

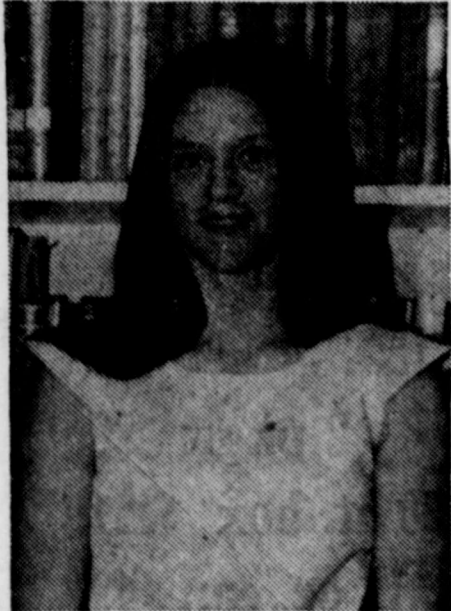

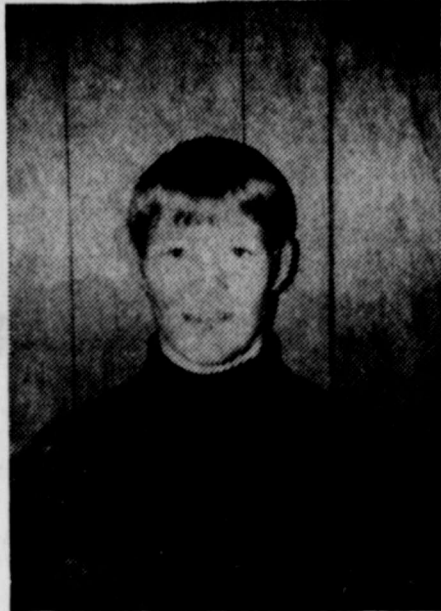

Funeral services for Mrs. Fannie McCaleb Muston, 81, of Robert Lee were held at Rockdale Wednesday, Feb. 12, at 10 a.m. in Phillips & Lucke Funeral Home Chapel. Burial was in the Tanglewood Cemetery at Rockdale.

Mrs. Muston died Sunday at 6 p.m. in Shannon Hospital in San Angelo after a short illness. She had suffered a broken hip from a fall on Feb. 2 and had undergone surgery Tuesday.

She was born Dec. 13, 1893, in Falls County and was married to Andrew, (Jack) Muston Oct. 12, 1913, in Rockdale. They lived in East Coke County for many years and were members of the First United Methodist Church of Bronte. They left Coke County in 1962 after living here since 1919. He preceded her in death Dec. 2, 1964. Mrs. Muston came to Robert Lee from Bangs April 13, 1971, and had been a resident of West Coke County Nursing Home since that time.

Public Library Near Reality

Establishment of a public library has long been a dream of the Coke County Historical Survey Committee. That dream is becoming a reality since it has been adopted by Mayor S. E. Adams and the City Council as one of the projects for the county's Bicentennial observances.

Coke County Commissioners approved the project at their regular second Monday meeting this week and adopted the name, "Coke County Library." The Court is studying procedures for making application for state approval of the project.

Henry "Hank" Baker, chairman of the Library Project, is now receiving cash donations. The Library will be housed in the southeast room of the old Coke County Jail, which is becoming a museum complex.

A spokesman for the Coke County Historical Survey Committee said the group's project of securing books for Coke County school libraries, which has been carried on for the past 10 years, will not be abandoned. The committee will merely add the Coke County Library to the list of libraries to receive their donations.

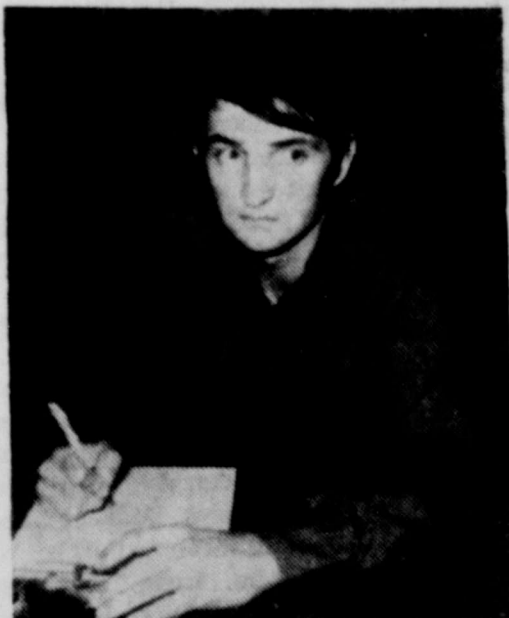

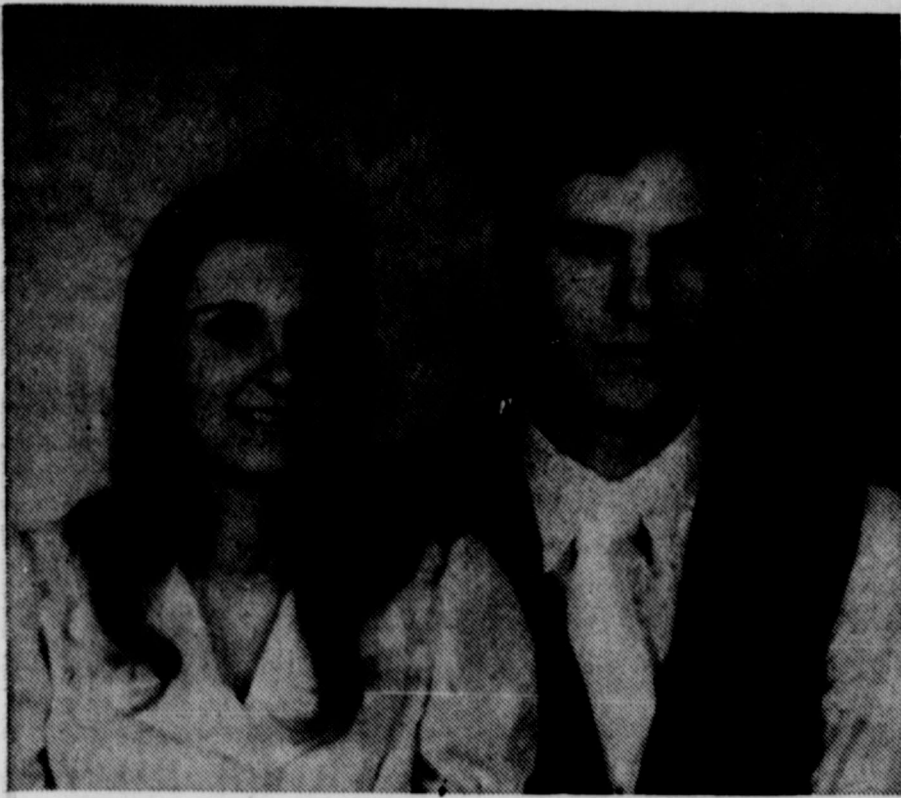

NOTICE OF INTENT TO ENGAGE IN WEATHER MODIFICATION ACTIVITIES

Notice is hereby given that Colorado River Municipal Water District, 1318 E. 4th, Big Spring, Texas 79720, who holds License Number 75-5 of the State of Texas, intends to engage in an operation to change or attempt to change by artificial methods the natural development of atmospheric cloud forms for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District located at P. O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas, 79720, and will conduct the program of weather modification designed to increase precipitation by means of the aerial application of silver iodide or other artificial nuclei as follows:

1. The area over, or within which, equipment may be operated shall include the counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Dawson, Borden, Scurry, Fisher, Martin, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan, Glasscock, Sterling and Coke.

2. The target area, within which the precipitation is intended to be enhanced, can be described as follows:
The boundary may be described by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Hiway 87 in a northwesterly direction to Lamesa, thence north-northeast on Hiway 87 to the north border of Dawson County, thence east along the north border of Dawson, Borden and Scurry Counties to Hiway 84; thence southeast along Hiway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence south-southeast to Maryneal; thence southwest to Silver in Coke County; thence south-southwest to Hiway 37 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence northwesterly along Hiway 37 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

3. The materials, equipment and methods to be used in conducting the operation within this area of approximately 3500 square miles include a 3 cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.

4. The person in charge of this program shall be Owen H. Ivie, Colorado River Municipal Water District, Big Spring, Texas.

5. The program will be operational during the period from April 15, 1975 to October 15, 1975.

6. Any persons who feel they may be affected in some adverse way by this program may file a complaint to the Texas Water Development Board, P. O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas, 78711. Signed: Owen H. Ivie
