Steers Finish Season Friday

The Robert Lee Steers are becoming hopeful that they will break their long losing streak Friday night when they wind up the 1974 season at Eldorado. The Steers have had a winless season and have been trampled badly by some of their opponents. However, in the last two games, with Wall and Junction, they have shown a great deal more football ability than in previous 1974 games.

The Steers lost to Wall by a very narrow margin of 3-0 in a defensive battle week before last. Then last Friday night the Steers played the Junction Eagles a fine ball game even though they did lose by a 19-13 score.

Fans are urged to follow the Steers to Eldorado Friday night. It is the last game of the season and the spirited Steers need the support of all their fans.

Tough Mason is in the lead in District 9-A in both season and district records, with an 8-1 and 4-0 record, respectively. Menard is second in both categories with 5-3-1 and 3-0-1. Mason appears to have the championship sewed up for 1974.

Basketball season gets underway for Robert Lee next week as the junior high girls and boys A teams go to Bronte Monday for games starting at 6 p.m. High school girls and boys A teams go to Eola Tuesday for games starting at 6:30 p.m.

On Friday, Nov. 22, Sterling City comes to Robert Lee for high school girls and boys A teams. They will start at 6:30 p.m.

Robert Lee High School girls and boys B teams will play in the Water Valley Tournament Nov. 21, 22 and 23.

Hunting Season To Open Saturday

Hunting season for deer, turkey and quail in Coke County will open Saturday, Nov. 16.

Open season for deer is Nov. 16 through Jan. 1, two deer of either sex, bag limit. Hunters must obtain tags from land owners to kill antlerless deer.

Open season on turkey is Nov. 16 through Jan. 1, bag limit two of either sex. Hunters will notice some additions to this year's hunting licenses: turkey tags.

It is unlawful for any person to kill and possess a turkey without attaching a turkey tag from a valid hunting license to the bird, and this tag must remain attached to the bird until arrival at its final destination," according to Game Warden R. L. Flanagan of Robert Lee.

Quail season opens Nov. 16 and runs through Feb. 16, 12 per day limit and 36 in possession limit.

Coke County is split by U. S. Highway 277 for duck and sandhill crane hunting. In the area west of Highway 277, duck season is open from Nov. 4-24 and Dec. 7 through Jan. 19. East of 277 the season is from Nov. 9 through 24 and Dec. 9 through Jan. 19. Bag limit on ducks is from one to seven ducks in the aggregate of 100 points, according to a point system which hunters should check.

Most all of Coke County is in Zone B for sandhill crane hunting. The season is Nov. 30 through Jan. 26. Daily bag limit is three; possession six.

Dogies County Champions

The Robert Lee Dogies wound up a successful 5-4 season Tuesday night when they went to Eden and whipped the Bullpups 16-0. The game was a makeup contest, having been postponed because of rain.

The first half of the contest was pretty evenly played, both teams gaining good yardage but being stopped short of scoring. Only scoring threat of the first half came as the Dogies recovered a fumble on the Bullpups' 15 yard line. The Dogies moved to the 10 then also lost the ball on a

fumble. The first half was played out 0-0.

The Dogies came back after halftime to turn the game their way. Good gains were made by QB Clay Allen and HB Terry Ross and the Dogie defense gave a great effort. The real turning point was a pass interception by Ross on his own 45 and a long run for he first TD. A pass from Allen to T. Ross was good for 2 extras to make it 8-0.

After the kickoff to the Eden 35 and a penalty to the 50, the Bullpups carried to the Dogie 35 where they were held and the Dogies took over. After two short gains Allen made a nice carry out to the 49 as the third quarter ended.

Early fourth quarter penalties set the Dogies back and they had to kick. Eden took the ball on their 35. A fired up Dogie defense pushed the Bullpups back to their 25, but a penalty moved it out to the 40. After more losses at the hands of the Dogie line, a kick attempt was made near the 30. Jimmy Munoz rushed in, blocked the punt, then picked up the ball and ran over for the second Dogie score. Again the conversion was a pass, from Allen to David Lackey in the end zone. Score: 16-0.

On the kickoff Eden brought the ball to the 50. Here Wade Wallace intercepted a Bullpup pass on the Dogie 46. Time ran out with

the Dogies in possession near mid-field. Coach Butler's whole squad saw some action in this last contest of 1974.

The Dogies claimed the Coke County Junior High Championship last Thursday night when they traveled to Bronte and defeated the Shorhorns 6-0. The Dogies had taken a 24-0 win from the Bronte lads earlier in the season and were declared the undisputed champions of the county.

The lone touchdown of the game came in the first few minutes of play as Clay Allen carried across for the Dogies. Conversion kick was blocked.

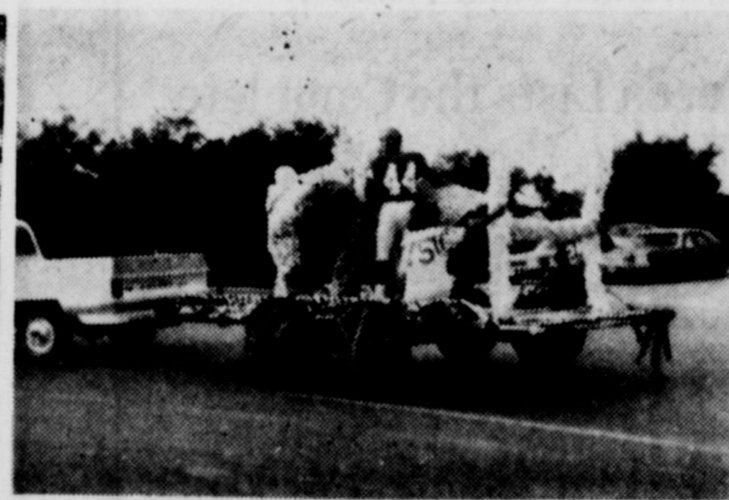

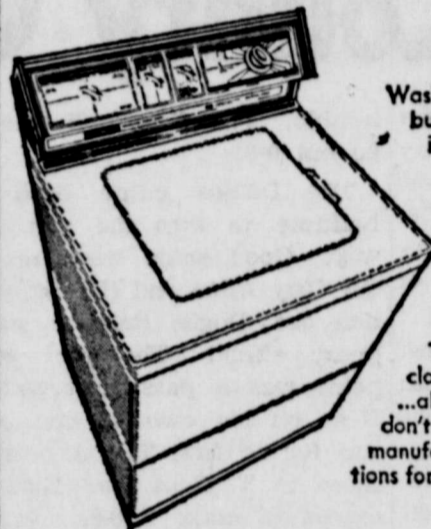

NO MORE UNSTAMPED MAIL DELIVERY

Postmaster Roy Shandley today reminded customers that effective Sunday, Nov. 17, the U. S. Postal Service intends to discontinue delivering mail on which there is no postage.

Postmaster Shandley said Postal Service officials estimate that cost of the service costs approximately \$18 million annually.

After Nov. 17, letters mailed without postage will be returned to the sender if there is a return address, or to the dead letter office, instead of being delivered as postage due mail as has been the custom.

"Naturally we realize that someone could inadvertently forget to put a stamp on a letter or that a stamp could come off prior to cancellation, so we urge mailers to be sure to include a correct return address on their mail," Shandley said.

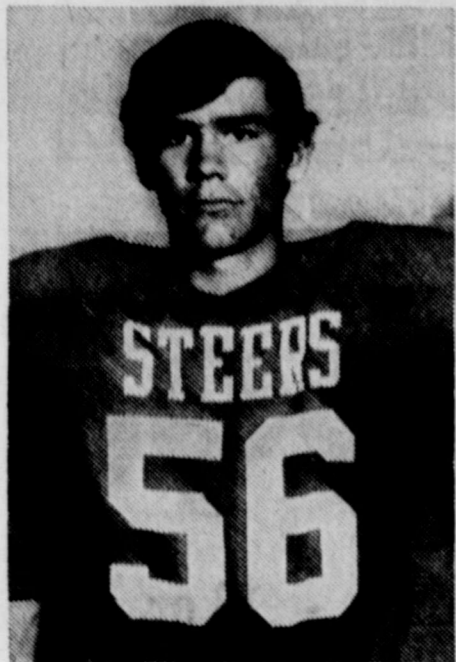

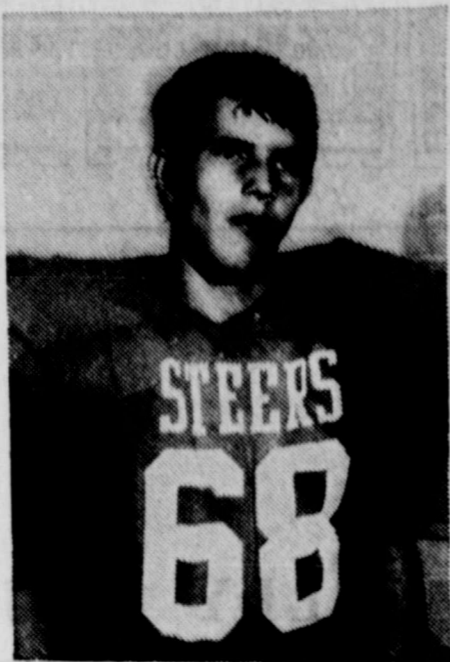
