

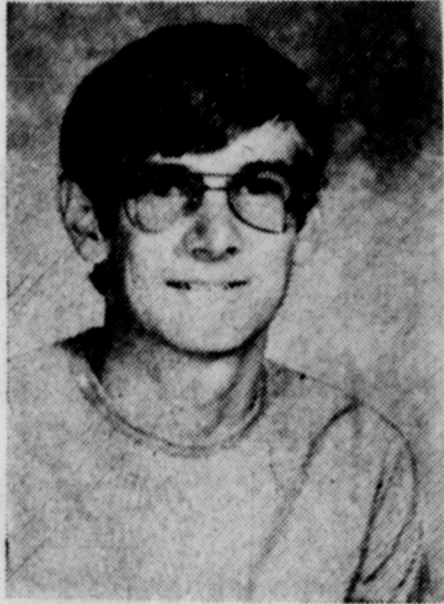

FHA Drouth Loans Okayed

Lane Shandley and Linda Havins have been named Band Beau and Band Sweetheart for the 1974-75 Robert Lee Steer Band.

Lane is a senior and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Shandley. He has been a member of the Spanish Club, Future Teachers Association, played basketball and has been active in the Steer Band.

Linda, a senior, is the daughter of Mrs. Edna Havins. They were honored at halftime activities at the Robert Lee-Junction game Nov. 8.

Farmers and ranchers in Coke County who sustained production losses as a result of the drouth during the period Sept. 1, 1973, to Sept. 1, 1974, may be eligible to receive an emergency loan from the Farmers Home Administration.

Those who have not received an emergency loan to assist them in recovering from their loss may apply for such a loan at the Farmers Home Administration county office at 1901 Lamar in Sweetwater before the close of business Aug. 15, 1975.

These loan applications will be taken under the terms of a new

law enacted Jan. 2, 1974. Individual examination will be made of each application to determine date of the disaster occurrence and emergency loan benefits for which the applicant is eligible.

Loans based on qualifying production losses may include funds to reimburse applicants for production expenses which went into damaged or destroyed crop and livestock enterprises, but not to produce new crops during 1975. Payment terms depend on the purposes for which the loan is used and the applicant's payment ability. No loan may exceed the actual loss sustained. The interest rate for these loans is 5 per cent and there will be no principal cancellation. These loans must be secured by crops, livestock, farm machinery, or real estate.

Anyone wishing further information concerning a loan should contact Alton Pyburn who is in charge of FHA in Coke County.

Town to Close For Thanksgiving

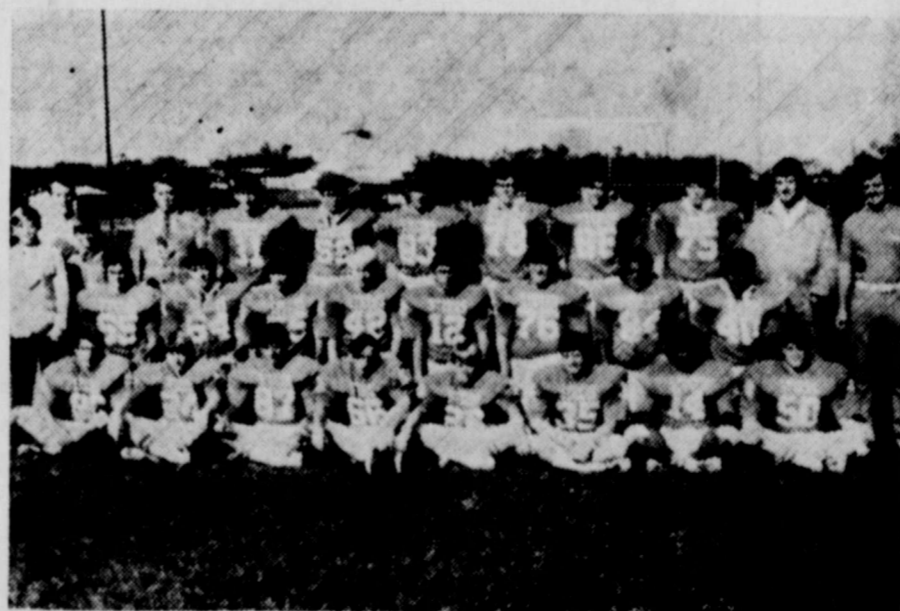
Robert Lee will close up for Thanksgiving next Thursday, Nov. 28. Most all the business firms in town will close for the holiday.

Ensor Is Named County Sheriff

J. Lee Ensor of Bronte, who has been serving as chief deputy under Sheriff Doug Robertson, has been appointed by the Coke County Commissioners Court to fill the vacancy caused by Robertson's resignation. Ensor took over the office Nov. 15, the same day Robertson's resignation became effective.

In addition to having the sheriff's job from now until Jan. 1, 1975, Ensor was elected handily by a write-in vote on Nov. 5 to be Coke County's sheriff for the next four years. At the same time Robertson announced his resignation, he also stated that he was no longer a candidate for reelection, even though he was the elected Democratic nominee and his name was printed on the ballots. He endorsed Ensor for the job and a write-in campaign was begun for the General Election. Ensor won the race easily with 587 write-in votes.

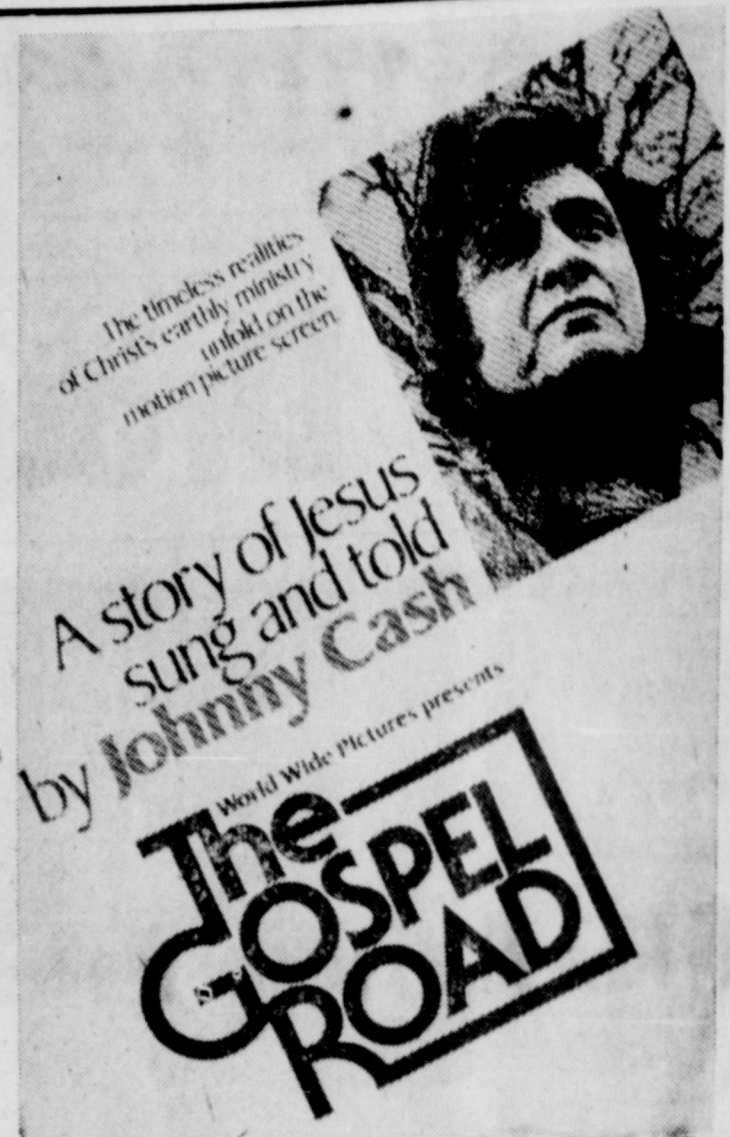
'64 CLUB TO HOST BRONTE STERLING CITY CLUBS

Steer Fall to Eagles, 27-12

This may be remembered as the longest football season in Robert Lee history, as it was the fate of the Steers to always come out on the short end of the score. But wounds will heal, even as deep as these are, and the Steers will be back, I promise you.

The Steers finished their 1974 season last Friday night when they went to Eldorado and were defeated 27-12.

First Quarter

The Steers kicked off to the Eldorado 11 and it was returned to their 39. The Steers held at the 39 and Eldorado punted to the Steer 18. Eldorado held at the Steer 23 and the Steer luck held as a short punt bounced back to the Steer 18.

The Steers hung tough and Eldorado got nowhere. The Steers took over the ball but soon fumbled or got it stolen, to put it mildly, at the 12 yard line. The Steers held again at the 13 as the 3rd quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

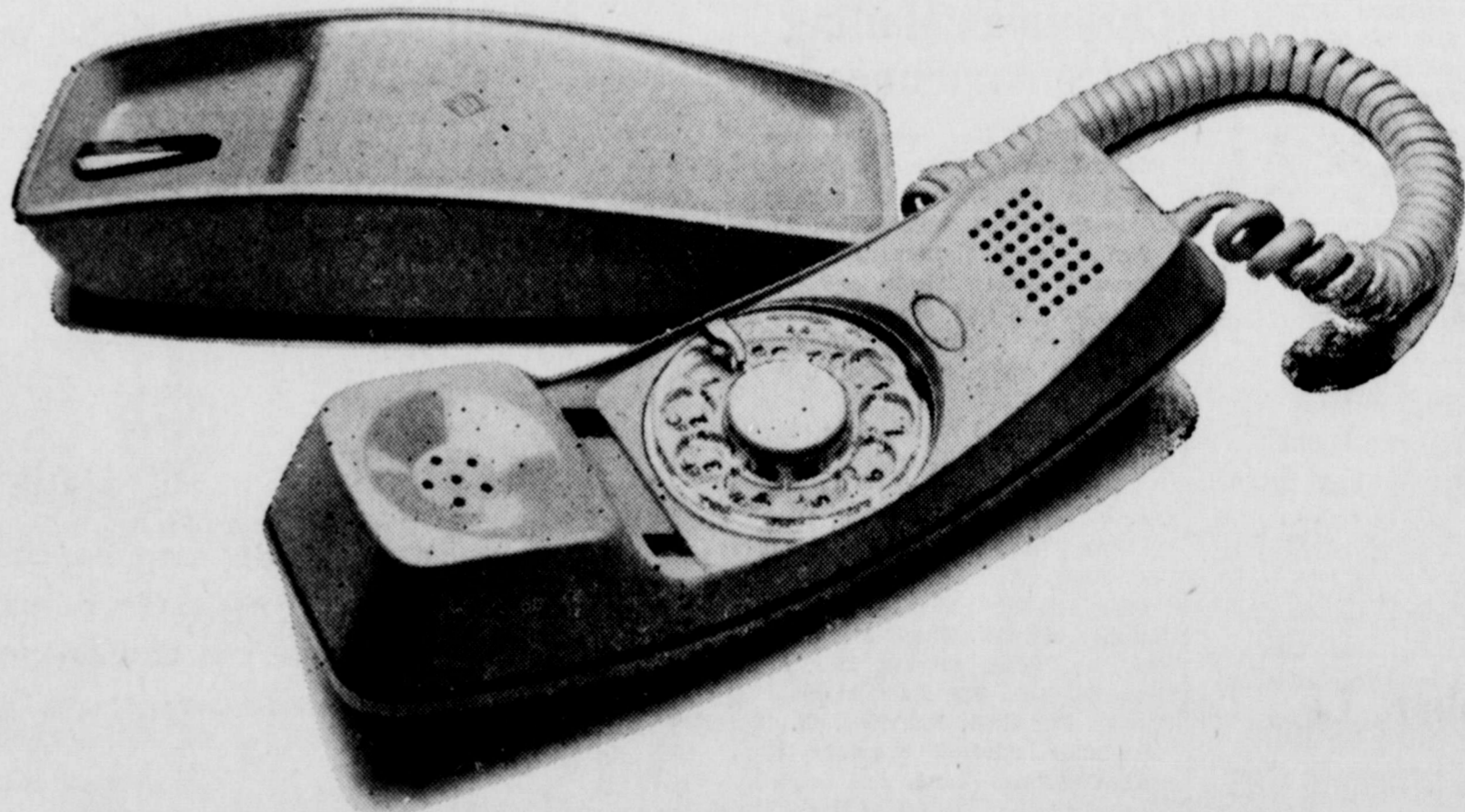
