Rotan Man Drowns Saturday at Spence

David Klepper, 59, of Rotan drowned Saturday afternoon in the Wildcat Creek area of Lake Spence while trying to recover a boat that had drifted from shore.

Justice of the Peace Roy Ross ruled accidental drowning as cause of death.

Mr. Klepper's body was recovered at 1:25 p.m., almost an hour after the accident occurred at

12:30 p.m.

According to Sheriff Douglas Robertson, Mr. Klepper was accompanied by his brother-in-law, Lee Everheart. The pair reportedly had pulled up to the shore in their boat and had gotten out when the boat began drifting off. Mr. Klepper swam out, fully clothed, to get the boat and went under, according to witnesses.

The body was taken to Newby Funeral Home and later transferred to Weathersbee Funeral Home in Rotan.

Funeral services were held Tuesday in the First United Methodist Church of Rotan with burial following in Bellview Cemetery.

He was born Sept. 15, 1914, in Fisher County and was married to Yvonne Finch in Roby on Dec. 24, 1938. He had been employed by National Gypsum Co. in Rotan since 1941.

Survivors include his wife, three sons, one daughter, a sister, and five grandchildren.

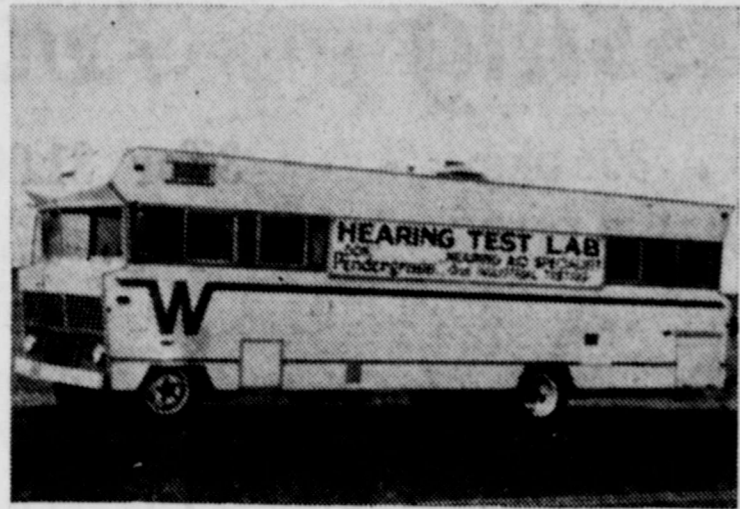
