## Dynamite Found Near Bronte

Approximately 85 pounds of dynamite were found last Friday night, part of it in a car which was stuck in the mud about four miles north of Bronte.

Loy Winkle of Bronte has been charged with possession of the explosive. He was arraigned in justice court and released on \$5,000 bond.

Deputy Sheriff Don Thorpe and Highway Patrolman Bobby Hart discovered the dynamite in a routine check of the car which was stuck in a field adjacent to U. S. Highway 277 on the Cecil Coal-son place.

One case was found in the trunk of the car and the other was found in a nearby storage barn.

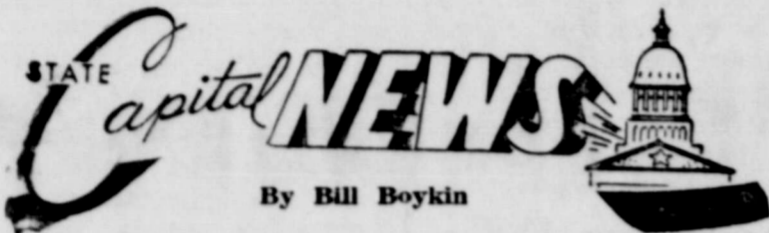
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Austin — Texas got a fast start-  
ing legislature, a new governor,  
lieutenant governor and speaker  
of the House all in eight action-  
packed days.

Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde and  
William P. Hobby of Houston were

inaugurated as governor and lieu-  
tenant governor Tuesday (Jan.  
16).

Price Daniel Jr. of Liberty won  
election as House speaker with-  
out opposition as the legislature  
convened Jan. 9. The 31 year  
old son of former Gov. Price  
Daniel (who now serves on the  
State Supreme Court) announced  
appointment of House standing  
committees four days after his  
election, and immediately refer-  
red bills for hearing.

Outgoing Gov. Preston Smith of-  
fered some good financial news  
to the arriving legislators. His  
\$9.7 billion biennial budget esti-  
mated a \$300 million surplus for  
lawmakers to use in expanding  
programs or revising school fi-  
nance formulas.

Governmental reform proposals  
backed by Daniel will be among  
the first bills to get House hear-  
ing. The House, with a minimum  
amount of opposition, promptly  
adopted the thick set of procedu-  
ral rules the new speaker urged.

Smith in his swan song to the  
Legislature, advised that lawmak-  
ers move immediately to estab-  
lish the constitutional revision  
commission directed by voters  
last November. He submitted an  
emergency matter appropriation  
of funds to pay the commis-  
sion's expenses.

The outgoing Governor further  
advised legislators ought to con-  
sider tackling the tough school  
finance system overhaul in a  
special session.

APPOINTMENTS — Among the  
last minute appointments of Gov-  
ernor Smith was naming Dorsey  
B. Hardeman of San Ange-  
lo as chairman of the Texas Wa-  
ter Rights Commission.

New Gov. Dolph Briscoe desig-  
nated former White House Aide  
Robert L. Hartesty, 41, as his  
press secretary and special as-  
sistant.

JOB COMMISSION URGED —  
Key legislative researchers re-

commend establishment of a gov-  
ernor's committee on equal em-  
ployment opportunity in state gov-  
ernment to police job discrimi-  
nation.

A Texas Legislative Council  
staff report found blacks and  
Mexican-Americans under-employ-  
ed in state government.

The report showed 79.92 per cent  
of state governmental employees  
are white and that they tend to  
hold higher paying jobs than the  
blacks and Mexican-Americans.

It recommended a six member  
commission to report to the gov-  
ernor on employment practices and  
discrimination and to evolve pol-  
icies and programs to encourage  
equal opportunity at all levels of  
government.

JAILS CRITICIZED — Texas  
Legislative Council urged creation  
of a commission on county jail  
standards, terming present laws  
on the subject "totally unrealistic  
and meaningless."

The Council's report said only  
five jails in Texas (those of An-  
drews, Lynn, Oldham, Smith,  
Taylor and Wichita counties) meet  
health department standards.  
The State Health Department in-  
spects jails but has no authority  
to compel compliance with its own  
standards.

TLC said the proposed commis-  
sion would promulgate realistic  
standards and regulations and pro-  
hibit confinement of prisoners in  
those which do not measure up to  
them.

SENATORS DRAW FOR  
TERMS — Sixteen state senators  
got four year terms in a draw-  
ing which may decide the politi-  
cal futures of some. Fifteen  
others, not so lucky, drew two  
year terms and must face voters  
again in 1974.

W. E. (Pete) Snelson of Mid-  
land, senator from this district,  
drew a two year term and will  
face reelection again in 1974.

Short Snorts  
Oscar Mauzy, 46, of Dallas  
was named president pro tem-  
ore of the senate.

The Legislature was urged by a  
study committee to regulate over-  
pumpage of groundwater in sev-  
eral parts of Texas, including the  
San Jacinto Monument-Baytown,  
area, the High Plains and San  
Antonio area.

An Austin representative intro-  
duced a resolution calling for a  
committee to investigate Rep.  
John Allen of Longview who paid

a fine late last year after plead-  
ing guilty to a misdemeanor nepo-  
tism charge.

Texas employers will try for  
"workmen's compensation self  
insurance" again this legislative  
session. Only 16 states do not al-  
low this—including the Lone Star  
state.

**Feb. 2-4 Rio Roundup—Western River Festival along Paseo del Rio, San Antonio.** Once again San Antonio's unique downtown River Walk will become a part of the western mood that invades the city during rodeo month. Western music, food, arts & crafts, and the "law and order" of the Bexar County Gunslingers and their frontier justice highlight activities and whip up spirit for the 25th annual San Antonio Livestock Exposition & Rodeo Feb. 9-18.

**Feb. 3-11 Southwestern International Livestock Show & Rodeo, El Paso.**

**Feb. 11-19 Rio Grande Valley International Music Festival & Opera, McAllen.** Now in its 13th year, this event was originated for the purpose of providing Valley students with the opportunity to enjoy live symphony performances. To do this and underwrite most of the costs for the children's concerts, it was necessary to also schedule performances for adults. The result is a schedule of 22 performances—children's, pop, concert, symphony and opera—in five cities during the nine-day festival. Over 20,000 children and 6,000 adults attended last year. This year the San Antonio Symphony will perform in the host city McAllen, in Harlingen, Edinburg, Pharr and Reynosa, Mexico. For all 13 years the cost for

children's tickets has remained at 50¢. Adult tickets for concerts are \$3.50 and opera tickets cost \$3-\$12. A complete schedule and tickets may be obtained from the Rio Grande Valley International Music Festival & Opera, P. O. Box 1915, McAllen, Texas 78501.

**Feb. 19-22 South Texas Wolf Hunters' Open Bench Show, Derby Run & Running Dog Bench Show, Karnes City.** Back in 1922 in Martinez, just east of San Antonio, 41 hounds and 55-60 hunters got together for the first South Texas Wolf Hunters' trials. In 1936 the annual event was the subject of a four-page spread in Life magazine. Life is gone, but the hunt goes on—bigger and better than ever. Last year 200-300 hounds and hunters from all over Texas and seven other states participated. This year's event will be at the Wagner Ranch six miles from Gillett, 20 miles north of Karnes City on State Highway 80. Roads to the event will be marked. On the 19th there is the open bench show for both hunting and non-hunting dogs. The mornings of the 20-22 the Running Dog Bench Show will see the hounds hunting from first light to about noon. Hunters will be camping on the ranch, but food will be available for non-cooks. There is no charge for watching.

**Feb. 21-March 4 Houston Livestock Show & Rodeo, Houston.** The Livestock Show, in its own special building, accommodates 17,000 entries that compete for more than \$200,000 in premiums. The rodeo, Feb. 23-March 4 in the Astrodome, this year stars on various days, Charley Pride, Sonny & Cher, Merle Haggard, Rick Nelson, Donna Fargo, Sonny James, the Fifth Dimension, Engelbert Humperdinck and the Jackson 5. Matinee performances 2 p.m.; evening 7:45 p.m., Monday through Saturday; 7 p.m. Sundays.

**Our Newsletter**

The first session of the 93rd Congress has now begun its work. Faced with a deficit which is expected to exceed \$35 billion during the current fiscal year, it becomes imperative that the Congress reexamine many programs which have in recent years pyramided and expanded extensively. Many battles will probably arise during consideration of ways and means to reduce.

Unless our negotiators yield to terms of the Communists in Paris, the war issue will probably consume hours and hours of Congressional bickering and debate during the months ahead. Informed sources now believe the enemy is increasingly dependent upon moves which they hope will enable them to win the war in Washington rather than in Vietnam or at the peace table in Paris.

Above everything, it is imperative that any settlement with Hanoi must assure prompt release of our prisoners and those who are missing.

During this session of Congress, my committee work and other official duties in Washington will prevent me from making many trips to the district. Last year I was chairman of a subcommittee which held hearings on important legislation—including six weeks consumed on one bill, the annual 13 billion military construction authorization. And a score of other vital measures were handled by our subcommittee.

Even with that heavy schedule,

last year I was able to make a total of 17 trips to the district, including 13 to San Antonio. Thus, I was able to make about two district trips per month prior to the adjournment of Congress. Fortunately, I was able to visit more than one county on some of those trips, mostly in response to invitations.

I would hope I may be able to do as much during 1973. This will depend, of course, upon my work schedule in Washington. Several months ago I committed myself to accompany Lt. Gen. Sam C. Phillips, director of the National Security Service, to San Angelo where he will speak to the annual Chamber of Commerce later this month. And last October I promised to address the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet at Comfort this month. In addition, on Jan. 11 and 12 I was in San Antonio for some briefings at the four major military installations there.

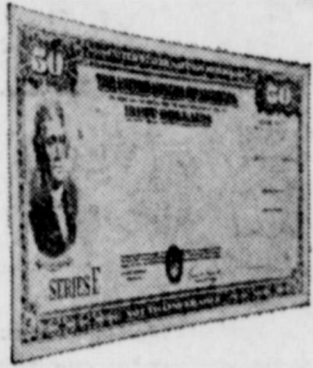

# Farmcast

A Weekly Report Of Agri-Business News

Compiled From Sources  
Of The Texas Department of Agriculture

Up, up and away? ... Sheep on Feed ... One Million Visitors ...

At first glance, it might appear that farm prices are "up, up, and away." Although prices to farmers do show increases, production costs are also rising so the net result is not as rosy for agricultural producers as it could be. Remember, too, income in rural areas is still about a fourth under the rest of the economy.

The Texas Crop and Livestock

Reporting Service notes that Texas farmers received price increases for almost every commodity recently. Only calves and sheep are above effective parity, however.

Calf prices at \$47.40 per cwt. are \$1.60 per hundred pounds above parity. Sheep at \$12.30 per cwt. are \$1.20 per hundred pounds above parity. Beef cattle at \$34 are \$4.20 under effective parity. Hogs at \$20.50 are more than \$2 under effective parity.

Crop prices show an even greater discrepancy. Cotton at 21.2 cents per pound compared with an effective parity price of 57.20 cents per pound. Grain sorghum at \$2.79 is below effective parity by 65 cents per cwt.

Egg prices at 50 cents per dozen are up eight cents from a month ago but still almost eight cents below parity.

The index of all farm products was 20 points above last month and 13 per cent above a year ago.

Farm production index prices paid by farmers was up seven per cent from a year ago.

A 22 PER CENT decline in sheep on feed is noted in Texas. Drylot sheep feeders with a

capacity of 2,000 head or more had 90,000 sheep and lambs on feed for slaughter on Jan. 1. This is 22 per cent under a month ago but five per cent above the number on feed this time last year. Current intentions to market are: January 50,000; February 32,000; and March 8,000. Marketings during December were 58,000 head.

COMMERCIAL slaughtering plants in Texas produced 194,000 pounds of meat during November, which represents a decline of six per cent from the previous month, but nine per cent above the total produced in 1971.

Nationwide, production of red meat was one per cent above a year earlier.

TEXAS livestock interests will be represented during the annual Mexican National Livestock and Industry Exposition in Mexico City Jan. 20-28. More than 1,000,000 visitors are expected to attend the activities.

Texas will have three exhibit spaces at the exposition. A total of 14 breed associations in the state will be represented. The Houston Livestock Show and the San Antonio Livestock Show will also be involved. The Mohafy Council of America will be in charge of a display of textiles.

The Texas Department of Agriculture marketing personnel will be in charge of the entire Texas exhibits.

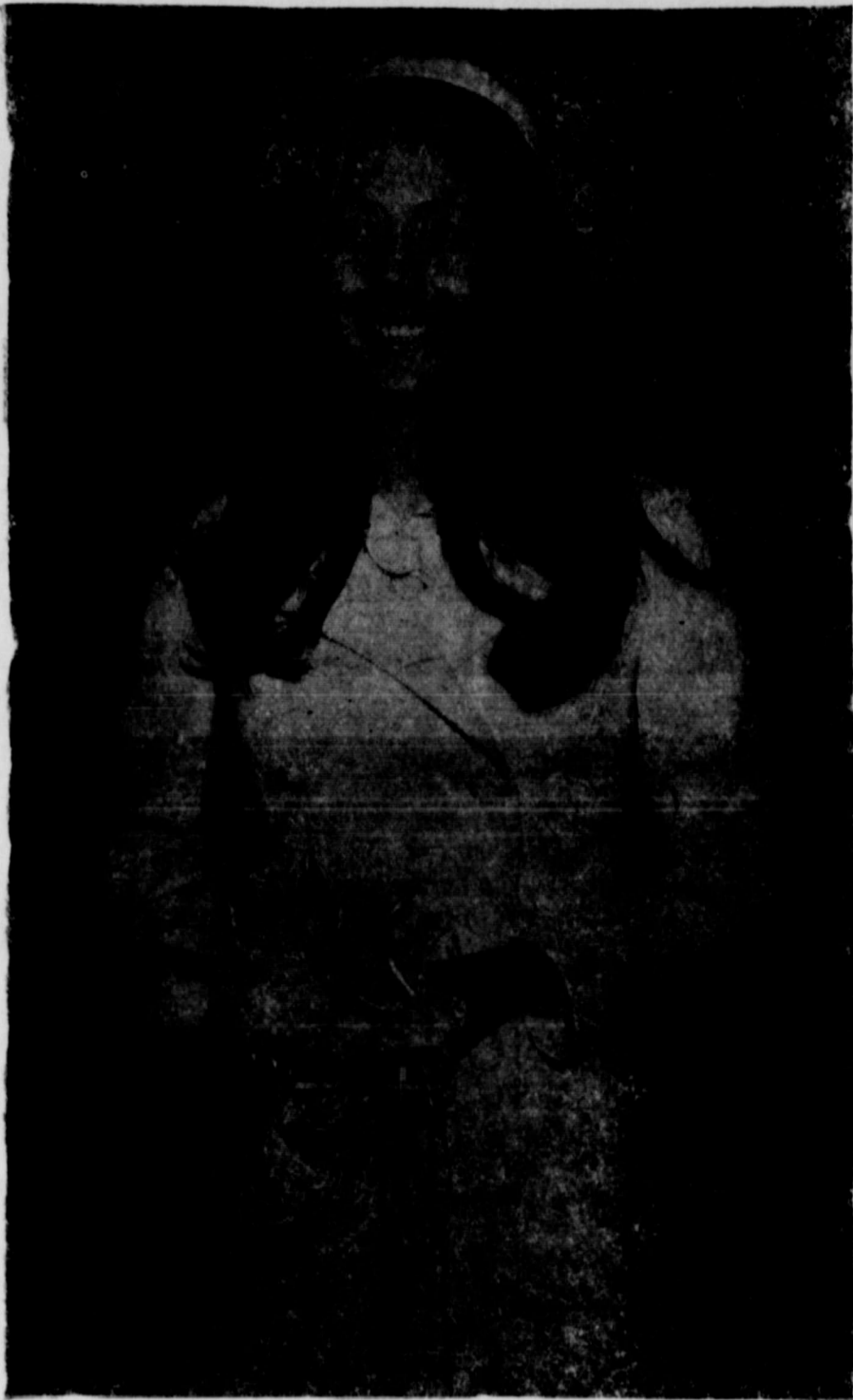

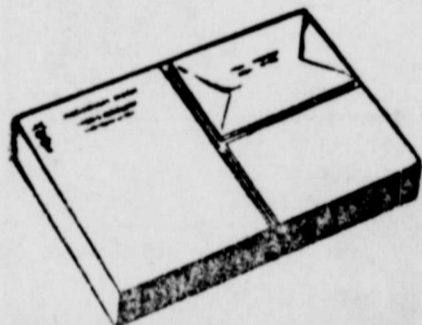
