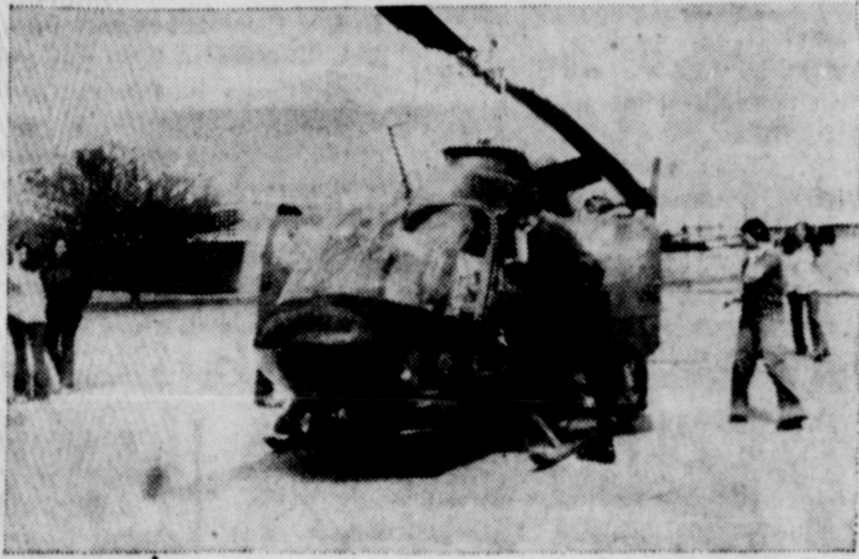

## Car License Tag Deadline Nears

The deadline for purchasing new 1974 license tags is fast approaching and will be here Sunday, March 31. The law provides that all vehicles must have the new tags by April 1, 1974 (midnight).

County Tax Assessor-Collector O. B. Jacobs has announced that his office will stay open Saturday so the new tags can be purchased before the deadline.

Tuesday, it was reported 2,000 tags had been sold but Jacobs said he expected to sell a lot more this week.

The new tags are made up of red lettering on a reflecting white background.

Persons buying license plates are asked to bring the three part application they received through the mail. If no application was received, they should take their titles and last year's receipts.

## Absentee Voting Okay Thru April 2

Absentee voting will continue through April 2 for the April city, school and hospital elections.

Persons wishing to vote absentee in the city election may do so at the City Hall. Absentee voting for school trustees is being held at the school tax office and absentee votes for hospital board members may be cast at the county clerk's office in the courthouse.

## Progress Made On Show Barn

Construction of a new county show barn and exhibit building in Robert Lee is progressing right along with an estimated 58 per cent of the work completed.

Coke County commissioners accepted a bid of \$140,674 in November from J. D. Burk Construction Co. of San Angelo to build the show barn and exhibit building here and a community center in Bronte.

The projects will be financed with federal revenue sharing funds. Approximately \$90,000 will be used on the show barn and \$50,000 on the community center.

The buildings are of metal construction. The arena in the exhibit project will be 50x60 feet; the exhibit hall, kitchen, rest rooms, etc. will be 50x80 feet and the wings will be 50x72 feet.

Work on the show barn was delayed until after the livestock show in January. Contract calls for completion of the job in 160 working days.

## Ice Coat Ushers In Spring Season

The first day of Spring was ushered in last week with a rapid moving cold front that brought temperatures down below the freezing mark, even though the faithful mesquites had already budded out. The last official day of winter was a summery day with readings in the 90's. The warm days had caused vegetation to green up and fruit trees to bloom out before the northern slipped in with spring.

Another blast of cold air came through late Saturday, accompanied by rolling thunder, some rain and sleet, leaving a coating of ice on everything for Sunday morning. Temperatures stayed in the 30s all day Sunday.

A warming trend Monday started the mercury on the rise again under partly cloudy skies. Cloudy, misty weather was back Tuesday morning. Tuesday afternoon and Wednesday convinced people that spring was returning.

Now everyone is wondering if this area has had its traditional Easter spell or if there is more cold weather to come before Easter arrives April 14.

Precipitation received the first week of spring was light with .15 inch recorded, bringing the total for the year to .96 inch.

Reports are that over all, not more than 10 per cent of the fruit escaped the cold weather, as temperatures dropped to 27 and 28 degrees.

The first day of spring in 1970 brought a big snow to this area, and on March 31 and April 1 in 1972, the mercury fell to 27 and 30 degrees with heavy frost.

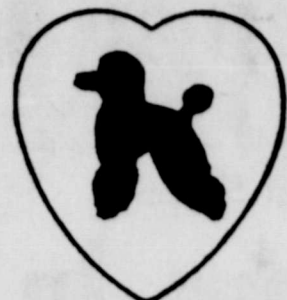

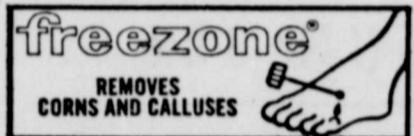

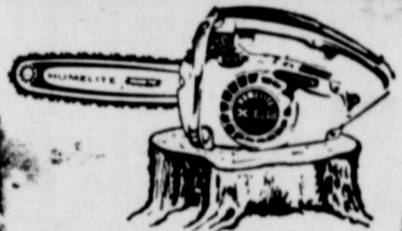

**LEGAL NOTICE**

**Pork Referendum and Producer Board Election**

Being certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture of the State of Texas for this purpose, the Texas Pork Producers Association, 2422 Taho, Sherman, Texas 75090, proposes a referendum election on May 14, 1974 under provision of Article 55c, Vernon's Civil Statutes, on the proposition of whether or not the pork producers in the State of Texas shall assess themselves a maximum amount of 10 cents per head on all slaughter animals to be collected at the point of first processing or sale and to elect members of a 15 member commodity producers board to administer proceeds of such assessment to be used for research, predator control, disease and insect control, education, and promotion designed to encourage the production, marketing, and use of pork.

The referendum and election will be held by mail ballot which will be provided to all eligible voters not later than 15 days prior to the election. Ballots

must be mailed to the polling place at Sherman, Texas before midnight on the date of the election.

Any person within this state engaged in the business of producing, or causing to be produced slaughter hogs for commercial purposes is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers, if such person would be required to pay the assessment proposed.

Any person qualified to vote at the referendum may place his name in nomination for membership on the proposed commodity producers board by application to the above organization signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in the referendum. Such applications must be filed at least 30 days prior to the election date.

Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot prior to April 30, 1974 may obtain one at his local County Agent's Office.

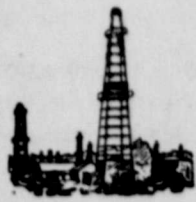

No. 1-B-68 J. W. Johnson is located 2,160 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east lines of Section 68, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 58 1/2 barrels of 45 gravity oil. Flow was through a 10-64 inch choke and perforations at 6,540-58 feet, which was treated with 1,000 gallons of acid and fractured with 19,000 pounds of sand.

Total depth was 6,763 feet, plugged back to 6,674 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 12,229-1.

The other new producer is No. 2-79 W. C. Blanks, spotting 890 feet from the north and 1,990 feet from the west lines of Section 79, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

The well had a daily potential of 35 barrels of 45 gravity oil flowing through a 10-64 inch choke. Production is from perforations at 6,295-338 feet, acidized and fractured as was 1-B-68 Johnson. Total depth is 6,380 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 8,575-1.

Exxon Corp. filed application to plug back to 5,345 feet to test the Gardner at a project four miles south of Blackwell in the Fort Chadbourne, West Field.

It is No. 67-F Saflis Odem. Account 2, located on a 533 acre lease. Site is 3,641 feet from the southeast and 2,650 feet from the southwest lines of Seth Clark Survey 475. It is a former Gray Sand producer drilled to a total depth of 5,453 feet.

### Voter Guidelines Answer Questions

(Editor's note: The following article was submitted by Mrs. Cumbie Ivey Jr., Coke County Democratic chairman, in hopes that it will clarify questions which voters may have concerning the forthcoming Primary and General Elections.)

Due to changes in recent years in the Texas Election Code, listed below are some VOTER GUIDELINES. Please check carefully these requirements to see if you are properly registered in the Precinct and County of your present residence.

1. Register to vote at least 30 days prior to the Democratic Primary, which is May 4, 1974.
2. All registered voters, 18 years and older, are eligible to vote in all Democratic Party elections.
3. Present registrations are valid if you voted in a Democratic Primary or a General Election within the last three years.
4. Register to vote at your County Tax Assessor-Collector's office or with a properly deputized person allowed to register voters.
5. Notify your County Tax Assessor-Collector of change of address five days prior to election day so that you are registered in the proper precinct, if you have moved within the county.
6. On moving from one county to another, you must re-register 30 days prior to the election, if you wish to vote in your new place of residence.
7. On April 14, 1974, the absentee voting for the first primary by personal appearance at the County Clerk's office begins and goes through the fourth day preceding the election.
8. Applications for absentee voting for the first primary must be received by the County Clerk not later than the close of business on April 30, 1974.
9. Marked absentee ballots for the first primary must be mailed back to the County Clerk and post-marked not later than midnight on May 3, 1974, and received in the County Clerk's office before 1:00 p.m. on election day, May 4, 1974.

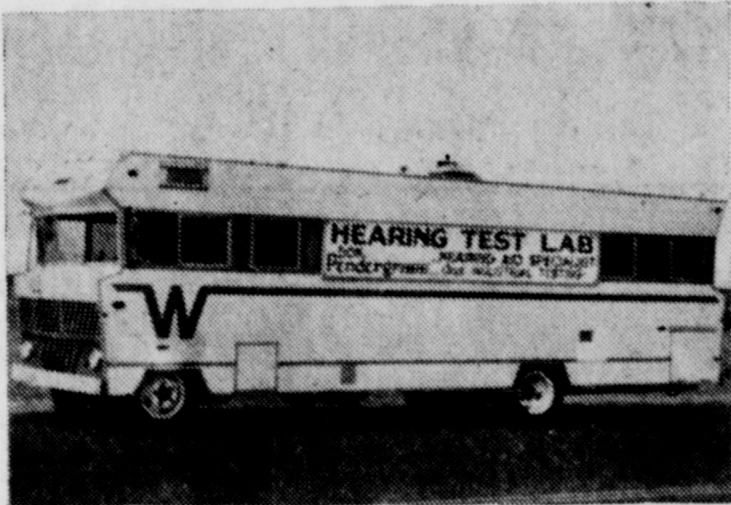
