'The Gospel Road' To Be Shown Here

The story is old, but the perspective is up-dated and brought into sharp focus by the film, "The Gospel Road," to be shown on Sunday, Dec. 1, at Robert Lee Baptist Church. The showing will begin at 7 p.m.

"The Gospel Road," distributed by World Wide Pictures, was conceived and produced by Johnny Cash and his wife, June Carter Cash, whose desire was to tell the story of Jesus Christ in a realistic and meaningful way.

The film is a unique blend of scripture based narrative, an abundant supply of specially written songs, and a series of in-depth character portrayals, with Israel itself as the mixing bowl.

You are there, walking beside the Jordan and the Sea of Galilee; you are there, seeing Him in many human situations that establish a practical and personal rapport with every viewer.

You are there, being introduced to the disciples, and gaining insights into their varied personalities. Meeting to Explain Coke Soil Survey

All interested farmers, ranchers and other citizens are invited to attend a meeting at 7:30 p.m. Monday when the recently published soil survey of Coke County will be discussed and explained. The meeting will be held at the courthouse in Robert Lee and will be sponsored by the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Jim Barnhill, soil scientist formerly based in Coke County, made survey and spent many hours collecting the information and compiling it. He will not be able to be present at the meeting.

Eph Cummins, Coke County conservationist, said County Agent Sterling Lindsey will be present to help explain the data in the book. Clarence Weidenfeld, soil scientist of San Angelo, will do most of the explaining, however, Cummins said.

Cummins said city, county and school officials should be particularly interested in the information, and he issued a special invitation to them to attend.

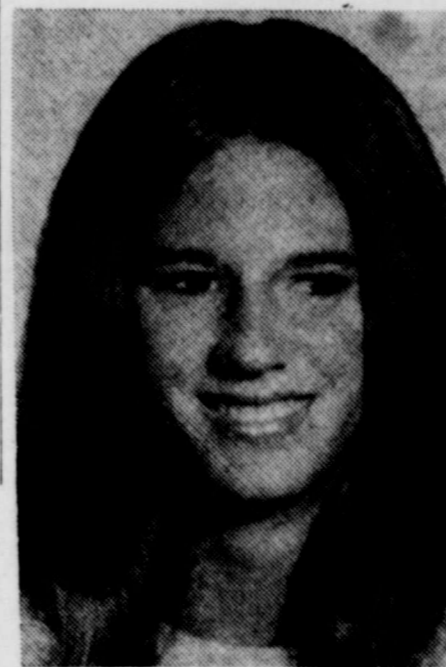

She has served on many committees in 4-H, including Awards and Fun Day programs. She is a member of the Coke County 4-H County Council and a delegate to District 4-H Council.

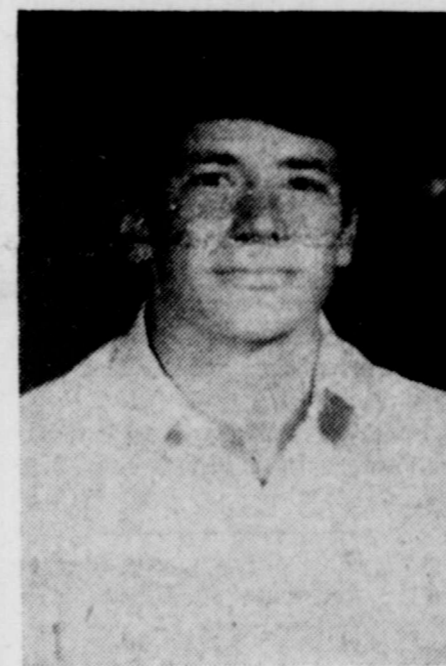

Mrs. White is a graduate of J. J. Pearce High School at Richardson and Mr. White is a graduate of Texas Tech University at Lubbock.

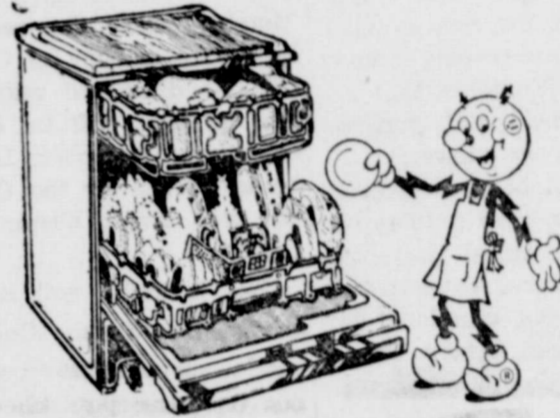

To assure long life and efficiency, the water heater tank should have a small amount of water drained periodically. Once a month should be adequate. The purpose of draining water from the tank is to prevent sediment build-up in the tank bottom.

The thermostat controlling the water temperature is usually pre-set at the factory to deliver hot water at 150° F. This setting has proven satisfactory from the standpoint of operating cost and household needs.

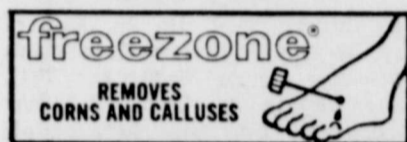

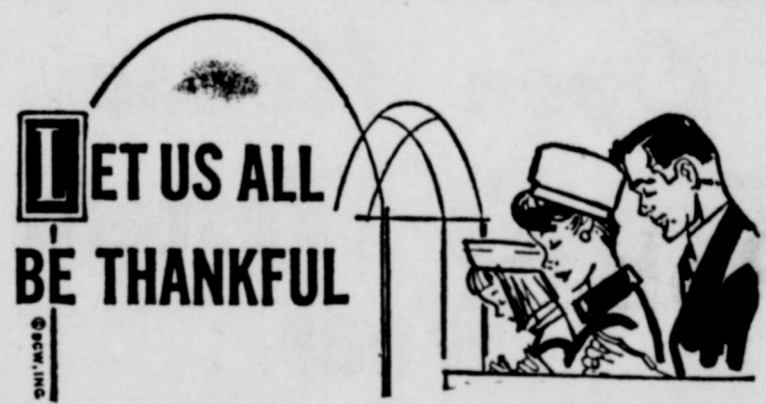
