Citizens Complain Of Water Quality

A group of citizens met with the City Council Monday night to discuss the quality of water in Robert Lee. The visitors complained about impurities and high bacteria count in the water and presented laboratory reports on

water samples which had been tested.

Some illnesses have been attributed to impure water.

The city has taken up the temporary pipe line which was used for a month to pump water from Lake Spence to Mountain Creek Reservoir. Reason for discontinuing use of the line is that cost has to be paid by the month, regardless of how many days it is used. City officials are hopeful the amount of water now available will last until the new permanent line from Lake Spence can be finished.

The city is still waiting on delivery of pipe for the permanent line.

Bloodworth Receives Citation

William Allen Bloodworth, son of Rev. and Mrs. H. L. Bloodworth of Silver, has recently received a meritorious honor award from the U. S. Agency for International Development, Department of State, for his outstanding agricultural work in Nepal.

The award speaks of his "outstanding devotion and dedication to the interests of the small hill farmers of Nepal in helping them develop, at minimum public expense, corn varieties which meet local needs and contribute to the welfare and nutrition of the Nepalese people" and says "Mr. Bloodworth has contributed in a distinctly superior manner to the agricultural requirements of small hill Nepalese farmers since his assignment to Nepal in August 1969."

Bloodworth was assigned to work with the Parwanipur Research Station which features rice research but has also made major contributions in applied research and multiplication of wheat, corn, horticulture, sugar cane, fish and poultry. One of Bloodworth's major responsibilities was to assist the Extension Service of four districts to increase crop production by extend-

ing research and information materials to the farmers.

These four districts lie in one of the many areas of Nepal where corn is a major crop and where the welfare of the farm family depends heavily upon the success of the season's corn crop.

In 1970 the Nepal Ministry of Agriculture was recommending three varieties of corn primarily on the basis of improved yield over "local" varieties at various research farms. Bloodworth soon found that farmers were unwilling to settle for increased yield alone. They also wanted varieties that would stand well (free from stalk rot); had long, tight husk cover to reduce field damage by birds and rain; had a hard, flinty grain for resistance to weevil damage in storage; and matured early to permit the planting of other crops.

Encouraged by the director of the Nepal Department of Agricultural Education and Research, the chief of the Agronomy Section, and other enthusiastic associates in the Ministry of Agriculture, Bloodworth set about developing, with his counterparts, a corn variety to meet these specifications. Assistance came from many

sources including CIMMYT, Rockefeller Foundation, USDA, USAID, local farmers, Peace Corps volunteers, American seed companies, Nepali official and local travelers.

Part of the AID compound at Hetaura where Bloodworth lived became a branch of the research station for corn breeding purposes. He acquired adjoining plots of land as needed and personally hired gardeners to do the work.

Corn germ plasma from all over Nepal, plus Pakistan, Burma, India, Australia, Thailand, Indonesia, Mexico, United States, Cuba, Guatemala, West Indian Islands, Argentina, Philippines and perhaps others have been used to build the farmers' variety. In 1972 the Nepal Ministry of Agriculture recognized and officially named the new variety "Hetaura Composite."

Now the Opaque-2 or high lysine gene is being bred into the Hetaura Composite variety, but other technicians will continue this work in Nepal, as Bloodworth is retiring from AID and returning to Texas to live after having spent 22 years in foreign service with AID and predecessor organizations.

A committee meeting will be held Tuesday at 8 p.m. in the vocational ag building at Bronte to make plans for the forthcoming horse show.

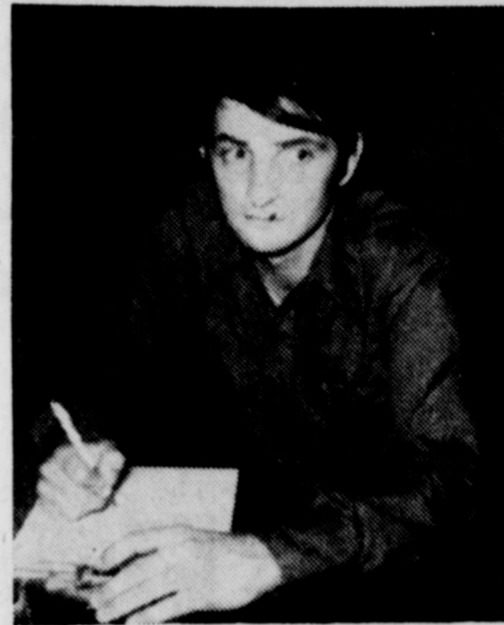

Tennyson P. O. Has 80th Birthday

Seventy-nine persons registered Wednesday when the 80th anniversary of the Tennyson Post Office was observed with an all day open house.

Mrs. W. T. Green, immediate past postmaster, served coffee, donuts and soft drinks to guests all during the day and sandwiches were served at noon.

The Tennyson Post Office was established June 26, 1894 with Sarah Kiser first postmaster.

Other postmasters and the dates they began are: Jane M. Byrd, Sept. 21, 1899; John T. Daniell, Feb. 26, 1909; Emory A. Bell, June 1, 1920; Joseph L. Howell, April 30, 1921; Mrs. Gladys Vanzandt, Aug. 21, 1937.

Mrs. Betty P. Green was sworn in as clerk Dec. 15, 1942 and became acting postmaster Jan. 3, 1943 and received her commission March 31, 1943.

Present postmaster William J. "Bill" Green was named officer in charge July 1, 1972, and received his commission Jan. 20, 1973.
