Hunting Season To Open Saturday

Hunting season for deer, turkey and quail in Coke County will open Saturday, Nov. 16.

Open season for deer is Nov. 16 through Jan. 1, two deer of either sex, bag limit. Hunters must obtain tags from land owners to kill antlerless deer.

Open season on tunkey is Nov. 16 through Jan. 1, bag limit two of either sex. Hunters will notice some additions to this year's hunting licenses: turkey tags. 

Bag limit on ducks is from one to seven ducks in the aggregate of 100 points, according to a point system which hunters should check.

Most all of Coke County is in Zone B for sandhill crane hunting. The season is Nov. 30 through Jan. 26. Daily bag limit is three; possession six.



NO MORE UNSTAMPED MAIL DELIVERY

Postmaster Ray Shandley today reminded customers that effective Sunday, Nov. 17, the U. S. Postal Service intends to discontinue delivering mail on which there is no

Postmaster Shandley said Postal Service officials estimate that cost of the service costs approximately \$18 million annually.

After Nov. 17, letters mailed without postage will be returned to the sender if there is a return address, or to the dead letter office, instead of being delivered as postage due mail as has been the custom.

"Naturally we realize that someone could inadvertently forget to put a stamp on a letter or that a stamp could come off prior to cancellaion, so we urge mailers to be sure to include a correct return address on their mail," Shandley
