Coke Clubs Observe National 4-H Week

Coke County joins Texas and the nation in recognizing 4-H'ers during National 4-H Club Week, Oct. 6-12.

To date all clubs in the county have been reorganized and club members have indicated projects of interest to them.

Membership in the clubs numbers 250. Clubs in Coke County are Bronte Junior, Robert Lee Junior, Bronte Senior and Robert Lee Future Leaders 4-H Clubs.

Club members may choose from some 50 projects and may work in groups or with a parent. Some of the areas of interest in the past have been foods and nutrition, photography, clothing and child development. Approximately 50 boys and girls will have animal feeding projects this year with about 150 animals on feed. Another active group is the 4-H Horse Unit with 30 members and honorary mem-

bers on the club roll. Individual projects carried out by many members include areas such as dog care, small engines, and horse health and care. **Continued on Page 4**

ed proposed expenditures of \$557,555.89 for the year. This figure is a little more than \$58,000 over the \$499,517.39 which is expected to come into the county treasury.

Spending more than will be taken in, according to County Auditor Weldon Fikes, will be caused primarily by expending money for permanent improvements. The improvements (including the new show barn and recreation center at Robert Lee and the new community center at Bronte) were undertaken with the idea of paying for them with federal funds. I will take more than this year's federal revenue sharing to make the payments, and a lot of it's remain with the new Ford administration's policy on federal fund sharing. Consequently, the county government will be a little in the red next year, even if federal funds come through; and the red ink will get even heavier

if the new President should cut federal revenue sharing.

Various funds of the county show the following figures:

Jury fund (a very stable fund which requires little additional revenue each year): available resources, \$18,549.02; approved expenditures, \$2,225.00; ending balance, \$16,324.02.

Road and bridge fund (which also includes farm to market and lateral road funds): available resources, \$297,682.92; approved expenditures, \$192,400.20; ending balance, \$105,282.72.

General fund: available resources, \$229,341.06; approved expenditures, \$123,204.88 (the general fund will have to suffer a \$60,000 transfer to pay salaries of county officials and employees); ending balance, \$106,136.18.

Officers salary fund: available resources (including the \$60,000

Dr. Dunn to Preach For RL Methodists

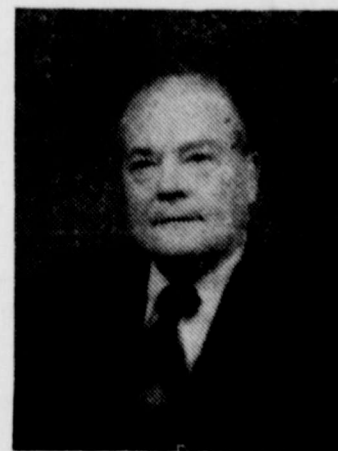

He holds a number of degrees: B. A. from Southwestern University; B. D. from Chandler School of Theology in Atlanta, Ga.; M. A. from Drew Theological Seminary at Madison, N. J.; S. T. M. from Union Theological Seminary in New York City; Ph. D., also from Drew. He was a Navy chaplain during World War II.

Dogies Rip Bullpups, 21-6

A win of 21 to 6 over the Eden Bullpups last Thursday gave the Robert Lee Dogies a 2-2 record for the season.

Coach Kenneth Butler's Dogies will take on Wall Thursday night (today) on the home field. Game time is 6 p.m.

For the first time this season the Dogies went up against a team with whom they were about even-matched in weight and depth of squad, and they gave a good account of themselves.

To open action, Jimmy Munoz kicked off to Eden, but the return was fumbled on the Bullpup 39 and the Dogies recovered. Quarterback Clay Allen went 10 yards to the Eden 29. After three downs and a 5 yard penalty, Eden took the ball on downs on their 25, then lost a fumble on 1st down and the Dogies recovered on the 12. Allen carried to 1 yard line. Terry Ross carried to the 1 foot line and Al went over for the score. Kick attempt for extra point failed. The

Pups took the kick on their 36 and after losing ground on three plays, were forced to punt. Allen took it on the 50 and carried back to the Eden 32. David Lackey carried on 1st down to the 24 to close the quarter at 6-0.

A Dogie fumble gave Eden the ball on their 39. After a pass completion to the RL 49 for a 1st down, again the Dogie defense forced a punt and Robert Lee took over on their own 28. The Dogies

Antlerless Deer Permits Available

Land owners of Coke and surrounding counties will soon have an opportunity to pick up their antlerless deer tags and permits for the coming whitetail season.

R. L. Flanagan, Coke County game warden, said the tags will be issued from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. on Oct. 16, at the courthouse in Robert Lee. He urged all land owners who want the tags to pick them up on that date.

Special antlerless deer tags are issued in lieu of permits in some counties. The difference is that permits are issued in limited quantities based on overpopulation of deer, carrying capacity of the land and in ratio to the proportion of land having surplus deer. No antlerless permits may be issued later than 10 days before the opening of the hunting season.

Special tags are used where either-sex hunts are approved.

There are no limitations on the number of tags a land owner may obtain since the hunts are designed to allow full land owner control of deer harvest.

The Dogies recovered their own kickoff on Eden's 30 yard line but were held and the ball went over to Eden. On 3rd down Allen intercepted a pass on Eden's 34. The last Dogie touchdown came off after Allen passed to Ross on the 5, then Ross carried over for 6 points. The extra point kick by Buddy Wallace added 1 to the score, making it 21-0.

transfer from the general fund) \$125,968.07; approved expenditures, \$127,280.07; ending balance, \$1,312.66 overdrawn.

Interest and sinking funds: available resources, \$64,455.84; approved expenditures, \$21,565.88; ending balance, \$42,889.96.

Revenue sharing fund: available resources, \$97,305.66; approved expenditures, \$90,879.20; ending balance, \$6,926.46.

Totals for all funds: available resources, \$833,802.57; approved expenditures, \$557,555.89; ending balances, \$276,246.68.

Auditor Fikes noted that the budget covers a period from Jan. 1, 1975, through Dec. 31, 1975. He said the county always has a surplus at the beginning of any year (on Jan. 1), but noted that 90 per cent of the tax money comes in during October, November and December. He said the apparent surplus is not real because the county almost always uses up its surplus during August and September of each year just before new tax money starts coming in.

Funeral Held for Drowning Victim

Funeral services for Richard Coke Austin Jr., 48, of San Angelo and a native of Sanco and Robert Lee, were held Wednesday at 10 a.m. in Lawnhaven Memorial Gardens at San Angelo, with the Rev. I. L. Whetsell, chaplain of Baptist Memorial Hospital, officiating.

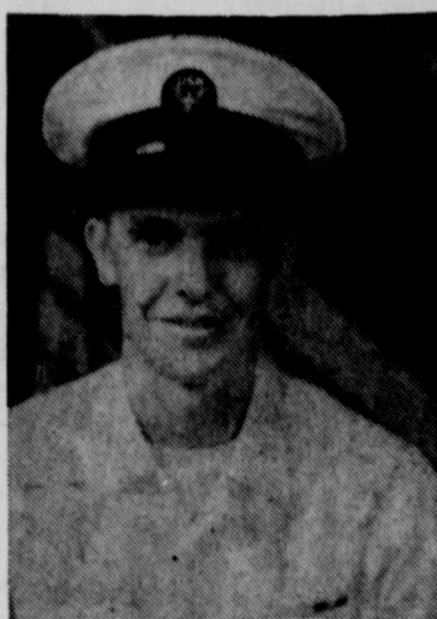
Austin's body was found in the North Concho River Saturday afternoon, not far from the place where he disappeared on Sept. 25 after he waded into the flood waters during the heavy rains and was swept under, according to witnesses.

Two young boys who were playing near the river discovered the body.

He was born Dec. 23, 1925, at Robert Lee, son of Mr. and Mrs. Coke Austin Sr. He attended Robert Lee High School and served in the U. S. Navy.

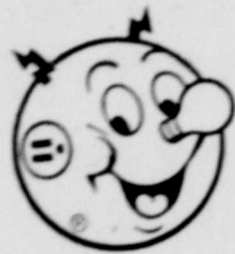
