

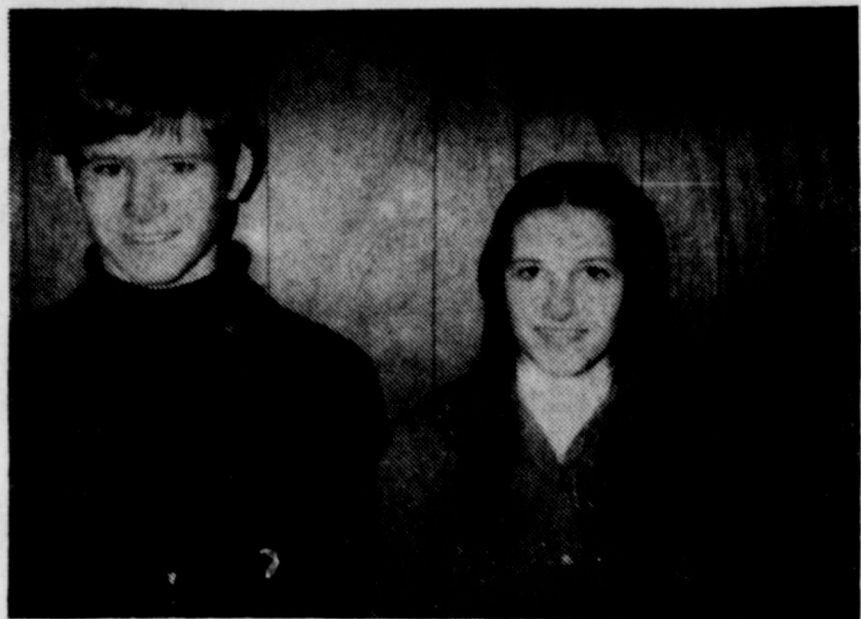

County Judge W. W. Thetford and county commissioners also have expressed desire for county wide participation in the celebration.

All citizens of Robert Lee, Bronte and rural areas of the county are invited to attend a meeting Thursday, Jan. 23, at 7 p.m. in the new Coke County Recreation and Show Center.

Mrs. H. K. Allen of Temple, a member of the Texas Bicentennial Commission, will be on hand to suggest plans and projects for local participation, many of which have been used successfully in other communities.

Already some activity has begun here which may help Robert Lee to qualify as a Texas Bicentennial Community. Bronte has also started working in that direction.

All clubs, churches, school groups, service clubs, ethnic groups and organizations of all kinds are urged to have representatives present at the meeting Jan. 23. Individuals interested in improving the towns and county are invited to attend.

Senior Citizens Party Set Jan. 21

Senior Citizens of West Coke County, those 60 years of age and older, are invited to attend a covered dish get together in the new Coke County Recreation and Show Center, Tuesday, Jan. 21, from 2 to 5 p.m.

This will be the second social held here since the formation of Coke County Senior Citizens' Advisory Committee, sponsor of the affair, working under Concho Valley Council of Governments. The first meeting in December was attended by 62 persons who voted unanimously to continue the parties the third Tuesday of each month. Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Hambright, owners of Mountain Creek Lodge in Robert Lee, have announced that the new addition to their lodge is now complete and in use. The new addition consists of a family room, two double units and three single units.

The new units and family room were built directly behind the first section of three double and three single units and the office which Hambright completed and opened for business in March of 1974.

Each room has its individually controlled air conditioning and heating unit, telephone and color TV. The rooms have shag carpet, marble lavatories, bath tubs and showers.

Many residents were surprised when they awakened Sunday morning to find the ground covered with the white icy stuff. The cold weather was brought on as the winter's worst storm moved through Texas, bringing sub-freezing temperatures to the entire state.

Col. Jack Snead Awarded Citation

Lt. Col. Jack C. Snead, who grew up in Robert Lee, recently received a Meritorious Service Medal from the U. S. Air Force upon his retirement from active duty.

Colonel Snead is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Snead Jr. of Robert Lee and his wife, the former Glo Caraway, is the daughter of Mrs. Lillian Middleton of Robert Lee.

The couple has two children, David, 19, who is in college, and Angela, 13, of the home. The colonel is now working for Telcom, Inc., of Arlington, Va., as a senior engineer, and the family lives in Oxon Hill, Md.

The citation accompanying the presentation of the medal, read:

Lieutenant Colonel Jack C. Snead distinguished himself in the performance of outstanding service to the United States as Chief, Avionics Branch, Avionics and Weapons Division, Directorate of Electronics and Weapons, Director of Science and Technology, Headquarters Air Force Supreme Command from 9 September 1969 to 30 November 1974. During this period, his outstanding engineering competency in the fields of Air Force inertial navigation, navigation guidance and weapon delivery coupled with the exceptional skill and judgment with which he managed the application of these technologies to meet the needs of present and future weapon systems, have had a profound influence upon Air Force capabilities and their effective employment. The singularly distinctive accomplishments of Colonel Snead reflect great credit upon himself and the United States Air Force.

The Citation bore the official seal of the United States Air Force. The medal and citation were presented at a special ceremony and the colonel's wife's help to him as an Air Force officer was recognized when a special award was presented to her.

The storm left three to four inches of snow in the Robert Lee-Bronte area, but high winds whipped the dry snow into drifts as deep as two feet. Abilene reported six inches of snow and San Angelo had two inches.

Rain fell early Saturday night but turned to snow and the white flakes came down until mid-morning Sunday. The temperature stayed below freezing all day Sunday and then dipped into the low teens Sunday night and Monday morning.

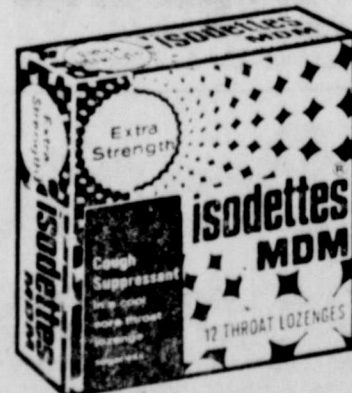

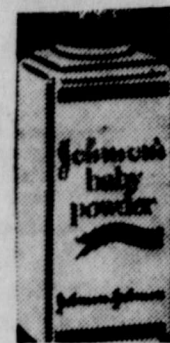

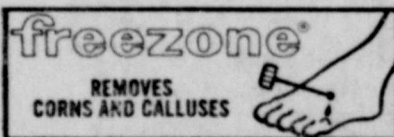
