## Coke Oil Activity Picking Up

### Funeral Service Held Here Saturday For Hawley Allen, Pioneer Lawman

Funeral services for Hawley Allen Sr., 96, were held at 2 p.m. Saturday in the Robert Lee Baptist Church with the Rev. Taylor Henley of San Angelo and the Rev. Roy Epperson, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Robert Lee Cemetery under direction of Robert Massie Funeral Home.

Mr. Allen died about 1:20 a.m. Friday in Shannon Hospital after surgery earlier last week for a broken hip.

His death ended a long and colorful career as a law enforcement officer, rancher and business man.

He was born Nov. 29, 1877, in Salado and moved to Coke County in 1889 with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Allen. He attended school at Hayrick and was married to Amelia C. Raway June 15, 1900.

The couple homesteaded seven sections of ranchland in Irion County in 1901. Before the turn of the century Mr. Allen worked for the Baker & Hagelstein ranch in Schleicher County for \$25 a month. He accumulated a few head of cattle, forming the basis for his ranching operation. He sold the Irion County ranch years ago and bought four sections in Coke County, which he still owned at the time of his death.

Mr. Allen was sheriff of Tom Green County for 10 years and filled the same office in Coke County for three years. He began his law officer career as a constable in 1908, served as Tom Green County sheriff from 1910 to 1920 and served as a deputy in Tom Green County. During his career as an officer, Mr. Allen made more than 3,000 arrests.

In addition to his law officer and ranching careers he operated a pharmacy in Robert Lee for several years.

He served as a director of Coke County Hospital, as a director for the Federal Land Bank and as a director of West Texas Boys Ranch. He was a member of the Coke County parole board at one time. He was a member of the Knights of Pythias, Macabees, Woodmen of the World and Hayrick Masonic Lodge.

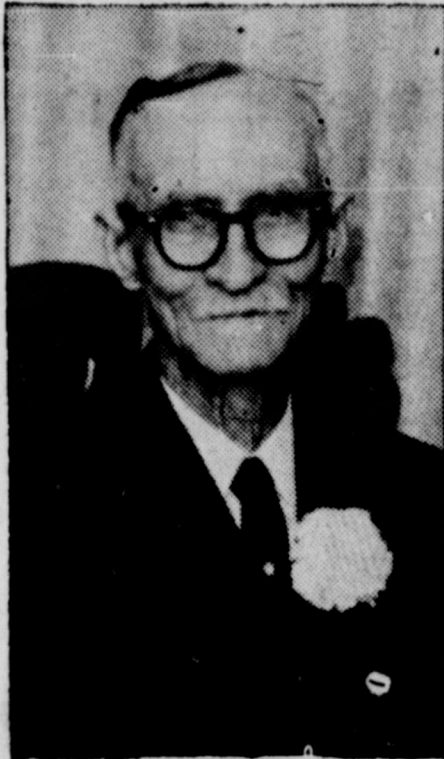
Survivors include his wife; three sons, Gerald Allen and Frank V. Allen of Robert Lee and Hawley Allen Jr. of San Angelo; two grandchildren, Bill Allen of Robert Lee and Lisa Allen of San Angelo; two great-grandchildren, Clay and Sterling Allen of Robert Lee.

Robert Lee's girls A team has won two games during the past week of district games but the boys didn't fare so well as they lost two.

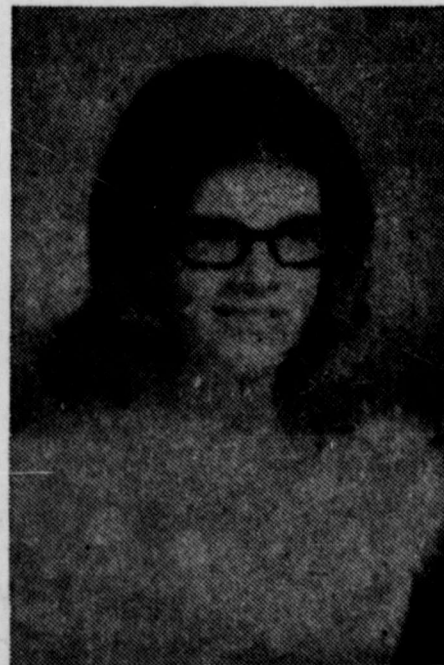
Last Friday night at Wall the girls won 54-34. Bickley was top scorer with 26.

Eldorado girls downed Wall 45-35 in the next game and then Eldorado boys whipped Bronte 37-33.

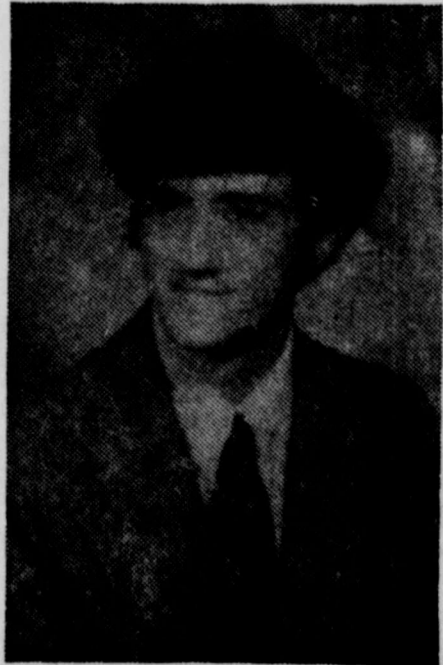

### Marker Dedication Scheduled Sunday

An Official Texas Historical Marker for Robert Lee Cemetery will be dedicated Sunday at 2 p.m. The program will be held in the Robert Lee School auditorium.

Sponsoring the event are the Coke County Historical Survey Committee and the Hayrick Masonic Lodge No. 696 of Robert Lee.

Supt. Jimmy Bickley will serve as master of ceremonies.

Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough, chairman of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee, said that everyone in the area has a cordial invitation to attend the special program.

Program for the event is given below.

The test was taken through a 12-64 inch choke and perforations at 5,817-22 feet. Earlier, after being acidized with 250 gallons, and fracture treated with 1,400 gallons and 1,400 pounds, it flowed 90 barrels of load oil in nine hours.

On a two hour and 30 minute drillstem test at 5,738-60 feet it recovered 4,200 feet of gas in the drillpipe, 60 feet of gas cut mud and 10 feet of oil and gas cut mud. On a one hour and 15 minute test at 5,820-53 feet, it recovered 218 feet of gas, 732 feet of gas cut mud and 244 feet of slightly oil and gas cut mud.

Located 18 miles northwest of Robert Lee, it spots 1,980 feet from the southwest and 467 feet from the northwest lines of V, Homman Survey 522.

Sixth producer and a northeast extension to the Lygay Field has been assured at Bill H. McWilliams No. 1 Central National Bank. It flowed 20 barrels of oil per hour. Flow was through a 24-64 inch choke and perforations at 5,816-832 feet, which had been fractured with 15,000 gallons and 9,000 pounds of sand.

The new producer is 18 miles northwest of Robert Lee in Joseph Liemuller Survey No. 523.

Daily potential was gagaged at 192 barrels of 44 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 1,288-1.

Shenandoah Oil Corp. of Fort Worth No. 1 Masonic Home recovered five feet of free 40 gravity oil, 30 feet of slightly gas and

**STRETCH YOUR FOOD DOLLAR WITH NUTRITIOUS PASTA AND MEAT MAIN DISHES**

Proteins, most commonly found in the meat group of foods, are the basic building blocks of nutrition. The entire family, from baby to grandpa, depends on them for bodily growth and repair. Since main dishes frequently include meat (fish and poultry are a part of the meat group) they are a principal source of protein, and because of this the wise homemaker will give them special consideration.

Three other good groups, in addition to meat, also need to be included in the daily menu. A mini daily requirement guide may help you balance your family's meals nutritionally.

Meat: Daily—2 or more servings  
 Bread-Cereal: Daily — 4 or more servings

Vegetables-Fruit: Daily — 4 or more servings

Milk, Children under 9: Daily — 2 to 3 cups

Children 9 to 12: Daily—3 to 5 cups

Adults: Daily—2 or more cups  
 Unfortunately, the important meat group is the most expensive one in the family food budget. The average American family spends one-third of each food dollar for the meat group, according to United States Government sources.

If, like most folks, you're fighting to keep the budget down, try pastas. Pastas, such as macaroni, spaghetti and lasagna, belong to the bread-cereal group and are both nutritious and inexpensive. They offer a thrifty way to combine good nutrition and economy because they unite well with the meat group in casseroles, stews, hearty soups and skillet dinners. Try balancing your family's budget, and your meals, with these hearty, nutritious pasta meat-extender combinations.

**ON WINTER HEATING**

1. For savings on energy, set the thermostat on the temperature setting that provides adequate comfort (the President suggests 68°). Don't continually switch it up and down. Remember, the lower you set the thermostat in the winter the more money you save on energy.
2. A routine service inspection by a qualified service man is advisable prior to the heating season. Follow the manufacturers recommendations on this. Clean filters keep the heating unit operating at maximum efficiency and economy. Filters are the most neglected part of any forced-air heating system.
3. A wood burning fireplace should be equipped with an efficient damper. Be sure to keep the damper closed when not in use. A chimney with the damper open carries warm air out the house, wasting heat.
4. To decrease heat loss and reduce energy cost in rooms that are not in use at night or in extremely cold weather, draw the draperies and lower the shades over the windows, glass panels and doors. If the sun is shining on glass areas, open the draperies. The sun shining through the glass will supply additional heat at no cost.
5. Some wall heaters have fan-forced circulation. To clean, turn the unit "OFF". Blow dust out of unit with vacuum exhaust attachment. Clean the grill cover with a vacuum or warm detergent water.
6. Proper insulation and weather stripping will make your home more comfortable. It will help keep dust and dirt from blowing in, and will help to eliminate cold drafts in the winter time, thus saving money on your heating bill.

**ALIEN ADDRESS INFO DECLARED CONFIDENTIAL**

According to Joe F. Staley of the San Antonio Immigration and Naturalization Service office, the information furnished by aliens in reporting their addresses has been declared confidential by statute.

These reports must be submitted during January each year by all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions. Forms on which to submit the reports are available at any post office or office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Persons who are unable to pick up a form because of illness, or other reasons, may have a relative or friend obtain a card for them.

The card should have an 8 cents stamp affixed and placed in the mail.

Parents or guardians of aliens under 14 years of age submit reports for such children.

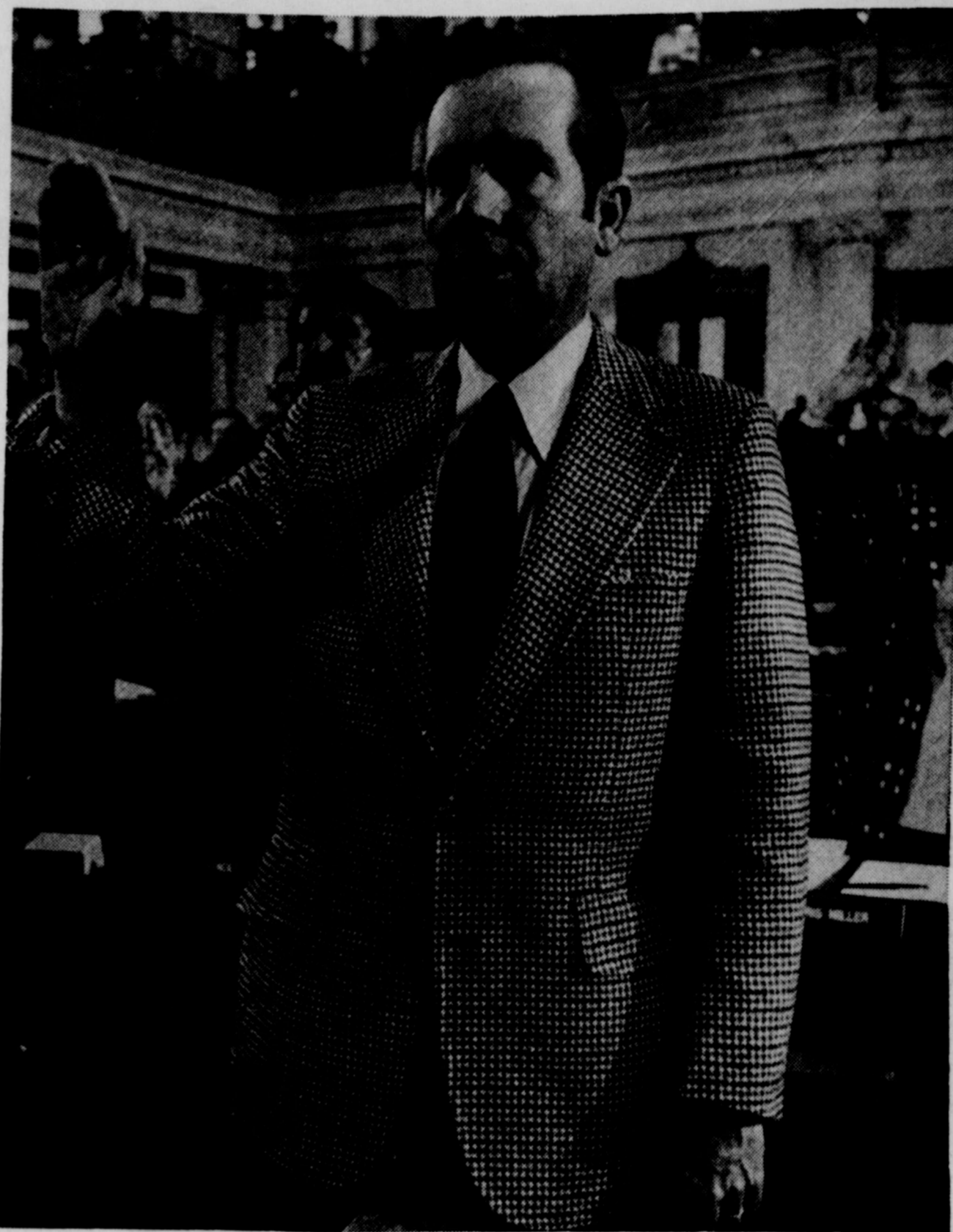
Miss Carter was born Nov. 10, 1944, and was a secretary.

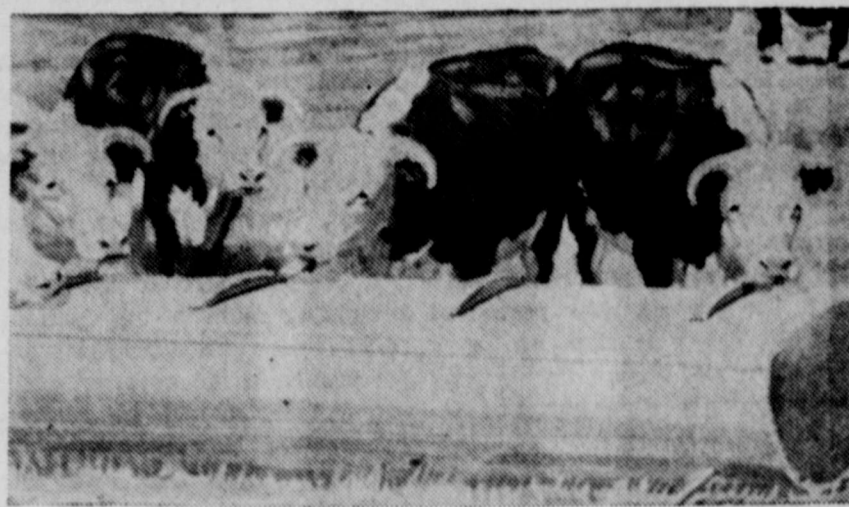

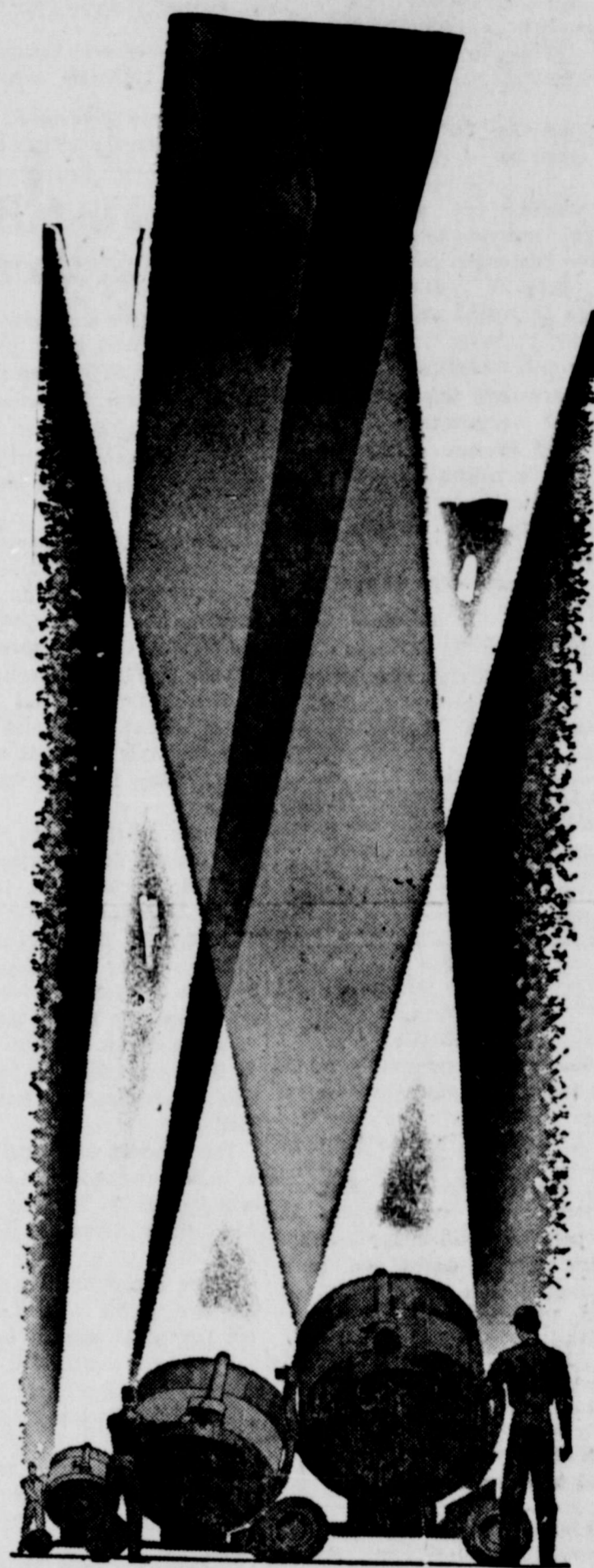
