## Some Damage Done - But Good Rains Fall Saturday

### 64 Golf Teams In Tournament

Sixty-four golf teams will be in Robert Lee this weekend for the Annual Partnership Tournament at Mountain Creek Golf Course. The tournament is a 36 hole, low ball contest. The teams are divided into four flights with 16 teams each.

### Only 347 Vote In 2nd Primary

Only 347 of the 2154 registered voters in Coke County cast their ballots in Saturday's Second Primary Election.

In the race for U. S. Representative, District 21, Nelson W. Wolff carried Coke County with 200 votes to Robert "Bob" Krueger's 146, but over the entire 21st District, Krueger came out the winner with 51.55 per cent of the votes to Wolff's 48.45, according to Texas Election Bureau figures.

In the May 4 Democratic Primary, Krueger polled 297 votes to Wolff's 235 in Coke County.

Krueger now faces Doug Harlan, a San Antonio Republican, in the General Election Nov. 5. Harlan won his party's nomination over three other candidates without a runoff in May.

The other race on the ballot was between Michael H. Ezzell and C. Glenn Toombs for State Representative, District 63, with Ezzell receiving 224 votes in Coke County to Toombs' 118. Ezzell won the nomination for the 63rd seat in the six county district and will face Republican John (Rich) Anderson of Gail in the November election.

In the May 4 Primary, Toombs received 412 votes and Ezzell 338 in Coke County.

### 11 Year Old Lad Drowns in Spence

Arvil Glenn Boshell, 11, of Andrews, drowned about 3 p.m. Tuesday in Lake Spence. The accident occurred north of Duncan's Fish-A-Rama while the family was on a fishing outing.

It was reported that he and a younger sister were wading in the water and stepped off into deep water. The boy's stepfather, William Kuykendall, was able to rescue the girl but could not get to the boy in time to save him. The lad could not swim.

Sheriff Doug Robertson, Deputy J. Lee Ensor, Game Warden R. L. Flanagan and lake patrolmen were called to the scene. The body was recovered in 10 feet of water about 3:45 p.m. by A. D. Barton of Odessa and Bob E. Wilson of Big Spring who were fishing at Lake Spence. Young Boshell was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Roy P. Ross.

His mother was treated for shock at West Coke County Hospital.

The boy was born Jan. 10, 1963, in Seminole. He was a student in Andrews schools.

Survivors include his stepfather and mother, Mr. and Mrs. William Kuykendall; two sisters and his grandparents.

Newby Funeral Home was in charge of local arrangements. The body was taken to Singleton Funeral Home in Andrews Tuesday night.

Robert Lee had turbulent thunderstorms Friday night and again Saturday night, and was hit by high winds which did considerable damage over town and surrounding areas.

The rain Friday night was heavier in the south part of town where over an inch was reported. Following the 20 minute, hard rain, water was running deep in the streets.

More turbulent weather Saturday night brought another inch of rain to parts of Robert Lee, with lighter amounts in other parts of town. Some hail was reported.

Sanco received 1.5 inches of rain Saturday night. The Saturday night a week before they got quite a bit of hail along with an inch of rain.

Silver had from 2 to 3 inches of rain Saturday night, accompanied by high winds and hail that ruined gardens, stripped trees and broke window panes. The hard rain filled stock tanks.

City Water Supt. Sherman Williams reported the City Lake caught about five feet of water over the weekend from rains. Water is being pumped to the City Lake from Lake Spence and Williams said this will continue at least through this month. Further use of the temporary line from Spence will depend on the water situation at that time. The line was completed late last Wednesday.

It was reported to the Observer that Lake Spence caught enough runoff from the rains to raise its level about 4 inches.

The courthouse rain measurement for the weekend was 1.81, bringing the total for the year to 6.71 inches.

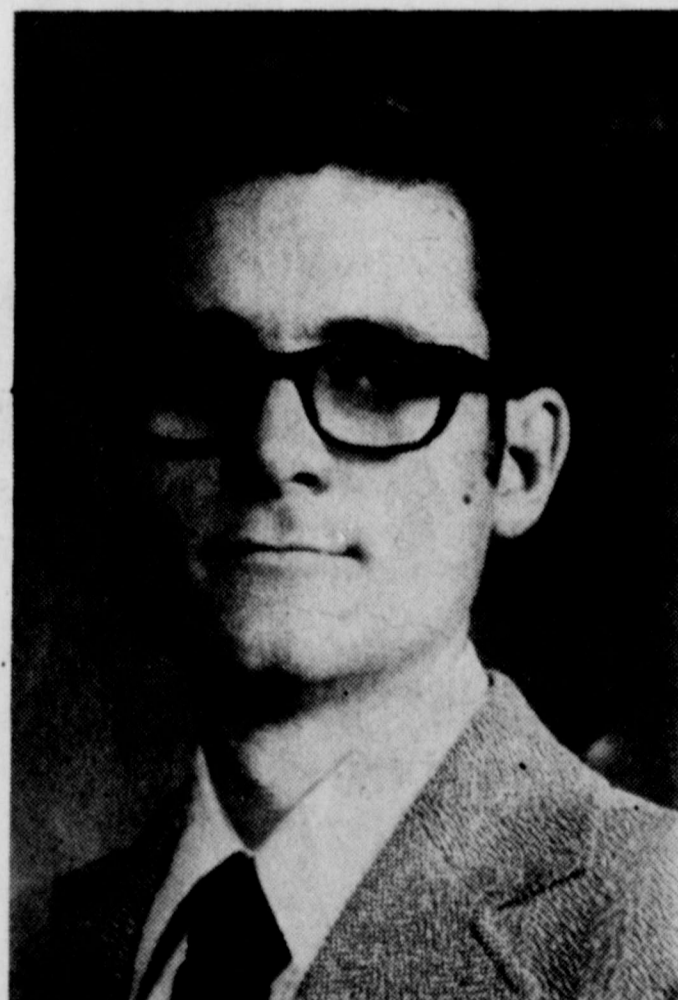

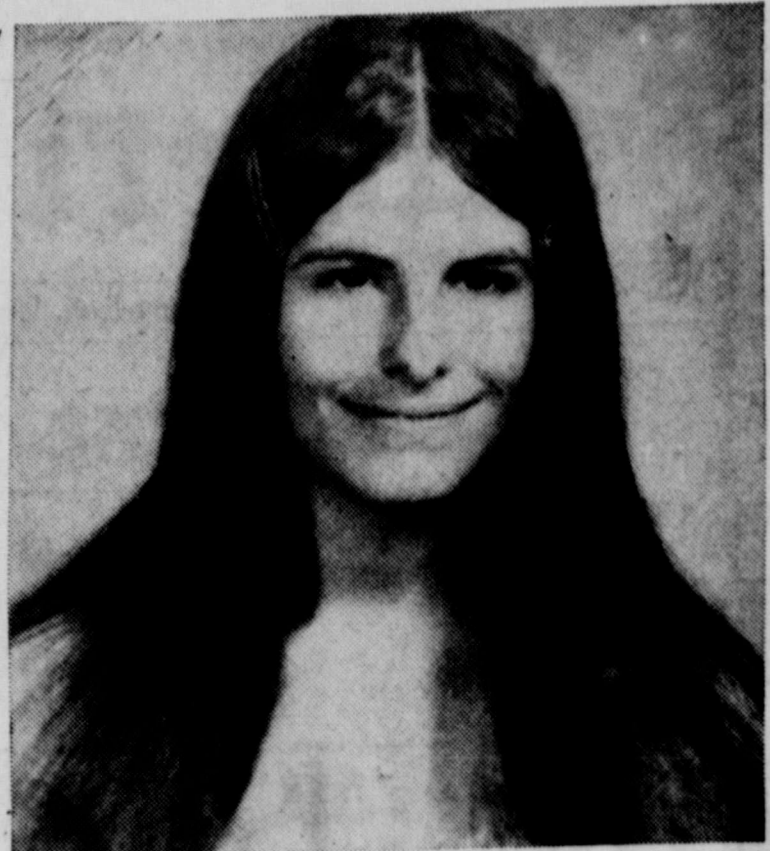
Susan Gail Prentice and Gary W. Hanna to Wed

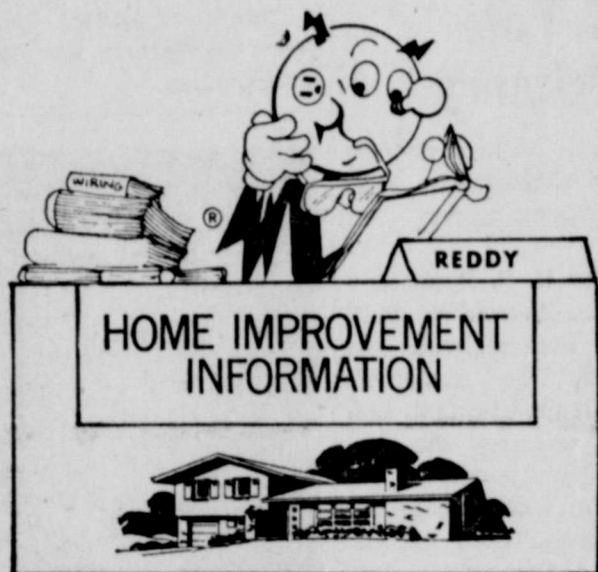

Oil Field**

The I.A.B., South (Canyon oil) field of Coke County has gained its eighth producer and a location east extension on the south side with the completion of I. W. Lovelady, Millard, No. 1 Canwell. It is located 9 1/2 miles west-northwest of Robert Lee. Daily pumping potential was 51.38 barrels of oil, plus 96 barrels of water, and gas at the rate of 60,000 cubic feet per day.

Production was through perforations at 5,841-51 feet, which has been acidized with 5,000 gallons.

Location is 467 feet from the north and 2,186 feet from the east lines of 183-2-H&TC.

**Pruitt Resigns  
From Committee**

The Coke County Democratic Executive Committee met Tuesday afternoon at the Courthouse to canvass the vote in the Second Democratic Primary election which was held last Saturday.

During the business meeting, the resignation of Noah Pruitt Sr. was received, with regret, by the committee. Mr. Pruitt has served as precinct judge for many years and has been very active in the Democratic Party.

Mrs. Willie B. Millikin of Bronte was appointed by a unanimous vote of the committee to serve as judge of Precinct 4.

Mr. Pruitt said he helped hold an election for the first time in 1948. Since that time he has served either as judge or assistant judge in every Democratic Primary.

He said he didn't resign his position because he didn't like the work or the people with whom he worked, but because he felt the precinct needed a younger person to serve as precinct committeeman and election judge.

Mrs. Millikin has assisted in the conduct of elections for a number of years, and the county committee felt she was well qualified to take over the job.

## Reservists to Work On Civil Defense

Residents of Coke County are being urged to cooperate later this month with Army Reservists who are seeking to improve the county Civil Defense plan through a "domestic action" project.

A nine man team from the 490th Civil Affairs Co., Army Reserve unit headquartered in Abilene, will be working with Civil Defense and other officials in Robert Lee and Bronte between June 16-29 to locate and classify all shelter areas which would be available for use in the event of a nuclear or natural disaster, such as a tornado.

Heading up the team working in Coke County, as well as other 490th teams working in Coleman and Nolan counties, will be Capt. Allen Clendennen, who lives in Robert Lee. He has commuted to the 490th's monthly drills for four years, serving as the unit's transportation officer.

Bob Lange of Robert Lee and Fred Alley of Bronte, local Civil Defense directors, have pledged their support to the Reservists and expressed appreciation for the civic action project designed to aid the two communities.

The Civil Defense directors joined Capt. Clendennen in asking local citizens to cooperate with the Reservists conducting the survey. "We would like to classify all public buildings, churches, schools and private shelters, to see how many persons could be protected in case of a real emergency, Capt. Clendennen said.

The team also will be working with law enforcement officials and "ham" and Citizens Band radio operators to form an emergency or alternate communications network, he said.

Results of the survey will be turned over to the Civil Defense directors for incorporation into their disaster plans, the officer said.

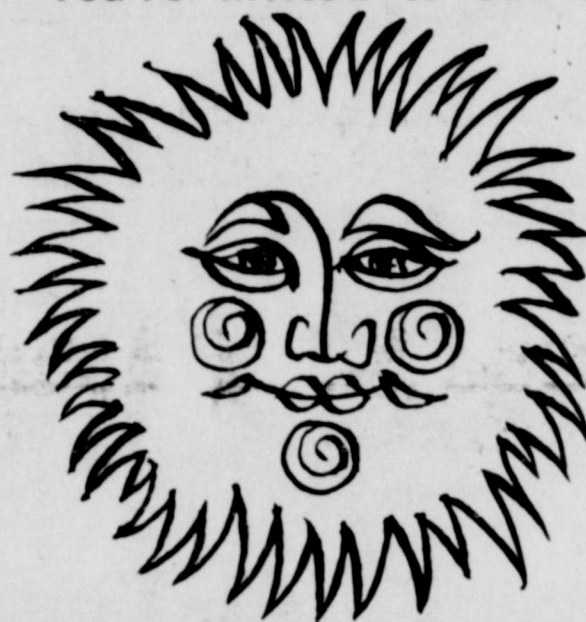

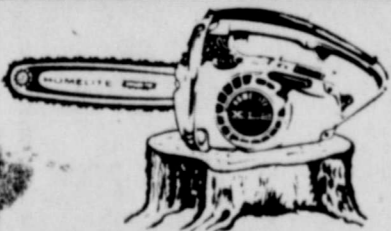
