Robert Lee Baptist Church will have a new pastor beginning Sunday, Oct. 21. The Rev. Roy Epperson, associate pastor of the First Baptist Church in Irving, has been called by the congregation to serve here. He will succeed the Rev. Bill Beaty, who resigned several weeks ago.

Epperson was born Aug. 13, 1938, at Loraine. He is married to the former Margaret Ann Feaster and they have three children, Melanie Ann, 6, Nikki Lynn, 4, and Stephen Roy, 7 months.

The new pastor is a graduate of Loraine High School and Howard Payne College where he majored in Bible and had minors in English and history. He then went to Southwestern Theological Seminary in Fort Worth and graduated with a master of divinity degree.

He was pastor of Liberty Baptist Church in Voca while at Howard Payne. He went to the Irving Church in 1965 and has served there since.

The family plans to move here Oct. 18.

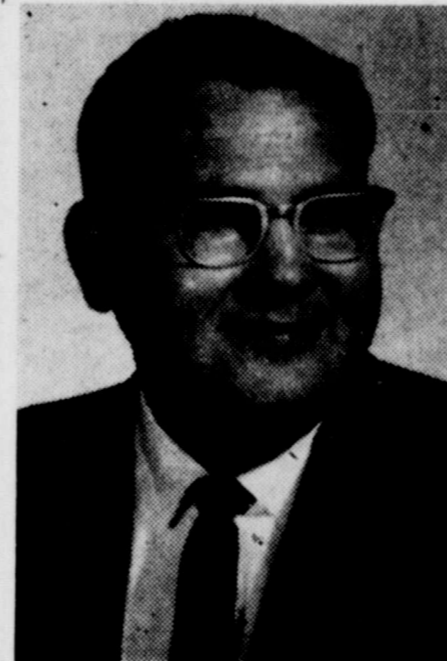

It was the first time Mrs. Roe had seen her parents since she left England 27 years ago with her new GI husband, J. L. Roe, of Robert Lee, Tex.

The Roes were married in England while he was stationed there in the military near the end of World War II. Their oldest child, a daughter, was born there and her grandmother said her granddaughter "was about 18 inches long the last time I saw her."

Mr. Potter, 72, and Mrs. Potter, 69, and the Kings came to Texas aboard a 747. King is an engineer with the British Atomic Energy Authority and Mrs. King is employed with the Ministry of Defense.

Mr. and Mrs. Potter celebrated their Golden Wedding Anniversary on Aug. 2, before they left home, but they found another celebration awaiting them in Robert Lee. Mrs. Roe and her children and Mrs. King prepared the second anniversary party. The Potters were lured out of the house to see a rattlesnake, and while they were gone, Mrs. Roe and the others decorated for the party. Upon the couple's return, the party was sprung on them and they were "quite suprised."

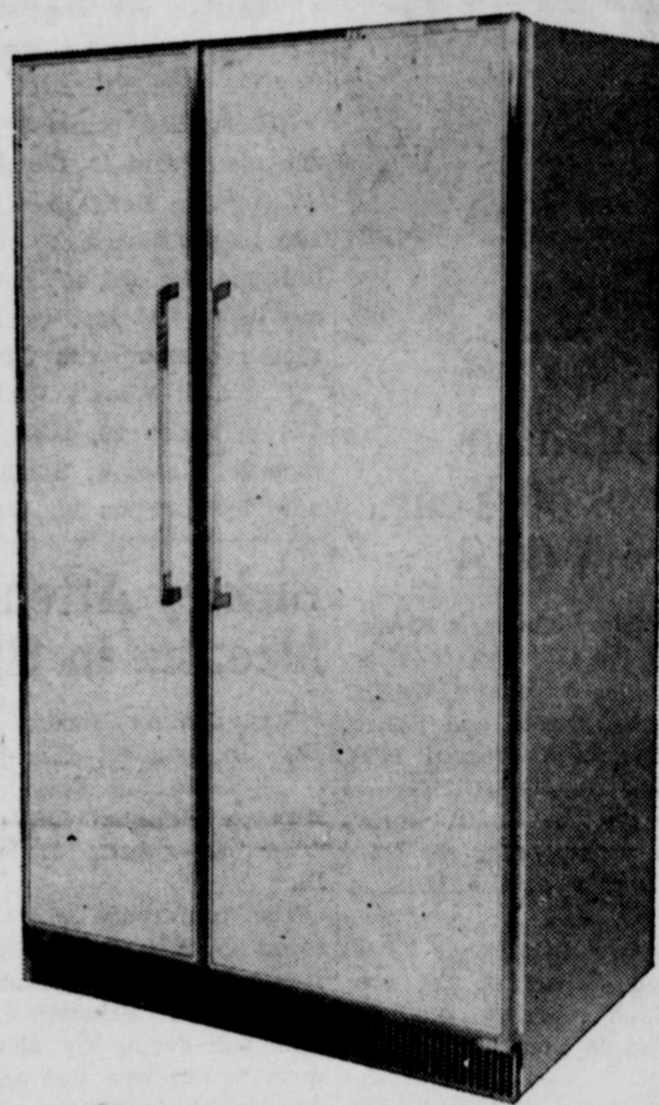

Mrs. Roe Attends Food Stamp Meet

Teaching local Food Stamp recipients "how to make the most of their stamps" was the subject of a two day meeting recently in Brady attended by Mrs. Fay C. Roe, Coke County Extension Agent.

More than 22 county Extension agents from throughout the area heard federal and state government agency representatives discuss food buying and nutrition, said Mrs. Roe.

"Representatives from the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Food and Nutrition Service explained how food stamp recipients can buy the nutritious foods necessary for a balanced diet without having to supplement their food stamp allotments.

"They also discussed the retailer role in the food stamp program," the agent said.

A Texas Department of Public Welfare representative told agents how the food stamp program is administered in Texas and outlined its operation as well as the requirements for obtaining food stamps.

Foods and nutrition specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, detailed food buying principles and demonstrated the preparation of nutritious, low cost foods, Mrs. Roe said.

Commenting on the Food Stamp program, the agent noted that prior to a year ago, some Texas counties, including Coke County, did not have Food Stamp programs. The program will become effective here Nov. 1.

"The Food Stamp program soon to start in Coke County includes plans for the educational phase to begin during late October," Mrs. Roe said.

"The educational phase—subject of the two day meeting—is designed to help limited income people utilize resources," she explained.

ASC Regulations Changed in Coke

Consolidation into a one-community county has been announced by the Coke County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) committee for the election of farmer committeemen and administration of federal farm programs by the committee members.

Commenting that it is essential to keep the farmer-elected committee system viable and responsive to needs, ASC county committee chairman James Allen said that the consolidation will provide several benefits, including the direct election of ASC county committeemen by farmers and ranchers.

Until this year, Coke County farmers voted for community committeemen, who in turn elected the county committee members. The county ASC committee has direct responsibility for administration of farm programs in Coke County.

Now three communities will be consolidated so that the county becomes, for ASC purposes, a one-community county. Coke County farmers will elect in a trial election in November one ASC committeeman and two alternates instead of three community committeemen and two alternates as in the past. Nominations for county committeemen are being accepted, beginning Oct. 4.

County ASC committeemen serve three year terms, with one committeeman elected each year. Alternates serve one year terms.

Allen pointed out that the community committee system in the county has gradually become obsolete as travel and communication facilities have improved, farm programs have been simplified and the number of farms reduced. The 1973 legislation in particular calls for far less administrative involvement in programs, and much ASCS business is now handled by mail.

"With fewer program regulations to explain and discuss with farmers handling their own decision making, the county committee will give farmers the same direct communication they have always had with their farm program agency," Allen said.

"I want to emphasize that consolidation into a one-community county strengthens the farmer-elected committee system here in Coke County," he added.

Numerous calls have come in to the office lately on ways to pickle jalapeno peppers. This recipe works well for me—we enjoy them all year in casseroles and as a pickle even though they are hot!

Pickled Jalapenos

Wash and pack tightly into hot jars the jalapeno peppers.

Combine in saucepan:

1 cup vinegar

¼ cup water

¼ cup olive oil

1 teaspoon salt

1 tablespoon mixed pickling spice

Bring to boil. Cover peppers with boiling hot liquid leaving ½ inch head space. Close jars and process in boiling water bath 10 minutes. Start to count processing time as soon as water returns to boiling.

To can in a water bath use tall container with lid and rack to keep jars off bottom of canner or pot. Seal jars, put into container of hot water, fill to ½ inch to 1 inch above top of jars. Bring to a full boil and boil as indicated in recipe. Remove jars with tongs and cool on table away from draft.

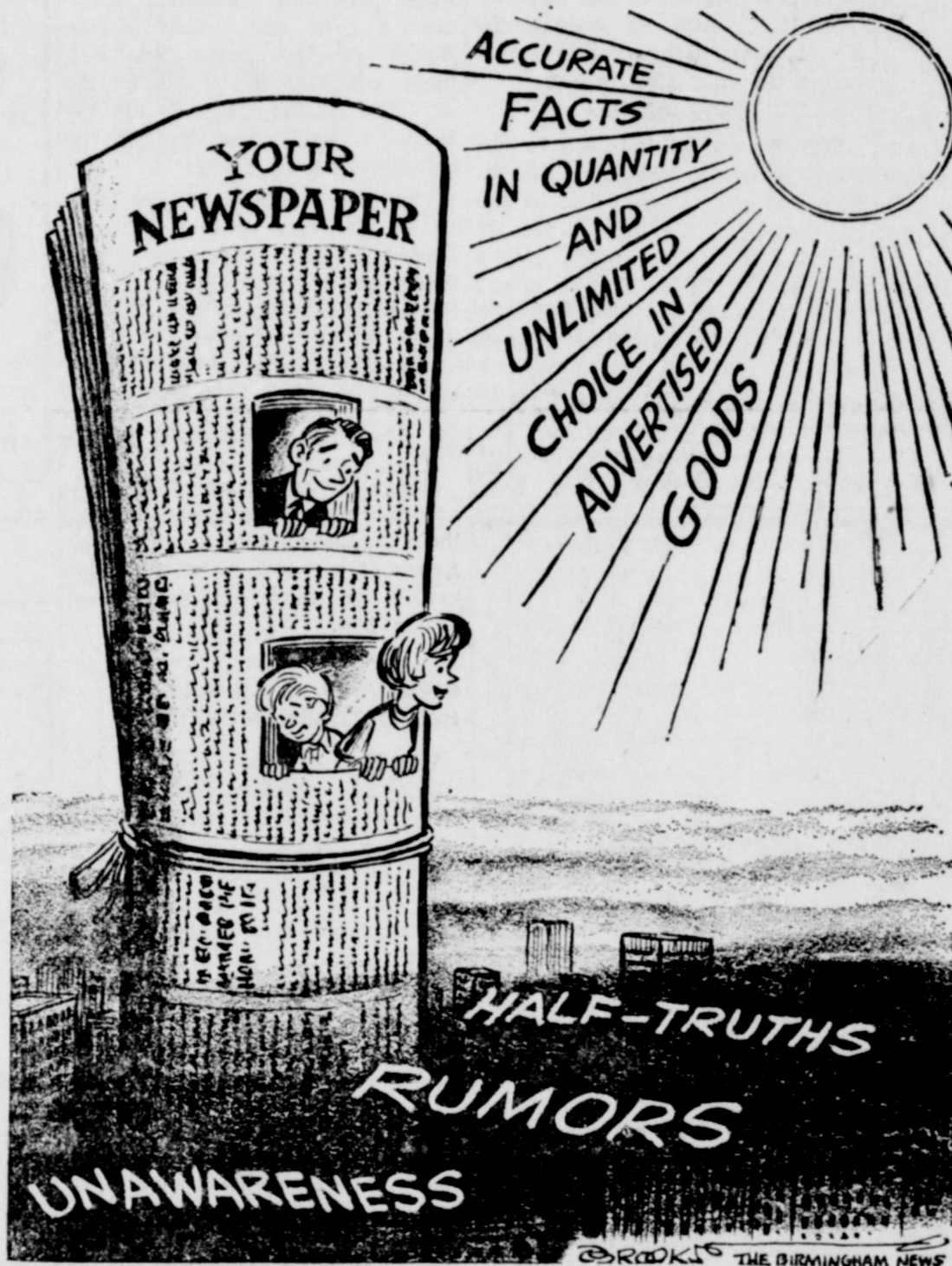
