Teacher Retirement and others, must be treated in the same manner.

If assistance is required in completing the cards, persons may contact Robert M. Nance, local Veterans County Service Officer. He will be in the courthouse at Robert Lee on the last Wednesday of each month and at the city hall in Bronte on the second Wednesday of each month.

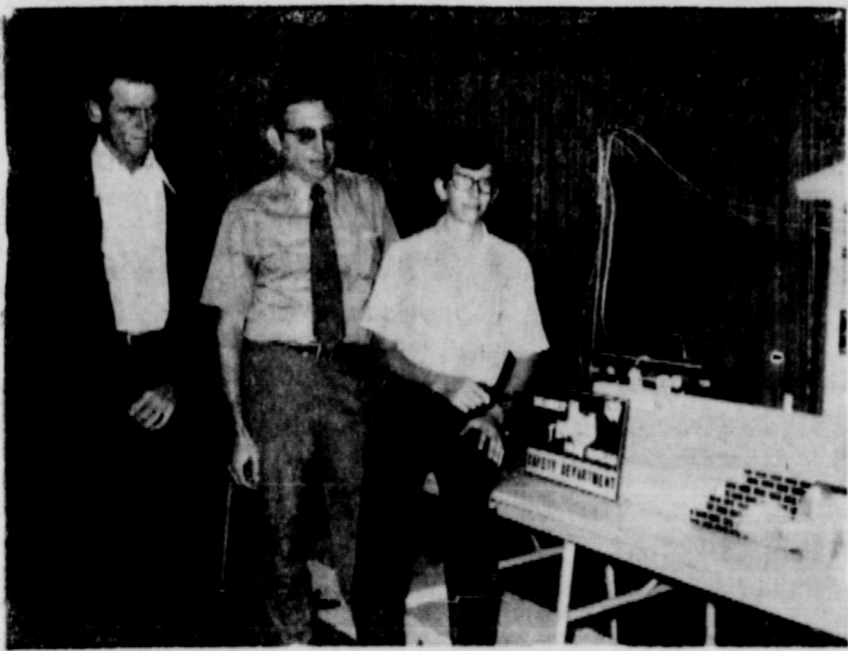

## Farm Bureau Safety Director Gives Demonstration on Dangers of Shock

Nobody is safe from electric shock, so don't let your body complete an electric circuit. This was the suggestion brought out by Joe Smetana, safety director for the Texas Farm Bureau, in a graphic demonstration held recently at Robert Lee High School.

He illustrated this point and others in the 45 minute demonstration, using a variety of materials.

Some of the accident producing situations illustrated included standing on damp ground or wet concrete, using or touching any grounded tool or appliance, or in contact with any piping system and allowing ordinary household current to pass through the body from defective equipment or accidental contact with conductors.

Continuing with the props having "special lighting effects," Smetana warned his audience of the hazards associated with falling to unplug a toaster before cleaning, using an aluminum ladder near electric lines, flying a kite with wet or metallic threads in the string near electric power

lines, and the dangers of a broken electrically charged line which has fallen over or near an automobile that has just crashed.

The average modern home has 120 volt or 240 volt, 60 cycle alternating current with a capacity of over 100 amperes. Electricity is constantly seeking "ground." Unfortunately the human can complete the circuit. Medical authorities agree that if the amount of current required to light a 15 watt bulb, which is only one-tenth of an ampere, should flow through the heart, death might result in just one second.

Smetana offered a list of suggestions for prevention of and protection from electric shocks.

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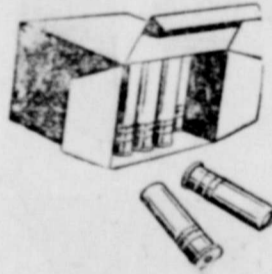
