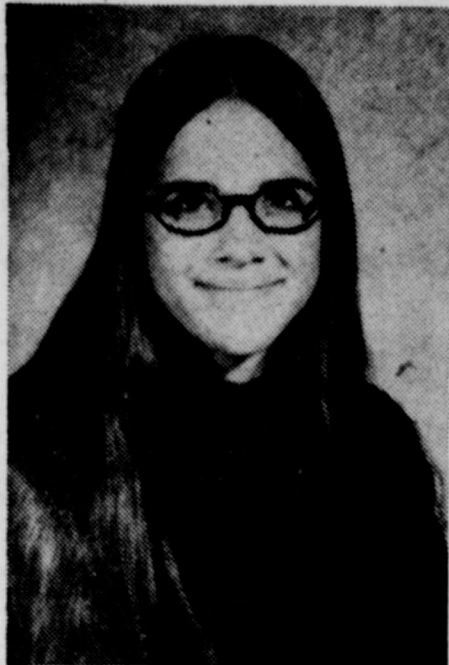

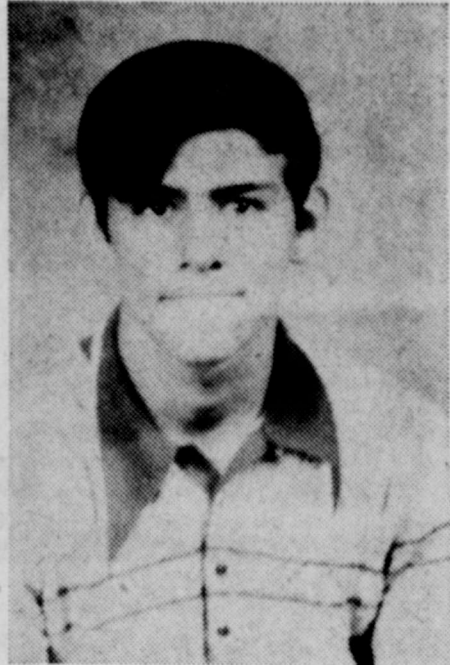
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Contests In School and Hospital

Council Accepts Line From Spence to Town

The Robert Lee City Council officially accepted the new pipeline from Lake Spence to the Robert Lee Water Treatment plant, located below the dam of Mountain Creek Lake.

The line was constructed last fall and has been completed for several months.

The line was constructed to assure city an adequate water supply when Mountain Creek Lake gets low, as has happened several times in the last few years.

City officials, when they let the contract for the pipeline from the big lake, stated that it should assure Robert Lee water customers an adequate supply for the future.

Lewis Heuvel and Allen Clendennen are seeking positions as city aldermen. Incumbents Frank Hearn and Dale Wojtek did not run for reelection and the other position to be filled was brought about when Robert Large resigned Jan. 7. Holdover aldermen are Jimmy Bell and Royce Hood, and Mayor S. E. Adams is the other holdover member of the council.

Three candidates have filed for the two vacancies on the school board. D. J. Walker Jr. and Foy Askins, incumbents, have filed for re-election, and Ben Bessent is a new candidate who is running for a trustee position. Holdover trustees are Bobby Baker, Glen Womack, J. C. Wallace Jr., Wilbern Millican and Joe Flowers.

Candidates for the Coke County School Board are George Newby in Precinct 1 and D. O. King in Precinct 3, both incumbents.

Four candidates have filed for election to the West Coke County Hospital board. Two places are to be filled. Candidates include one incumbent, W. E. Jacoby, plus Joe R. Ash, Maurice Yarbrough and Derwood Mumford. Incumbent Victor Wojtek was petitioned for reelection but has asked that his name be withdrawn from the race. Holdover directors are J. D. Harmon, Finnell Smith and Fern Havins.

Absentee voting will start Monday, March 17, in the three elections.

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YOU ARE WHAT YOU EAT

Despite the rich bounty provided to us by the land, Texas and the nation are described as nutritional illiterates.

Nutrition is a relatively new science. For this reason there is room for misunderstanding, and even intentional misrepresentation. Although much malnutrition is the result of poverty, a full pocket doesn't mean a nourished body, says the State Health Department.

The State Health Department says you can get all the required nutrients, including Vitamins C and E through a wise selection of foods. Selecting foods properly will also insure efficient utilization of the food dollar — something that can shrink rapidly in today's supermarkets. Supplements generally are expensive and unnecessary, unless prescribed by a physician.

The Nutrition Services Division of the State Health Department says the basic food groups still are the best guide for the average person who needs the strength and vitality to meet each day's challenges. These are divided into the milk group, meat and alternate protein group, fruits and vegetables group, and the bread and cereal group. While giving you sufficient energy, these groups also supply the trace elements of minerals which your body needs.

Calcium, iron and iodine are not the only minerals you need. Most of the others—zinc, copper, sodium, potassium, magnesium and phosphorus—are widely available in so many foods that a little variety in making your choice at the grocery store takes care of them easily. Magnesium, for example, abounds in beans and dark green vegetables.

Phosphorus shows up in the same foods that supply you with protein and calcium, although leafy vegetables contain little phosphorus.

Vitamin A: This vitamin plays a very important role in eye function, and in keeping the skin and mucous membranes resistant to infection. Although vitamin A occurs only in foods of animal origin, the deep yellow and dark green vegetables and fruits supply a material — caroten—which your body can turn into vitamin A. Cheese made from whole milk, or margarine enriched with vitamin A, both supply this vitamin.

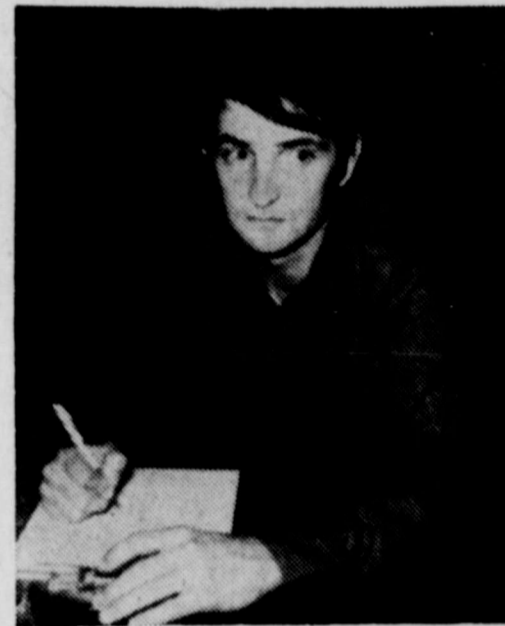
Previously assigned at Shemya AFB, Alaska, Sergeant Casey is a

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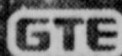

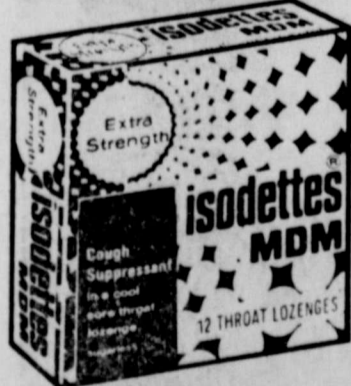

Purpose of the meeting was to hear progress reports from the project chairmen.

Fern Havins, Horizons Project chairman, reported that considerable work has been done at the city's Fern Havins Park, where trees have been pruned and brush

and weeds cleared from the river bank, making access to water easier for fishermen and greatly improving the appearance of the park.

It is hoped that all citizens and visitors will cooperate by helping keep local parks clear of unsightly debris.

Mrs. Wilson Bryan, project chairman for Festival U. S. A., reported that plans for several affairs are shaping up with the '64 Study Club, Alpha Kappa Pi, the Robert Lee Silver Lions Club, the Robert Lee School Bands and directors of Coke County Fair pledged to help.

She said that Henry "Hank" Baker, library chairman, has really been busy. Bookshelves have been built and finished and will be installed as soon as carpet can be laid.

Several hundred dollars and a large number of books have been donated. Mrs. Yarbrough complimented Baker on the speedy effort he is putting into the library project.

Several donations have been received for the Coke County Museum Project, which will be ready to receive more artifacts as soon as carpet is laid.

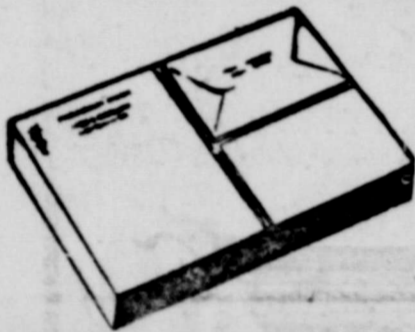
Members of the committee suggested that all citizens make some of their memorials, birthday and other special event gifts payable to the Bicentennial Committee or specify the project of the donor's choice.

Former RL Man Has Bright Idea

A San Angelo man who grew up in Robert Lee has come up with an idea that has proved to be of great help to farmers and ranchers who carry a rifle in their pickups—and even more help to large number of persons who help in the production of the item.

Johnny Elkins has invented a gun rack which requires no holes to be drilled in the pickup cab in order to mount the rack. Elkins' idea has been found practical, allowing the gun rack to be mounted with blades that fit down between the rubber weatherstrip and the glass in the rear of the pickup cab.

Elkins, a long time carpenter and contractor in San Angelo, is now vice president and general manager of the E-Z Mount Corporation of San Angelo.

In addition to supplying farmers and ranchmen with a useful item in their everyday business, the firm has put hundreds of hands to work which might otherwise be idle. The parts of the rack are manufactured by a Midland plastics firm, but are assembled by residents of the San Angelo Center at Carlsbad. Another sheltered workshop for assembling the product was recently opened in downtown San Angelo and is operated MH-MR Center of San Angelo.

Elkins said when he first had the idea he thought it was a good one and would sell, but added, frankly, he had no money to work with. He took his idea and went to Marvin Hanz, San Angelo attorney and the men formed a corporation with Hanz as president. The two men worked on the design and development and has patents pending.

Another helper in the success story is Elkins' wife, Ann. The two work together in handling marketing of their product and often attend sporting goods shows to demonstrate the merchandise. Beginning marketing operations from the back of a pickup, the op-

eration has expanded into a nationwide market and into Canada. Profits from the operation go into a trust fund that supports the workshop, its equipment and supervisors. The mentally retarded workers are paid in accordance with their abilities to get the work out.

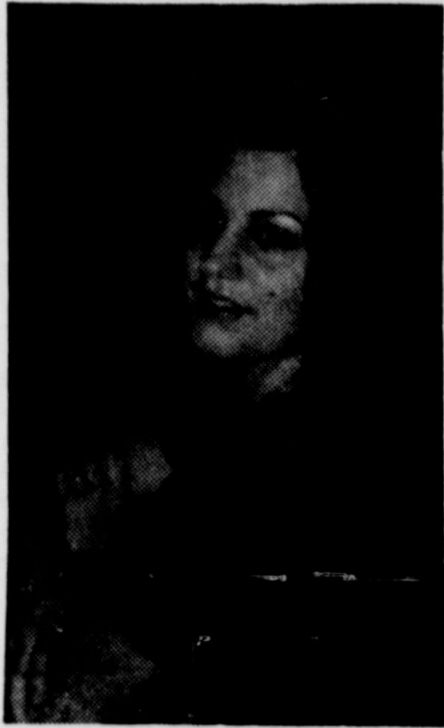

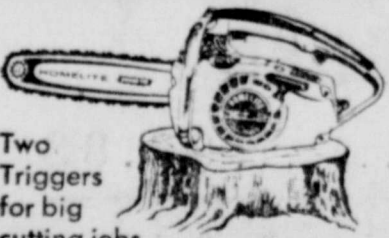

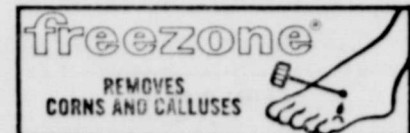
