An estimated 1800 to 2000 persons attended the third annual Coke County Fair which was held Friday, Saturday and Sunday in the Coke County Recreation and Show Center in Robert Lee. Each of the three days, throngs of people

looked over the many exhibits entered as well as the displays set. For most observers it was their first tour of the new Coke County Recreation and Show Center Building.

Many interesting items were on display in the Antique and Historical Department: a spinning wheel which belonged to the great-grandmother of Mmes Lorene and Eva Jo Millican; a family Bible owned by the grandparents of Mrs. Bryan Yarbrough; various kinds of irons and a collar and cuff fluter; hand corn planter; corn sheller; antique furniture; green depression glassware and many more intriguing items.

The Bronte and Robert Lee nursing homes each had some lovely gifts items on display and for sale that were made by residents of the homes.

Judges for the exhibits were Norma Preston, Anna Margaret Anderson, Mrs. Earl Bowman, Janelle Slough, Norma Mullins, Joan Hill and County Extension Agent Rex Jones, all of San Angelo.

Several business firms and organizations gave prizes as fair participants registered for drawings held at the booths.

One of the highlights of the fair was the Belles and Beaus Coronation Saturday night. A large crowd gathered in front of the Rec. Hall for the event and to hear western music by Add Davis and his band. Square dancing followed the coronation.

Everyone enjoyed the fair and plans are being made to have a bigger and better one next year.

### Dogies Take Win From Shorthorns

Action was fast and furious in the Robert Lee Dogie - Bronte Shorthorn tilt Thursday evening at Robert Lee. In the first half the teams appeared well matched and played about the same game as the ball moved back and forth across midfield.

Both teams lost fumbles, but made strong ground drives and completed passes for good gains. Quarterback Clay Allen and backs Terry Ross, Wes Sawyer and Brett Clark worked together well against the Shorthorns. David Lackey and Rickey Ross, ends, Buddy Wallace and Jimmy Munoz, tackles, Sam Ybarro and Waid Davis, guards, and Randy Collins, center, did a great job in stopping the Shorthorn offense. They made many tackles behind the line and made it hard on the Horn kickers and passers.

Lynn Gulley, sub at guard, and Terry Payne, linebacker, also did an outstanding job. Working together the Dogies turned the tide after halftime when the score was 0-0.

Robert Lee received the ball to open the second half on the 25. Ross carried to the 39 for a 1st, Allen to the 42, Ross to the 49, Allen to the Bronte 48, Ross to the 44. A 15 yard penalty moved the ball back to the Dogie 32. Failing to make their 1st, they punted to the Shorthorn 20.

The Dogie line held and David Lackey blocked his second Horn kick, then carried the ball over for

All statewide offices have two or more candidates and, of particular interest to Coke Countians are the races for state representative and U. S. congressman. Squaring off in the state representative race are Democratic rominee Mike Ezzell of Snyder and Republican nominee John R. "Rich" Anderson of Borden County, and in the congressional race, Democrat Robert Krueger of New Braunfels and Republican Doug Harlan of San Antonio.

Coke County Judge W. W. Thetford's office has announced that all county offices in the Court house will be closed Monday, Oct. 28, in observance of Veterans Day.

Robert Lee State Bank also will be closed for the holiday. No other business firms has announced plans to close.

Coke County has had four additional cases of screwworms in the past 10 days, bringing the year's total to six cases.

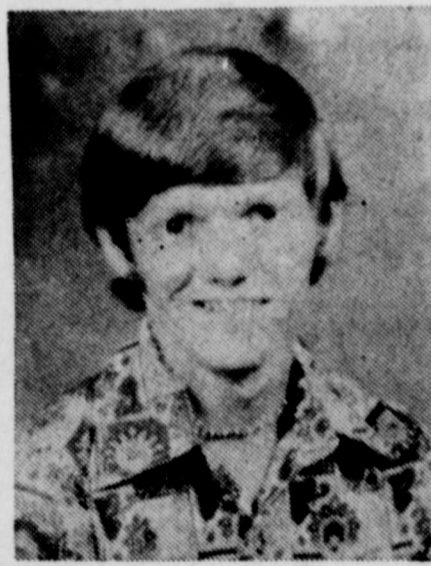
A case was found in a sheep by Graham Fenton on the Arledge Ranch early last week. This was followed by a case reported in a calf by Mike Hollis, just north of Robert Lee.

Two cases came from calves on the Wylie Estate, 12 miles northeast of Bronte.

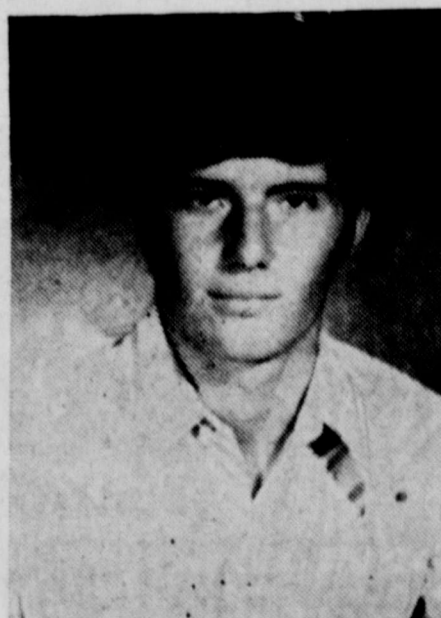
County Extension Agent Sterling Lindsey said conditions have been ideal for a build-up of screwworms. One case unfound or unattended could bring on a rash of cases unless the weather gets much cooler and soon, he said. "Hopefully, cold weather will stall the screwworm in this area within the next 30 days," Lindsey added.
